Marilyn Glenn has been named valedictorian of the 1964 Bronte senior class. She had a four year average of 95.65 and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Glenn. LaJan Kiker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Kiker, is the salutatorian of the class with an

average of 93.91 for the four years.

Miss Glenn plans to enroll in Baylor University at Waco in September. In her freshman year she was class favorite, class president and was chosen for Who's Who in English. She was class reporter for her sophomore class and was chosen for Who's Who in Homemaking. Secretary of her junior class, she was named to Who's Who both in Spanish and Social Studies. She was also a member of the Speech Club.

As a senior, Miss Glenn is president of her class, secretary of Bronte chapter of the National Beta Club, and is a member of the Science Club.

Miss Kiker has been a member of the Longhorn Band throughout her high school years. She served as drum major of the band one year and was a twirler for two years. She was elected Miss B.H.S. during her junior year and was also the duchess for the junior class. Miss Kiker was a member of the speech club in her junior year. She is also a member of the science club and the local chapter of the National Beta Club.

She plans to enroll in San Angelo College in September.

Bronte delegates will be Noah Pruitt Sr., D. K. Glenn, Elmer Hurley, Matthew Caperton, Edward Cumbie, Eddie Alexander, J. B. Mackey and E. F. Glenn. Alternates will be Mr. and Mrs. Otis Smith and Mrs. D. K. Glenn.

Pruitt was elected permanent chairman of the precinct delegation and Alexander was named secretary.

Bronte High School's entrants in the State Interscholastic League meet will leave Bronte Thursday afternoon with their sponsors for Austin where contests will be held at the University of Texas.

The state meet will get underway Thursday, but no Bronte entrants will participate until Friday morning.

Bronte's two entrants in literary events are Margi Oglesby in ready writing and Larry Corley in number sense. Margi's contest will be held Friday morning, while Larry's will be Friday evening.

Bronte will have three entrants in track and field events. Jim Morrow, the region's champion high jumper earned a berth on the team with his five feet 11½ inch jump in regional competition at Big Spring. Tommy Glenn Sims took a second place in the 100 yard dash and will compete at state. Also winning a second and right to enter state competition was the 440 relay team, composed of Sims, Edwyn McDaniel, Ronnie Lee and Royce Lee.

Preliminaries for the track and field contests will take place Friday morning and finals will be on

Saturday afternoon.

Coke Goes Along with Rest of State in Voting For Connally, Smith, Yarborough and Pool

Gov. John Connally carried Coke County along with the rest of the state in his bid for a second term in last Saturday's Democratic Primary election. Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith also had little trouble in winning re-nomination. Senator Ralph Yarborough took a sizeable margin over opponent Gordon McLendon.

Only local race contested was for constable of precinct 2. Hiram Brock unseated incumbent Oscar Renshaw, 195-102. In District races the incumbents and winners also carried Coke County. Dorsey Hardeman defeated Miss Juanita Camfield in Coke County, 591-107, for state senator. In the district attorney's race, Frank C. Dickey Jr. won this

county over Jack Sessom, 521-231. Results of the contested races, with the first figure showing the Bronte result and the second the county wide count, are as follows:

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Choose a knife designed to do a particular job. It will cut down on work and improves the food product, the specialist adds.

A homemaker doesn't need every type of knife that cutlery manufacturers put on the market. A basic selection of kitchen knives that will expedite the various jobs may vary from family to family.

Here are descriptions of eight basic knife types, along with information about some of the jobs they are designed to do.

Paring knife with 3 or 3½ inch blade has many uses, including peeling, paring, and scraping small fruits and vegetables.

French Chef's knife with an 8 inch blade — for dicing, cropping and mincing raw vegetables, fruits and nuts; carving hot roasts.

Carving knife, 7 to 9 inch blade — for heavier work, such as carving beef, veal, pork and other hot meats.

Boning knife, 5 to 6 inch blade — for cutting around bones of hams, roasts, leg of lamb and other cuts.

Utility knife or trimmer, 5 to 7 inch blade — for slightly heavier jobs — slicing carrots, potatoes, onions, oranges, green peppers.

Narrow slicer, 8 inch blade — for slicing steak, poultry, cold processed meats, sausage and some cheese.

Ham slicer, 9½ or 10 inch blade — for getting wafer-thin slices of ham, boneless roast, turkey breasts, cold meats and the like.

Butcher knife, 7 inch blade — for dismembering poultry, other heavy duty jobs.

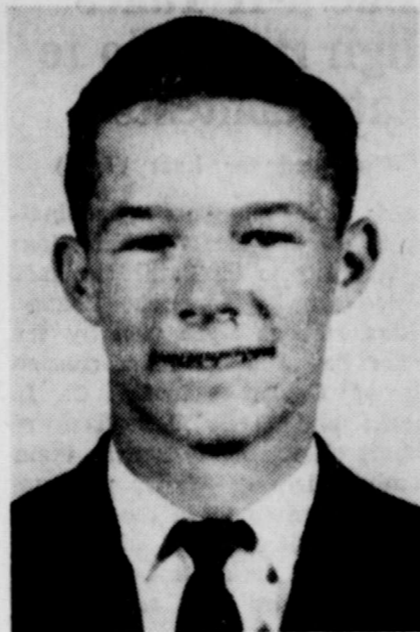

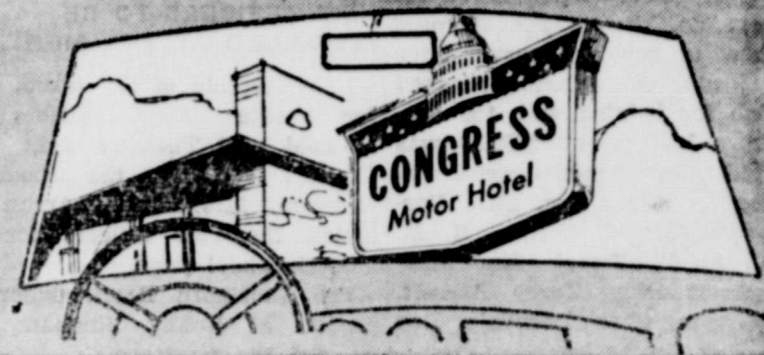

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

Field Crops Demonstrations have been started by several Coke County operators. Others will be started in the near future, if the weather cooperates.

Some of the new hybrid sorghums — sudan crosses are being tried. Also, several cotton varieties that have been developed to mature early. Three companies have furnished milo seed, also, that will be used in test plots.

The field crops committee hopes to compare these crops to the varieties that are planted more commonly. If all goes well, a tour may be held later to view the crops during the growing season.

The various seed companies have been very cooperative to the tests. We are thankful for their cooperation and generosity.

The plots that will be tried are as follows:

Oscar Kresta, Pioneer 980, hybrid sorghum, Asgrow Duet hybrid sorghum and Ranger "A" Milo.

Ben Boykin — Northern Star 5 Cotton

J. L. Tinkler — Paymaster 101 "A" cotton

Alton Roberts — Comanche and Pawner varieties of milo.

Jay Evans — Paymaster 111 Cotton, Northern Star 5 Cotton, Pioneers 846, Raider "B" and Ute Milos.

Fred McCabe, Jr., — Soybeans and sweet-su hybrid sorghum.

R. C. Patterson — Summerour perfection cotton.

Darwin Scott — Paymaster 111 cotton, Northern Star 5 cotton and Three Little Indians hybrid sorghums.

The screwworm situation is not alarming, but the number of cases and their locations have climbed slightly. The last report showed 8 cases from six different counties. Edwards county was the northern most county having a case.

We still need to be on the alert and take all precautions to prevent screwworms in our area. We have had several samples submitted, but to date all have been non-screwworm.

Placing whole sections of newspapers under tomato vines is an easy way to prevent fruit rot according to the Extension Service Horticulturist. He suggests putting papers down after the vines are heavy enough to keep them from blowing away. Plastic dry-cleaner bags can be used the same way.

Staking tomato plants sometimes produces larger, better quality fruit. It also keeps them cleaner and makes plants easier to spray. However, staked tomatoes are likely to have more cracking, blossom-end rot, and sunscald.

When staking tomatoes, place sturdy, five-foot stakes about one foot in the ground. Set them about four inches from the plant and avoid cutting tomato roots when setting them. Use of soft cord or strips of old cloth will lessen injury to plants when tying them.

A good method of tying plants to stakes is to loop the material around the main stem; then cross it between the stem and the stake to form a figure eight. Tie it back of the stake.

If pruning is necessary, break off shoots that grow from the crotch formed by a leaf branch at the main stem. Break the shoots, rather than cutting them, because a knife may spread disease. When pruning, shoots should be removed before they are three inches long.

Angel Food Party Cake

(Editor's Note: By request we are printing the following recipe.)

1 large angel food cake (about 49c size), break into small pieces.

6 egg yolks
3/4 cup lemon juice
1/2 cup orange juice

(Juices above should be from fresh fruit, not canned or frozen)

1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon oleo.

Put the egg yolks, juices, sugar, and oleo in double boiler and cook until it begins to thicken. It does not get very thick. To the above custard add 2 pkgs. plain gelatin, which has been dissolved in 1/2 cup water. Stir well and set aside to cool.

Beat the 6 egg whites and add 3/4 cup sugar and 1 tsp. almond extract. Beat until stiff and stands in peaks. Add the custard mixture to the beaten egg whites.

Grease a long pan or pyrex with crisco or oleo. Put a layer of custard first, then a layer of cake crumbs, pressing down with your hands. Next a layer of two boxes of frozen strawberries (thawed) juice and all. Add the rest of the custard. Top with chopped pecans or cocoanut. Set in refrigerator overnight. Cut into squares to serve. May be topped with whipped cream. This makes 16 regular slices or 12 large ones.

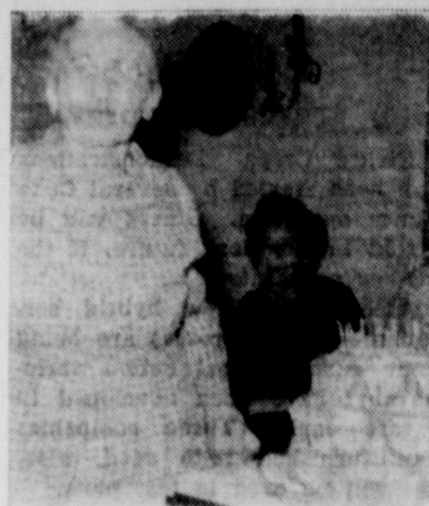

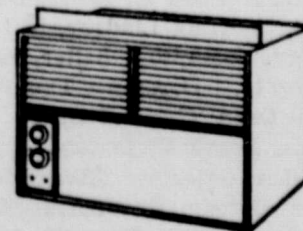
