Track Team Wins Region; 8 to State

Bronte Longhorns won the regional track meet, making 47 total points. Rochelle was second with 44 and Klondike had 43.

A total of eight Bronte High School students will enter three athletic and two literary events at the state meet in Austin on May 6, 7 and 8. The group qualified to participate at state level when they placed first or second at the regional contest last Saturday in Big Spring.

Margi Oglesby took first place honors in ready writing and will make her second trip to Austin in as many years. She won second place in the state meet last year. Miss Judith Smith is sponsor of the ready writing event.

Larry Corley will also be making his second trip to Austin to enter the number sense contest. Clint Low is his sponsor.

Jim Morrow, also a two time winner, will try to outdo his last year's performance of winning second in the state in high jump.

Royce Lee will do double duty at state, as he won top regional honors in the 440 yard dash and was also a member of the mile relay team which placed second at Big Spring. He, too, participated in the state meet last year.

Other members of the relay team are Ricky Wheat, Mike McKown and Tad Richards. Jerry

Trustees Study Plans For New High School

Another session with George Sowden, Fort Worth architect, by Bronte School's board of trustees last Thursday night gave the board members another plan of building new high school facilities.

It also made it plain to them that the facilities needed at Bronte will cost at least \$300,000.

The plans Sowden presented feature an underground classroom

section, 60x90 feet, which could double as a storm protection center for the school and entire community.

The proposed new plant would be located on the present high school building site, and the newer part of the high school facility would be left intact, except for extensive remodeling and modernization.

The above ground part of the building would consist of a new gymnasium, athletic rooms, science department, restrooms, and principal's office. Underground would be the library, study hall, three classrooms, teachers' workroom, book storage, and mechanical equipment room. The remainder of the high school classrooms would be housed in the south wing of the present elementary building.

Plans also call for the homemaking department to remain in the area now housing it. The entrance opening up on the east would be closed and the hallway now leading to the gym would be incorporated into that department.

The present library and study hall space would be converted into a band and music room.

Sowden's estimate on the most on the structure, including demolition of the old structure and renovation of the gymnasium building, would run \$325,000.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said board members would like to get the cost below that figure, but they did feel such a bond issue could be retired with no increase in the present tax setup for bond retirement. The board has in mind to have the building ready for use in time for the first bond payment to coincide with retirement of the elementary building bonds.

Barbee said that Gordon Charlton of San Angelo, the school's fiscal representative, has made no definite proposal on the time schedule, but a preliminary estimate showed the proposed bond issue could be retired with the same money now paid out each year on the elementary school bonds. However, the period of payment would have to be extended over a slightly longer period of time, due to the fact that the principal amount would be larger and interest rates have increased since the elementary school was built.

SCIENCE FAIR SET SATURDAY

Bronte School's annual science fair will be open to the public all day Saturday. The fair will feature science projects from each of the 12 grades of school.

Clint Low and Cecil Toliver are supervising the show. Low said Tuesday that the projects of the students will be judged Thursday, and the fair will be open to students Friday.

The exhibits will be grouped in junior and high school group and individual projects in both physical and biological categories. There will be exhibits for the various rooms in grades 1-4, and for individuals and groups in grades 5-8.

The science fair is a big event in the school and community each year, with a big majority of the students participating and residents of the area enjoying the results of their work.

The fair will be set up on the top floor of the high school building, and guides will be available to explain the various exhibits, Low said. He issued an invitation to everyone in the area to come by Saturday and see the work of the school science students.

Heavy Oil Production Apparent in Wildcat

What appears to be a prolific producer has been discovered in a wildcat about six miles north of Bronte. The well is styled Karl Hoblitzelle and Ronald R. Perkins No. 1 C. C. Boecking.

Four separate drillstem tests, at various intervals between 4,155 feet and 4,185 feet, the total depth yielded a sizeable amount of oil and operator has set 4½ inch casing to the total depth. Perforations at unreported intervals have been made and the well is in the process of being completed.

Results of tests were as follows:

Test No. 1, 4,155-85 feet. Tool open one hour. Gas surfaced in six minutes. Recovered 3,582 feet of fluid, 2,430 feet of oil and 1,152 feet of sulphur water. Initial shutin pressure was 1,285

and final shutin pressure was 1,260 pounds. Initial flowing pressure was 1,090 pounds and final flowing pressure was 1,215 pounds.

Test No. 2, 4,155-67 feet. Tool open two hours. Gas surfaced in one hour and 57 minutes. Recovery was 1,345 feet of fluid, 1,165 feet oil and 180 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud. Initial shutin pressure, 1,275, final shutin pressure, 1,260. Final flowing pressure, 0-385 feet.

Test No. 3, 4,174-80 feet. Gas surfaced in eight minutes. Recovered 3,432 feet fluid, 2,037 feet oil and 1,395 feet water. Pressures were same as test number 1.

Test No. 4, 4,180-85 feet. Test tool open 30 minutes. Gas surfaced in 12 minutes. Recovery was 810 feet oil and 750 feet water. Initial shutin pressure, 1,225; final shutin pressure 1,210. After being shutin ten minutes, flowing pressure was 160-575 pounds.

Operator has moved rig to No. 1 L. T. Youngblood, one location east of the discovery wildcat. The Youngblood test is located 1,667 feet from the north and 467 feet east of the west line of a 160 acre tract in 347-1A-H&TC Ry. Survey.

The discovery was drilled under the supervision of Clyde Lee, who is in charge of drilling operations for Hoblitzelle and Perkins, and Royce Lee, who is in charge of production, is supervising completion operations.

The mile relay team ran its best race of this year with a 3:31, even though it came in second, behind Klondike.

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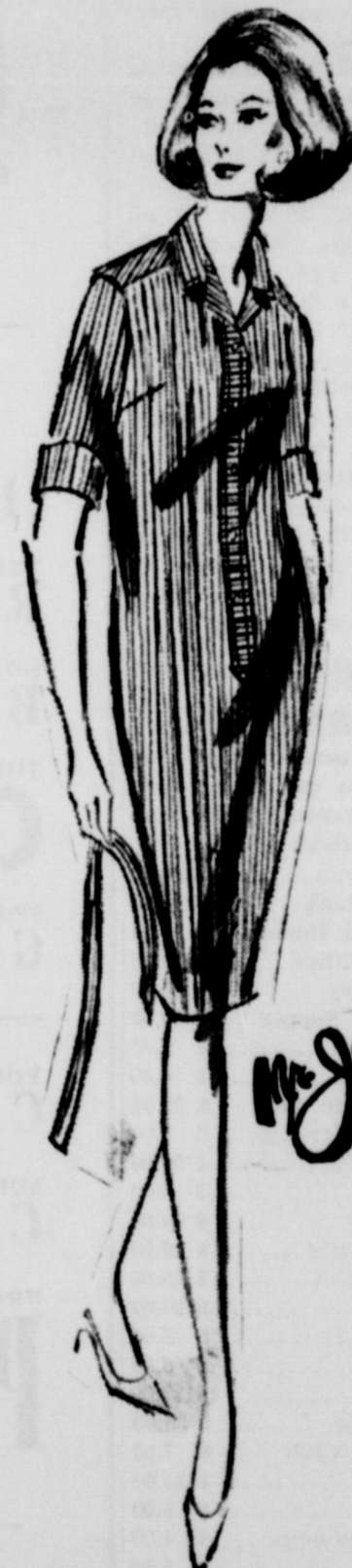

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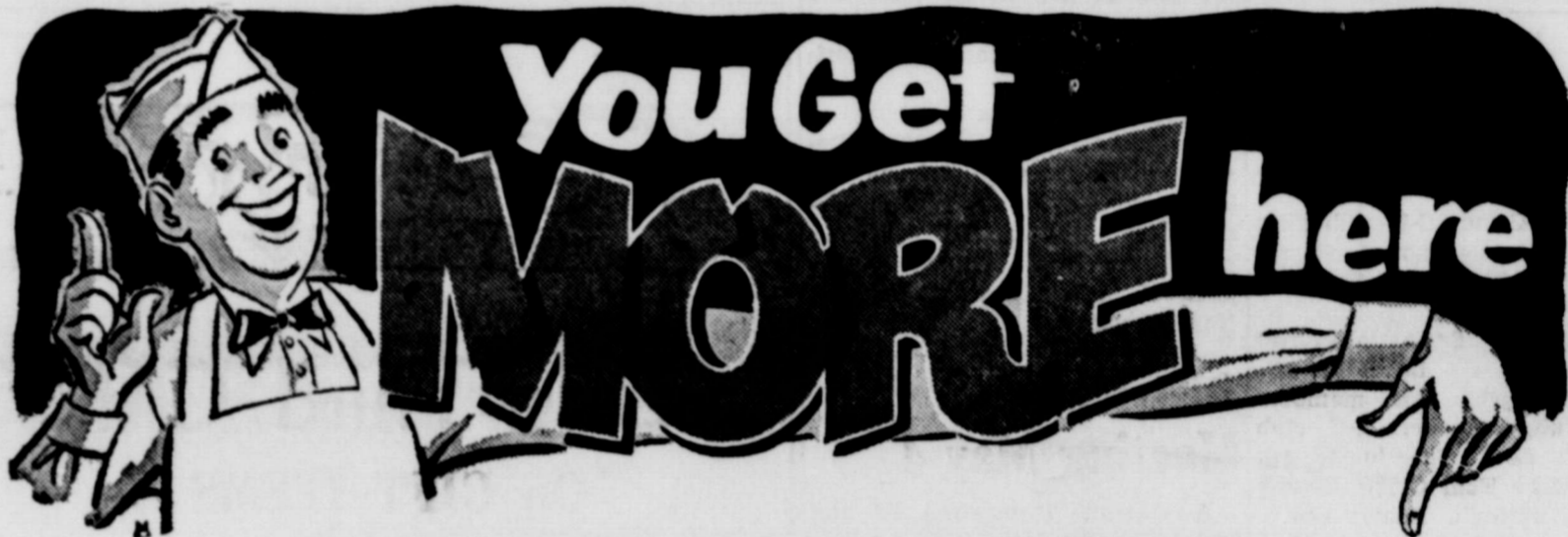
