### Second Astrodome Bus Being Filled

One bus has been filled with persons who want to make the trip to Houston's Astrodome July 3. Reservations are now being taken for a second busload.

Twenty-nine reservations had been made by the middle of the week and a conversation Wednesday morning with the management of Sunset Bus Lines in Abilene indicated that a second bus would run if a minimum of 20 more persons make reservations.

Reservations should be made at the Observer office in Robert Lee or at the Enterprise office in Bronte. Cost of transportation to and from Houston and a ticket into the ball game between the Houston Astros and Cincinnati Reds is \$13.50.

Deadline for signing up is Saturday, July 25. Reservations after that date cannot be accepted because the management of the bus company has to send in the order for tickets.

The bus, or buses, will leave from the Enterprise office in Bronte at 5 a.m. The schedule calls for arrival at the Astrodome at 12:15 p.m., in time for lunch before the ball games starts at 1:30. The bus will leave on the return trip immediately after the ball game is over, and will arrive back in Bronte at approximately 10:30 p.m.

### Four Students At Band School

Abilene —Four students from Bronte have enrolled for the 19th annual two-week summer vacation band and twirling school which opens July 10 on the McMurry College campus.

Attending the school from Bronte will be Lana Lynn Low, Mary Jane Morrow, Norma Pruitt and Bob Wells.

Heading the 15-member faculty chosen from successful band directors and twirling instructors from over West Texas will be Dr. Raymond T. Bynum, director of the McMurry College Band.

Dr. Bynum said, "Beginning on Sunday night, July 10, in Radford Auditorium the entire school will be together for a worship service. Monday night will be movies and dancing with music furnished by members of the band school faculty. For entertainment Wednesday night the faculty will give a recital."

The classes are designed to improve concert band performance as well as marching showmanship. Attention will be given to all individual instrument instruction, conducting, marching and twirling, theory, percussion, and drum majoring. For mature and advanced players, a course in "reading band" will be offered.

The summer band school is open to college and high school players. Exceptional players of junior high age may attend upon recommendation from their band director.

## School Tax Rate Is Lowered 14c

The 1966 tax rate for property owners in Bronte Independent School District will be lower than it was last year. The tax rate was set at the last meeting of the school board at \$1.84 per \$100 val-

uation; this rate is 14 cents lower than the 1965 rate of \$1.98.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said the maintenance and operation part of the tax rate will remain the same at \$1.50, but bond retirement requirements would be lower this year, allowing the debt retirement part of the tax rate to be lowered to 34 cents.

The last payment on the elementary school will be paid during the next year. Sufficient money is on hand to make the \$18,405 payment. The only debt requirement to be taken care of with 1966 school taxes is for the new buildings which are now under construction.

Another bright point in the school tax picture, Barbee said, is the fact that valuations in the district are up some \$600,000 over last year. He attributed the increase to a raise in allowable in Texas and to some workover jobs which increased production on some declining wells.

In other business at the last board meeting, the trustees accepted the resignation of Miss Judy Smith as high school English teacher. They also adopted the same student insurance program which has been in effect the past two years.

### Calendar Issued

A school calendar for the 1966-67 school term has been released. Teachers will report for in-service training Aug. 25 and 26. School opens on Aug. 29.

### Sign Up Slow for Reserved Seats

Fans who wish to reserve seats for the five home football games have been asked to sign a register at the Bronte Enterprise office. Response this week was slow. If enough persons have signed up before the next board meeting, there will be about 330 good seats available for reservation at \$6.25 for the season. The seats will be freshly painted, protected by a wind break and have other advantages. Whether or not this section will be reserved will be decided at the next meeting of the school board.

## County Agents News Column

The rains as always were a welcomed sight. The amount varied considerably, but the over-all benefits will be great. The pastures and fields alike will take on a new look.

Along with the rains in most cases were strong winds. The wind did some tree damage over the county. We probably will have more limbs broken as the year progresses.

If you have a tree that had some limbs broken off, these should be removed now for best results. Make a clean cut below the break next to the trunk if possible. Then when the limb has been removed, paint the wound with a tree wound dressing. This will help prevent disease and insect damage.

Grasshoppers are showing up in damaging numbers in a few spots in the county. We hope they will remain confined to their present small areas. Now is the time to initiate control measures if you have a grasshopper "hot spot."

The grasshopper is much easier killed when he is small. Also, once the hoppers spread, control measures are more difficult and more expensive. Give them a dose of sevin, malathion, heptachlor or toxaphene now while they are small and confined to a given area.

Several people have commented on how bad the corn ear worm is this year. No doubt they have seriously damaged some good "roasting ear" patches already.

Like the grasshopper, the corn ear worm is not easy to control — and is impossible to control once he is a half inch long or longer.

One practice that has worked well for some is to spray your corn ears (tops particularly) about ev-

ery third day with sevin or DDT the first or second day after the silk shows. Repeat this application three or four times. Not all the corn ears are ready at the same time. Be sure to spray the silk area. The ear worm miller lays her eggs there. They hatch and the young worms feed down and into the corn ear. Once they reach this point, they are difficult to control. The best time is to try to get them as they hatch.

Texas sustained 15 screwworm cases last week. The majority of the cases were down State, but a few were not. Kerr County had one case and Sutton County had one case.

Coke County operators have submitted several samples for diagnosis, but all have returned with a negative report to date. Maybe it will stay that way.

## H D Agent's News Dept.

### Check Home Canner With Care

Summer vacation time heralds the home canning season for many homemakers. If your pressure canner is still where you placed it at the end of last year's canning season, now's a good time to check it out.

For safe use of your steam pressure canner, clean the safety-valve and petcock openings and check the pressure gauge. Faulty pressure gauges may result in loss of food.

Clean the safety-valve and petcock openings by pulling a string through them. Then carefully check the dial gauge and weighted gauge.

Use your pressure canner to can all meats and vegetables. Tomatoes, however, are an exception, for they may be safely canned by the boiling water bath method used for canning fruits. The water-bath canner should be checked to see if it is deep enough so that water will cover tops of jars adequately. The lid on the canner should fit tightly.

Both the water bath canner and pressure canner should contain a rack inside on which to put jars.
