Junior Hi Teams Get Good Results At Silver Tourney

Bronte's junior high basketball teams had a good weekend at the Silver tournament. The girls team, coached by C. B. Barbee, won first place honors, while Coach Cecil Toliver's boys team took consolation honors.

Business topics discussed by the council included plans to attend the district planning meeting on March 8, adaptation of 1966 recommendations, and the change of the March meeting.

Keith McCutchen and Norma Pruitt were awarded individual trophies as members of the all-tournament team.

Mrs. C. E. Arrott of the Bronte Senior club is newly elected chairman and presided at the meeting. Mrs. Pat Rives, Friendship club, is vice-chairman and Mrs. B. J. Lockett, Bronte Zeta Delta club, is secretary treasurer.

The Silver tournament completed the season for the juniors. The boys played 15 games, winning eight and losing seven. They also took one tournament championship and one consolation trophy. The girls had an even more successful season. They played 13 games and lost only two. The Bronte girls won two tournament championship trophies.

Girls Games

The girls started in the tourney last Thursday with a game with Sterling City. They took this one, 27-22. High pointer was Norma Pruitt with 14; Jolene Vaughn had 8, Linda Carlton 4, and Melissa Lee 1.

The girls drew a bye in the second round and advanced to the finals. This contest was with Silver and the local lassies took the victory, 31-27. Pruitt was high pointer with 21, and Vaughn had 6.

Boys Games

The boys lost their first contest, with Sterling City, the winner of the boys division. Score was 28-22. Scoring honors went to Randy Barbee with 9; Keith McCutchen had 5, Steve Williams 4, Jim Arrott 2 and David Denman 2.

In the consolation finals the local lads bested the Robert Lee freshman team, 42-34, to win the trophy. Barbee was high again with 11. Williams had 10, Denman 8, McCutchen 7, Manfred Thompson 4, and Arrott 2.

Other members of the boys squad were Wesley Ash, David Scott, James Vaughn and Nicky Arrott.

The Bronte Longhorn basketball team wound up the 1966 regular season last Saturday night in a blaze of glory when the high school cagers defeated Sterling City, 64-52. On the Friday night before, they downed Water Valley, 63-48, to give

them the District 67-B title and an almost perfect record, with only one loss to Garden City.

The wins last week and capture of the championship title makes the Longhorns eligible to compete with Christoval, winners of District 68-B

competition, for a berth in the regional tournament which will be held Feb. 25 and 26 at Howard County Junior College in Big Spring.

The all-important tilt with Christoval will be played next Tuesday night, Feb. 22, at the Coliseum in San Angelo. Game time will be at 7:30 p.m.; however the Coliseum will open at 6 p.m. Admission price will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Three To Be Named In Trustee Election

Bronte School's board of trustees in a meeting last Thursday night called an election for April 2. Three places on the board will be filled at the election.

As has been the custom for several years, there will be two polling places. One at the city hall in Bronte, will be presided over by Mrs. Otis Smith. The other at Tennyson store, will have Mrs. W. T. Green as election judge.

Persons who wish to run for trustee must have their names filed in the county judge's office in Robert Lee at least 30 days before election date. Names may be placed on the ballot by two methods: a candidate may submit his own name by filling out the appropriate form and filing it, or a name may be submitted by petition signed by at least five qualified voters of the district. Both forms may be obtained in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee. Names of all candidates must be filed with the county judge, not with the superintendent.

Golson's Contract Extended; Action on Simpson Deferred

Bronte School's board of trustees extended the contract of Elementary Principal James Golson in a meeting held Thursday night of last week. The board deferred action on the contract of High School Principal Joe B. Simpson until a later date. The trustees also accepted the resignation of Mrs. R. C. Lasswell, who is retiring from the teaching profession after 21 years of service.

The extension of Golson's contract makes it run until June 15, 1968. Simpson's contract will not expire

until June 1, 1967. Contracts of teachers were not considered at the meeting, as rules of the board provide for the hiring of teachers at the March meeting.

Mrs. Lasswell's letter of resignation said in part: "I am grateful to members of the boards and to those superintendents and principals under whom I have worked these many years for the courtesies and considerations they have shown me. It has been a pleasure to work with you, a joy to teach your children."

Olga, three years at Cow Creek, one year at Norton and the remainder of her teaching career has been spent in Bronte School.

In other action at last week's meeting the board decided to rebuild the center section of bleachers on the home side of the football field. Improvements to be made include replacing all wood and reconstructing the stands so seats and foot space will be on a different level. It is also planned to fill in the rear of the section with tile to block off wind from underneath the seats.

County will be observed today. Senior Citizen's Day in Coke Thursday. The 1965 amendments to the Social Security Act and Medicare will be discussed in meetings at Robert Lee and Bronte today. The Robert Lee meeting will be held in the school auditorium at 2:30 p.m. and the Bronte meeting will take place in the school visual aid room at 6:30 p.m.

"The information is urgent to people nearing retirement age as well as those 65 years and older" said Mrs. Willis Wayne Smith of Robert Lee, chairman of the Coke County Family Living Committee, sponsors of the programs.

"The meetings will be of special interest to you if you have parents, other relatives, or friends who are 65 or over and have worked under Social Security at any time," she said and added "the information will also be of special interest to certain persons now age 65 or nearing age 65 even though they have never worked under social security."

All interested persons in the county are invited to attend one or both of the meetings.

Neil Tarvin, Social Security representative from San Angelo, will be in charge of the programs that will consist of slides, discussion and a question and answer period. Free pamphlets will be given and personal questions will be answered. Applications will be taken for those who wish to file after each meeting.

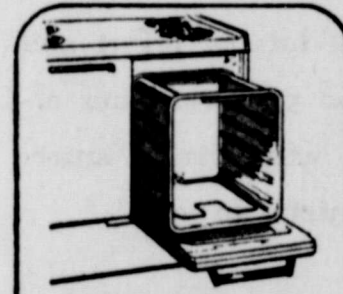

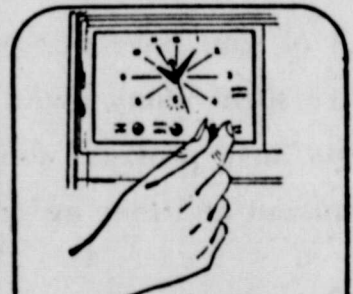

Hendryx Seeks Re-Election As Representative

State Representative Gene Hendryx, Alpine, who has served in the Legislature since 1963, is unopposed for the Democratic nomination of the new 66th Legislative District. The prominent West Texas business and civic leader was elected twice as a county commissioner and twice as Democratic county chairman of Brewster County before being elected to the Legislature.

Texas news media have carried hundreds of stories about the former totally disabled Marine, particularly his quips on the floor of the house. Hendryx serves as floor leader for Speaker Ben Barnes.

Hendryx owns and operates a radio station at Alpine and has appeared several times on various networks. He is the author of the novel, "Semper Fi!", along with several feature articles and short stories.

Among his accomplishments in the Legislature is the passage during his freshman term of the constitutional amendment which bars the Legislature from tampering with the Permanent School Fund. A member of the powerful Legislative council, his new district is the largest in the United States, covering 15 counties bounded by El Paso County on the west and Runnels County on the east.

Hendryx graduated with honors from Sul Ross State College with a bachelor and masters degree. Listed in "Who's Who in the South and Southwest," "Who's Who in American Business and Commerce" and "Leading Men of America," he holds numerous citations for outstanding community service.

He is married to the former Lucille Kempen of Alpine and they have three sons.
