The council received a protest that chickens and livestock are running loose in the city. Members called attention to an ordinance strictly prohibiting unpened stock or chickens in the city limits, and pointed out that any person who allows his stock to run loose is breaking the law.

Bronte Takes Easy Win from Santa Anna Mountaineers

Bronte Longhorns came to life in Friday night's football game to defeat the Santa Anna Mountaineers 28-6. After a scoreless first half, Quarterback David Glenn went over from the 1 shortly after the clock started ticking off the minutes of the third quarter. After that, freshman fullback Doug McCutchen made three touchdowns to account for Bronte's four counters.

First Quarter

Larry Corley kicked off to start the ball game, and it was taken by Eugene Davenport who was downed on the 19 but fumbled the ball. Bronte recovered and took possession at that point. After two plays, the Longhorns fumbled and Santa Anna recovered on their 11 yard line. After gaining a yard on two tries, the Santa Anna lads decided to quick kick on 3rd down. The kick and run back put the ball on the 42. Bronte was unable to make the needed 10 yards, so the ball went over.

On the first play from scrimmage McCutchen intercepted a pass and ran the ball to the Mountaineer 31. A pass from Glenn to Royce Lee was good for 9 yards and Jerry Don Holcombe

Mr. Hurley lived in Coke County for a number of years before he moved to San Angelo in 1942. He was born April 21, 1902, in Springfield, Mo., and came to Coke County in 1925. He was the son of J. M. and Dora Munger Hurley. Mr. Hurley and Mae Thetford were married at Marfa May 12, 1923.

During World War II, Mr. Hurley was a torpedoman in the Navy for three and a half years. He saw service in the Pacific Theater of Operations. Returning to San Angelo after the war, he was a civil service employee at Good-fellow AFB until his retirement in 1956. He was a member of St. Luke's Methodist Church in San Angelo.

Mr. and Mrs. Hurley were frequent visitors to Bronte as their son, Elmer L. Hurley lives here. Also this is the home of Mrs. Hurley's mother, Mrs. Nannie Thetford, and her sister, Mrs. B. D. Snead.

line for 6 yards, then Glenn threw a pass to Lee which put the ball on the 1 yard line. Glenn took it over on a keeper for Bronte's first tally. Try for extra points failed.

Corley kicked off to the Mountaineers, but the Longhorns soon had the ball back when the visitors failed to make their 1st down. McCutchen and Holcombe were the main ball carriers in moving the ball back down the field to the Santa Anna 23, where the visitors took over after recovering a fumble. The visiting team made a 1st down on the 34, and had moved the ball on to the 44 when a fumble recovered by Bob Strickland gave the ball back to the Longhorns. McCutchen needed only two plays to carry the ball all the way to pay dirt. He went to the 29 on the first attempt then picked up good blocking for the 29 yard counter. Again try for extra points failed. Score was 12-0.

Larry Corley kicked off and the Mountaineers had to punt on 4th down. The officials ruled that the ball touched a Bronte player and the visitors recovered possession on the Bronte 23. Jones moved it up to the 11 for a first, and after three more tries was faced with a 4th, and 5 to go. He decided to pass, and it went to Valdez in the end zone for Santa Anna's only counter of the evening.

A short kick took the ball to the Santa Anna 45 where Bronte took possession of the ball. Unable to make their first, the Longhorns punted. Lee got his toe into the ball for a fine kick. It bounced down to the Santa Anna 5 yard line where Ron Johns killed it. The Longhorns had things going their way when Larry Corley recovered a fumble on the visitors' 9 yard line. McCutchen made a couple and Holcombe added three more. Then McCutchen went over from the 4 to make the score 18-6. Conversion attempt failed.

Jim Morrow did the kicking off with the ball being placed in play on the Mountaineer 33. On the first play from scrimmage Larry Corley intercepted a pass which gave the Longhorns the ball on the 38. Holcombe made 10 for a 1st. McCutchen and Holcombe took turns running the ball and moved it down to the 1. From there McCutchen went over for the touchdown. Glenn passed to Johns for 2 more points, making the score 26-6.

Morrow's kick went almost to the goal line where Williams took it and ran to the 15. On the next play a fumble was recovered by the Mountaineers in their own end zone, and Bob Bell rushed in for the tackle, which gave the Longhorns a safety and 2 more points. Score 28-6.

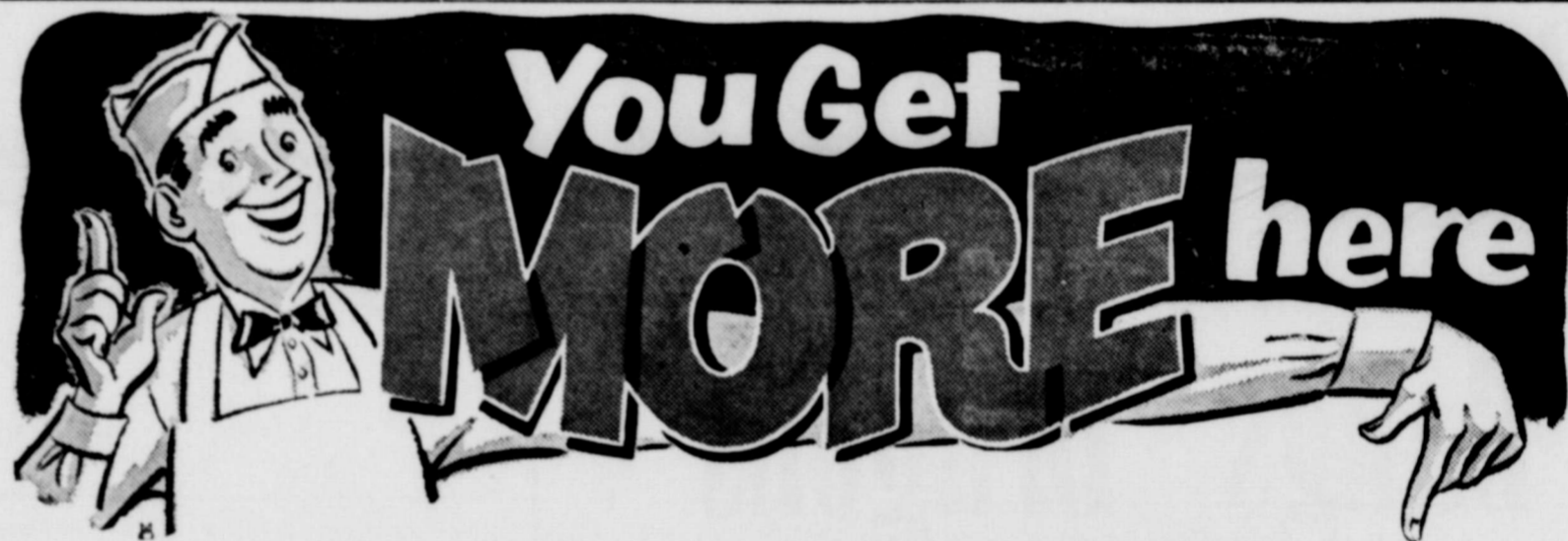
