## Four Girl Scouts at Camp This Week

Program of the camp is supervised by a specially trained staff. In each unit there are three staff members—a Unit Leader and two assistants. Camp program includes tent living, swimming, nature exploration, star gazing, cooking and sleeping out, singing — and opportunities to work on proficiency badges relating to the out-of-doors. Archery is included in the program for older girls.

The waterfront is supervised by a staff of two, and both the director and assistant are certified by the Red Cross.

## Group Meets To Talk Traffic Problems Here

Everybody agreed last Thursday night that something needs to be done about traffic law violations in Bronte. A meeting was held in the school auditorium with about 50 persons present to discuss the problem.

The meeting was called by Mayor Royce Lee with approval of the Bronte city council. The council's interest in the matter, the mayor said, was to bring the problem before enough people that it can be corrected without too much penalty.

Lee acted as moderator and introduced the speakers. Coach Cecil Toliver, who is teaching a driver education class in Bronte this summer, was present with some of his students, and told of the benefits derived from classes in driver education. He offered statistics to show that drivers who have had the training are involved in a lower percentage of accidents than those who have not.

**Stop Signs Violated**  
Toliver also announced that he had made traffic surveys in Bronte at the stop signs on Washington Street and at the intersection of the Ballinger-San Angelo highways, and that a majority of the drivers through the intersections do not stop. Some drivers stop, some slow down and some run right through the stop signs, he said.

Sheriff Melvin Childress showed some photographs of fatal accidents which have occurred in this area and discussed the economic loss caused by wrecks. He told his audience that he had not investigated a single wreck since he became sheriff in which there were not two or more traffic law violations preceding the collision. Childress agreed with the city council in its concern with traffic violations and pledged the support of his department in correcting the problem. He also pointed out that he believes 90 per cent of traffic safety is directly connected with education of drivers.

## DAVID DENMAN'S DIARY TELLS DETAILS OF WORLD'S FAIR TRIP

David Denman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Denman, recently returned from a trip to the World's Fair in New York City. He made the trip with his uncle, M. L. Denman, and his family of Corpus Christi. During the trip the Bronte school eighth grader kept a diary of what he considered important sights and happenings. The following information is taken from entries in his diary.

David traced the trip which started May 28 across Red River to Oklahoma City. On May 29 they reached the Missouri state line, drove across Missouri and crossed the Mississippi River, going into East St. Louis, Ill., at 6:45 p.m.

Apparently they spent some time in East St. Louis, as he has no entry until June 1. On that date they crossed state lines into Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania. They spent the night at Erie, Pa.

His June 2 entry says he saw Lake Erie. Next entry is for June 4, when he records going through several tunnels, crossing the state line into New Jersey and going on to New York City. He also says they went through a tunnel under the Hudson River.

June 5 was spent visiting the fair, where they spent nine hours. They rode the subway to the fair.

June 6 tells of a tour of New York. Among the places visited were Chinatown, UN building, Rockefeller Center, Belview Hospital, the Flatiron Building, the Bowery, Greenwich Village, Central Park, the Little Church Around the Corner, Broadway, General Grant's Tomb and Macy's (largest department store in the world).

David went to church Sunday morning, June 7, at Marble Collegiate Church and hear Dr. Norman Vincent Peale. Later in the day his group went to the 102d floor of the Empire State Building

and toured the Museum of Natural History and the Statue of Liberty.

They left New York June 8, went through the Lincoln Tunnel into New Jersey, back into Pennsylvania, and the next day went through Maryland and arrived at Washington, D. C. Points of interest visited there were the grave of John F. Kennedy and the tomb of the Unknown Soldier where they witnessed the changing of the guard. They also visited many government buildings in the capital city, including the Capitol and the White House. They saw the Washington, Lincoln and Jefferson monuments. Crossing into Virginia they took the Skyline Drive through the Blue Ridge Mountains.

His entry on June 12 states that they saw the Natural Bridge and Lost River Cave, where ammunition was made during the recent war, and that they crossed into Tennessee at 3:50 p.m.

June 13 was a day of travel, as they went into Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana and back into Texas. On June 16, he toured Texas A&M University campus at College Station.

His mother told The Enterprise that one of his biggest thrills of the entire trip was getting to fly on home from Corpus Christi.

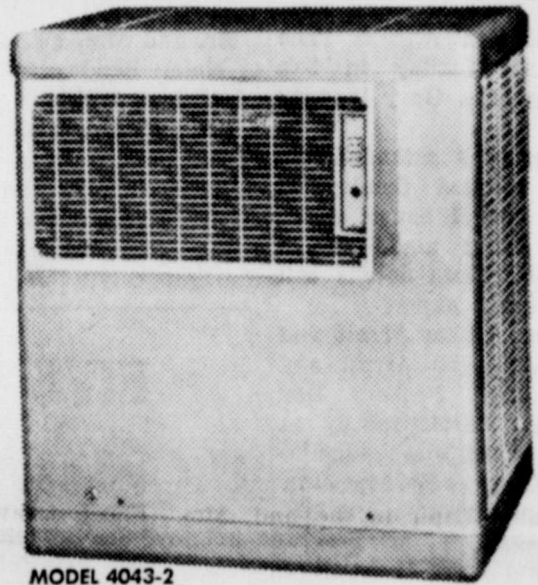
