Trackmen Win First in District

Bronte High School track team set a remarkable record at last Saturday's District 67-B track meet in Big Spring. The Longhorns won first place in the meet, set two new records and qualified boys to compete in regional contests for nine of the 14 events which compose the meet.

Bronte trackmen amassed a total 164 to win first place honors. Coming in second was Robert Lee

with 131; Forsan was third with 88; Garden City, fourth, 60; Water Valley, fifth, 30; Sterling City, sixth, 21.

Jim Morrow was high point man for the Longhorns with 30 points, for taking first in high jump, broad jump and discus.

Silver took first place honors in the junior high division, with Bronte coming in second. Davis Corley was high pointer for the younger group with 23. He won first place in four events.

440 yard dash: Royce Lee, 1st, 53.1; Tad Richards, 4th.

180 yard low hurdles: Larry Corley, 4th.

220 yard dash: Ronnie Lee, 1st, 23.2 (broke record of 23.6 set in 1964 by Edwyn McDaniel of Bronte).

Mile relay: Bronte, 1st, 3:41.0, with team made up of McKown, Royce Lee, Wheat and Richards.

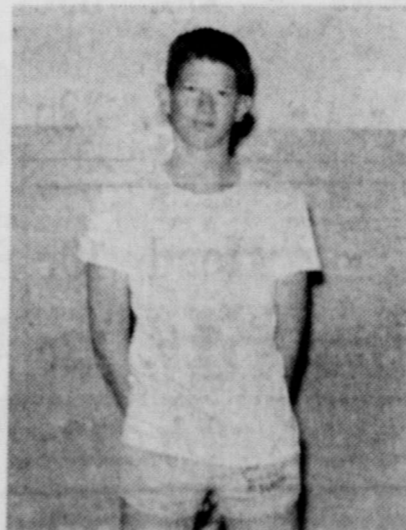

Meeting Set Tuesday On Poverty Program

A large delegation of Coke County residents attended a meeting Tuesday night in Sweetwater which was set up to explain the workings of the President's anti-poverty program. The local citizens were interested in obtaining

information on any possible assistance which might be received here for improvement of the economic situation.

County Judge W. W. Thetford announced Wednesday morning that he thought the County Committee on Progress, which is already functioning, would be a proper sponsor for the program in Coke County.

Consequently, the chairman of the committee, E. F. Glenn of Bronte, has called a meeting of all members for 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, April 20, at the courthouse in Robert Lee.

Glenn urged that all members of the progress committee be present as plans made may be of extreme importance to the welfare of the county and its residents.

Glenn said the explanation of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 (anti-poverty program) was very enlightening and he is hopeful that Coke County will be able to take advantage of some of the opportunities offered. He said portions of the program are very flexible and probably can be adapted to local conditions.

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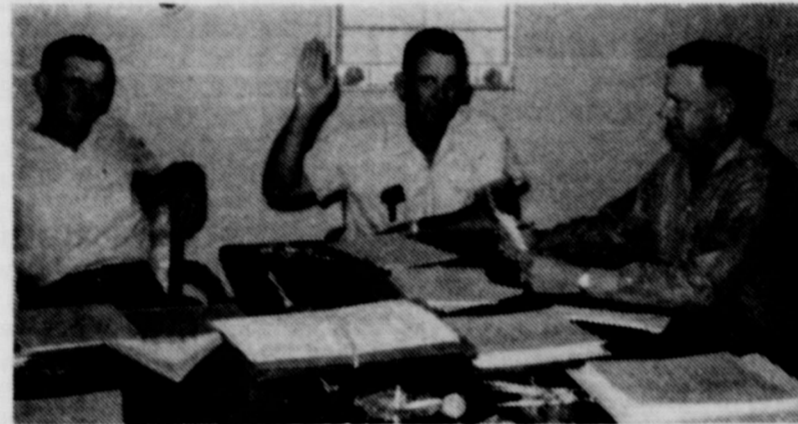

One of the main items of discussion was spending a large amount for construction of a new gymnasium. This expenditure was questioned at some length by the trustees, and they seemed to think that a new gym is necessary to carry on the kind of school program needed by our children. Athletics, they pointed out, is an integral part of an educational program in 1965 and will probably become even more important in years ahead.

The school board was unanimous in opinion that needs of the school should be given careful consideration by every resident of the district. These men want to do what is best for our children, but at the same time they are keenly sensitive to the desires of the people they represent.

We would like to suggest that all our readers give earnest thought to the matter of a new school and decide what you think is needed. We would also like to suggest that you keep a few things in mind while considering this matter:

- (1) The needs of the students in the light of present day demands on young people who are preparing themselves for the future.
- (2) What it would mean to this community if we let things continue as they are and keep losing scholastics to better schools.
- (3) The cost we will have to

shoulder if we allow the school to go down to a point where we are forced to consolidate. The possibility of even higher taxes in another school district will face us.

(4) The fact that good facilities attract people, which makes us believe an improved school plant would increase our number of scholastics.

(5) The almost positive assurance that the present high school building will be condemned at any time by the state.

Lots of work and lots of decisions will have to be made in the next few months, if we are to see this project to a successful completion.
