The Joni-Lyn line of sportswear consists of blouses, skirts, pedal pushers, shorts and cabin pants. Starting out making only blouses, they branched out into the other lines. For a time before the disastrous fire a couple of years ago. they made house coats and maternity wear, but discarded these two items to concentrate on the sportswear line.

Presently employed in the factory are Mmes. Claude Beaver Horace Taylor, Bill Braswell, James Phillips, Luther McCutchen, Barney Griffin, Nealy Mackey, R. M. Andrews, Marshall Hooper and H. H.
