# San Angelo Builder Gets Contract for New School

Bronte Schools should be operating amidst the din of hammers, saws and other construction machinery within the next two weeks. It is expected that work will begin on the new high school, gymnasium and agricultural building within that time.

Bids were opened and contracts awarded last Thursday for the

building job. Three groups of bids were taken and three contracts awarded.

Edwin O. Wanoreck of San Angelo was the successful bidder for the general construction contract. His bid was \$200,990. High bid for this work was \$237,050. Eight bids were received. Wanoreck's bid called for 270 working days.

Included in the contract were three alternate plans which the board decided to accept. One was a terrazzo floor in the lobby of the high school building. Another was the installation of a sliding partition between the library and adjoining classroom. This part of the building included in the underground structure. The third alternate plan called for installation of a new roof on the present gymnasium building. Wanoreck's bid was sufficiently low to allow the board to accept all three alternates.

Fitzgerald & Skidmore, Inc., of Midland was successful bidder for the mechanical contract. This work includes plumbing, heating and air conditioning equipment and installation. The Midland's firm's bid was \$73,269, compared to the high bid of \$89,800. This cost includes air conditioning and heating equipment for the new high school part of the construction job.

Westbrook Electric Co. of San Angelo submitted the low bid of \$17,495 for electric equipment and its installation. The high bid in this department was \$24,715.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said that each category of bidding had eight proposals submitted. Bidders were from Abilene, Ballinger, Hamlin, San Angelo, Sweetwater, Midland, Crockett, Hamilton and Lubbock.

Barbee said the board was well pleased with the number and quality of the bids. He said the bids taken Thursday, plus money already spent for improvement of the football stadium, the architect's fee and other incidental expenses will total \$321,500, which is slightly under the \$325,000 bond issue voted for school facilities improvement.

A few papers have to be signed and this will probably be accomplished this week. After the work orders are awarded to the three successful bidders, they will have ten days to begin work.

**POST OFFICE GIVES POINTERS FOR SENDING CHRISTMAS MAIL**

Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history, postal officials said. Nationally about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve.

ZIP code use and cooperation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for this success, they said and they hope with the same or better cooperation this year an even greater volume will be handled with less effort than last year.

Following are some pointers by the Post Office Department which will help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season:

Up date last year's address list and include ZIP codes.

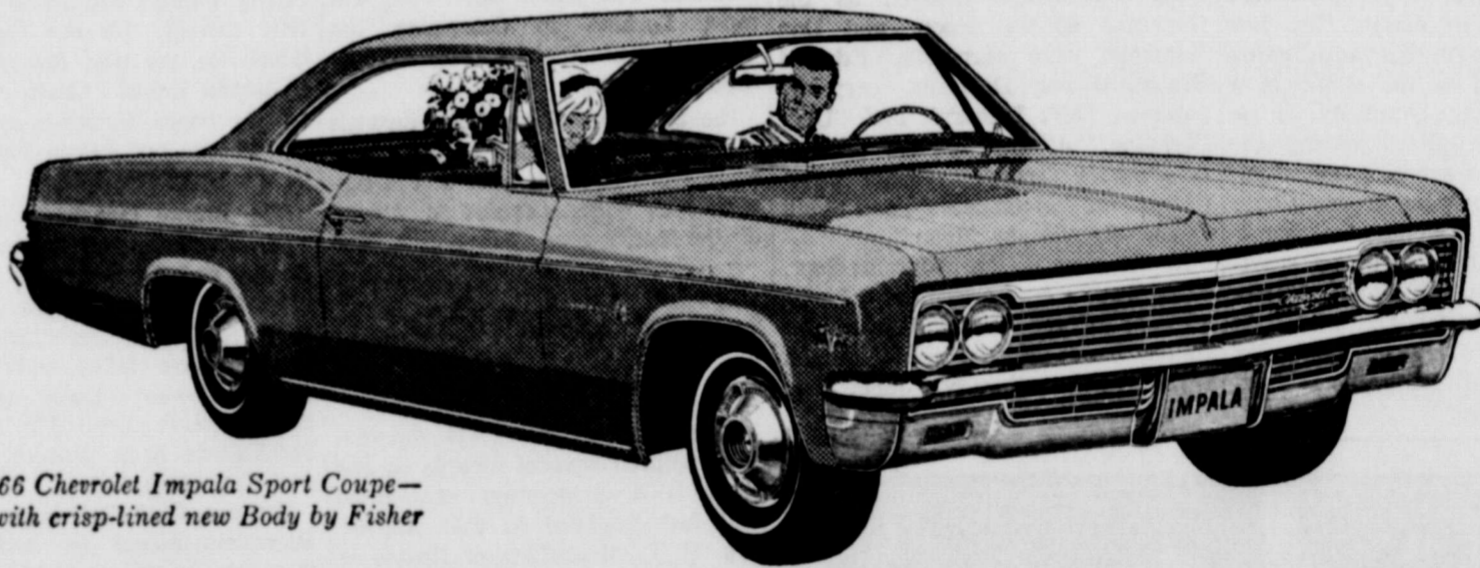

# Longhorns Down Loraine, 54-6; Take Lead In District Standings

The Longhorns continued their march toward the championship of District 8-B last Friday night when they swamped the Loraine Bulldogs, 54-6.

The Longhorns scored in every quarter while the lone Bulldog touchdown came in the 4th period of play.

Thrilling plays were pretty thick on the Bronte program for the evening. Doug McCutchen thrilled the crowd in the 3rd quarter with a blazing 90-yard kickoff return and in the waning moments of the game Royce Lee intercepted a Loraine pass and carefully picked his way through the 11 Bulldogs for the final Longhorn touchdown of the evening. Tad Richards was really the spark-plug on the scoring as he made the runs which put the Longhorns on the scoreboard the first three times and later threw a pass to Lee for another.

### First Quarter

Larry Corley kicked off to start the ball game. The Bulldogs tried 3 times and netted a minus 5 yards, so they punted. It went to Wayne Carlton on the Loraine 26. McCutchen made 16 and a 1st. A loss of 2 and a 5 yard penalty against the Bulldogs set up the Longhorns with a 2nd and 7. Tad Richards made

the 7 yards for Bronte's first TD. Try for extra points failed.

Again Corley kicked off and again the Bulldogs had to punt on 4th down. McCutchen took it to the Bronte 48. On the next play Tad Richards carried for 52 yards and the 2nd touchdown of the game. Again the try for PAT failed and Bronte led 12-0.

The Bulldogs took Corley's kick, a long one, and were downed on the 10 yard line. The Bulldogs almost made a 1st down, but decided to kick when faced with a 4th and 1. The ball went to the Bronte 49. The Longhorns were penalized 15 for holding, making it 1st and 25. McCutchen carried 3 times for a 1st down on the Bulldog 24. Tad Richards carried twice and McCutchen once for 4 yards each time and another 1st. Bronte was penalized 5 and then Tad Richards went thru the middle for 17 yards and the 3rd TD of the night. EP failed and the score was 18-0.

Corley's kick was returned to the 20. Britton made 9 and Hackfield made 1 for Loraine's first 1st down of the game. Britton then picked up small yardage on 2 plays, but the Bulldogs had to kick, and the Longhorns wound up with the ball on the Loraine 46. On the 2nd play

of the series a Bronte fumble was recovered by Loraine on their 47. The Bulldogs, with the help of a 5 yard charge against the Longhorns, made a 1st down on the Bronte 40. Three plays later the Bulldogs fumbled the ball and Brian Richards was the last man off the pigskin. Bronte took over on their 41. The Longhorns moved the ball well and had a 1st on the Loraine 33, when the ball squirted loose and a Bulldog recovered on the 35.

Loraine made another 1st down, but had to punt at the end of the second series. The ball went to McCutchen who was downed on the 42. After two unsuccessful tries to gain yardage, Glenn handed off to T. Richards, who tossed a left handed pass to Lee. Lee took the ball and went on the double stripe for the 4th Bronte tally. The play was good for 60 yards. EP try failed once again and the score was 24-0. Corley's kick went to Britton who made a profitable return to his 40 yard line. The hapless Bulldogs couldn't go and had to punt. Bronte took over on their 12 yard line. The Longhorns made a 1st on their 45 and then couldn't muster another 1st. Lee punted for the first time for the Longhorns, and the Bulldogs took over on their 23. They tried 3 times for a net loss of 3 yards to end the half.

### Third Quarter

The kickoff by Loraine went to McCutchen who took it on the 10 and started running. Some good speed and some good blocks permitted him to elude his pursuers, as he thrilled Bronte spectators with a 90 yard touchdown run. McCutchen also ran the conversion to make the score 32-0.

Corley kicked and the Bulldogs couldn't go. They punted but regained possession of the ball by recovering a Longhorn fumble on the Bronte 47. Britton went for a 1st on the 37 and the next series bogged down and Loraine had to kick. It went into the end zone and Bronte took over on the 20. McCutchen and T. Richards alternated the ball carrying chores and moved to the Loraine 16. Some losses and a penalty caused the Longhorns to be faced with a 3rd and 16 at about the 20 yard line. The odds were not too bad, however, as McCutchen made the entire distance on one play to give the Longhorns another touchdown. Richards ran the PAT to make the score 40-0.

Corley kicked off and the Bulldogs owned the ball with a 1st down on the Bronte 32 yard line at the end of the quarter.

### Fourth Quarter

Hackfield and Britton moved to the 20 for a 1st down. After a couple of short gains, Britton took the ball around left end for a Loraine TD. Conversion failed and the score was 40-6.

Roy Rose kicked to McCutchen who made his way to the 41. The Longhorns took to the air and several good completions were made from David Glenn to McCutchen and to Lee. As the Longhorns approached the Bulldog goal line the going got tougher and they were confronted with a 4th down and long yardage. They tried a field goal but it was no good, so the Bulldogs took over at the 20. The Longhorns held the Loraine bunch and a punt was called for. It was a short one and the local boys took the ball on Loraine's 33. After moving to the 20 the Longhorns lost 15, so skyward seemed the only way. McCutchen took the aerial and covered the needed 35 yards. Richards made the conversion and the Longhorns were ahead, 48-6.

After taking Corley's kick the Bulldogs moved steadily down field and had a 1st and goal on the 5. Britton went in for the TD but it was called back and the Bulldogs

were penalized 15 for holding. After 2 incomplete passes the Bulldogs turned loose another, but it did not go incomplete. Lee intercepted and ran back and forth for considerable distance in order to get his blockers together. They came to his aid and he was able to go the entire 90 yards for another Longhorn touchdown. EP try failed and the Longhorns were ahead 54-6.

Corley got off his kick just before the final gun sounded.

## SHORTHORNS TRIP HERMLEIGH TO KEEP PERFECT 1965 RECORD

The Bronte Shorthorns wound up their regular season of play last Thursday night with a lopsided 44-8 victory over the junior high team from Hermleigh.

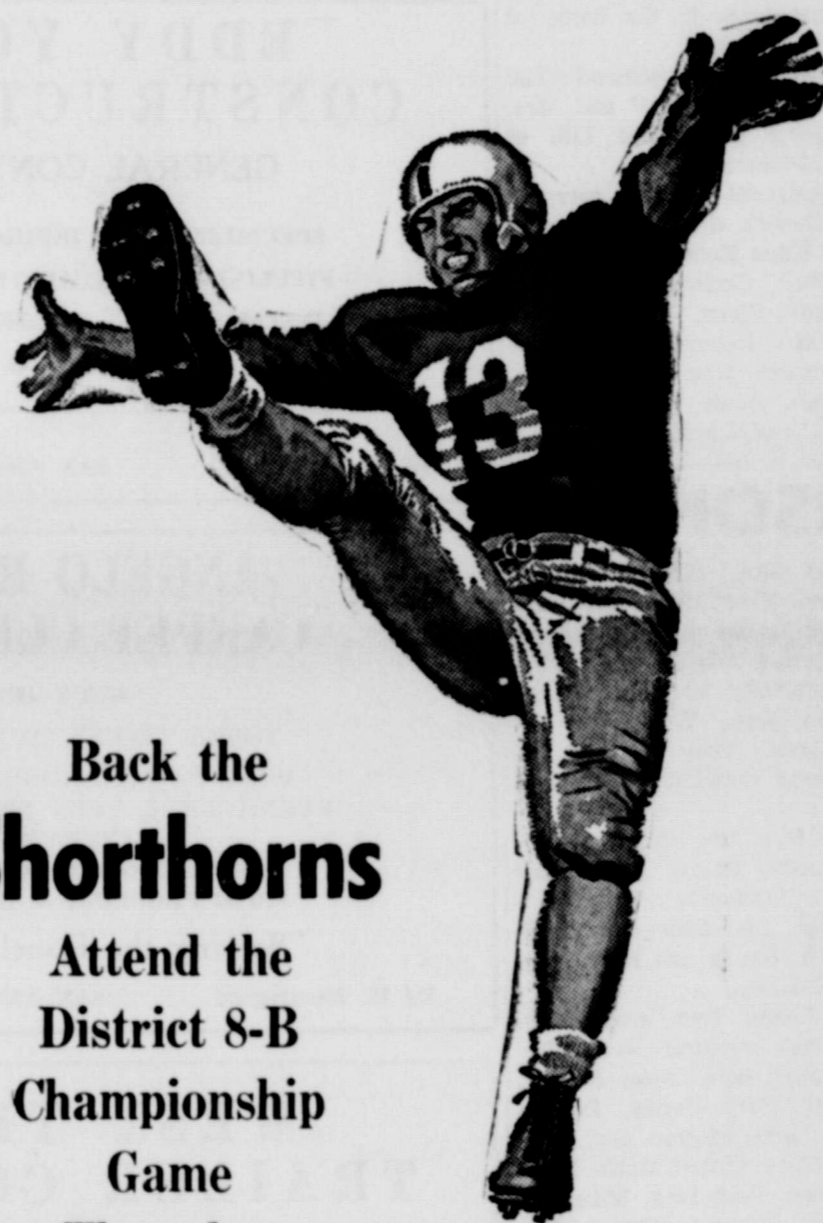

# Coke Defeats 4 Amendments

Coke Countians pretty well went along with other voters of the State of Texas in the special amendment election Tuesday. Texas Election Bureau reported Wednesday morning that five of the ten amendments voted on had passed; four had been defeated; one was still too close to be decided.

Coke County voters went against the same four that were defeated statewide and for all five which were approved statewide. Coke voters approved the undecided issue, No. 2 on the ballot.

Coke County voters turned thumbs down on four year terms for the governor and other state officials (No. 4) and for state legislators (No. 10). They also voted down No. 9 which would have allowed an increase in salaries of the speaker of the house and lieutenant governor. The other amendment turned down was No. 7, which would have exempted certain hos-

pital properties in the state from ad valorem tax payments.

Coke County voters approved No. 1, on financing colleges; No. 2, on increasing the veterans' land fund; No. 3, on aid to the needy; No. 5, on teacher retirement funds; No. 6, Texas opportunity plan; No. 8, on judges' retirement.
