Bronte Child Has Hepatitis; Doctor Urges Everyone to Take Precautions

One child in Bronte school has infectious hepatitis, it was reported last Friday by Supt. C. B. Barbee. Rhonda Ivey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack D. Ivey, and a third grader in the local school, is presently undergoing treatment for the disease. So far as had been reported, she is the only person here who has been diagnosed as having the disease.

Supt. Barbee issued a letter to all school parents last Friday announcing the fact that hepatitis had been found here. A number of cases have been reported in Ballinger during the last few weeks.

Dr. John R. Harris, city health officer, said this week that strict personal hygiene is the best preventative for keeping the disease from spreading. He warned that everyone should wash hands thor-

oughly before eating and after using the bathroom.

Dr. Harris said that shots of gamma globulin, which is helpful in treating and preventing the disease, have been given to a number of children.

The doctor said first symptoms of hepatitis are nausea and a little fever. However, he added that these same symptoms occur when a person is contracting influenza, making a spot diagnosis difficult. He urged persons with these symptoms to see a physician at once.

Dr. Harris said that he knows only the one case which has been confirmed, but that there are others which are under observation.

He also stated that there is no need for undue alarm but that every precaution should be taken to prevent spread of the disease.

Rattlesnake Hunt Date Moved Up To March 7 and 8

Dates for the Jaycee Rattlesnake Roundup have been changed to March 7 and 8. The hunt had been set for Feb. 29 and March 1, but the date were changed due to a conflict with the Sweetwater roundup.

In a meeting Monday night, the Jaycees made definite plans for the hunt.

Ranchers who are interested in having hunters take snakes on their land are requested to register at Mackey's Feed & Supply in Bronte and at Sparks Texaco Station in Robert Lee. Hunters may register at these places on the days of the hunt or before, if they wish.

Plans call for a show Sunday afternoon at the livestock show barn in Robert Lee. Admission price will be 10c for children and 25c for adults.

Prizes of a rod and reel and a plaque will be awarded for the longest snake, the shortest snake, the snake with the most rattles, and to the individual who brings in the most pounds of snakes.

Five rules were announced for the roundup:

1. No guns allowed.
2. Keep all vehicles on existing roads.
3. Hunt only on approved ranches.
4. Use extreme caution in fire prevention.
5. Close all gates at all times.

The Jaycees are working in close cooperation with the county agent's office, with game wardens and with a committee from the Coke County Game Management Association, composed of Otis Smith, C. E. Arrott and Curtis Walker.

A number of professional hunters have agreed to be present for this first Coke County Roundup. The hunt will get underway each day at 8 a.m.

Public Invited To Science Fair

Annual Science Fair conducted by students of Bronte Schools was opened up to PTA members Tuesday night and will be open to the public all day Saturday.

A fine collection of projects will be on exhibition at the fair, and every person in the area is assured of seeing something which will be interesting and educational when they visit the fair.

Clint Low, high school science and math teacher, is directing the fair, and issued a cordial invitation to everyone to attend.

Exhibits have been prepared by students from the elementary grades through high school, and some of them are quite complicated.

Guides will be on hand Saturday to show visitors through the show and explain the exhibits.

Prizes will be awarded to first, second and third place winners in the following categories: elementary room; junior high group and

individual exhibits, both biological and physical; and senior high group and individual exhibits, both biological and physical.

Some of the projects which will be exhibited included a survey on smoking, the power of centrifugal force, effect of rattlesnake bites, collections of sea shells and insects and many others.

In inviting the public to view the science exhibits, Low said "These students have spent a lot of time, money and effort in working up their projects and they will appreciate your coming by to see them."

CITY ELECTION CALLED APRIL 7

A mayor and three councilmen will be named at a city election which has been called for Tuesday, April 7. An order and notice of the election are being published in this week's Enterprise.

Mayor Norman R. Kiker told The Enterprise Tuesday that he definitely will not be a candidate for re-election. He said that he appreciates the cooperation and help received from local citizens during the time he has served, but that personal business matters make it impossible for him to seek re-election. Kiker was named in a special election early last year to fill the unexpired term of the late J. A. Stephenson.

Council members whose terms expire this year are Matthew Caperton, Cecil Kemp and Billy Joe Luckett. Caperton and Kemp were contacted Wednesday morning on their plans. Kemp said that he would not be a candidate, and Caperton replied that he had not given the matter much thought and could not say definitely what his plans are. Luckett was unavailable for comment.

Royce Fancher and C. E. Bruten are the only holdover members of the council. They have another year to serve.

Deadline for filing for either the mayor's position or the city council spots is thirty days before election.

The election will be held at the city hall with Noah Pruitt Sr. serving as election judge.

BRONTE DROPS TWO THRILLERS TO ROBERT LEE TUESDAY NIGHT

Bronte high school teams lost a couple of close ones Tuesday night in the local gym to Robert Lee. Girls score was 57-48 and the boys game ended 59-46. In both games, only one point separated the teams at half time.

Jan Wilkins was high scorer in the girls game with 24 points; Peggy Corley made 22 and Georgia Owen 2. Rhonda Gartman scored 23 for Robert Lee.

Royce Lee and Ron Johns each scored 11 points for the local boys. Weldon Broussard made 7; Jim Morrow 5 and Barry Curlee and Jimmy Wells, 6 each. Terry Thetford was high for Robert Lee and the game with 23 points.

In games played last Friday night at Sterling City, Bronte boys were victorious 45-42 while the girls lost 62-47. For the boys, Royce Lee headed the scoring col-

umn with 19 points; Weldon Broussard made 16 and Danny Bailey made 13 for Sterling City.

Peggy Corley made 28 points for the Bronte girls and Jan Wilkins scored 14.

These last games brought the district record for the home teams to four losses and five wins for the boys and six losses and two wins for the girls.

Only two more games remain on the district schedule. Last home game of the season will be Friday night with Water Valley here beginning at 6:30 p.m. and the teams will wind out the season at Garden City next Tuesday.

Robert Lee boys are leading in district 83-B play and are undefeated thus far in season play. A crucial district game will take place Friday of next week when Robert Lee teams go to Forsan.



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
