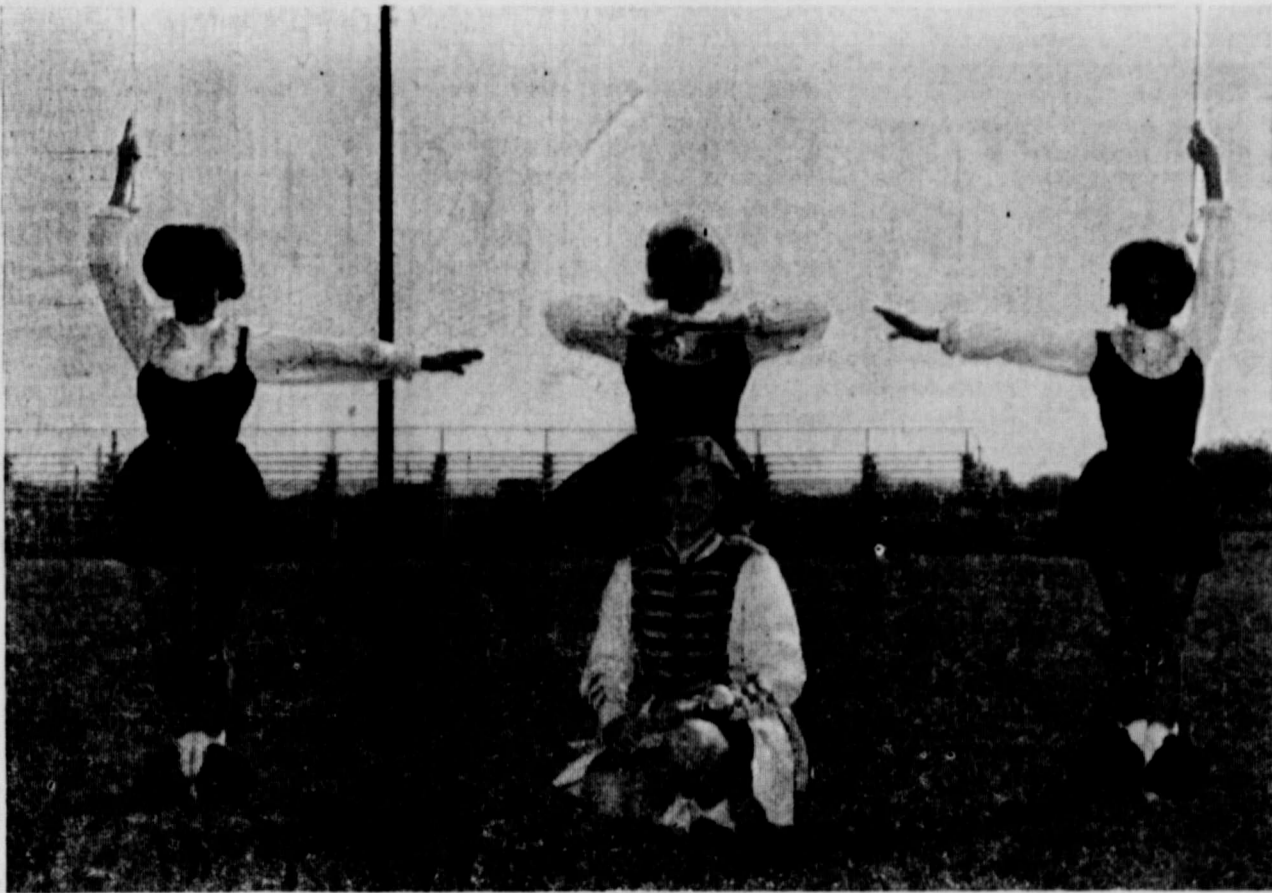

The Bronte Longhorns look as though they are on the road to winning the Region I championship. Of course, we have come this far on several previous occasions, only to be defeated in the final game.

### Cotton Quota Vote Coming Up

The cotton quota vote this year is the first time growers have voted by mail on marketing quotas for their upland cotton crop. C. E. Arrott, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Coke County Committee said today. Ballots should be returned to the ASC County office — by mail or in person — during the period December 5 through 9.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum approve quotas for the 1967 upland cotton crop, growers who agree to reduce their cotton acreage below the effective farm allotment will have available a program that offers loans, price-support payments, and diversion payments. Marketing quota penalties would apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm. However, growers who elect not to participate in the reduction program also have the chance to produce cotton for export only, with-

out marketing penalties or Government subsidy.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose quotas for the 1967 crop, the regular allotment program will remain in effect, and price-support loans will be available at 50 percent of parity to growers who do not exceed their acreage allotments.

Lease or sale of cotton allotments is provided for the 1967 crop; however, transfer documents have to be filed with the county office not later than January 3, 1967. The outcome of the marketing quota referendum will have no effect on the lease or sale of allotments. Producers who shared in the 1966 upland cotton crop or its proceeds are eligible to vote; where no cotton was planted in 1966 on an allotment farm, only the owner and operator may vote. Questions about eligibility to vote should be referred to Coke ASCS County Office.

Football is still mighty important this week to squad members, coaches and fans of Bronte, as the mighty Longhorns move toward their final encounter of the 1966 season. The Longhorns will travel by chartered bus to Brownfield Friday afternoon, and, at 7:30 p.m., will meet another set of Longhorns, from Vega. The winner of the encounter will be declared champions of the vast area covered by Region I.

on the north by the Texas, Oklahoma line. The boundary runs in a southeasterly direction with Trent as the easternmost point, curves back toward the southwest to take in Bronte, and runs approximately through San Angelo on to the Rio Grande. All the area west of the line to New Mexico is included. Thirty Class B schools which play 11-man football are in the region.

Vega, located about 36 miles west of Amarillo on Route 66, is the champion of District 1-B, and by virtue of the Longhorns' Thanksgiving Day win over District 2-B champs of Sundown, earned a spot in the regional playoffs. They downed favored Sundown, 34-16.

So far this season the Bronte Longhorns have a slight edge over the Vega lads in the win-loss column. Bronte has won ten games and lost one, while Vega has won seven, lost three, and tied one.

Coach Cecil Toliver didn't stutter when he told The Enterprise Wednesday morning that he believes his Longhorns will take the Longhorns from the north. "They'll give us a hard time, and will be a lot tougher than Fort Hancock was last week," the coach said. "But I believe if our boys will get in there and work, they'll win this game," he added.

The Bronte starters have a slight weight advantage over the boys from Vega. Bronte's line averages 174, compared to 170.7 for Vega. The local backfield average is 157, while Vega averages 152.

The Vega team has a couple of 195 pound tackles, Toliver said, and quarterbacking is done by an 180-pound senior.

The Vega team runs a slot T formation from an unbalanced line, the coach said, and operate with a 4-5 defense.

The black and gold clad Vega team is coached by Kenneth Miller, a Howard Payne graduate. He is assisted by Jimmy Duncan and Vaughn Dunn.

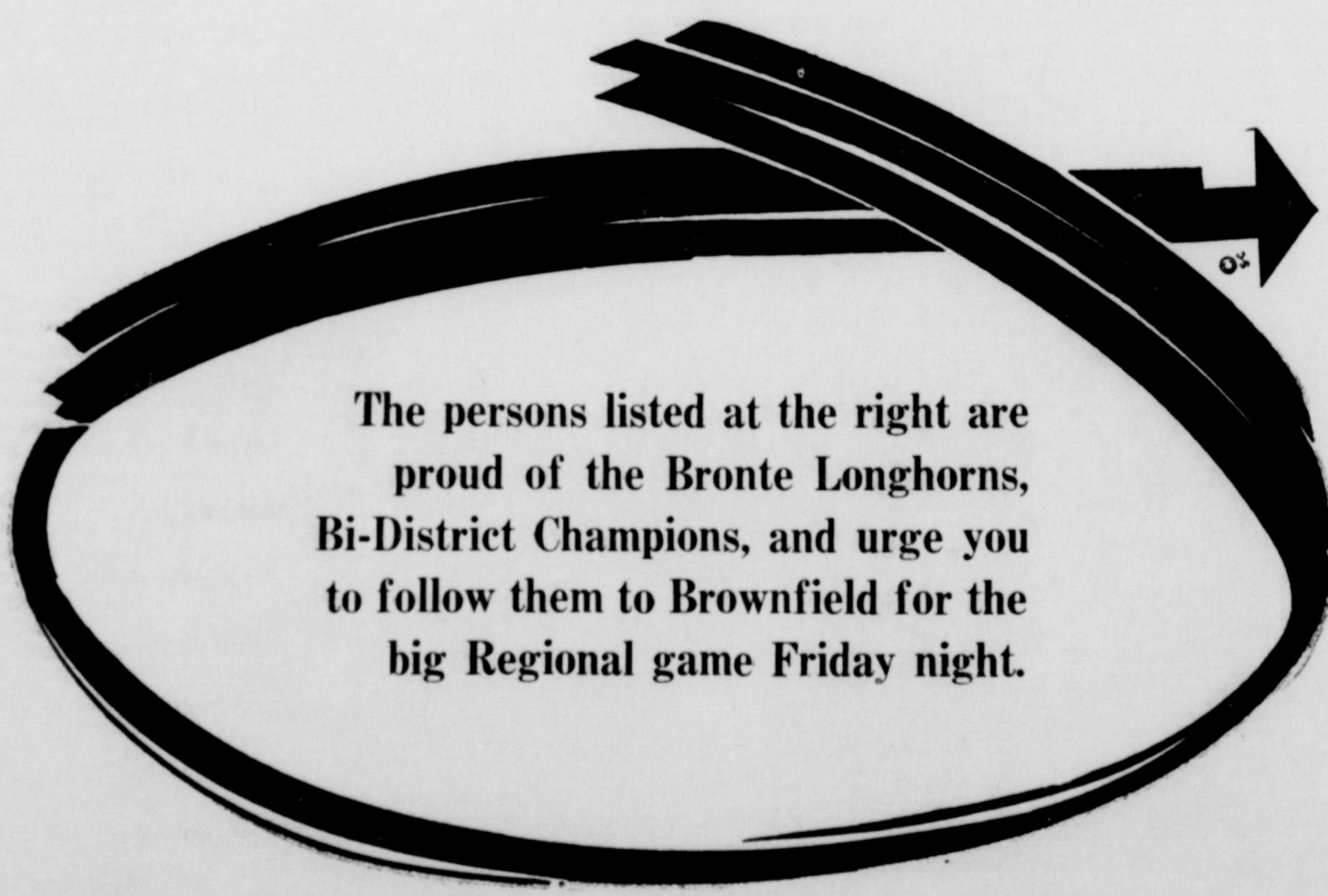

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# Longhorns Take Bi-District Title With Win Over Ft. Hancock, 38-12

The Bronte Longhorns once again proved their mettle last Saturday night when they met the Fort Hancock Mustangs in a bi-district game at Crane. The Longhorns, champions of District 4-B, ran the ball all over the field and outdid the Mustangs, champs of District 3-B, 38-12.

The Longhorns scored in every quarter with star tailback Doug McCutchen leading the way for the Longhorn victory with four of the counters. Davis Corley made the fifth touchdown when he caught a pass in the end zone from Quarterback David Glenn.

Weather for this bi-district contest was not quite as favorable as it has been for most of the other games this season. The football plant at Crane, however, is exceptionally well equipped, and with all things considered, the setting for the game was good.

## First Quarter

McCutchen kicked off to get the game underway. Starting from the 16, the Mustangs moved to the 32 for a 1st on the first play from scrimmage. The next series, however, was not so fruitful and Dale Wistman punted. It went to McCutchen on the 40, and he was off for the first Bronte touchdown. Fine blocking cleared Mustangs out of the way for the run. He then went over the right side for 2 extras and the score stood at 8-0 with a little over a minute of playing time gone.

R. Galindo received the kickoff and ran a couple of plays, then Porkie Jimenez tossed an aerial which was intercepted by David Glenn, who had to hurl himself through the air to get to the flying football. Taking over on the Fort Hancock 49, the Longhorns called for a run by Charlie Masterson, who went for 3. McCutchen moved the ball for 12 and a 1st on the 34. Masterson, McCutchen and Glenn went 12 more for another 1st on the 22. Masterson made 10 in two carries for another 1st on the 12, and McCutchen went in from there for the second Bronte touchdown. The Mustangs were penalized 1 1/2 yards, making easy picking for McCutchen to run a pair of extras. Score: 16-0.

R. Galindo took McCutchen's kick deep in Mustang territory and ran it out to the 27 where he fumbled, and McCutchen recovered. The Mustangs, with their backs already to the wall, stiffened their defense and the Longhorns couldn't capitalize on the situation. Corley had to punt for the first time. It went into the end zone.

Galindo carried for 5 and Chuy Marquez went for a 1st on the 32. After making 7 yards in three tries, the Mustangs punted. The punt and a 15 yard clipping penalty moved the ball back to the Longhorn 15. The locals got off a couple of plays before the end of the quarter.

## Second Quarter

An incomplete pass brought up 4th down and Corley punted to the Fort Hancock 40. Galindo made 14 yards and a 1st on the Bronte 46 before Brian Richards pulled him in. A tackle by Don Hageman stopped Marquez after 5 yards. Galindo was stopped by David Gentry, Victor Brock and Wayne Carlton for short yardage, but a flag nullified the play and brought up a 2nd and 10. Glenn and Gary Don Allen put the screws to the next two plays, and Wistman punted. It was a good one and rolled to the Bronte 6, but a flag was thrown and had to be redone. Next time it went out on the 17. A McCutchen run was good for 11 yards, then a Glenn to Corley pass made 11 more. A second pass to Corley was good for another 1st, gaining 21 yards. A couple of plays later, G. Grajeda recovered a Bronte fumble at midfield.

The Mustangs moved to the 40 for a 1st. Richards, Allen and Brock took care of the tackles on the three downs. A pass to Jimenez was good for 16 yards. After an incomplete pass, McCutchen intercepted the next one near the goal line and ran it back to the 29.

Masterson went for 6, then Bronte was penalized 5. A pass was good to Randy Barbee, but the 'Horns didn't make their 1st down. Corley punted a beautiful 45 yard boomer to Franco who was downed on the 42. After failing to make their 10 yards, thanks to the defensing of Allen, Corley and Carlton, the Mustangs punted to the 27. On the first play of the new series, McCutchen picked up some good blocks and wound his way a long 73 yards for the third Bronte TD. He went around right end for 2 PAT to make the score 24-0.

Manfred Thompson and Masterson stopped Galindo on the 31 after he took McCutchen's kick. Galindo then took a pass which was good for 15 yards and a 1st. The next pass try might have been good, but the Mustang receiver ran over one of the officials and couldn't get to the ball. A pass was good to the 45, where Brock nailed the receiver in his tracks, and the first half was over.

## Third Quarter

McCutchen took the kickoff on the 11 and returned it to the 47. Masterson went for 2, and Glenn kept the ball to run for 10 yards and a 1st on the Fort Hancock 41. McCutchen went for 3, and Glenn made 7 for another 1st. Glenn again on the next play, and just as he was going down lateraled to McCutchen, who went for another TD. A Glenn to Corley pass was good. Score: 32-0.

Junior Galindo made a nice return to the 44 before Glenn pulled him down. A pass to Marquez was good for a 1st on Bronte's 46. Jimenez threw a long pass down to the Bronte 10 where McCutchen was defending and waiting for it. He ran 39 yards before he was stopped. Corley took a Glenn pass, was hit hard just as he got the ball, and fumbled. It was recovered by John Franco, who was downed on his own 42.

The Mustangs were off on a drive which was to lead them across the Longhorn goal line for the first time. Things didn't start off too well for the Mustangs, as Bob Bell came banging through and threw Jimenez for a 14 yard loss, as he tried to pass. However, on the next play, Galindo recaptured the loss and some more as he went for 23 yards. Jimenez picked up the 1st on Bronte's 37, and the Fort Hancock lads continued to move the ball. They were down on Bronte's 14 when the third quarter ended.

## Fourth Quarter

Jimenez kept on the first play after the teams changed ends of the field, and was thrown for a yard loss by Keith Morris. He was not to be denied, however, and went the needed 15 yards on the next play for a Fort Hancock counter. A kick for PAT was blocked by Allen and Brock, to make the scoreboard read 32-6.

After taking Junior Galindo's kick, the Longhorns with Masterson, McCutchen, Barbee and Glenn carrying, made it down to the Mustang 22. The big gainer in this drive was a 24 yard run by Glenn, with a 15 yard penalty against the Mustangs tacked onto it. However, the Longhorns bogged down, and faced with a 4th and 21 situation, McCutchen tried a field goal which fell short. Fort Hancock took over on the 29.

The Mustangs made 3 yards on the ground and 14 by air, before Jimenez tried another aerial from the 38 yard line. Masterson made

a leaping interception of the ball and the Longhorns took over on the Mustang 48 yard line.

A clipping penalty set the Longhorns back to their own 42. Glenn pitched to McCutchen, who in turn threw a pass to Glenn, which carried the ball to the 19 yard line for a big 1st down. Masterson went for 5, McCutchen moved for 3 to the 11, and from that point a pass into the end zone to Corley was good for 6 points. Try for points was no good.

Coach Cecil Toliver emptied his benches at this point and every member of the Longhorn squad got a chance to play in this bi-district contest.

Barbee kicked off to Rudy Lusera who was tackled on the 45. Jimenez made a long run to the 23, and Marquez went in for another Mustang tally from there. Try for points failed. Score: 38-12.

An on side kick went to David Scott and Bronte had the ball on the 39. With Keith McCutchen calling the signals, Tony Barrett and Jerry Parker, who has been out for several weeks with a cracked ankle, moved the ball for short yardage, and Barbee punted as the ball game ended. Scoreboard read 38-12.

Notes on the ball game show that outstanding line work was done by Allen, Hageman, Gentry, Stroebel, Corley, Carlton, Morris, Brock and Bell.

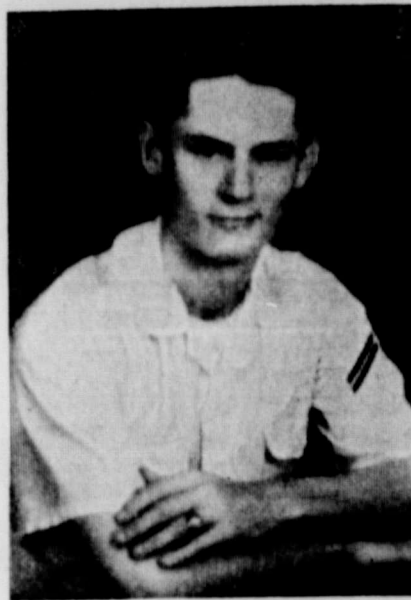
## KEN MAYBEN WRITES ABOUT BIG FIRE ON CARRIER, USS ORISKANY

28, Oct. 1966

1:00 (morning)

Dear Daddy, Grandma, and Aunt Paully,

Well, I guess ya'll have heard about our little fire on the news by now. It wasn't very little though. About one-fourth of the ship is completely destroyed. All that is left is the hull. It took a little over eight hours to put the main part of the fire out. They said that the fire started in an ammo magazine. It was one of the magazines where we keep the flares they use to drop from planes to take pictures. They say there were about 640 of them that exploded. There were 35 officers and eight enlisted men killed in the fire. The reason so many officers were killed is because the started right below where the officers sleep.

As I told you before, I work from 6:00 in the afternoon till 6:00 in the morning. I got off work at six a. m., yesterday morning and went up and took a shower, then went to bed. I had been in bed about ten minutes when the first alarm went off. It sounded like this, "Fire, Fire, Fire in hanger bay 1, all hands man your general quarters stations." I got up and started pulling on my pants. About 15 seconds after the first alarm, they sounded another one the same way. Immediately after it they sounded another alarm. It was "General quarters, general quarters, all hands man your general quarters stations." I had my pants on and was about to put my shirt on at this time. I dropped my shirt and grabbed my shower shoes and put them on. I ran up to the hanger bay and all I could see was smoke. So I headed for the emergency steering room, which is my general quarters station. In case you don't know, general quarters is the disaster or battle alarm aboard ship. Another name for emergency steering room is after steering. That is what it is commonly called. It is located at the back of the ship and the fire was all the way up on forward end of the ship. But, the whole ship was smoked up. Just about the time I got down to after steering they sounded general quarters again and then they sounded "Man Overboard." About three minutes later there was another man overboard. Down in after steering we have a siren called the steering casualty alarm. It went off and we knew the bridge had lost control of the ship. And that is what we are in after steering for, to take control if they lose it. We tried to take control, but nothing happened. The ship was fishtailing and spinning in the water for about five minutes before we finally got control. We were steering the ship in after steering, taking orders from the bridge as to what turns to make, for about four and half hours. The bridge finally got their cable fixed and took control again and we sat the rest of the fire out. It was kind of weird sitting down there 25 feet below water level in a small room, not knowing what was going on up above and waiting to hear those bombs start exploding. We had three different squawk boxes we were list-

ening to down there. On one we could hear the pilot house, main control, port and starboard life boats and port and starboard life bouy's. On the other, was the enclosed bridge which is where the captain is, the chart house, and secondary con, which is a stand-by bridge if the bridge even gets blown up. On the other we could hear a whole assortment of people, such as main engine control, foryard diesel, after diesel, IC, fire control, etc. So all we could do was listen and picture in our mind what was happening.

And thats about all there is to tell. I will tell you all about it when I come home. We should be heading back for the states in a few days. Our flight deck is warped and both catapults are out, so its a cinche we aren't going to launch any more planes. Speaking of planes reminds me of something else. They pushed about eight planes and two helicopters overboard during the fire plus they threw over hundreds of bombs to get them away from it and keep them from exploding. We have all 43 bodies of the guys who died down here in the reefers where I work. We are keeping them to send back to the states. I helped put them in there and cover them with sheets. Its kind of weird sitting down here at night. Guess that's it.

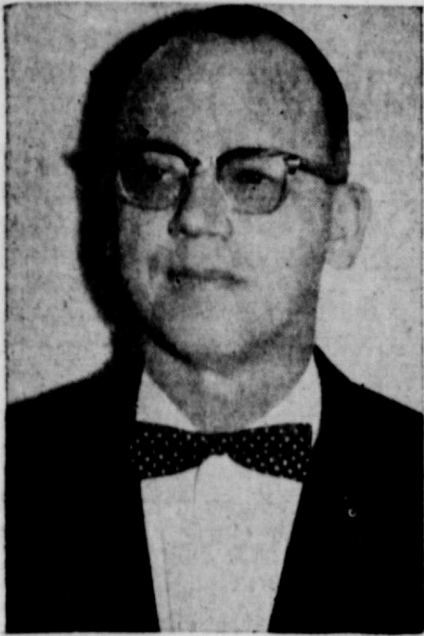

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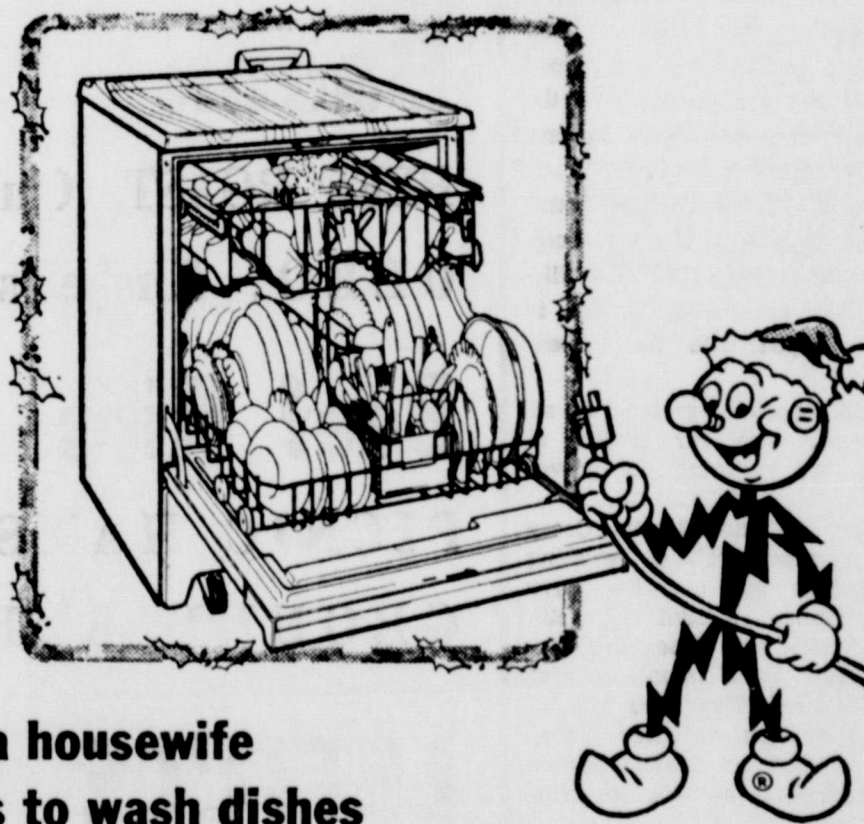
