## Gov. Vetoes UCRA Enlargement Bill

The pros and cons of enlarging the Upper Colorado River Authority were settled, at least for the time being, when Gov. John Connally vetoed the legislative bill to expand the river authority by the addition of eight counties.

Reason given for the governor for refusing to sign the bill was that it would have given the enlarged authority police power and power to control pollution.

Connally said the bill would have allowed the authority to adopt regulations and employ officers to arrest persons who violated them. His objection to the pollution control part of the bill was that he felt the bill would have excluded the 10 counties from provisions of present water pollution statutes.

Some directors of the present UCRA board of directors talked as if they were in favor of introducing a similar bill next time the legislature meets, but one which would overcome the governor's

objections.

The bill would have been approved by Tom Green and Coke counties, presently the only counties in the UCRA, before the enlarged district could have been formed. The other eight counties also would have had to vote individual approval in order to participate.

## Funeral Services Held June 19 for Mrs. Lee Richards

Funeral services were held Saturday, June 19, at First Methodist Church for Mrs. Nora Richards, 80, widow of the late Lee Richards of Bronte. Mrs. Richards died June 17 in Menard Hospital.

The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. D. Rhea Allison, pastor of First Methodist Church, Menard, assisted by the Rev. A. S. Masterson, pastor of the local church. Burial was in Old Fort Chadbourne Cemetery, north of Bronte.

Mrs. Richards was born near Zephyr, Tex., Aug. 25, 1884, the daughter of John and Molly Russell. She was married to Lee Richards, a native of Coke County on Dec. 24, 1905. They lived in Coke County all their married life. Mrs. Richards moved to Menard in January 1962, in order to live near her daughter.

She was an active member of the Methodist Church, and was honored with a lifetime membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Her husband and one daughter preceded her in death.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Harry E. Sanford of Lafayette, La., Mrs. Wm. A. Carter of Menard and Mrs. L. D. Burton of Crane; two grandchildren; three great grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Wyley McRorey of Blackwell; three brothers, George Russell of Blackwell, J. P. Russell of Sterling City and M. Russell of Bronte.

Pallbearers were J. B. Mackey and Clifford Clark, both of Bronte; Joe Aycock and Craig Chumley, both of San Angelo; J. C. Carter and Willard Renfro, both of Ballinger.

## Rainfall Hits 18"

More rainfall the first of this week brought Bronte's yearly total to more than 18 inches before the first half of 1965 was over. This amount is normally considered good for a whole year.

More than 2½ inches fell in town, starting Sunday evening and continuing through Monday. Over three inches was reported north of town. Blackwell had 2.35 inches and Oak Creek Lake caught some more water. Robert Lee reported 1.40 inches, and spotted rainfall in the Silver area varied from .8 to 2 inches.

Coke County pastures, usually turning brown by this time of year, have the most luxuriant growth of grass and weeds that most people can remember. A few fields of early grain sorghums are already heading out and should make an abundant crop of heavy grain.

## Services Held for Jamie Allen, 23, Drowning Victim

Last rites were held Saturday afternoon at Bronte Church of Christ for James William (Jamie) Allen Jr., 23, who was drowned some time Thursday in a farm pond near his home northeast of Bronte.

Funeral services were conducted by Foy L. Moore of Overton, former minister of the local church, and Cecil Cox, the present minister. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, directed by Williams Funeral Home.

Young Allen was last seen alive about noon Thursday when his father went to a field on their farm to do some work. When the boy did not return home by 8 p.m., the parents started a search for him.

The Allens enlisted the aid of local law enforcement officers, firemen and others who joined in the search. His clothes were found on the bank of the pond, and investigators theorized that he must have decided to go into the water to cool off. After his clothing was found, the San Angelo Emergency Corps was called and the body was located in about ten feet of water approximately 25 feet from the edge. Justice of the Peace J. T. Liles ruled that death was caused by accidental drowning.

Allen was born Jan. 4, 1942, in San Angelo. He moved to the farm with his parents in 1948. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors are his parents; a brother, Bobby Allen, a student at Abilene Christian College; a sister, Gloria Deane Allen, who has been living in Fort Worth where she teaches school; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Allen of San Angelo; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Thompson of Maverick.
