CONSERVATIONIST — Robert Walker, of Silver was presented a plaque Tuesday of last week at the meeting of the Robert Lee BCD for his outstanding work as a supervisor for 14 years on the Coke County Soil Conservation District Board and for his excellent job of conservation on his ranch. The plaque was presented by J. L. Richmond, area conservationist with the SCS, of San Angelo. The plaque for Walker was purchased by the Coke County SCD. W. E. Jacoby, county conservationist, was in charge of the program.

Heavy Production In No. 2 Boecking

Another prolific producer is apparent on the Charlie Boecking lease north of Bronte in the Karl Hoblitzelle No. 2 Boecking. The well is located 1,214 feet south of the No. 1 Boecking, which was recently finished for a daily potential of 158.41 barrels of 43 gravity oil.

The No. 2 Boecking is another discovery for the area, as production is indicated at a different depth from the No. 1 Boecking.

On a drillstem test from 5,300-5,309 feet, gas surfaced in three minutes. The test was shut in after 38 minutes and the well flow-

ed in 57 minutes. Bottom hole shut in pressure was 1845 pounds and flowing pressure was 390-740 pounds.

Recovery was 2,954 feet of fluid, including 2,224 feet of oil and 730 feet of mud cut oil.

Operator has completed well from open hole between 5300-310 feet with a heavy flow. Flowing into test tank pending completing of flowline connections to battery.

Operator has moved rig to No. 1 L. T. Youngblood for a 6,000 foot wildcat well located 2867 feet from the No. 1 Boecking.

Webb, an employee of Rotan Veterinary Hospital, died of an apparent heart attack about 6:30 p.m. Thursday. He was ill when his wife picked him up at work. She took him to the hospital where he died a short time later.

He was born Dec. 19, 1931, in San Angelo. He was a graduate of Bronte high school and graduated from Sul Ross State College in 1954. He was employed by the Soil Conservation Service from 1954 to 1963. He was married to Mary Susie Moore of Divide Aug. 14, 1955.

Survivors include the wife; two sons, Steve, 9, and Gary, 7; two brothers, Joel of Ruidoso, N. M., and C. N. Jr. of Bronte; his mother Mrs. C. N. Webb Sr of Ruidoso and the maternal grandfather, Elmer Allen of Orient.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Legislature Passes Bill To Enlarge UCRA Dist.

The Texas Legislature in its final meeting Monday voted a compromise bill to permit expansion of the Upper Colorado River Authority. Some controversy was evident as to whether Coke and Tom Green counties should have two representatives on the board of directors while the new counties, which may become a part of the organization, should have one. The compromise bill, which was passed and sent to the

governor for his signature, would allow Coke and Tom Green two members each on the board for the first three years, and thereafter these two counties would have only one, just as the other counties.

The UCRA, now composed of Coke and Tom Green counties, would be increased to include Coleman, Concho, Irion, McCulloch, Menard, Runnels, Schleicher and Sterling. Each county or any part of a county that becomes a member of the organization would have to vote approval before being admitted.

If either Tom Green or Coke county vote against consolidating the eight other counties and enlarging the district, the whole matter will die, according to the bill.

Purpose of the new district, as set forth in the bill, would be carried out by a board of directors appointed by the governor and approved by the Senate. The board would have authority to construct water conservation projects and develop water resources for domestic, municipal, industrial, mining, irrigation, reclamation and forestation uses and hydroelectric power.

The present board of directors of the UCRA has come out with a

resolution favoring the enlargement. Gerald C. Allen, Robert Lee, chairman of the board, has come out wholeheartedly for the proposition. He said Tuesday that he feels the addition of the other counties will add greatly to the strength of the UCRA and enable this area of West Texas to secure greater consideration from state and federal authorities in development of water resources. Allen included the Robert Lee dam and lake in projects which he thinks will be aided by the increase in the size of the district.

He said he and other directors of the UCRA are hopeful of securing a favorable reply from the State Board on the Robert Lee project. "Every county included in the bill passed by the legislature has come out in favor of the Robert Lee lake," Allen said.

On the other hand, one director of the UCRA, L. T. Youngblood of Bronte, former chairman of the board, has come out completely against the enlargement of the district. He has said on numerous occasions that he feels Coke and Tom Green counties have nothing to gain from the consolidation with the eight other counties. Youngblood objects to the assets of the UCRA, made up of ad valorem tax money paid by residents of Tom Green and Coke counties, being turned over to the new enlarged district.

No date has been set for holding the elections. Tom Green and Coke counties will vote to determine if there will be an enlarged district while the other eight counties will vote to see if they want to be a part of it.

—Has been owner and operator of Hardesty Drug in the Crawford Hotel Building since discharge from the Infantry in 1946.

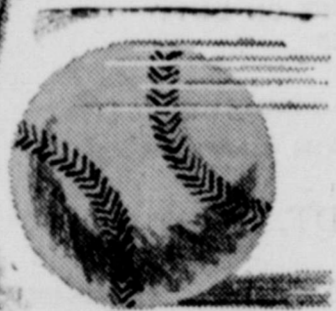
—Is Past Commander of American Legion Post 355 of Howard County.

J. T. Henry, agriculture teacher, said Edwards was well pleased with the turnout and interest in the course.

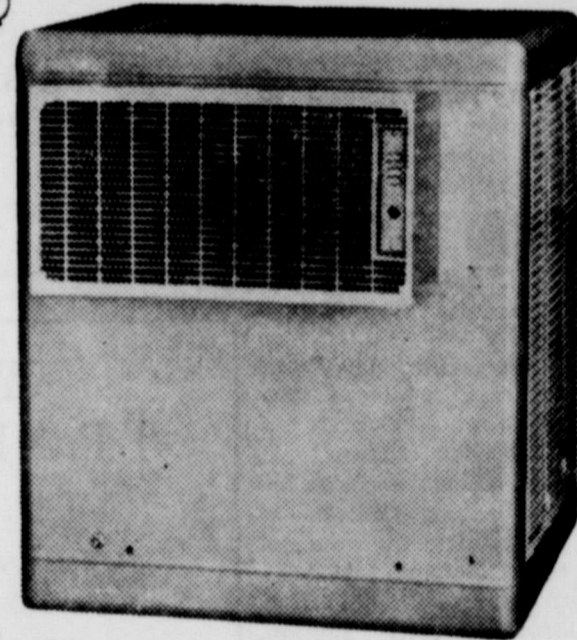
