Royce Lee's Name Put on Ballot for Mayor of Bronte

A petition has been filed with City Secretary Mrs. Helen Kirkland to place Royce Lee's name on the city election ballot for mayor. Candidates may file their own names for positions in the city government or the names may be filed by petition bearing the names of at least five qualified resident voters.

Mrs. Kirkland said Wednesday morning that this is the first filing in connection with the forthcoming city election. Vacancies exist for three councilmen and for mayor.

Present Mayor Norman R. Kiker announced a couple of weeks ago that he would not be a candidate for re-election. Councilmen whose terms expire this year are Billy Joe Luckett, Cecil Kemp and Matthew Caperton. None of them has indicated that he will seek re-election.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 7, and deadline for filing a name to appear on the ballot is 30 days prior to election day. Therefore, all candidates must have their names filed by a week from Saturday, March 7.

APRIL 1 DEADLINE FOR AUTO INSPECTION STICKERS

"April 15 is the deadline for several things, one of which is having your motor vehicle inspection certificate on your car," warned Maj. Leo E. Gossett, commander of the 49 county West Texas Region of the Department of Public Safety.

Capt. R. M. Hammett, who heads the Vehicle Inspection Service for this area, stated, "Our records show less than one-third of the vehicles in this area have been inspected since the new inspection year began Sept. 1, 1963, and this means several thousand vehicles must be inspected in the time remaining."

All motor vehicles are required to display a valid inspection certificate on or before the April 15 deadline. Those who fail to comply with this law are subject to a fine of not less than \$1.00 and costs or more than \$200 and costs.

Davey Crockett On Trustee Ballot

Name of one candidate has been filed for trustee of Bronte Independent School District. Davey Crockett's name was filed by petition in the office of County Judge W. W. Thetford.

An election will be held April 4 to fill two vacancies, the positions now held by Bill Thomas and Jacob Morrow.

A name may be filed to be printed on the ballot by the candidate himself or by a petition signed by five qualified voters living in the district. Names must be filed in the county judge's office at least 30 days before the election. Petition forms are available in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee.

Rattlesnake Roundup to Feature Hourly Show

Snake handling shows and fried rattlesnake meat to eat will be combined with Coke County's first big rattlesnake roundup March 7 and 8. The event is being sponsored by Bronte Jaycees.

Hunters will look over Coke County on farms and ranches, where the owner has given permission for the hunt, for sleepy rattlers which can be lured out of their dens. Both Saturday and Sunday afternoons will see snake shows and fresh meat on sale at the show barn in Robert Lee.

Bill Ransburger of Sweetwater snake handling expert, will perform every hour both afternoons, providing the crowd is large enough to justify such frequent shows. Admission to the show barn will be 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children. A concession

stand will be in operation for those who wish to purchase refreshments.

The hunt will leave each day at 8 a.m. from Bronte city hall. Hunters are requested to register at Mackey's Feed Store in Bronte or Sparks Texaco Station in Robert Lee. Land owners who wish to have their places hunted over should also register at one of the two places.

Prizes of a rod and reel and a plaque will be awarded to the person who captures the longest snake, to the hunter who catches the shortest snake, to the person who has the snake with the most rattles, and to the person who captures the most pounds of snakes.

Five rules are to be followed in the hunt:

1. No guns allowed.

2. Keep all vehicles on existing roads.

3. Hunt only on approved ranches.

4. Use extreme caution in fire prevention.

5. Close all gates at all times. The Jaycees are working with the county agent's department, the game warden department and with a committee from Coke County Game Management Association composed of Otis Smith, C. E. Arrott and Curtis Walker.

Wayne Dunnam, Jaycee president, said that everyone in the area is invited to join in the hunt or come to the show. A number of professional hunters and others from out of town are expected to be here for the roundup.

The Jaycees hope to make the hunt an annual affair.

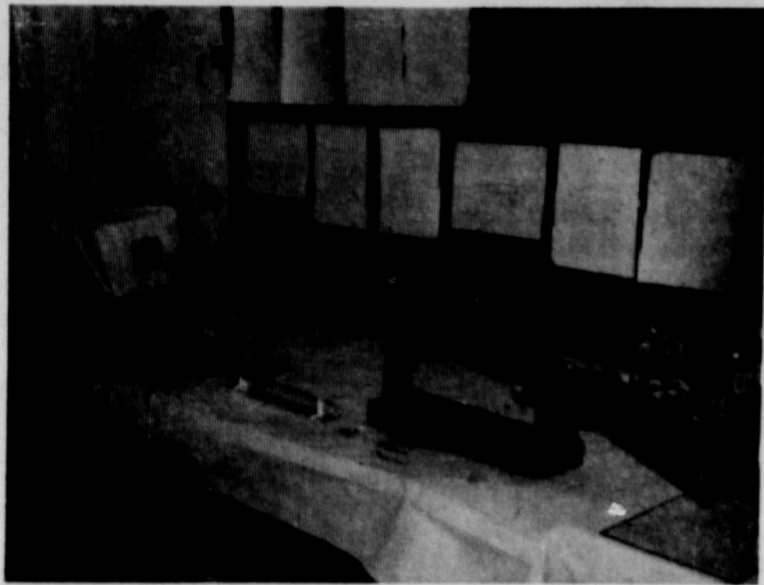
Scotch Play Sunday

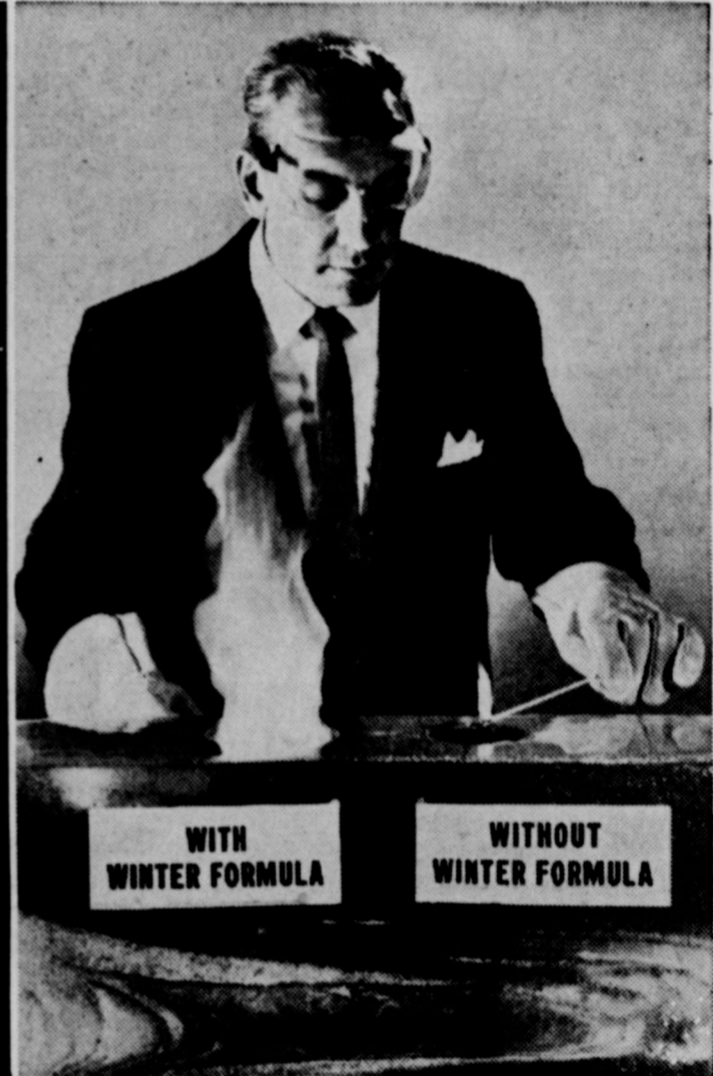
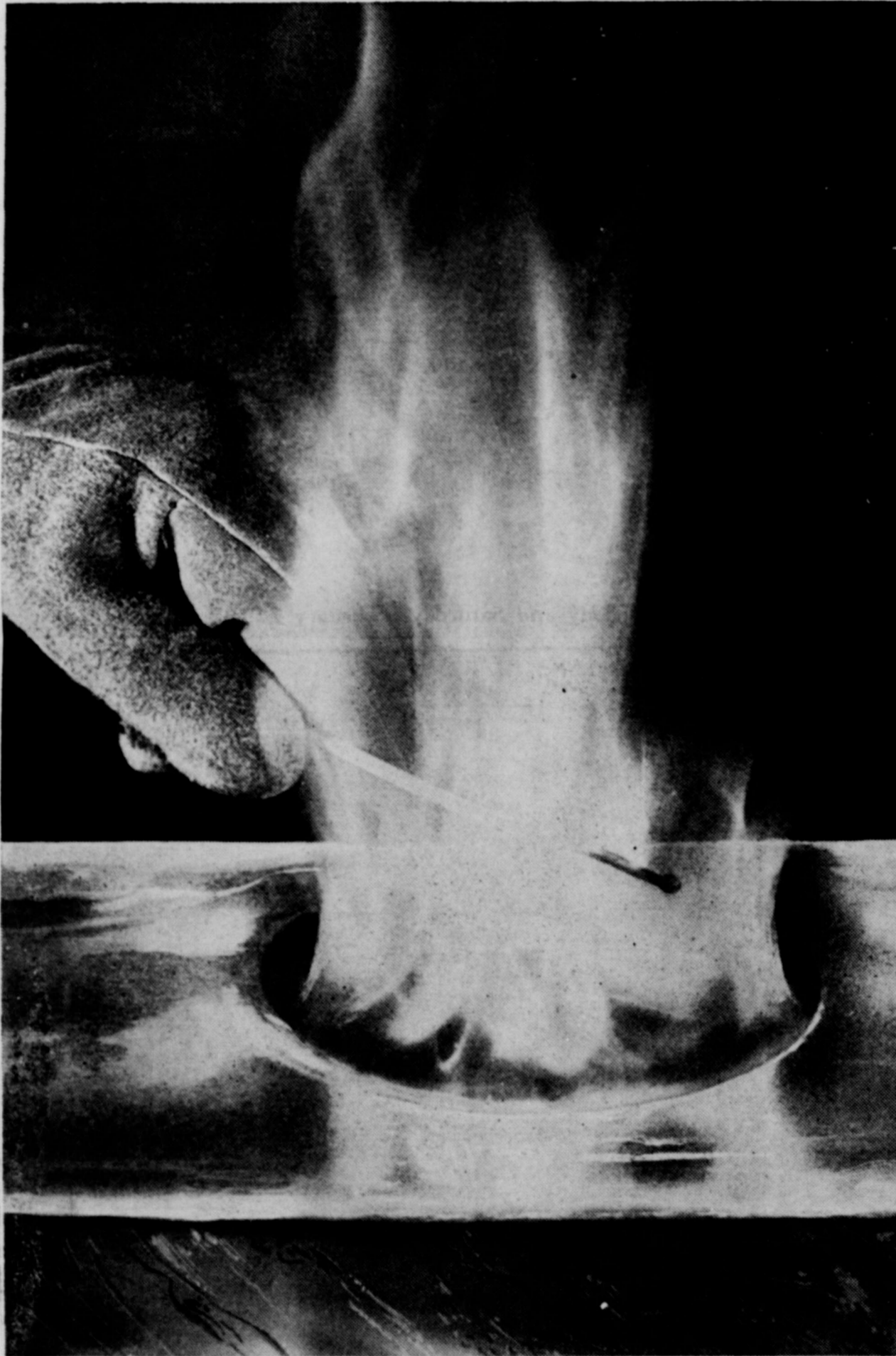

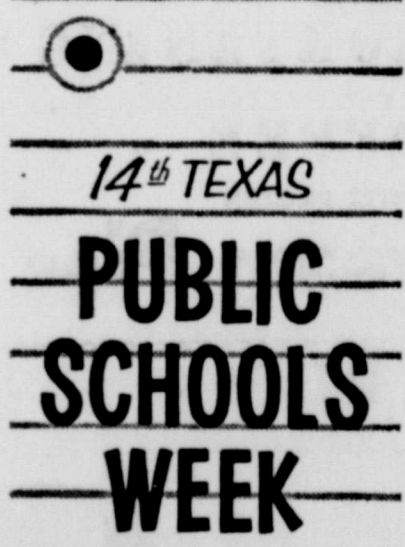
