## Lions Club Broom Sale To Be Held Saturday

Bronte Lions Club will sponsor a broom sale here Saturday. The big van of the Lighthouse for the Blind will be parked in front of First National Bank, and everyone is invited to come by and purchase the brooms, mops and other merchandise which will be offered for sale.

The Lions Broom sale is an annual affair and members of the club are looking forward to

a big day Saturday. All of the merchandise sold is made by blind persons, and they will receive the biggest part of the proceeds. The Lions will receive a percentage of the money taken in for use in projects for community betterment.

An ad in this paper lists all the merchandise which will be available. A club spokesman suggested that readers use the ad to prepare their list of needs.

In addition to having salesmen on duty at the truck, the Lions club will have representatives who will make a house to house canvass of the town. A complete line of merchandise will be carried for those who do not wish to come to town.

## Vaccination Will Be Given Today

The PTA immunization program will get underway today (Thursday) at 12:30 p.m. in the school clinic at Bronte Schools.

Small pox vaccinations and the first of the combination diphtheria-whooping cough and tetanus shots will be given. Children entering the first grade next year and school students under 12 are eligible to receive the vaccines. Parents will be responsible for giving the other two shots of the DPT series. Both smallpox and DPT shots are required before entering school.

Mrs. A. R. Bagwell, R. N. from Harris clinic, will administer the shots and the vaccine will be furnished by the PTA.

All of Bronte Schools' teachers, with the exception of two, were rehired last Thursday at a regular meeting of the board of trustees. Resignations of R. H. Hornbeck, band director, and Mrs. G. W. Murphy, fifth grade teacher, were accepted by the board.

Mrs. James Raughton, wife of the head basketball coach, was elected to teach the fifth grade, but no replacement for Hornbeck was hired.

Smith, English; Mrs. George Thomas, second grade; Cecil Toliver, coach and science; Darrel Windhaus, Spanish and social science.

Contract of Supt. C. B. Barbee was extended in January and those of Principals Joe B. Simpson and James Golson in February.

Mrs. Raughton, the only new teacher on the 1965-66 faculty so far, is teaching this year in Robert Lee Schools. She is a graduate of Sul Ross College. She and her husband have three children. The family lives on Highway 277 in a rent house belonging to C. E. Bruton.

In other business, the board approved the senior trip which will be taken at the end of school. The group will go to Colorado Springs, Colo. The trustees also ratified the textbook report of the state Textbook Selection Committee.

Another step was also taken toward getting the new high school building program underway, when an agreement was signed with Columbian Securities Corp. of Texas and R. K. Dunbar & Co. Ltd., for the firms to serve as financial advisors to the board during the proposed building program.

**H. H. Ditmores Receive Interesting Letter from Daughter in Ethiopia**

The H. H. Ditmores recently received an interesting letter from his daughter, Mrs. James (Darlene) Davidson, who lives in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. Mr. Davidson is a teacher for deaf mutes in a Church of Christ school there. The Davidson arrived in Ethiopia in Sept., 1964, and their three children, Kathy 12, Kobe 10, and Courtney 8, are with them. Believing the letter will be of interest to our readers, we are reprinting it, in part, below:

Feb. 2, 1965

"We are all fine and so thankful for our health, because we certainly come in contact with a goodly number of strange germs daily. It is just a part of life here.

"We had a happy experience yesterday, at least for the children. Quen Elizabeth and Prince Phillip came to town and we saw them. Also His Majesty, Haille Selassie. We were fortunate to get right on the road from the airport. She looked directly at us and waved. There were nine children in our group, and we feel that she spotted them, because of the blonde fairness of our friends children. Actually they are not British, but Swiss. Anyway, the group of white children showed up in the colored crowd...and she noticed them. Our kids have talked of nothing else today. She is truly a beautiful woman...much more lovely than her photographs show her to be. Prince Phillips is a big man, and very handsome, too. Haille Selassie is so very, very small. He is showing his age. His features are definitely Arabic-Jew. His countenance is very kind.

"We hope he will remain in power for a few more years.  
"Several people say that this country will be in chaos if some-

thing happens to him now. He does have a son, the Crown Prince, but he seems to lack the strong hand for leadership that his father has.

"If people in America could see what real poverty is, they would all go home and thank their Lord for a bed, food, and a roof, and one pair of britches. I never knew the meaning of the word until we came here. Richness does not mean the number of things we have, but the fewness of our wants.

"You really get a different outlook on life, when just outside your window an old woman carries a heavy earthen jar of water up the path. She carries it from the river up and down the steep banks. When she finishes this, she will go into the forest to collect cow dung, or heavy loads of

wood for cooking. If she is lucky, she will have highly spiced gravy and bread for breakfast, the same thing for lunch, and supper. Never anything else, seven days a week, three times a day...if she's lucky, that is."

## Mrs. George Hannaford, Born Here in 1880, Observes Her 85th Birthday

Old timers here will remember Mrs. George Hannaford, pictured above, former long-time resident of Coke County. The picture was made at the home of her son, B. W. Hannaford in Corpus Christi when she observed her 85th birthday Feb. 1. It was also B. W. Hannaford's birthday.

Mrs. Hannaford was one of the first white persons born in Coke County. She was born on Oak Creek just above the present Oak Creek Lake in a picket house on Feb. 1, 1880. Her parents, Mr. and Mr. Blackie Robinson came to this area in the 1870s from California. After settling here guard on the wagon train from California. After settling here, Mr. Robinson hauled and freighted the first barbed wire into here from Waco.

She and her sisters and brothers attended Howard Payne College in the 1890s. Two of her sisters were early day school teachers in the pioneer schools. Miss Florence Robinson taught at Decker and Miss Gertrude Robinson (McCurry) was a teacher at Fort Chadbourne. Her brother, W. F. Robinson was the first mail carrier from Buffalo Gap to the old Fort Chadbourne post office. He later served as county attorney in Coke County and as county judge at Lamesa in Dawson County.

Mrs. Hannaford grew up on the place which is now the Preston Davis home near Fort Chadbourne. She later married and then moved back to this area to raise her family, moving to Corpus Christi in 1939.

Her other children are Mrs. G. B. Waltrip, Ruidoso, New Mexico; Mrs. Mabel Davis, Corpus Christi, and Miss Gladys Hannaford, Alamogordo, New Mex. Mr. Hannaford died in 1950 and is buried at the Old Fort Chadbourne cemetery. She and Mrs. Davis make their home together in Corpus Christi.

Mrs. Hannaford is in reasonably good health and remembers the organization of Coke County.

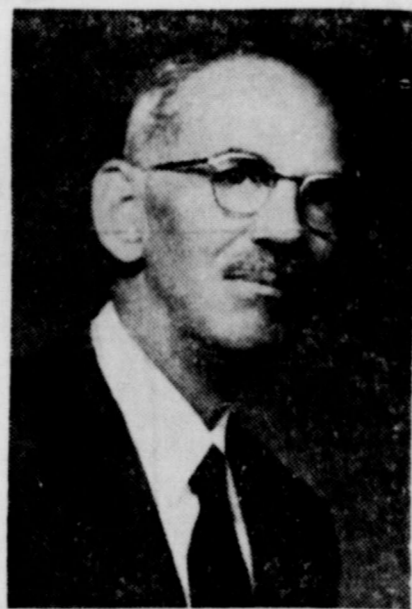
### Mrs. Sims Hosts WSCS

Royce Lee and Ronald Hooper will appear over KCTV, Channel 8, San Angelo at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, March 23 as members of a TV class during a lecture demonstration on the LASER. The TV presentation will be given by Dr. Herbert Trotter Jr., chairman of the board of General Telephone & Electronics Laboratories, Inc.

Science teachers and students from towns throughout the area plan to "attend" the lecture via TV's set up at schools. The program is being sponsored by General Telephone Company of the Southwest, according to R. R. McCullough, district manager.

During the lecture Dr. Trotter will present a new concept designed to overcome factors producing a crisis in education. He also will demonstrate "blackboard by wire" which permits a teacher to transmit formulas or other written material via telephone lines to students throughout a wide geographical area. This method also permits two way voice communication over existing telephone circuits between the teacher and the students.

### Cotton & Wool Garments

The term "delayed cure" may sound like a health fad, but it actually refers to a new textile process which represents happy news for the family wardrobe.

Wash-wears finished by this technique have an exceptional ability to retain their shape during wear and after laundering.

Durable creases and pleats can be set in to last the life of the garment, even after repeated washing.

Slacks, trousers and work pants were the first cotton garments to be made by this new process. Sport shirts, blouses, and dresses are expected on the market this spring, and all-cotton suits are now being developed for men. At present most of the fabrics used are a blend of cotton with either nylon or polyester fiber.

The finish requires two steps. First, the fabric is treated with thermosetting resin and goes to the manufacturer to be made into garments — including sharp creases or pleats, if desired.

Then the finished garments are placed in a high-temperature oven to "cure" the finish by heat. This permanently "sets" the shape of the entire garment. It also reduces the problem of subsequent seam pucker and eliminates the need for touch-up ironing.

Certain wools are also being treated by a chemical process with a delayed setting similar to that used for cottons and cotton blends. Creases or pleats are made in finished woolen garments and the setting takes place in a subsequent step — again assuring the durable sharpness so important to a pleated fashion.

### Avoid Torn Wrappers

If you buy fresh or fresh frozen poultry and if you intend to put it in the freezer, be sure the wrapping is tear-free and tight.

Exposure to air dries out frozen poultry quickly, and may turn it dark and develop off flavors.

Should you wish to repack the poultry or make packages larger or smaller, be sure to use a moisture-vapor-resistant wrapping material. Foil is fine for this purpose, and there are several types of freezer wraps available at most supermarkets.

Force the air out by pressing the wrapping close to the bird. Then fold the ends of the paper upward and over until the package is tight.

Store frozen chicken no longer than a year. Turkey, goose and duck should be used within six months.

Regular prices on frying chicken continue reasonable, and scattered specials bring these young chickens down to a hard-to-resist level.

Chicken hens and turkeys are excellent buys. Eggs are among bargain buys this week, with large sizes even better buys than a week ago. And they are so good for preparing Lenten dishes.

A number of specials are featured on beef this week. Consider succulent pot roasts, stews and favorite cuts of steak. Fresh pork choices include picnics, chops, loin roasts, hams and liver.

Prices are generally steady on Grade A bacon, with specials on lesser grades.

Canned tuna, pink salmon and frozen fish fillets offer other good values for Lenten menus.

Quality varies on some of the fresh vegetables. Carrots, cabbage, eggplant, turnips, head lettuce, celery and dry onions are among the best selections. Cooking greens are fair-to-good quality. Most potatoes are still high.

Grapefruit of excellent quality is moderately priced. Bananas, juice oranges, apples, and pears

are other good fruit selections.

**March 26 Deadline To Sign Up for '65 Grain Program**

Friday, March 26 is the last day growers may file application to take part in the 1965 feed grain program, according to C. E. Arrott, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee for this county.

He reminded farmers that only those who participate in the feed grain program will be eligible for price support on their 1965 corn, barley and grain sorghum crops. As last year, the support is made available through loans and price-support payments.

Besides qualifying for price support, the participating grower also earns a diversion payment for shifting part of his feed grain base to a conserving use. Minimum diversion is 20 percent of the individual farm's total feed grain base. Maximum diversion is 50 percent of the base or 25 acres if this is more. For diverting more than the minimum, the diversion payment will be figured at a higher rate. If the actual diversion is 40 percent or more, the higher rate applies to the whole diversion.

Arrott said that farmer interest in Coke County is higher than last year and indications are that 1965 participants will run well ahead of 1964.

He urged interested farmers

to call at the ASCS county office as soon as possible, since only six working days are left before the March 26 deadline, and signing up is the first step in program participation. The ASCS office is open from 8 until 5 o'clock, Monday through Friday.

"We don't want anybody to be disappointed because he waited too long," Arrott said. "There's also the advantage of being able to get half the estimated diversion payment in advance at the time of signup or soon afterward."
