

Deadline for persons over 65 years of age to apply for health insurance under the Texas 65 program is midnight, Friday, April 30. The Texas 65 insurance program is made possible by a special law passed by the State of Texas and only residents of this state are eligible.

#### MILLIKIN NOMINATED FOR TEACHER AWARD


