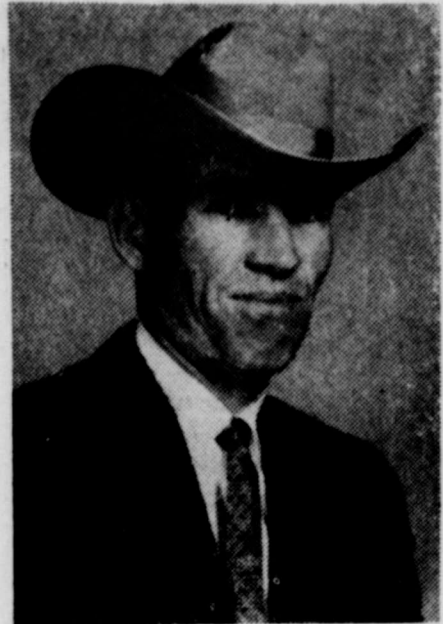

Sterling Lindsey Receives Honor At Agents' Meet

Coke County Agent Sterling Lindsey was one of six Texas county agents who received the Distinguished Service Award at a meeting last week of the National Association of County Agents in Pittsburgh, Pa.

Lindsey's award came because of his outstanding work and leadership in developing youth and adult educational programs in Coke County. The awards are presented annually to a select group of county agents who have over a period of 10 years or more made outstanding contributions to agriculture and rural living.

Lindsey came to Coke County in 1957. Prior to his service here he served two years as assistant county agent in Coleman County and six months in Runnels County, and for two years as county agent of San Saba County.

A native of Frio County, Lindsey was outstanding in FFA and other agricultural work during his youth. He is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a B.S. Degree in agricultural education. He has done special summer work at Colorado State University and attended numerous work shops and short courses to enable him to stay abreast of latest developments in his field.

Under Lindsey's direction Coke County has developed an outstanding 4-H Club program with strong project demonstrations. A strong believer in leadership training, he has also assisted youth and adult groups in improving their leadership and citizenship programs.

In addition to his regular duties, the award winner takes an active part in Robert Lee and Coke County church and civic affairs. He is a member of the official board of Robert Lee Methodist Church and is active in the Coke County Wildlife Association and Boy Scout work.

A bobcat weighing 38 pounds and measuring more than three feet in length was killed early Wednesday morning by Hollis Ensor and his son, Jesse Ray. The big cat was treed several times by Ensor's dogs and finally shinned up a telephone pole and was brought down by a .22 rifle shot in the rear leg.

Ensor said he heard one of his dogs barking about 2:30 a.m. and got up to see what was causing the commotion. He said he was expecting to find a coon trying to steal a meal of fresh turkey meat.

After running the cat for about an hour, he summoned help from Jesse Ray and they were able to bring the animal down about 3:30 a.m. Ensor brought the big cat to town Wednesday morning in the back of his pickup and attracted a large crowd of spectators.

Shorthorns Take Easy Victory From Loraine To Win Dist. 8-B

Bronte Shorthorns took an easy victory last Thursday night when they hosted the junior high Bulldogs of Loraine in a District 8-B playoff game. The Shorthorns were victors in the south zone of the district, and Loraine took the north zone. The playoff determined the 1965 junior high champions. Final figures on the scoreboard gave the Shorthorns a 36-6 win.

Bronte's first counter was on a 39 yard pass and run play. Keith McCutchen tossed the ball to Joe Basquez to make the 6 points. Randy Barbee went over left tackle for the extra points to make the score 8-0.

McCutchen made the second Bronte touchdown, after the Shorthorns moved the ball down to the 4 yard line. The four yard gain and touchdown came on a jaunt around left end. Try for points failed. Score: 14-6.

Another touchdown was made af-

ter Bronte took the ball on their 37, following a Loraine punt. Barbee made 6 yards, then the old McCutchen to Basquez pass combination gave the Shorthorns 6 points, and the scoreboard read 20-6. McCutchen ran the EP to make it 22-6.

Wesley Ash kicked and the Bullpups got in one play before they fumbled the ball and Bronte recovered on their own 36. McCutchen passed the ball to Basquez which was good for 35 yards and a Bronte TD. McCutchen ran over the points and the score stood at 30-6.

This concluded Bronte's scoring for the first half.

Ash kicked to start the second half. The Loraine boys tried to march down the field but had to give up the ball on their 43 yard line when a 4th down try failed.

Barbee, Grace and McCutchen moved the ball nicely down to the

15, but a fumble stopped the march and Loraine recovered on the 20. Loraine couldn't go and punted, but another fumble gave them the ball at midfield. Again the Shorthorn defense held the visitors and they had to punt. The kick netted them a total of 3 yards after Ash ran it back to his 47 yard line. Ash then made a 23 yard run to the Loraine 30, and there the local lads bogged down, and Loraine took over. They couldn't move and had to punt. Jim Bob Arrott shot through the line and blocked the kick and the Shorthorns took over on the 22.

The next play yielded the last touchdown of the night. It was another pass from McCutchen to Basquez and made the scoreboard read 36-6.

Loraine's lone touchdown came early in the second quarter when Britton passed to Hamilton, who made his way across the goal line.

Deer, Quail, and Turkey Season Opens Saturday

Hunters are expected to be on the loose Saturday morning, when open season will begin on deer, turkey and quail. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

Deer and turkey season runs through Dec. 31, while quail season will not end until Jan. 31.

Bag limit on quail is 12 per day with 36 in possession. The limit on turkey is one gobbler or one bearded hen. Hunters may take two bucks and one antlerless deer if they have a special permit.

State game officials, as well as local law enforcement officers urged all hunters to follow safety rules in handling guns, and to be particularly sure of what they are shooting before they pull the trigger.

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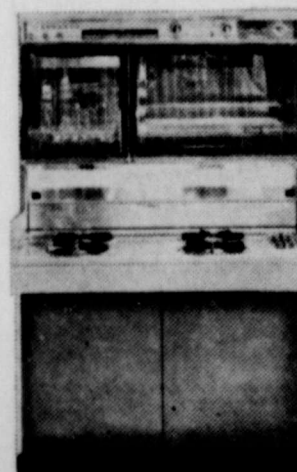

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Deer, Quail and Turkey Season Opens Nov. 13th

Hunting season in Coke County opens Nov. 13. At sunrise on that date hunters will be permitted to take deer, quail and turkey. The season closes on deer and turkey on Dec. 31 and on quail on Jan. 31.

Antlerless deer may be taken in certain designated areas in the county. A map showing these places is on display in the courthouse. Antlerless deer permits will be issued Nov. 5 at the court house. Shooting preserve licenses for land owners who lease land for hunting in Coke County may also be obtained on that date.

Three areas have been designated as open for antlerless deer. Area 1 includes a block enclosed by a line which begins two miles west of Robert Lee on Highway 158, runs to Friendship county road and back to Highway 208 and north to the

county line. Also part of area 1 is enclosed by a line which starts at the west county line, runs to Union Gas plant, to Farm Road 2059, one mile north of Pecan Church. It also includes an area which runs east on the county road by Roe ranch headquarters to Highway 158.

Area 2 is in the Tennyson vicinity and is bounded on the north by Wendland lane, running east to Highway 277 and west to Highway 208. The area extends south of this line to the county line.

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Area 3 is in the southwest part of the county around Water Valley. Hunters are urged to check the map at the court house when they obtain their permits.

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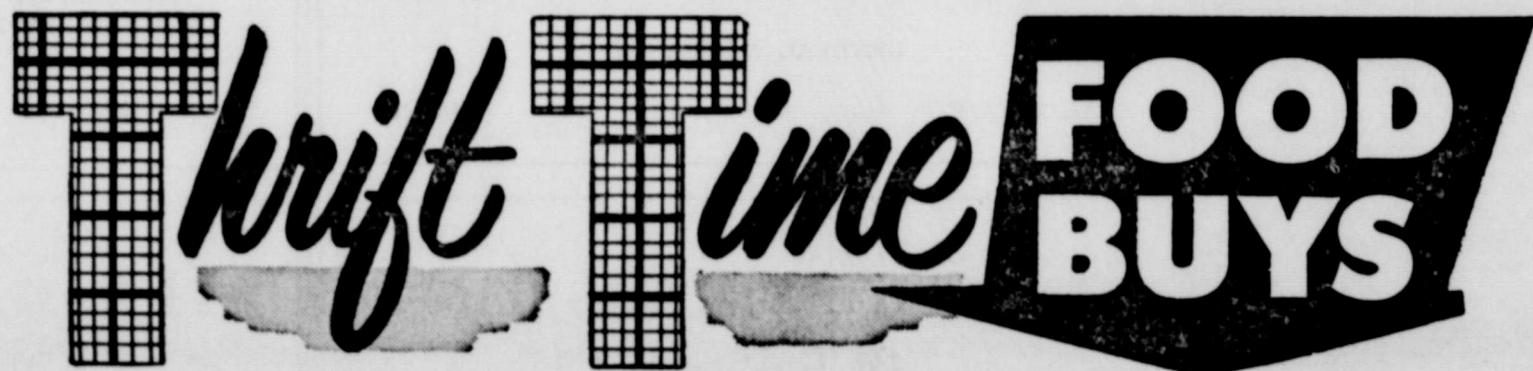
