Hurley said this year's March of Dimes is being waged primarily to battle birth defects. Some of the money will be used to maintain polio and arthritis treatment centers, but as much money as possible will be made available for research on and treatment of birth defects.

One in ten families in the United States is affected by the calamity of a child who is physically or mentally deficient, Hurley said. "Over 250,000 defective children are born each year, and we believe the concern and generosity of people all over this country — and right here in Coke County — will provide the money to conquer this terrible thing. Please give generously."

### Funeral Saturday For Eddie Garvin, Accident Victim

Funeral services were held in First Methodist Church in Blackwell Saturday at 2:30 p.m. for Eddie L. Garvin, 36, well known ranchman and oil field pumper. Mr. Garvin was killed sometime between 11 a.m. and 4:15 p.m. Thursday in a pickup accident about five miles northwest of Maryneal.

Conducting the funeral services were the Rev. Charles Dunnam, Blackwell Methodist pastor; the Rev. Gerald Sharp of Knox City, a former pastor; and George Triplett, Blackwell Church of Christ minister. Burial was in Blackwell cemetery under direction of Wells Funeral Home of Roscoe.

Edmond Leggett Garvin was born June 28, 1928 at Hext and moved to Blackwell nine years ago. He was married in 1949 at Sweetwater to Dona Hendry of Blackwell. Prior to moving to Blackwell the couple lived at Sterling City and Robert Lee.

Mr. Garvin was a board member of the Blackwell Methodist Church and a member of the Lions Club. He was an honorary member of Blackwell FFA. Only recently, he announced the Blackwell FFA stock show, and was scheduled to announce the Winters Show last weekend.

Mr. Garvin was an enthusiast of western and country music and was well known for his participation in musical programs in this area.

According to investigating officers, Mr. Garvin's pickup apparently went out of control after he topped a steep hill and rolled 1 1/4 times. His body was found beside the wrecked vehicle, with a note in his hands on which he had written to give instructions to whoever discovered the wreck. Officers theorized that he had crawled from the truck, knew he needed medical attention, and feared he would be unconscious when help arrived, so he penciled the note. Justice of the Peace C. F. Rose of Roscoe conducted an inquest and ruled that death was due to internal injuries suffered in the wreck.

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### Service at Norton For Joe B. Lee, 43, Car Wreck Victim

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m. at Norton Baptist Church for Joe B. Lee, 43, of Maverick. Mr. Lee was killed Sunday night in San Angelo when his car skidded on north Bell Street, hit a curb and turned over. He was alone in the car at the time of the accident.

He was taken to Shannon Hospital, but was dead on arrival.

Conducting the funeral was the Rev. N. T. Gault of Miles, former pastor of Maverick Baptist Church. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery at Bronte under direction of Newby-Davis Funeral Home of Ballinger.

Mr. Lee was born Sept. 11, 1921, at Maverick. He was a farmer, and a member of the Methodist Church. He was an army veteran of World War II, serving in the Pacific Theater of Operations at Hollandia, New Guinea and in the invasion of Manila. He was stationed at Ft. Lewis, Wash., and Camp Roberts, Calif., before going overseas.

He was married to Barbara Turner of Norton in 1941 at Ballinger.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Turner and Billy Ren, both of Maverick; three daughters, Mrs. Doyle Thompson of Arlington.

The 19-year-old soldier is a 1963 graduate of Robert Lee High School and attended San Angelo College.

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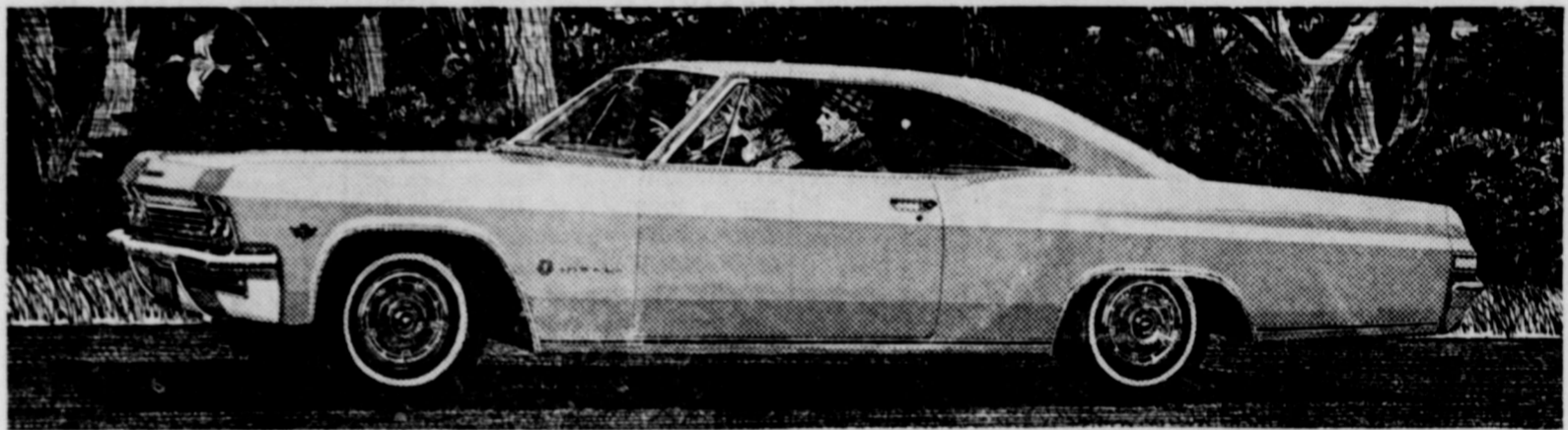


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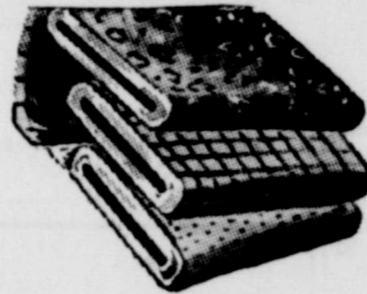

## State Prisoners To Give Program Here on Feb. 22

Four convicted felons now serving time in the state penitentiary at Huntsville will present a program Feb. 22 in Bronte School Auditorium. High School Principal Joe B. Simpson said the program is one of the most educational ever to come to Bronte.

"The stories these men tell make up the most educational and beneficial program a person can see," Simpson said. He invited everyone, men, women and children, to be on hand at 2:15 p.m. for the program.

Simpson said the Huntsville inmates know what they are talking about when they present their stories of the easy road to a life of crime, and the long hard road back from it.

"I am particularly anxious for all of our boys and girls and all parents to attend the program," the principal said, "for theirs is a story we can take lessons from."

Simpson has written all surrounding schools, inviting them to bring their student bodies and citizens of their communities to hear the prisoners speak. He said school officials would like to have at least 500 persons present.

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## Mid-Term Examinations In Progress at School

Midterm examinations began Wednesday afternoon in the upper grades of Bronte School and are continuing through Friday. Students have been provided with examination schedules.

A short school day will be run during exams, with classes being dismissed at 2:35 p.m., and buses running at that time.

## School Census Very Important

The superintendent said proper enumeration of all students in the school district is very important, since funds received by the school are based to some extent on the census.

Barbee asked help from everyone in the district in making certain that all children are counted. He asked anyone who knows of children who may not be listed to contact his office. He also invited anyone who has questions regarding the information wanted to contact the superintendent's office.

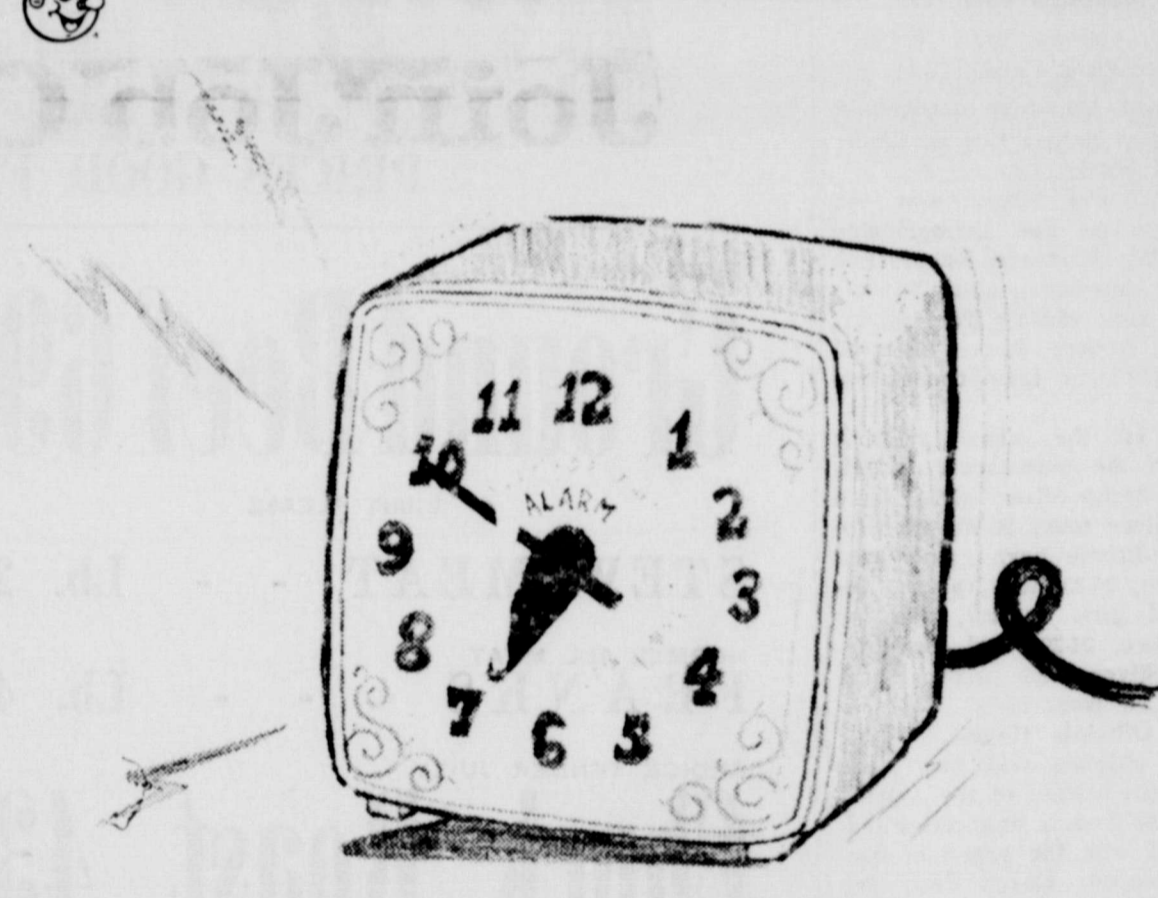

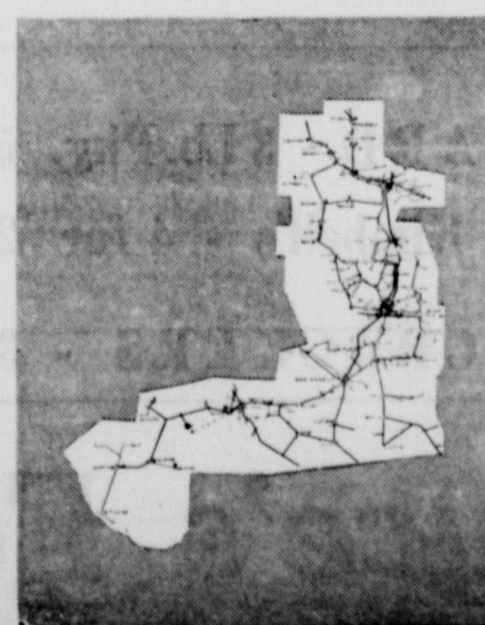

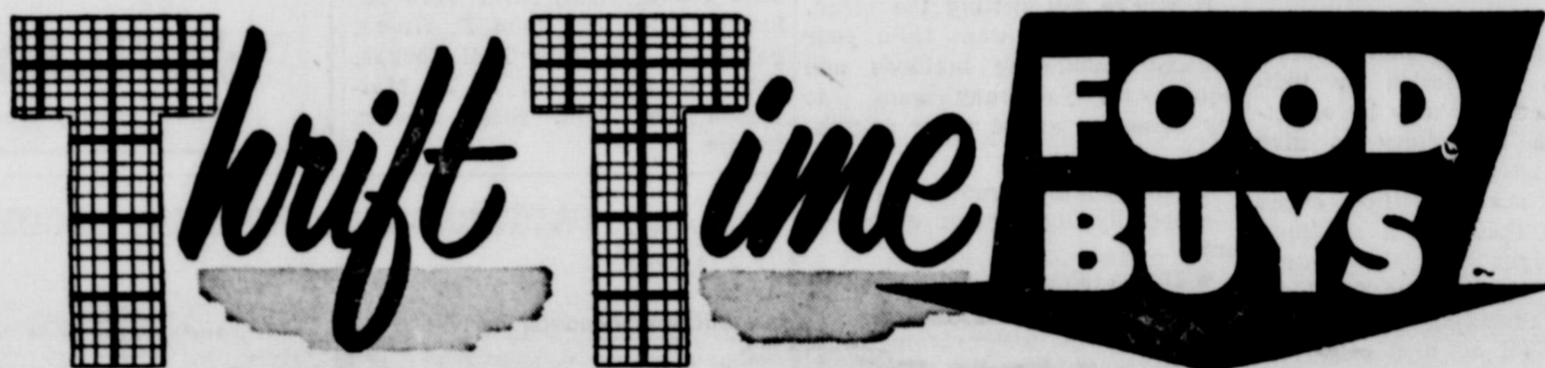
