Trustee, City Elections Set Saturday, Tuesday

A quiet election is expected next Tuesday when voters of Bronte will go to the polls and elect a mayor and three city aldermen. Only four candidates are on the ballot for the four positions, so they should have little trouble getting elected.

Mayor Royce Lee heads the ticket without any opposition. He is a candidate for his second term. Others on the ballot, all for councilman positions are Billy Joe Luckett, Martin Lee and Kenneth (Buddy) Reed. Luckett and Lee are running for reelection and Reed is running for office for the first time.

Elmer Hurley is the other councilman whose term expires this year. He is not running for reelection. Holdover members who have another year to serve are Norman R. Kiker and Horace Grigg.

Ten names will appear on the ballot in Saturday's school board election. Three vacancies will be filled in the election which will be held at Bronte City Hall and at Green's store in Tennyson.

Candidates names, as they appear on the ballot, are as follows:

Horace Taylor, James Wells, Marvin Landers, G. L. Latimer, M. D. (Dolan) Mackey, Eddie G. Collins, Joe Rawlings, Charles C. (Clyde) Lee, Billie Gene Thomas and Dale G. Thompson.

Running for reelection are Taylor, Wells and Rawlings.

Election judges will be Mrs. Otis Smith for the Bronte box and Mrs. W. T. Green for the Tennyson box.

Holdover members of the board are C. O. Richards, Wayne Arrott, J. B. Morrow and A. E. Bell Jr.

Rattlesnake Roundup A Smashing Success

Bronte Jaycees Third Annual Rattlesnake Roundup was a huge success. Large crowds watched anxiously all day Saturday and Sunday as hunters unloaded hundreds of pounds of the deadly reptiles.

The show was held in the Rawlings Building on Main Street. An approximation on the number of persons attending set the figure somewhere between 2,000 and 2,500 viewers during the two days. The number of snakes captured was also estimated, at 1,600 to 1,800.

Big winner in the competition for prizes was Hipp's crew of Black-

well. The young hunters turned in 204 pounds of rattlers to take the big Saturday prize of \$150.

Manuel Reyes of Bronte won the Sunday prize for most pounds of snakes delivered. He turned in 147 pounds. Reyes also won the \$25 prize for the longest snake, 65 inches.

Carlos Walker, Tim Arrott and Wayne Caulder split the \$25 prize for the snake with the most rattles, all bringing in snakes with 15 rattles.

Shellie Downs of Micanopy, Fla., milked venom from hundreds of reptiles and supplied a show for spectators. A crew of butchers supplied plenty of fresh meat for members of Zeta Delta Home Demonstration Club to cook and feed snake steaks to the crowd.

Out of state visitors for the show were from Oklahoma, Illinois, Alabama, California, Tennessee, Minnesota, Colorado, New Mexico, Missouri, Kansas, Indiana and Wisconsin.

Jaycee President J. B. Arrott and Show Chairman Dolan Mackey expressed their thanks to everyone who attended the show, hunted snakes, furnished land on which to hunt, helped with the concession stand or assisted in any other way to make the show a success. Special thanks were tendered to Edward Rawlings, who supplied his building at no cost.

The Jaycees said they made some money on the show, and it will be used to further their projects for the benefit of the entire community. Mackey said, "We hope to have a bigger one next year."

RAIN COVERS WIDE AREA OF WEST TEXAS

Rains ranging from .2 inch to 3.25 inches fell in the Bronte area Sunday night. Heaviest rainfall was on the P. J. Cervenka farm, southeast of town. He received 3.25 inches. Lightest moisture in this area was reported by C. O. Richards on the Wylie Ranch northeast of town, where only .2 of an inch fell.

Cervenka was overjoyed with the fine rain he received but was not so happy that he had six cows and a calf killed by lightning during the time the thunderclouds were hovering over his place. The cattle were under a mesquite tree about 300 yards from his house when they were hit.

Historical Marker Commemorating Butterfield Trail Going Up Nearby

The Southern Overland Mail Service (1858-1861) of the Butterfield Stage is the subject of an Official Texas Historical Marker soon to be erected at the intersection of U. S. Highway 277 and State Highway 70 in Coke County, nine miles north of Bronte, according to Lewis Timberlake of Austin, president of the Texas Historical Foundation.

This large aluminum marker measuring 27 inches by 42 inches is one of a series of informative history-in review sponsored by the Moody Foundation of Galveston, to delineate the history of "early travel, communication and transporta-

LOTS OF COKE VEHICLES NEED INSPECTION STICKER

About 56 per cent of the motor vehicles in Coke County have been inspected and now bear a 1966 sticker. Deadline for obtaining the new sticker is April 15.

A highway patrolman this week stated that there are 3,015 vehicles registered in the county and 1,690 have new stickers. He urged motorists to obtain the stickers as soon as possible, in order to avoid the last minute rush, and emphasized the importance of the matter when he said "On April 16, drivers, if caught without a sticker, will be issued a little pink slip they will not be happy to get."

tion" in Texas, Timberlake said. The Butterfield Stage, which passed near the site where the marker will be erected, provided the first combined passenger and mail service between the Pacific and Atlantic coasts.

"The inscription on this marker points out that the trip one-way took 25 days, seven of these spent in crossing Texas from Preston (now Lake Texoma) to Jacksboro, Ft. Belknap, Ft. Chadbourne and El Paso," Timberlake recounted.

The \$10,000 Moody Foundation grant helps the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the Texas Historical Foundation in their RAMPS program to record, appreciate, preserve and survey Texas history.

"History and tourism cannot be separated in Texas. By erecting historical markers, encouraging the publication of marker and museum guides, historical maps and other tourist literature, the results are two-fold: Texas history is preserved and made available for Texans traveling their state as well as the thousands of tourists who come to Texas," Timberslake said.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough of Robert Lee is chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee. A dedication of this marker will be held later in the spring.

Inscription on the marker reads: **SOUTHERN OVERLAND MAIL, 1858-1861**

(BUTTERFIELD STAGE)
Passed near this site, providing for the first time combined passenger and mail service between Pacific and Atlantic coasts. Operating west from St. Louis and Memphis, John Butterfield's company used 1350 horses and mules and 90 Concord coaches and wagons.

Stage traveled at a run, despite lack of good roads. A signal given approaching a station would have fresh horses ready and food on the table for crew and passengers. Route had stations 12 to 113 miles apart, and was sometimes changed to get water. Crew and passengers wore guns; to reduce danger of Indian attacks, mules (less coveted than horses) were used west of Ft. Belknap. The trip one way took 25 days — seven spent crossing Texas, from Preston (now under Lake Texoma) to Jacksboro, Ft. Belknap, Ft. Chadbourne and El Paso. One way fare for the 2700 miles was \$200. Passengers rarely stopped off, because they might not find seats on a later stage. Merchants in Jacksboro and other towns used Butterfield's light freight service to make mail-order sales.

Greatset contribution of the overland stage was its carrying news; coaches also brought mail from the west one to 10 days faster than it came by ship. Service was ended in 1861 by the Civil War."

LONGHORN TRACKMEN TAKE FIRST IN MEET HELD SATURDAY

Bronte Longhorn tracksters won their own track meet here Saturday in a four-team competition. Other teams were Robert Lee, Blackwell and Miles.

The Longhorns made 61½ points, and were paced by Royce Lee. He anchored both relays, won first in the broad jump and 440 yard dash. Douglas McCutchen counted up the points, with a leg on the 440 relay, a tie for first in the 100-yard low hurdles and third in the 100-yard dash and a first in discus.

Larry Corley racked up the points with a leg on the mile relay, first in pole vault, a tie for first in the 100-yard hurdles and second in the high jump.

Robert Lee Steers came in second with 41½ points. They were led by Buddy Vosburg with a win in the 220-yard dash, second place in the 100-yard scamp and a second in the broad jump. Robert Lee also

won the 880-yard dash and the 60-yard high hurdles.

I have reviewed the Attorney General's opinions furnished me, and it appears to me that it is not a violation of the law for the brother of one of the County Commissioners to act as an employee of the County Park Board.

My opinion on this matter is based on the assumption that the employee of the Park Board was hired and confirmed without the necessity of the brother on the Commissioners' Court voting for his employment by the Park Board or voting for his confirmation of employment.

In other words, it is my opinion that brother of a County Commissioner can be employed by the County Parks Board as long as his employment is not dependent upon his brother's vote.

CRMWD Aims at Early Start on Dam

Still aiming at a mid-year start on construction of a dam above Robert Lee, the Colorado River Municipal Water District is pushing ahead on land purchases.

Recent agreements have brought to 3,130 acres of land the CRMWD has acquired from 14 land owners. Most of the acreage is in the dam site.

APRIL 1 DEADLINE FOR FEED, COTTON PROGRAMS

Friday, April 1, is the deadline for farmers to sign up to take part in the 1966 upland cotton and feed grain programs.

C. E. Arrott, chairman of the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, urged all farmers who wish to take part in the programs to sign up before the deadline. Farmers may go to the ASC office in the courthouse at Robert Lee today and tomorrow, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. to sign up.

Also included in the agreements is a total of 750 acres of minerals where for one reason or another it was advisable to obtain them. Thus far, purchases have held within values fixed by appraisers, said O. H. Ivie, CRMWD manager.

He added that negotiations are underway concerning approximately 4,000 acres. The entire project will embrace around 16,500 acres for the dam and lake basin.

While steadily seeking to get as many land agreements as possible, the district is continuing talks with the City of Midland relative to a water sales contract. Ivie said that prospects of an agreement here appeared favorable.

Plans are being shaped for advertising for sale of revenue bonds. The amount will depend on whether Midland contracts for water. Engineers are confident of a July letting on construction.
