## Ballinger Man Faces Charges

A 22 year old Ballinger man was charged Tuesday morning with assault with intent to rape after he allegedly tried to abduct a Bronte woman Monday night.

The man, Dickie Earl Williams, was placed in Runnels County jail after being arrested early Tuesday morning. Charges were filed with Justice of the Peace Earl Cope.

Last stop will be at 11:15 on the ranch belonging to Mrs. Annie Wilkins south of Bronte. Results of range seeding and other conservation management practices.

Everyone is invited to make the tour, or to join or depart from it at any of the scheduled stops.

## Plans for New High School Due to Arrive Next Week

Plans for Bronte's new high school and other facilities are due to be completed Sept. 28. Final changes have been approved by the board of trustees and are now being incorporated into the plans by architects. Supt. C. B. Barbee said the changes should be completed and returned to the board by next Tuesday.

Following acceptance of the revised plans, the board will advertise for bids for construction of the buildings. After suitable notices have been published, two weeks must elapse before the bids can be opened and one accepted or all rejected.

Barbee said if a suitable bid is received and a contract is let, the contractor should be able to begin work within ten days or so. The superintendent said he could not set a definite date, but there is a good possibility work may begin by Nov. 1.

Qualified voters of the school district decided last May by almost a 3-1 majority (186-62), to issue \$325,000 in bonds to finance the school improvements. Three large units are included in plans: an underground and ground-level building to house high school classes and offices; a gymnasium, and an agricultural shop and classroom.

Part of the money will be used to remodel the south part of the present structure, built in 1936. It now contains the home economics department on the ground floor, the library and study hall on the second floor and the old gym. This structure will be rearranged so the homemaking department will be housed in one room, and the band hall will be housed on the second floor.

Barbee said that many hours have been spent by the school board, the school administration and teachers in working out details of the final plans.

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# Longhorns Drop Game To Eden Bulldogs, 20-6

It was strictly a first half ball game here Friday night when the Eden Bulldogs invaded the Bronte stadium to take their first victory of the year. All the scoring was done in the first half, but the coaches kept 22 men on the field during the last two quarters, even though sporadic downpours of rain dampened the spirits and bodies of the spectators and sent most of them scurrying for shelter. The first half and the game ended, 20-6, in Eden's favor.

Right at an inch of rain fell, starting during the halftime performance. Eden's band got on the field and put on a good show for spectators on both sides of the field, but the driving rain prevented Bronte's band from making an appearance on the field.

### First Quarter

Bronte drew first blood and gave local spectators quite a thrill when Doug McCutchen made a score after the Longhorns recovered an Eden fumble on the Eden 44 yard line.

Larry Corley started the game with a kickoff into the end zone, giving Eden possession on the 20. Stansberry and Kirkpatrick picked up 12 for 3 tries and a 1st on the 32 and Tomlinson carried twice for 8 yards. Then Stansberry fumbled and Davis Corley recovered on the Eden 44.

McCutchen got busy on the nicest piece of work of the evening for the Bronte squad. He gained a yard on one carry and then got loose for a 33 yard gainer and a 1st on Eden's 10 yard line. McCutchen was lined up to make all the runs on the next series. He gained 3, then lost 3, then added 9 to his list, to bring up a critical 4th and 1 to go situation. He was able to squeeze through the middle to the double stripe and the TD. A conversion kick try failed. Score 6-0.

L. Corley kicked the ball out on the Eden 30 and the Bulldogs decided to play it from that point. Tomlinson's 30 yard run moved the ball down to the Bronte 40. Kirkpatrick and Garcia ran the ball 9 yards and Stansberry went through the middle on a keeper for 3 more and a 1st on the 28. Garcia then carried twice for an even 10 and a 1st down on the 18. The Bulldogs ran into trouble on the next series, having two passes, defended by Allen and L. Corley, go incomplete. Bronte took over on their own 10.

McCutchen tore out for 19 yards and a 1st down on the first play of the series. He then picked up 2 more and Lee carried a couple of times for 9 yards and another 1st on the 40. An incomplete pass brought up 2nd and 10 but an off-

sides penalty against the Bulldogs gave Bronte a 2nd and 5. The next play saw the Longhorns throwing the ball into the air and the Bulldogs coming down with it. Garcia intercepted a pass on his own 35 yard line and the Eden lads took over the offensive. Kirkpatrick carried for 6 yards before the horn sounded to end the quarter.

### Second Quarter

The second period of the contest was extremely lucrative for the visiting Bulldogs, as they made all their counters during this quarter.

Kirkpatrick carried again for 3 to the 44, then Stansberry moved it on to his 44 for a 1st down. Then Kirkpatrick eluded the Bronte defenders for a long gain of 44 yards down to the Bronte 12 and a 1st down. He was finally knocked out of bounds by Lee, Bronte half-back. The next play saw Tomlinson make the 12 needed yards to the double stripe, and a pass from Stansberry to Garcia moved Eden out in front, 8-6.

Haenisch was in charge of the kicking chores for the Bulldogs and got off a nice one, taken by Lee who fought his way back to his 34 yard line. The Longhorns bogged down on their gains after Lee had gained 9 on the first down of the series and had to punt. Lee's kick was short and was downed on the Eden 47. The Bulldogs didn't know it but they were once again on their way to pay dirt.

Kirkpatrick picked up 3, and Tomlinson pulled an 18 yard gain out of his bag of tricks for a 1st down on the Bronte 32. Garcia and Tomlinson moved the ball to the 24, and from there Stansberry fired an aerial to Tomlinson which netted the Bulldogs 24 yards and a touchdown. A try through the middle by Garcia failed to earn extra points. Score 14-6.

Haenisch kicked to Glenn, who handed off to McCutchen. He moved the ball out to his 41. Eden was penalized 5, giving the Longhorns a 1st and 5. McCutchen was swamped and lost 7, then Lee gained 11 and moved the ball almost to midfield to bring up a punting situation. Davis Corley punted the ball and the Bulldogs took it on their 36 yard line. Garcia made 11 and a 1st on the Bulldog 47. Kirkpatrick moved the ball 6 yards to the Bronte 47 and Stansberry tossed a short pass for an 11 yard gain and a 1st on the 36. Garcia made 10 and another 1st on the 26. Kirkpatrick added 2 more yards and Stansberry tossed a pass to Garcia down close to the goal line, but it was called back and the Bulldogs drew a 5 yard penalty. A couple of Bulldogs plays moved the ball a-

bout 9 yards, and then Stansberry passed to Garcia for a 1st down on the Bronte 13 yard line. Kirkpatrick made 3 yards, Stansberry threw an incomplete pass, and then he skirted around the left end of the Longhorn line for the needed yards and a touchdown. The conversion try failed and the score was 20-6, with seconds remaining on the clock. However, Haenisch kicked off, with an on side kick, but Brock was able to control it on his own 41. The Longhorns tossed a pass, had it intercepted; Eden had time for a play, fumbled the ball and the Longhorns recovered before the end of the first half.

### Second Half

Rain started falling during the half. After Bronte received the kickoff, a fumble on the runback gave the wet pigskin to the Bulldogs on the Bronte 27. Caffey was the Bulldog who came up with the ball. Hall picked up 13 yards and a 1st on the Longhorn 14 in two tries. Bronte drew a 5 yard penalty to move the ball down to the 9. With this setup facing them the Longhorns closed ranks and didn't allow the Bulldogs to make but 3 yards in four tries. Brian Richards threw Hall for a loss and Davis Corley got after Stansberry on the final play of the series and he was unable to control his passing try. The Longhorns took over on their 6 yard line.

Lee did all the carrying chores for the Longhorns, but was unable to gain the needed 10 in this series. He got off a good punt but it was

called back. Eden was penalized 15 yards for roughing the kicker and the Longhorns had a 1st down on the 30.

The Bulldogs defense, aided by a 5 yard penalty against Bronte, forced a punt on 4th down. The punt plus a 15 yard personal foul penalty gave the Bulldogs the ball on their own 38 yard line. Eden ran two plays and quick kicked on 3rd down, moving the ball back to the Longhorn 25, where the Bronte boys put it in play. They couldn't go, however, and D. Corley kicked the ball to Garcia who was downed on the Bronte 45.

Eden couldn't move either, so Stansberry got his team in punt formation, but decided to run the ball anyway. He didn't make the needed 12 yards, and the Longhorns took over again on their 46.

Glenn threw a pass to Tad Richards for 7 and another to Lee for 2. Another 15 yard penalty moved the ball down to the 32 where it was 1st and 10 for the Longhorns. The Bronte lads bogged down at this point and Lee punted on 4th down. He got off a nice kick which went out on the 17.

Hall made a beautiful 33 yard run to midfield for a 1st. Stansberry and Tomlinson were able to move up 10 more yards in 4 tries for another 1st on the 40. The next two plays saw the wet football flying around loose on the field, with Morris recovering for Bronte on the Eden 43, then Gebara recovered for the Bulldogs on the Bronte 44.

By this time the rain was coming down in bucketfuls, and the teams were having trouble keeping things in order. Bronte received a 5 yard penalty for having too many men on the field most everybody was looking for the clock to run out.

The ball seesawed back and forth until the clock hands were estanding straight up and the final horn blew.

Some outstanding defensive playing for the Bulldogs was turned in by McDonald, McGuffin, Stansberry, Hall, Gebara, Caffey, Haenisch and Garcia.

Defenders on the Longhorn side of the ledger who deserve mention were the two Corley boys, Brian Richards, Clark, Hageman, Brock, Lee, Morris, Tad Richards, Allen and McCutchen.

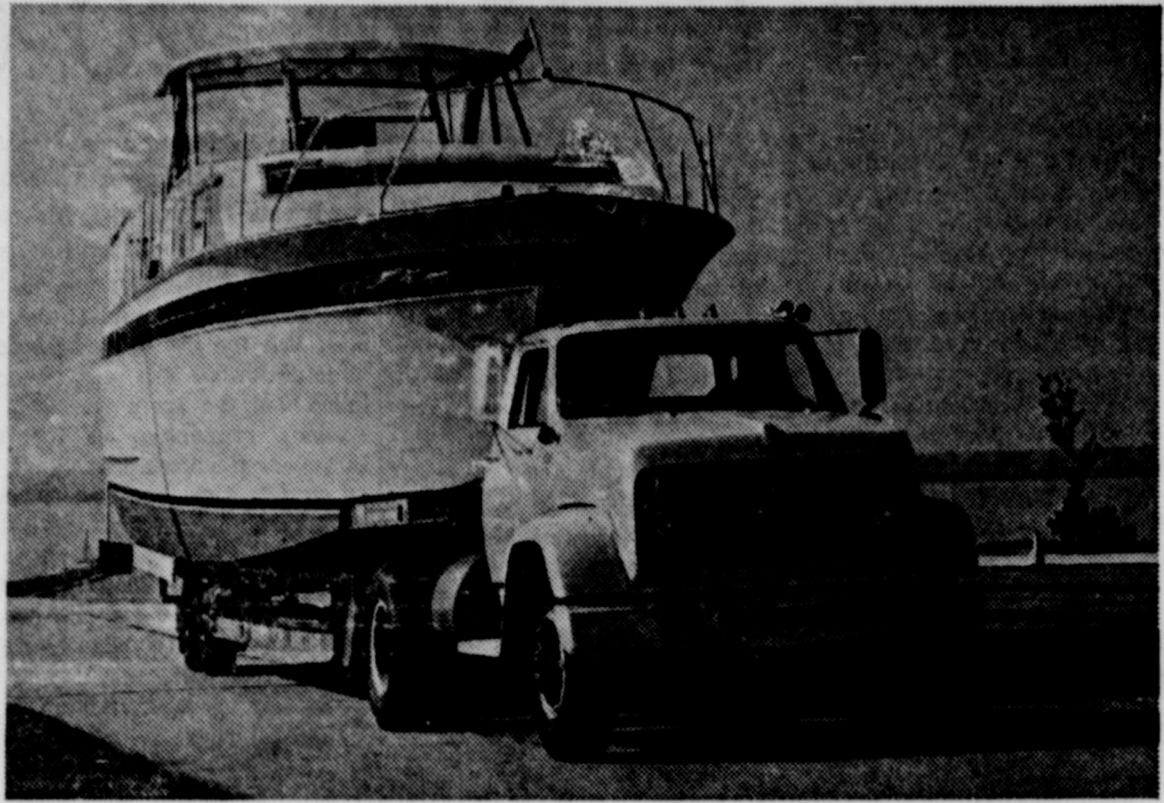

**Care of Non-Stick Cooking Utensils**

The new non-stick cookware utensils are a joy to clean and use. All non-stick utensils should be conditioned the first time they are used by applying a thin coat of cooking oil or shortening. If they appear dry from repeated use, an occasional oiling will improve them.

Non-stick utensils may become stained if high heat is used to fry foods. This causes fat spatters to burn the surface of the pan. These stains can be easily removed by boiling one cup of water, one half

cup of liquid laundry bleach, and two tablespoons of baking soda in the pan.

Wash the pan and treat it with cooking oil to recondition. This formula removes the stain and eliminates sticking, a common complaint after food has burned in the pan. Avoid extreme high heat, as this may crack the non-stick coating. Remember to use nylon coated, rubber, wood, all non-stick and plastic coated metal spoons and spatulas with non-stick coated cookware.
