L. T. Youngblood Honored for Service As UCRA Chairman

L. T. Youngblood, Bronte banker and member of the Upper Colorado River Authority board of directors since 1936, was honored by his fellow directors and Tom Green and Coke County dignitaries Tuesday night, Mar 24. Mr. Youngblood was presented a plaque and resolution by the board at a dinner at the River Terrace in San Angelo.

It was a time of reminiscing by all those present, and praise for the untold amount of time and money the honoree has spent in carrying out his duties on the UCRA board during the last 28 years. He was elected vice chairman of the board in 1936, served in that capacity until 1945, and was then elected chairman. He held that position until early this year when he was succeeded by Gerald Allen of Robert Lee.

The plaque of polished wood, with a gold front, had the following engraved on it: "1945-1964 — Presented to L. T. Youngblood as an expression of appreciation of his outstanding leadership while serving as chairman — Upper Colorado River Authority"

Among the notable achievements of the Upper Colorado River Authority during the period Mr. Youngblood has served as chairman are North Concho Dam, Bronte's water system and pipe line from Oak Creek Lake, Robert Lee's Mountain Creek Lake, and water systems for Carlsbad and Christoval.

Among the dignitaries who paid tribute to the accomplishments of the Bronte man were Senator Dorsey Hardeman; M. D. Bryant, former mayor of San Angelo and the man who led the fight to get the new Three Rivers dam at San Angelo; Porter Henderson, former member of the UCRA board and San Angelo civic leader; and Forrest Harding, state representative from San Angelo.

Speakers told of the many trips Mr. Youngblood has made to Austin, Washington and other places in interest of the UCRA and its program, "without expecting compensation for his time or expenses."

Bryant told those present that Mr. Youngblood provided him with the inspiration to seek and finally obtain approval for the Three Rivers project.

Mr. Youngblood's work on the UCRA was still going strong at the meeting of the board last Tuesday when he requested the water authority to finance water system improvements for Bronte estimated to cost \$80,000. He asked

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Services Here for Chester Harwell, Area Ranchman

Funeral services will be held Thursday at 10 a.m. at First Baptist Church in Bronte for James Chester Harwell, 58. Mr. Harwell died Tuesday about 3:30 p.m. at his ranch home southwest of Bronte from a gunshot wound.

The Rev. Murrell Johns, Baptist pastor, will conduct the funeral services and burial will be in Fairview Cemetery. Clift Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles ruled that Mr. Harwell died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. He was alone in his home at the time, his wife and father-in-law, J. E. Mitchell, having stepped out of the house for a short time to attend to some chores on the ranch. Mr. Harwell was a native of Coke County and a life long resident. He was born on the place where he lived at the time of his death, it being the family home of his parents.

Born Jan. 16, 1906, he was the son of Robert and Ida Caperton Harwell, pioneer ranchers in this area. He and Miss Marjorie Mitchell were married Dec. 24, 1930, in Clovis, N. M. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Bronte and served 13 years as a member of the Bronte school board.

Mr. Harwell's survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. David Dixon of Austin and Mrs. Ike Billings of Del Rio; five sisters Mrs. Russell Haney and Miss Myrtle Harwell, both of Roscoe; Mrs. Floyd Modgling of Bronte; Mrs. Roe Williams of Odessa and Mrs. Ernest Buford of McCamey; and four grandchildren.

Pallbearers will be Bert Blaylock, T. F. Sims Jr., A. Z. Denman, Clarence Arrott, Lake Smith, W. J. Martin, Collins Sayner and Robert Forman. Members of the Baptist Men's Bible Class will be honorary pallbearers.

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Voters Will Decide School, City Elections

School Election Tuesday to Name 2 Board Members

Two school trustees will be selected Saturday by voters of the Bronte School District from five candidates who are running for the positions. Voting will take place at the city hall in Bronte and second polling place will be set up at Tennyson.

Candidates, in order their names are listed on the ballot, are Davy W. Crockett, E. L. Champion, B. G. (Bill) Thomas, J. B. Morrow and Conda O Richards

Morrow and Thomas are presently serving on the board, Crockett and Champion have never served on the board, and Richards is a former member of the board. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

D. K. Glenn will be election judge in the Bronte box and Mrs. W. T. Green will be judge at Tennyson.

Persons eligible to vote are those who reside in the school district and who have a poll tax receipt or exemption.

Holdover trustees who have one or more years to serve are Joe Rawlings, Horace Taylor, A. E. Bell Jr., James Wells and Edward Cumbie.

City Voters Will Elect Mayor and Three Councilmen

An election will be held Tuesday, April 7, to name a mayor and three councilmen for the City of Bronte. Opposition exists in both contests, giving voters a choice of the men who will serve as their city's governing body.

On the ticket for mayor are H. O. Whitt and Royce Lee. Council candidates are Martin Lee, Matthew G. Caperton, James O. Pitts, Billy Joe Luckett and Elmer Hurley. Three vacancies exist.

Luckett and Caperton are now serving on the council. Cecil Kemp, the third councilman whose term expires this year, did not seek re-election. Neither did Mayor Norman R. Kiker desire to seek this office for another two years. Holdover councilmen are Royce Fancher and C. E. Bruton.

Balloting for city officers will be held at the city hall, with Noah Pruitt Sr. serving as election judge. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Only residents within the city limits of Bronte who have paid their poll tax or have an exemption are eligible to vote in this election.

C. R. Smith Has Been Making Sportswear Last Ten Years

C. R. Smith & Co. observed the tenth anniversary last week of the beginning of their Joni-Lyn sportswear manufacturing business. Work started on the Smiths' first order of blouses on Feb. 17, 1954, and first shipment of the Bronte-made goods was made to a customer in Eldorado on March 19.

Joni-Lyn was born in the building located next door to the present West Texas Utilities office. The structure was destroyed by fire in 1962.

During the past ten years Mr. and Mrs. Smith and their working crew have turned out more than 150,000 garments, which have been shipped all over the State

of Texas. Mrs. Smith told The Enterprise that they now make approximately 500 pieces per week. She added that they never have any trouble selling all the merchandise their present crew and equipment can handle.

The factory, which is located in back of the building which houses their retail dry goods store, now boasts a total of 13 machines. They have a button hole making machine, a button sewer, a blind stitcher and ten regular sewing machines.

The Joni-Lyn line of sportswear consists of blouses, skirts, pedal pushers, shorts and cabin pants. Starting out making only blouses, they branched out into the other lines. For a time before the disastrous fire a couple of years ago, they made house coats and maternity wear, but discarded these two items to concentrate on the sportswear line.

Presently employed in the factory are Mmes. Claude Beaver, Horace Taylor, Bill Braswell, James Phillips, Luther McCutchen, Barney Griffin, Nealy Mackey, R. M. Andrews, Marshall Hooper and H. H. Holland. Mrs. Noah Pruitt Sr. and Mrs. W. H. Maxwell work in the retail store. Annual payroll for the factory is approximately \$13,000.

Joni-Lyn blouses change styles with the seasons and with fashion changes, and at least ten different models are available to the Smiths' customers. Number of styles of the other sportswear items is not so great, Mrs. Smith said.

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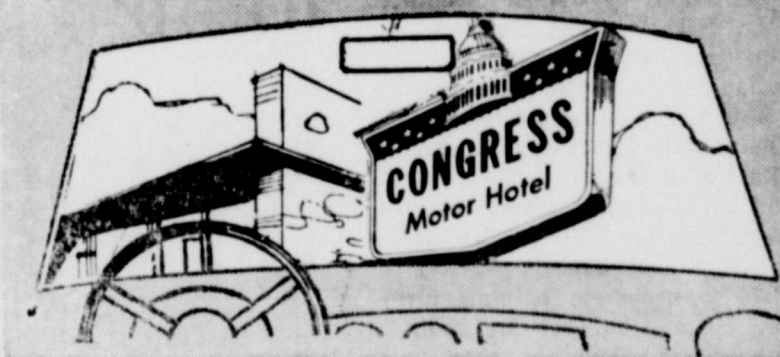

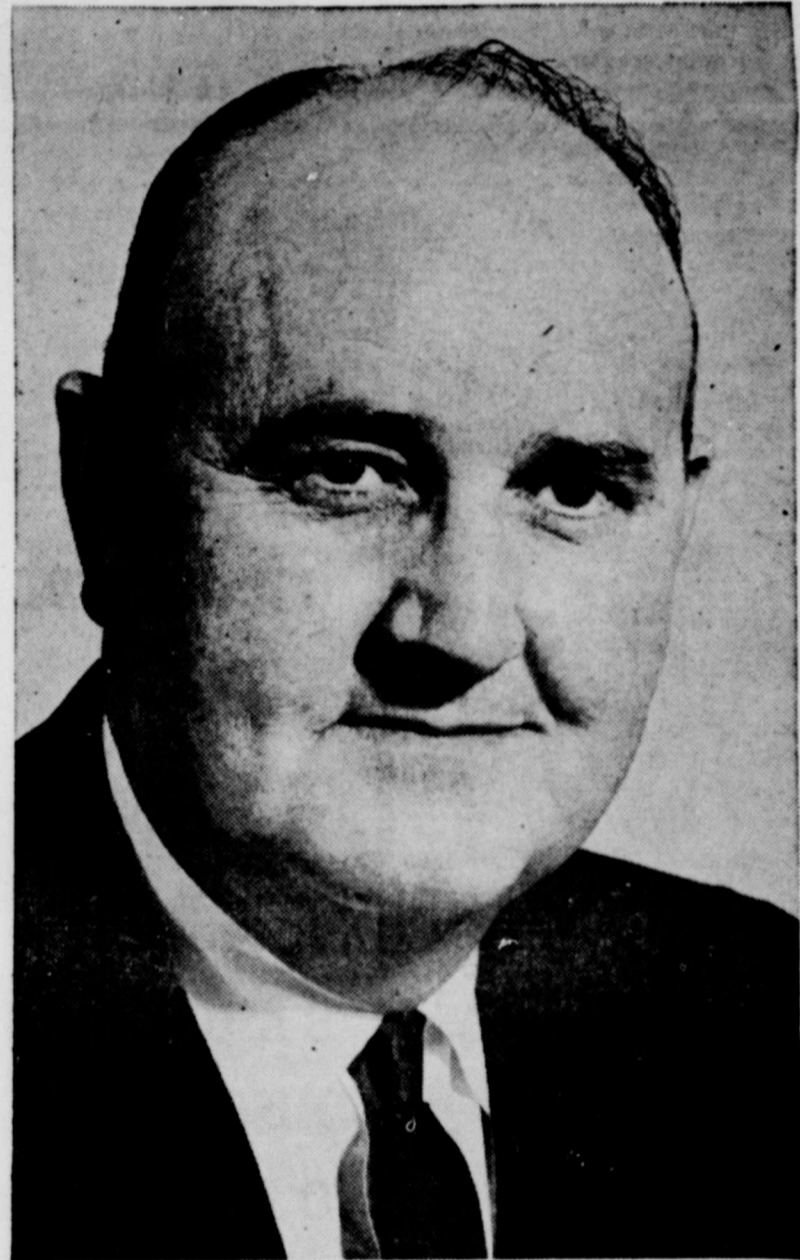
