Hart Farmer Is Killed Sunday By Lightning

Funeral services were held in Plainview Monday afternoon for Roy H. Wall, 28, of Hart, who died Sunday after he was struck by lightning Thursday afternoon.

Wall was operating a hay rake in a neighbor's field when the bolt hit him. The tractor pulled the rig a considerable distance before others in the field noticed he was being dragged by the machine.

His heart had apparently stopped beating, but artificial respiration, applied while an ambulance was reaching the scene, started to breathe again. His right side was badly burned and he never regained consciousness.

Wall was born and reared in Canyon and lived there until four years ago when his family moved to Hart.

He is survived by his wife, Lucille Wall and three children, Lonnie, Sylvia and Rachel, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wall and two brothers, Easton and Neal Wall, all of Hart.

Interment was in Dreamland Cemetery in Canyon.

Palo Duro Park Is Cited As New Movie Taking Location

Palo Duro Canyon State Park has been "discovered". Only this time Hollywood discovered it rather than Spanish explorer Coronado.

Discovery of a new natural background suitable for outdoor movie drama is as important to film makers as discovery of a new star. Hollywood still remembers the awed reaction of screen audiences at seeing weird Monument Valley where "Stagecoach" was photographed and Death Valley in the silent film "Greed."

Predictions are that Palo Duro Canyon will become a major scenic attraction after audiences see it in the technicolor film "Thunder in the Dust." Palo Duro Canyon, a geological wonderland of many colors, is a Texas State Park near Amarillo, Texas.

The "discovery" of Palo Duro Canyon came through color photos taken there by John LeMay, 70-year-old father of Alan LeMay, producer. The elder LeMay showed the pictures to his son who later explored the canyon with producer George Templeton. The producing team then wrote the script of their outdoor drama to place it in the actual locale of the canyon. The story is laid in 1900 and deals with a cattleman's war.

Producers LeMay and Templeton took players Robert Preston, Robert Sterling, Chill Wills, Caty Downes, and John Barrymore, Jr., to Palo Duro for scenes. The entire picture was shot in the vicinity of the Park.

Technicolor experts had nothing but praise for the vivid colors and rugged formations in Palo Duro. "Thunder in the Dust" will be released in March with the premiere in Amarillo.

Lions International Elects President For Coming Year



NEW YORK, July 21 (Sp. —) Walter C. Fisher, Ontario, Canada, is the new president of the International association of Lions Clubs, (Lions International). He was elected by unanimous vote at the 32nd annual convention of the Association which closed here at Madison Square Garden today. Fisher succeeds Dr. Eugene S. Briggs, Enid, Okla.

The convention concluded one of the most successful years in the history of the Lions International, according to the report made by Melvin Jones, Chicago, Ill., Secretary-general and founder of the Association. He reported the addition of 757 new Lions Clubs and 23,282 men to the roster of the Association during the twelve-month period ended June 30, 1949, for a total of 7,427 club clubs and 381,426 members. He stated also that during the fiscal year Lions Clubs were established in four additional countries: France, Bolivia, Philippines and Norway.

Lions International, he added, is the largest, strongest and most active service club organization in the world, with Lions Clubs in 26 countries on five continents.

Work Is Finished By Public Service Co.

According to an announcement Wednesday by mayor L. G. Manning, the new street lighting system in Dimmitt will be put in operation tonight, Thursday. Mayor Manning was informed by Mr. Paul Hubnik, construction foreman, that all work of installing the lighting system was practically completed, and barring bad weather or other unforeseen events, all work would be completed before Thursday night.

Marking a long stride in the development of Dimmitt, the new street lighting project was made possible by the progressive city administration, with the cooperation of the Southwestern Public Service Company. All equipment and installation was furnished by the Southwestern Public Service Company while the city has arranged to defray the increased cost of operation.

The very latest type of street lighting equipment has been installed with mercury vapor lamps on steel standards in the business district. An automatic device, controlled by light intensity, will turn on the lights with the approach of darkness, and will turn them off at the break of day.

Tech Has Largest Summer Graduate Class on Record

LUBBOCK, July 21—The largest August graduating class in the 23 year history of Texas Technological college will receive degrees Aug. 26 in the first summer commencement since 1946. Three hundred fifty degrees will be conferred.

Gen. Robert J. Smith, president of Pioneer Airlines and commanding general of the 443rd Troop Carrier wing reserve, will be the principle speaker at the exercises.

General Smith is a veteran of both World Wars, becoming first interested in aviation in 1917. Following his discharge from the service, he began a program of training which was to make him, outstanding in the rapidly growing aviation industry.

He obtained an AB degree from Jefferson University and a LL.B. from Northwestern. In 1925 he became head of the aviation department of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

Remaining there until 1938, he then went to New York City to become general manager of American Airlines.

Since that time he held a position in the law firm of Clark and Rice and was executive vice president of Braniff Airways in Dallas. He left that company to enter military service in World War II.

As a colonel he acted as deputy commander of the North African division of the Air Transport Command with headquarters in Cairo. General Smith commanded bases in Tripolitania, Libya, Saudi-Arabia, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, Iraq, Russia and India.

General Smith is a member of the Dallas, Texas and American Bar associations. He is acting president of Aviation Activities, Inc., a member of the Air Force association and a director of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

With the alarming total of 222 Texans having been attacked by the dread disease of poliomyelitis, 1949 bids fair to be the worst polio year the State has ever experienced, and health officials in every section of the state are exerting every effort to bring the disease under control. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has re-iterated his appeal for every citizen to cooperate in a continuous clean-up program, ridding their premises of all rubbish and trash piles, and any such filth as will afford breeding places for flies and other disease-spreading insects.

This polio situation will never be controlled without the observance of sanitation measures, the state health officer declared. "The filth on your premises may cause polio in your home. The problem of controlling polio is one demanding the closest possible cooperation and until a program of continuous cleaning up is instituted and strictly enforced, we shall continue to face the menace of polio in all sections of the state."

Season For Tree Pruning is Here If you plan to cut back overgrown trees or shrubs, do it now or wait until winter. Large limbs removed later may lead to winter injury. Sadee Hatfield, extension specialist in landscape gardening of Texas A & M College, says that cutting back a plant during the growing season starts new growth and does not have time to harden before frost. Then the shrub or shrub is killed back. Heavy rain often kills large shrubs or even trees.

Fertilizing and watering in late summer stimulates new growth, adds Miss Hatfield, and this growth may also be damaged by cold weather if it doesn't have time to harden before the cold weather hits. Badly injured plants may not die but they will look sick for a year or more. Blooms and fruit may be light on the injured plants next year.



ed and comfortable this summer. The herd, he says, should be protected from the sun during the hottest part of the day. The pasture without shade should be used at night. Some dairymen are using brush arbors or a darkened shed to provide shade during the hottest hours during the day. Burleson says two waterings a day are not enough. High producing cows need plenty of clean, cool water for digestion and milk production and they should have free access to water at all times. Good green grazing, accessible during the cool of the day or night, is necessary for maintaining production during the summer months. Succulent silage, along with plenty of high quality hay, will do much toward maintaining high production when the pastures are poor. Supplement the roughage with a proper grain ration. Cows, like humans, are not comfortable when they are annoyed by flies. Burleson recommends the use of suitable fly sprays along with the elimination of fly breeding places to solve this problem. Dairymen have reported good results from the use of methoxychlor fly spray. Last, he says, the cow must receive kind treatment. Hauling the herd on a hot day is a costly way to save time. The failure to milk at regular intervals not only affects the milk flow, but it also makes high producers restless. A well-bred, high-producing cow deserves good feeding, kind treatment and comfortable surroundings. Provide these essentials and she'll do her duty, contends Burleson.

SPORTS AFIELD

One of our most perennial outdoor battles is that waged by fresh water anglers and those who fish the salty waters of the seas as to which branch of fishing is superior. Let's take a look at the arguments of Robert D. Hall, author of many salt water fishing articles.

In fishing salt water the angler is at a disadvantage because of the meager information available concerning marine fishes. Much of his knowledge is gained by personal experiences in fishing a particular section of our coast. And it isn't easy to study fish that are nearly always moving up and down the coast, or in-shore or out with tide and food. The controversy between black bass fishermen and the sea trout fisherman or the musky fisherman and the bonefish fisherman boils down to the fact that is not so much the species of fish you may catch, but how light the tackle you use.

No man will ever derive the utmost fun from fishing until he has reached the point where he considers the battle of the fish superior to the catch. It is very encouraging to see the trend in recent years toward lighter-weight fishing equipment.

The tarpon fishermen have discovered that a spittling streamer fly tied on a 2-0 O'Shaughnessy hook will usually drive these small 8- or 10-pound tarpon crazy in their mad quest to strike this tantalizing lure. You decide if this is equal to catching a bright salmon. Here both anglers use a 6-ounce fly rod for their sport.

It can be truthfully stated that the tarpon's mouth makes hooking more difficult than gently taking up the slack line when salmon fishing.

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

Precautions Listed For Sanitation

According to a bulletin distributed by the State Department of Health, the following rules are important in maintaining sanitary conditions around the home:

1. Always demand safe water for yourself and family.
2. Toilets with water carried sewage are the sanitary ones.
3. Place all garbage in garbage cans. Keep all garbage cans covered.
4. Make open and 18 inches above the ground. Rats breed in dark places in and around lumber piles.
5. Keep your premises neat and clean. Flowers and gardens are far better.
6. Keep all feed and other food under cover.
7. Keep all doors and windows well-screened and in good repair.
8. Keep perishable foods in the refrigerator. Keep other food in glass jars and other rat-proof and fly-proof containers.

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
