### Relief Will Be Denied to Those Offered Jobs

The following resolution was passed when the Texas Relief Commission met in Austin on June 27th:

That persons physically able to work who are offered employment at the prevailing wage scale in the locality where in the work is to be performed and who refused to accept same without good cause, shall not be furnished relief.

Persons who are offered employment to others are asked to advise the local county board when the offer of employment is refused, giving the name and address of the party offered employment and the wages offered.

The above resolution has been adopted and the following resolution has been passed by the local board:

That any person physically able to work who accepts employment on any relief project and who fails to perform his duties as assigned him by his foreman and is discharged for same will not be furnished relief.

### Loans Raised to \$400 For Wheat Farmers

Castro County farmers may now obtain wheat loans up to a maximum of \$400 instead of \$250, from the Emergency Crop Loan section.

The county was placed in the drouth area this week and the loan limit was consequently raised, according to John S. Andrews, field supervisor.

Farmers who applied for more than \$250 may re-apply for the difference between the amount and \$250.

July 15th is absolutely the final date for filing applications, Mr. Andrews said.

### Wheat Harvest Nears Finish

The 1934 wheat harvest was about complete this week and with the exception of a few fields the grain had been cut.

Up to Thursday of this week 168 cars of wheat had been shipped from Dimmitt with probably more than that many being shipped from Hart.

The price on local markets Thursday was 69c.

Funeral services for Mrs. Lydia C. Grant, 86, were held Tuesday afternoon in Dimmitt. Services were conducted by L. C. Chapin of Friona of the Church of Christ, at the local church at 3:30. Interment was in the Dimmitt cemetery.

Lydia C. Renfro was born January 19, 1848 in Madison county, Illinois. She moved to Harrison County, Mo., in 1857. She was married to James T. Dale, January 9, 1868. Two children, Angie who, died in infancy, and Rozella, still living, were born to this union. She was left a widow in 1871. She was married to Isaac H. Grant, January 14, 1875.
