Mrs. Lee died at 1:30 p.m. Sunday in the Holiday Hills Rest Home in Coleman, where she had been a patient for about two months.

She was born Lillie Mae Harper Aug. 19, 1883, in South Carolina. She was married to N. D. Lee June 17, 1904, in Springhill, Tex. They came to Maverick in 1922 from Longview and had lived there since that time. Mr. Lee died June 14, 1934.

Survivors are six sons, Lenard of West Lake, La., Joe W. of Houston, Winifred and Jack, both of Ballinger, and Hurlin and James, both of Bronte; 12 grandchildren; and 16 great-grandchildren.

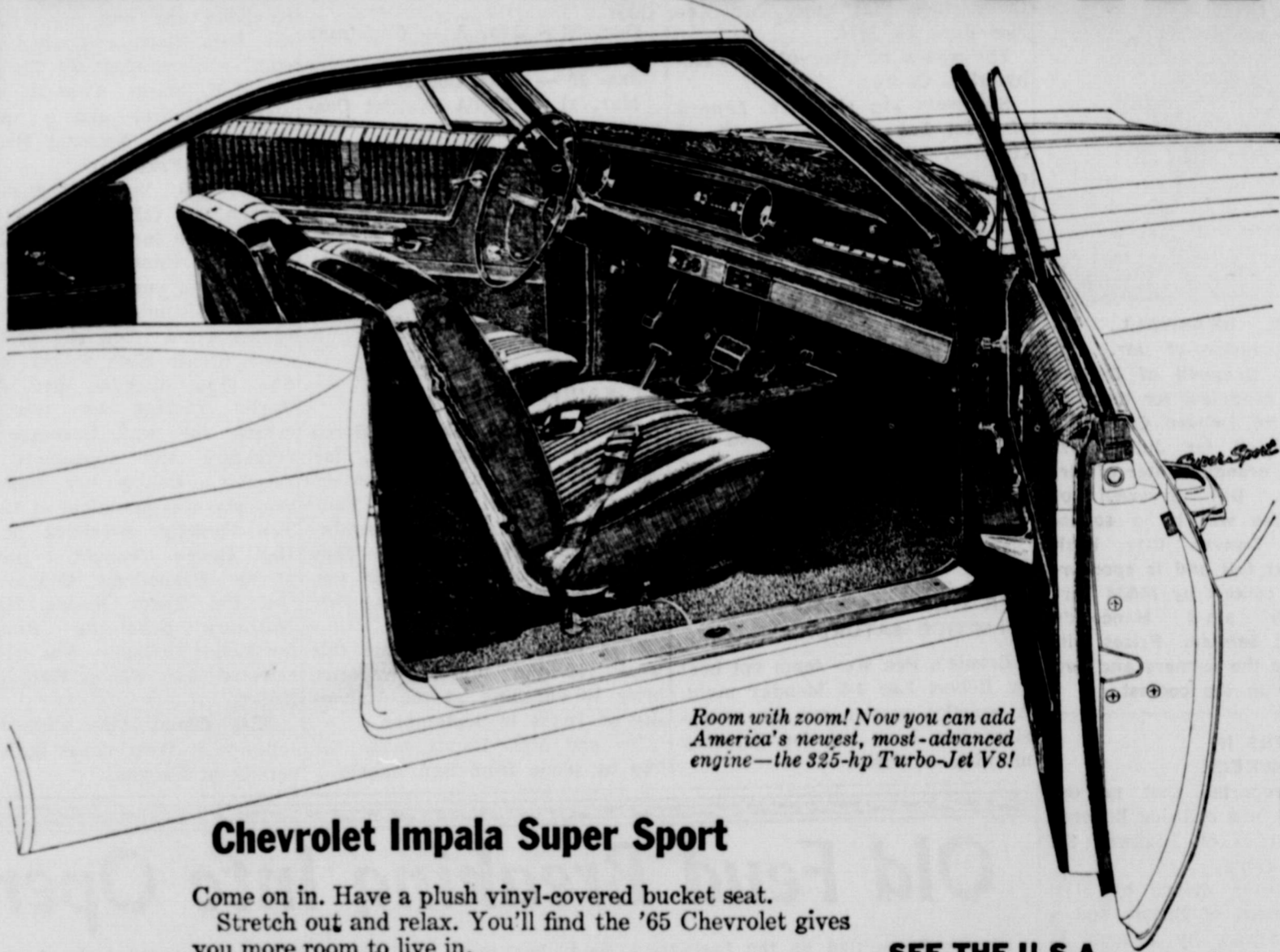

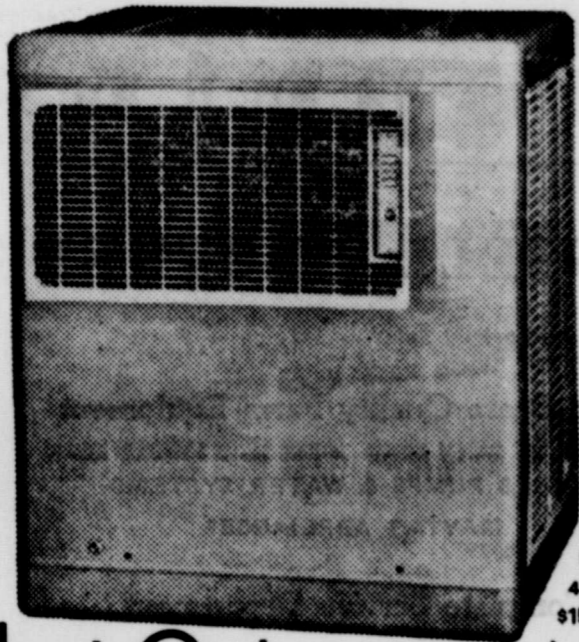


