## General Election Coming Up Tuesday

### AD-LIB-BEN

Next Tuesday is election day, and we'd like to put in a good word for a couple of men on the ticket. It happens they are both Democratic nominees for the offices they are seeking.

The all-important race for United States senator between Waggoner Carr and John Tower is THE big race in the state and possibly in the nation. Republicans all over the country are pushing an all-out effort to get their man back in the Senate. They want to keep Tower in the spot formerly occupied by Lyndon B. Johnson.

We believe Waggoner Carr is more ably suited to fill this position. Having known Waggoner since our student days at Texas Tech in the pre-war years, we have watched his climb with a great deal of interest and believe he is now ready to fill the important job of U. S. Senator. He has served his district and the state in an outstanding manner and is well qualified to help make the laws of the land.

Another man whom we would like to see elected, and who should have no trouble defeating his opponent, is our top flight representative in the Texas House of Representatives, Gene Hendryx of Alpine. #### Senate Race Big One

The race for United States Senator is the big race in Texas. Democratic nominees in other races to be voted on by Coke Countians have only token opposition.

In the senate race, Democratic nominee Waggoner Carr, now attorney general of Texas, is seeking the spot now held by Republican John Tower. Both have made intensive campaigns for the office. Republicans in many quarters have listed the Texas Senate race as the most important in the entire country to their cause.

Another race which will be voted on by Coke County voters is for state representative of the 66th legislative district. Incumbent Gene Hendryx of Alpine, the Democratic nominee, is opposed by Republican Marvin Russell. Experts on politics think that Hendryx will have little trouble in retaining his seat in the Texas house. Democrats cited Hendryx's long record of service to his district and his outstanding

## Giant Defensive Effort Gives 13-12 Victory Over Trent

It was rough all the way, but Bronte won. If possible, it was closer than the score indicated, but it isn't possible to divide football scores into fractions. It took a gigantic effort by the Longhorn line to keep the Gorillas from scoring any extra points, but it was accomplished. The score was 13-12.

The Gorillas had a couple of the best running backs in the business. Elton Payne was a real pain to the Longhorns, and Deris Hutcheson wasn't much better. Larry Hellums also made some good gains behind the blocking of his teammates. The Gorillas alternated almost every play with two quarterbacks, who ran in and out all the time.

But then, Bronte must have had a little bit more, because the Longhorns came out just a little bit ahead on the scoreboard.

#### First Quarter

Doug McCutchen kicked off to start the ball game, and the Gorillas made a sustained drive down the field for a touchdown before they were stopped. Hellums made 20 yards for the Gorillas first play from scrimmage for a 1st on the 45.

Payne carried about two times to Hutcheson's one, and the pair moved the ball from the 45 for three 1st downs in their 55 yard trip to the Bronte goal line. Payne carried it over from the 1 yard line for the counter. Try for point failed, and the Gorillas had drawn the

first blood in what was booked as the Class B battle of the year.

Hellums kicked off to McCutchen, but he had to do it again after the Gorillas were penalized 5 yards. It went to Charlie Masterson the second time and he was downed on his own 44.

With McCutchen and Masterson doing the ball toting chores, they moved it to the Gorilla 43 and had to punt from there. Davis Corley's punt went to the 20, where it was 1st and 10 for Trent. Payne and Hutcheson moved to the Bronte 40 before the end of the quarter.

#### Second Quarter

With a 2nd and 9, Messrs. Payne and Hutcheson made a couple of ground tries for a net of 2 yards. On the 4th down the Gorillas tried

a pass instead of punting, but it didn't work and the Longhorns took over on their 39.

McCutchen went for 17 yards and a 1st on the Trent 44, Masterson added a couple, and McCutchen made 6 more, before Trent was penalized 15 to set up a 1st on the 20. Quarterback David Glenn decided it would be easier to eat up the yards in the air, so he tossed a nice lobbing pass to end Davis Corley who had it in the end zone before the Gorillas knew what had happened. McCutchen kicked the extra point, which later proved to be the deciding score of the ball game.

McCutchen's kick went to Hellums who was pulled in on his 31. An incomplete pass, a gain of 2

yards and a loss of 10 on a fumble and recovery set up a 4th and 18 for the host team, so they really did punt this time, to the Bronte 36. McCutchen went for 9 and Glenn added 7 to make a 1st on the Trent 48. Masterson made 5, Glenn picked up 1, and a pass to Victor Brock was good for another 1st on the 35.

McCutchen went for 3, then caught a pass for 6 more. He then traveled 16 yards for a 1st on the 10. Masterson and McCutchen picked up short yardage on down toward the double stripe, then McCutchen took the ball over for the second Bronte counter of the quarter. Try for points failed, and the Longhorns were ahead, 13-6.

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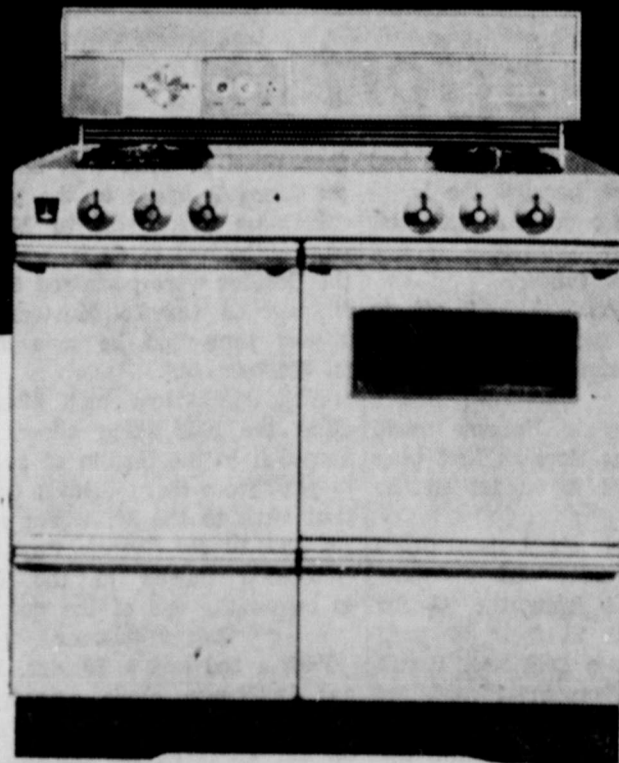

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## TEXAS IS ON THE MOVE!

In virtually every field of endeavor, our state has made dramatic progress the past four years under the strong leadership of Governor John Connally. His administration's bold, yet sensible programs have helped provide new opportunity and a better way of life for all our people.

**IMPROVED EDUCATION** — Since 1963, state investment in higher education has doubled, and faculty salaries have increased 40%. **INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION** — A record 855 new industrial plants have been established the past three years, moving Texas into second place in the nation in industrial expansion. Last year, more than 23,000 new jobs were created in manufacturing alone — the best year ever for the Texas labor force.

**INCREASED TOURISM** — More than 12 million tourists visited Texas last year, adding more than \$900 million to the state's economy, and creating 140,000 new jobs. The state's tourist advertising program has been sharply expanded.

**MENTAL HEALTH AND MENTAL RETARDATION** — New emphasis on prevention of mental illness and mental retardation has been achieved through establishment of new community centers, replacing the former practice of "warehousing" patients. Investment for research into causes of mental disorders has doubled the past four years.

**BETTER HIGHWAY TRANSPORTATION** — Texas has more farm-to-market roads than any other state — more than 35,134 miles. We lead the nation in construction of interstate highways, at a cost 40% below the nation's average.

**COMBAT AIR AND WATER POLLUTION** — New legislation for public health, "The Clear Air Act of Texas," provides state action to combat air pollution. Similar vigorous action has been initiated to control pollution of Texas streams, bays and estuaries.

**NEW CULTURAL GROWTH** — The Fine Arts Commission was established in 1965 to nurture the cultural enrichment of Texans. The state's cultural heritage will be preserved and portrayed in the state's pavilion at HemisFair '68 in San Antonio.

**BUSINESSLIKE ADMINISTRATION** — With unprecedented teamwork, our state government has operated responsibly and efficiently. The Legislature has finished its work on time in each session. Following a pay-as-you-go policy, we have maintained a healthy surplus in the general revenue fund without curtailing essential services.

**HEALTHY, GROWING ECONOMY** — Business activity rose 11% last year, as Texas continues one of the brightest growth areas. Employment and income are at an all-time high, unemployment at an all-time low. Despite increased responsibilities, our state government costs only \$168.78 a year per citizen, fourth lowest in the nation. No broad-based tax has been enacted the past four years. ### Third Quarter

The third stanza of this ball game was strictly defensive, so far as changing the scoreboard was concerned. Masterson took the kickoff, but the Longhorns were unable to make the needed 10 yards and had to punt. In the next series Trent was penalized back to their 14, and was unable to overcome a 1st and 25 situation. Hutcherson punted to the Bronte 31.

Bronte started putting together a good drive, with McCutchen, Masterson and Glenn all making yards. They went down to the Trent 25 yard line where a fumble stopped their chance for a score.

Payne and Hutcherson did the carrying chores and made themselves a 3rd and 8 on Bronte's 15 yard line when the quarter ended.

### Fourth Quarter

Payne carried a couple of times and came up with a 1st and goal on the 8. The Longhorn defenders had their work cut out and they did it, by holding the Gorillas to a total of 7 yards in four tries. They never did cross the double stripe and the Longhorns took over on their own 1 yard line.

With the help of a penalty, the Longhorns moved out to the 15 for a 1st. The second series of downs didn't turn out so well, however, and Corley got a bad pass from center, had to evade the swarming Gorillas and got off a short kick which went out of bounds on the Bronte 25.

Payne carried once and then a penalty against Bronte moved the ball to the 12, where the Gorillas had a good setup. Payne was equal to the occasion, however and traveled the needed 8 yards for the second Gorilla touchdown of the night.

Rising to the occasion was the entire Longhorn defense and Payne was stopped short of the double stripe. The scoreboard still showed 13-12.

A sigh of relief went through the Bronte side of the field, as spectators were hoping the Longhorns would be able to run out the clock before their next series of downs was over. However, the excitement was not over.

Masterson took Hellums' kick and made a fine run back to the Bronte 49. McCutchen went for 4, then a fumble gave the ball back to the Gorillas on their own 39 yard line. Things were looking down again. Payne went for a couple, and Hellums made a nice gain but it was nullified and Trent was penalized 5. Payne made 2 more, then Hellums caught a pass which gave the hosts a 4th and 1. The next play sewed up the ball game as David Gentry fell on a loose ball to give the pigskin back to the Longhorns on the Trent 37. Knowing that the clock was running out, the Longhorns played pretty conservative football, and had a 4th and 5 on the Trent 32 when there was no more time left.

Longhorn linemen and linebackers deserve special praise for their successful goal line stands in a couple of instances.

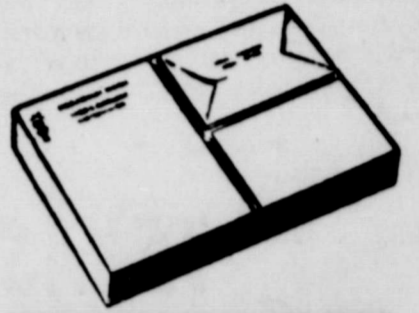

Dear Mrs. Oglesby, Editor,

In regard to your recent editorial (Oct. 27, 1966), I wish to make comment. While a Democrat in name, I feel the necessity of voting for the man, and I do not think your comments concerning the Honorable Junior Senator of Texas, Senator John Tower, were accurate.

First of all, Senator Tower was duly elected by responsible voters. He did not "pay" his way in or did he "waltz" in; he was chosen by Texans in a fair race between two candidates. The fact that he defeated a faction-torn Democratic party who chose "... a Democratic nominee who was ... ultra conservative ..." only added emphasis to the necessity of judging the man and did not insinuate the lesser of two evils as your editorial seems to imply.

As to Senator Tower's opposing "... just for the sake of opposing everything which comes before the U. S. Senate ..." exactly what would have been the vote of an ultra conservative Democrat against the vote of the ultra liberal Yarborough? The fact that Senator Yarborough is so liberal would, of course, make the vote of moderate conservative Senator Tower appear to "cancel" out such unmitigated liberalism.
