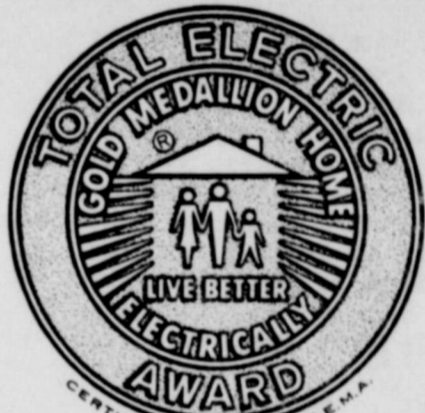

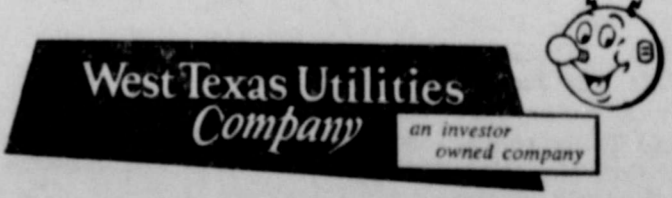

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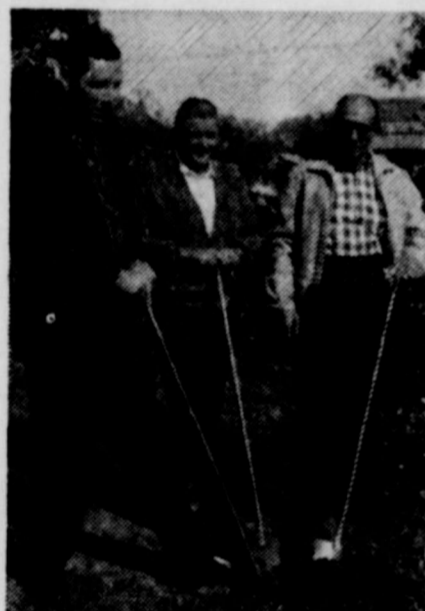

Sergeant Garrard Member of Rescue Party in Thailand

CMSgt. Hollie G. Garrard, whose family lives at Blackwell recently completed a rescue mission in the mountainous jungles of Thailand. The sergeant is a member of the United States Air Force and is serving at a remote radar site high in the mountains of central Thailand.

Garrard distinguished himself recently as a member of a rescue party responsible for saving the lives of four United Nations Economic Commission personnel. The four civilians were lost three days in a remote jungle area near the radar site. The area abounds in wild life and poisonous snakes, tigers and wild elephants are often sighted.

Sergeant Garrard was a member of the ground search party initiated after the lost party was located by helicopter. He was one of the first to reach the lost men who had been without food for three days. The rescue party, fully equipped with emergency food rations, medical supplies and weapons, experienced extreme difficulty reaching the lost party because of the terrain in the area. They had to cut their way through dense jungle and at times wade waist deep through mountain streams to reach the lost party. Garrard remarked after returning, "It was rough going all the way, but they sure were glad to see us."

Garrard is performing a vital mission as a member of his unit which is responsible for training the Royal Thai Air Force in aircraft control and warning proced-

ures. His wife, Dolly Ruth, and children, Patricia, Glenda and Steven, reside in Blackwell. A brother-in-law, Louis Gallaway, lives in Bronte and a sister, Mrs. J. D. Taylor, also lives in Blackwell.

His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Smith, were in the ranching business between the sites that later became Robert Lee and Bronte. His father, J. R. Smith came to this area several years before Coke County was organized. He herded sheep in the day time and taught school for his employer and his children at night. Lake Smith would have been born in this county, but since there were no medical facilities here at the time, his mother returned to her old home in Mississippi for the birth of her child and did not return to West Texas until he was about 9 months old.

They said at the time of their marriage there were no paved streets, and they had no electricity

until the REA built lines in to the rural areas.

Mr. Smith's hobbies include working with ranch stock and Mrs. Smith enjoys handwork, including many varieties of needle craft.

When asked their secret for a long and happy marriage they agreed that a main ingredient was hard work and respect for each other's interests. Then Mr. Smith added, "Let the woman be the boss and you'll get along."

I am sure several people have tried to contact me by phone at night in recent weeks and have failed. I have moved. My new number is 453-3907. It is listed in the 1965 Robert Lee directory as the Ray Burch residence.

Nitrogen is the basic building block of all living matter, both plant and animal.

Plants need plentiful supplies of nitrogen to insure respiration, growth and reproduction. Nitrogen generally is concentrated in the rapidly growing areas of plants such as tips of shoots, buds and newly opened leaves.

Plants tend to use a high proportion of their nitrogen during the early growth stages. Young plants take up large quantities of nitrogen and hold it for later use. As much as two-thirds of the total uptake of nitrogen may occur during the first 60 days of the life cycle of crops such as cotton, corn and grain sorghum.

However, this supply taken up in early stages does not last indefinitely. A continuous nitrogen supply must be available throughout the season. In the case of forage crops that are grazed or cut for hay or silage, split applications of nitrogen are necessary so that an adequate amount can be available for each successive cutting or grazing period.

Several factors should be considered when deciding upon the amounts needed for the next crop. These conditions include: last year's crop, tonnage and stage of decomposition or residue, previous fertilizer applications, crop to be grown and anticipated yield, amount of organic matter present in the soil and previous response to fertilizer.

Have your soil tested by a reliable soil testing laboratory for an evaluation of the nitrogen status and the rate to use for maximum efficiency.

We have three new publications that look like good ones. They are "Know Your Home Financing", "Texas Plants Poisonous to Livestock," and "Know Your Grasses." A couple of others off the press fairly recently are entitled "Mesquite Control" and "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants."

If you would like copies of one or all of these, give us a ring.

Our water testing program has been going pretty slow. If you would like to have your water supply or supplies tested for salinity and/or hardness, bring us a sample.

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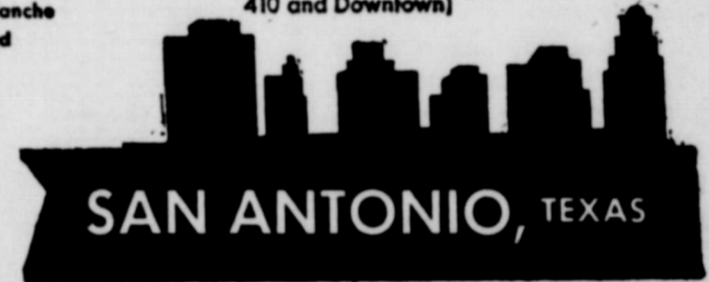

Contacts Made On Land Purchase For Robt. Lee Dam

Initial contracts for land purchases for the lake project at Robert Lee will be made this week.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District's land committee, headed by H. W. Wright, Big Spring, gave the green light after reviewing first land appraisals in an on-site meeting at the end of last week. O. H. Ivey, CRMWD general manager, and R. A. Schooling, lake superintendent who will handle much of the land negotiations, will make the contracts as rapidly as appraisers furnish information on the tracts. Efforts will be made to secure land at the dam site first. This will run into several thousand acres. More than 16,000 acres of land may be required before the basin is complete.

P. C. Harbour, Odessa, and R. D. Fields, Snyder, went with Wright, Ivey and Schooling on a complete tour of the basin in order to make themselves familiar with the various problems.

Meanwhile, other phases of the lake project are proceeding steadily. The additional core drilling needed on the northwest flank of the dam has been completed and reports are expected momentarily. Colorado State University, which is building a scale model of the designed spillway for detailed testing, advised that the morning glory spillway, conduit, and spilling basin had been constructed and the vertical bin will be in place by Dec. 9. Actual tests may begin by the end of the month.

In terms of time, surveying of the basin area is about 50 per cent complete, Ivey estimated.

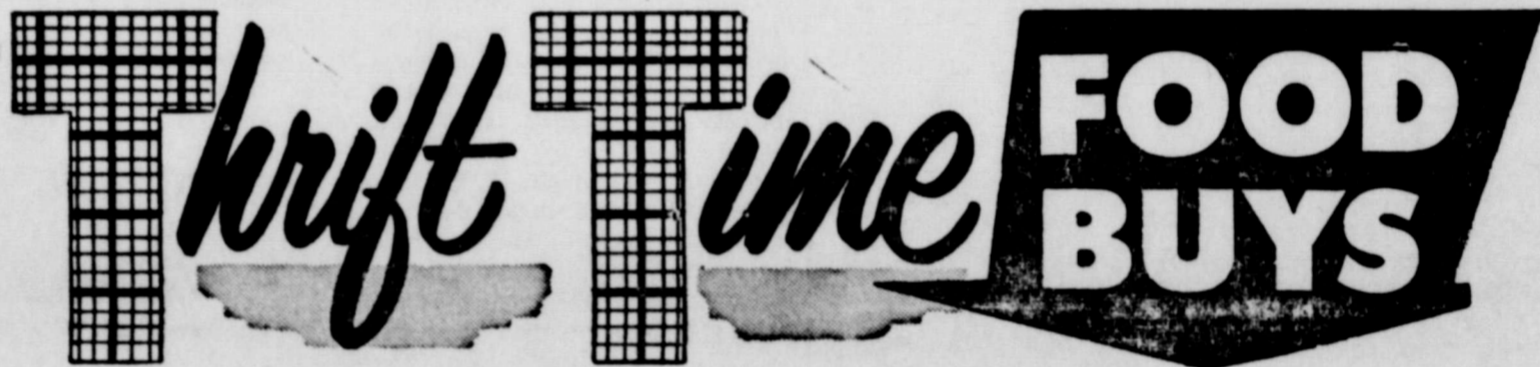
