2 Events to Benefit Scoreboard Fund

Two benefit events for the PTA-sponsored football scoreboard fund will be held at Bronte School Friday night, April 2. A pancake supper, sponsored by the Bronte Longhorn Club, will get underway at 5:30 p.m., followed by a hootenanny at 7:30 p.m. Admission to each of the affairs is 50 cents. The PTA is the hootenanny sponsor.

Elmer Hurley, president of the PTA, said he hopes enough money will be raised April 2 to complete the amount needed to purchase the scoreboard. The fund now has \$815 on deposit.

Another opportunity will be given to help the scoreboard fund during an intermission at the hootenanny, when cold drinks, coffee and pie will be served in the school lunchroom.

Mrs. Bill Moody, member of a PTA committee working on the project, said that a large number of local and out of town musicians and performers are being lined up to provide the entertainment.

Hurley said he hopes everyone in this entire area will make plans now to be at the school Friday night of next week to enjoy the pancake supper and hootenanny, as well as to help raise enough money for the scoreboard. Present plans call for having the new board installed and ready for use at the first 1965 home game of the Longhorns.

STOCKMEN ASKED TO GIVE \$2720 FOR SCREWORM ERADICATION

Coke County livestock producers have been asked to contribute \$2720 to help keep the screwworm Eradication Program in operation through June 30 — the county's prorata share of the \$300,000 that

is needed from Texas producers to keep the program going. Each operator is asked to contribute ten cents per head for each cow or horse in their basic herds and two cents for each head of sheep, goats or swine.

Track Team Going To Merkel Meet

Bronte high school's track team will go to Merkel Saturday for a track meet which will involve Class A and B schools of the area.

Coach Cecil Toliver said coaches had to choose between the San Angelo Relays and the Merkel meet where they will be able to see some teams likely to be met later on in regional competition. He said the competition will be stiff, with a number of strong teams taking part.

Last Saturday Bronte's track team accumulated a total of 34 points at the Eldorado meet.

The big gun was the 880 relay team which took first place honors and brought home a beautiful trophy. The team ran the 880 yards with a time of 1:34.5. It is composed of Ronnie Lee, Royce Lee, Rickey Wheat and Mike McKown.

Jim Morrow was awarded second place in the high jump event, after he and two more entries tied at 6 feet, one-half inch. Places were determined by the number of misses each boy had before he cleared the pole.

Another point-maker was Ronnie Lee, who won third place in the 220 yard run.

Absentee Voting in Progress for School, City

Persons who wish to vote absentee in either the city or school elections may do so now. The city election will be held Tuesday, April 6, while the school trustee voting will take place Saturday, April 3.

Any qualified voter may cast his ballot absentee if he will not be able to get to the polls on election day, because of health or absence from the area. Ballots may be obtained in person or by writing the office where absentee voting

is being held.

Mrs. Helen Kirkland is in charge of city absentee voting, and Judge W. W. Thetford is in charge of school trustee absentee voting for the entire county.

Four candidates are seeking two posts on Bronte School board of trustees. They are A. E. Bell, Jr., (reelection), Wayne Arrott, Clyde Lee and Matthew Caperton.

There are three candidates for two vacancies on the city council, Manuel Reyes, Horace Grigg and

Norman R. (Wink) Kiker.

In the county trustee voting which will be held at the same time and place as Bronte School trustee balloting, D. K. Glenn of Bronte and W. D. McAdams of Robert Lee have filed for county trustee at large. Noah Pruitt Sr. of precinct 2 and C. E. Arrott of precinct 4 are running unopposed for reelection as county trustees.

Six candidates are running at Robert Lee for three places, while Silver has two candidates seeking reelection, unopposed.

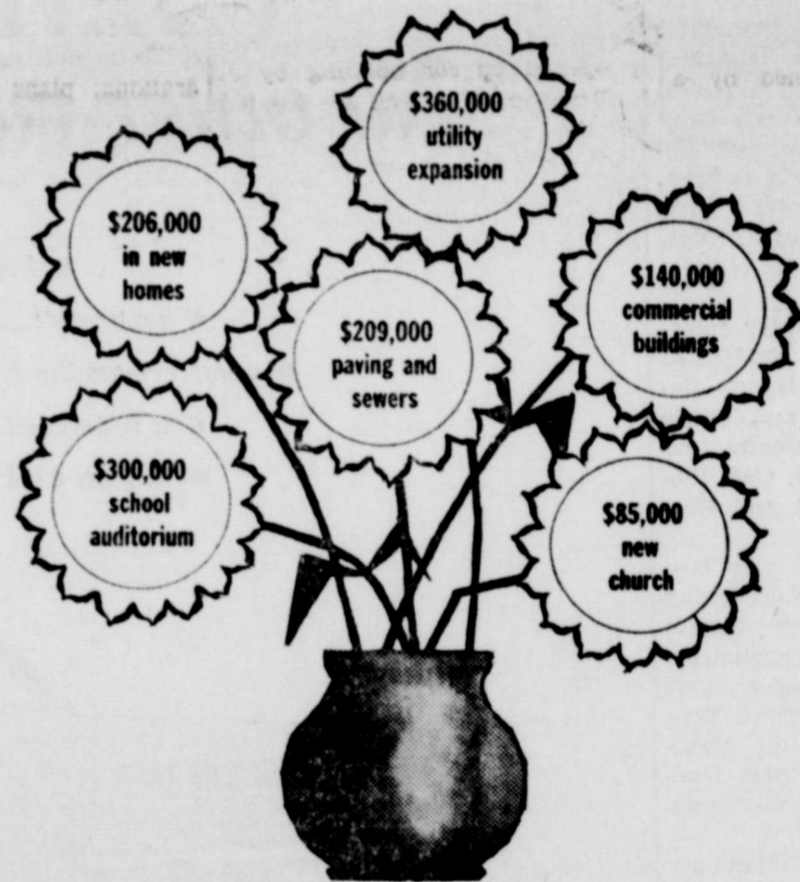

in production of sterile screwworm flies have extended available funds by several months.

Eradication experts estimated that during April, May and June, a time of heavy screwworm activity, 100 million sterile flies will be needed each week to keep fertile insects from Mexico from reinfesting the Southwest, where the livestock pest has been eradicated through use of the sterile male fly technique. Cost of operating at this level will be \$12,000 a day or about \$1.1 million for the three-month period.

The \$300,000 to be raised by livestockmen, along with \$250,000 already appropriated by the Texas Legislature, will match an equal amount of federal funds to supply the total required for the next three months.
