Four Firms Burglarized

Burglars made a haul of an estimated \$288 last Monday night when they broke into four Bronte business firms. The businesses were McShan's Snack Bar and Gulf, Fina and Texaco Service Stations.

Deputy Sheriff Jesse Parker said Wednesday that law officers investigating the burglaries have not come across any leads. No witnesses have been found to the crimes, and officers have not been able to ascertain what part of the night the intruders struck.

Sustaining the biggest loss was McShan's Snack Bar where the burglars picked up \$85 from the

cash register. An undetermined amount, thought to be small, was also taken from the juke box.

Hallmark & Parker Gulf lost about \$20 from their cash register, and the Texaco Station lost

Final Rites Held For Miss Thomas

MOD Drive Started

The annual drive of the March of Dimes in Coke County is now underway, according to Coke County Chairman Elmer Hurley. The fund drive will get its first big boost in the Bronte area tonight (Thursday) when members of Zeta Delta H. D. Club will conduct the annual Mothers March, making a house to house canvass of the city.

Mrs. Wayne Dunning is chairman of the Mothers March.

This year's March of Dimes is already off to a good start, Hurley said, as \$110.14 was contributed to the drive by golfers of Coke County. This amount was raised last November when duffers of Bronte and Robert Lee met for their annual tournament for the Dimes Drive.

The ladies will start their canvass at 7 p.m. Persons who would like for the club women to stop at their homes Thursday night are requested to turn on their porch lights, or indicate their wishes by putting up a white flag.

The March of Dimes has been

an annual affair since back in the early 1930s when it was started by the late Franklin D. Roosevelt. Originally founded to help stamp out polio, the March of Dimes now uses its funds to help children and adults with birth defects. Much of the money raised is used for research in an effort to determine the cause of birth defects, which scientists hope will lead to their prevention.

Hurley pointed out that the fight against birth defects is a gigantic task and requires a great deal of financing. He asked that all Coke Countians be generous when they donate to the cause.

The fund chairman pointed out, "One family in ten in the United States knows the tragedy of having a defective child. Almost 80 per cent of all birth defects can be treated, and often completely corrected, if early diagnosis and proper treatment are obtained. Your contribution to the March of Dimes finances more than 75 Birth Defects Centers across the nation to bring the best of care to those who need it most."

SCHOOL CENSUS IS UNDERWAY

Bronte School's annual enumeration of all school age children in the district is now in progress, and school authorities are emphasizing the importance of every child's being counted in the census.

Families who now have children in school have been sent blank forms to be filled out with names of all their school age children, including those who will be starting next fall in the first grade.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said the biggest problem in obtaining an accurate count is getting information from families who will have a child in school next fall, but do not have students in school now.

Barbee requested the cooperation of everyone in the district in getting blanks to families who have not received one.

The census is important to the school because it is one factor used in determining the amount of state money received; also it helps school officials and board members in making plans for the next school term.

Voter Registration Deadline Nears; Taxes Due, Too

O. B. Jacobs, Coke County tax assessor-collector, said Wednesday morning that 634 persons have registered to vote in elections which will be held in 1967. Jacobs emphasized that everyone between the ages of 21 and 60 must have a registration certificate in order to vote in any election held this year.

Deadline for obtaining the certificates is Tuesday, Jan. 31. He pointed out that young people who will become 21 any time during this year must obtain certificates before the deadline.

New Law Questioned

Judge Herman Jones of Austin recently ruled that the constitutional amendment abolishing the poll tax in Texas is unconstitutional. However, Attorney General Crawford Martin said he would appeal the decision to the Texas Supreme Court.

Meanwhile, in the period while the matter is pending, the voter registration law will continue in effect. Jacobs talked with officials in the attorney general's office and was instructed to carry out the original plans for voter registration during the remainder of this month.

Citizens of this county who are 60 years of age and older do not have to register, Jacobs said.

Taxes Due, Too

Jacobs said he would like to remind Coke County property owners that state and county taxes are due in January, also. If they are not paid by Jan. 31, they become delinquent and the taxpayer will have to pay a penalty and interest in order to redeem his property.

City and school officials announced that taxes levied by their institutions are also due by Jan. 31, and thereafter will become delinquent.

PRANKSTERS WARNED ABOUT DAMAGING U. S. MAIL BOXES

Mailboxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment, postmasters in this area warned recently in a statement for the press.

The postmasters noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

The postmasters quoted from the law: "Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or wilfully or maliciously

injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

They said this applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property.

"Pranksters — and especially children who do not know better — should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions," the statement said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank."

Often the mailbox damage is the work of youths, who do it for "kicks." And the courts have shown little sympathy for this youthful means of expression. In Michigan, a justice sentenced two 18-year olds to 10 days in jail, including two on a diet of baby food. The diet specification, explained the judge, was because the youths "acted like babies." They were also fined \$25 each plus \$15 costs.

In New York state, five youths were fined \$25 each plus restitution or restoration, plus no driving for an indefinite period, plus an 8 p.m. curfew, plus a written analysis by each of a magazine article entitled "A Judge Gets Tough on Hoodlums."

Two Iowa youths who damaged 39 mailboxes were required to personally apologize to each boxholder in addition to making repairs or providing a new box.

In Missouri, three 17-year olds lost their driving privileges, were given a 9 p.m. curfew, and had to report twice weekly to juvenile authorities. They had damaged 63 mailboxes.

And in Arkansas, four juveniles faced the following: (1) no driving until further notice, (2) a 10 p.m. curfew, (3) return to court in a month with letters from their school principals reporting on grades and attitudes, (4) full restoration of all damages, and (5) wear a sign for 30 days stating "I have not learned to respect the property of others."

Anyone tempted is reminded that this is a federal offense.

Jury Reduces Price Paid Montgomery

A six-man jury last week lowered the amount awarded Montgomery Sand & Gravel some \$32,000 in a condemnation suit brought by the Colorado River Municipal Water District. The original suit was heard last September by a commission, and the sand and gravel firm was awarded \$84,262 for its properties along the Colorado River which will be included in the land needed for the lake being built by CRMWD.

The jury's decision to lower the award to \$52,000 came in county court after both plaintiff and defendant filed objections to the commission's decision. The jury decided that CRMWD should recover \$32,262 at six per cent interest.

The case was heard in Judge W. W. Thetford's county court. Members of the jury were James A. Wells, James Allen, Royce Fancher and J. B. Morrow, all of Bronte; Fred McCabe Jr. of Divide community; and Frank Demere Jr. of Water Valley.

CRMWD was represented in the suit by Frank Dickey Sr. of Robert Lee and Rosser & Carroll of Snyder, while P. B. Shannon represented Montgomery.

Another condemnation suit, CRMWD vs. Weldon Gordon, has also been appealed and will be heard at a later date, Judge Thetford said.

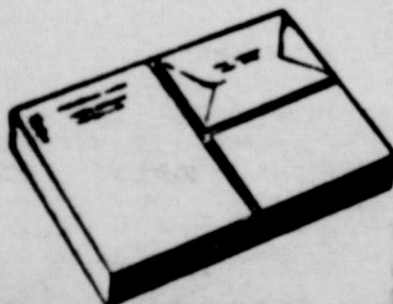

Accident Record Worse In 1966

Coke County auto accident record in 1966 was worse on all counts than the 1965 figures.

Viewing the cold figures below, it is difficult to visualize the pain, blood and heartache that accompanied the 65 accidents which occurred in this county.

Total accidents in 1966 were 65, compared to 60 in 1965. Two persons were killed while only one met death in an auto in 1965. There were 15 personal injury accidents in 1966 in which 22 persons were hurt, compared to 14 which injured 18 the year before.

Property damage accidents reached a total of 48 last year, doing \$54,101 in damage, compared to the 1965 figures which show 45 accidents with the cost amounting to \$30,076.

Tom Green and Val Verde counties led this sub-district of the Department of Public Safety with nine deaths in each county. Two counties reported no deaths in 1966, while three reported one fatality.

Voc. Ag. Boys Build Greenhouse

The vocational agriculture department at Bronte High School is doing some expansion work, in preparation for giving students some experience in horticultural work. The boys and their sponsor, J. T. Henry, have a small greenhouse under construction on the south end of the campus.

Henry said this week that the project is a double-barrelled one: it will give his students experience in construction during the time they are building the greenhouse, and then will provide a place for them to raise plants during the cold months of the year.

The boys will start out raising some tomato and pepper plants, Henry said. "We're going slow on this project," he added "for none of us has had much experience in the greenhouse business. We'll just kinda ease our way into it."

Color Important in Decorating

When it comes to decorating, don't be afraid of color! Many homemakers feel it takes an expert to choose a color scheme and carry it out successfully in a room.

Many new decorator fabrics are inexpensive, yet well designed. So if you aren't sure of yourself when it comes to choosing a color scheme, you can follow the fabric designer's lead.

Plan your decor around the colors in the fabric. For instance, select one pretty cotton print for curtains or slipcovers. Use the predominant background color in the print for walls and rugs, the largest room areas.

Choose two or three of the other colors in the fabric, and repeat them in chair covers, painted tables, or other room furnishings. The print may have small touches of a vivid accent color, like red, electric blue, even white. You can pick up this accent color in small accessories — pillows, flowers, or lamps.

Home Economics Briefs

INSTANT FRUIT — Research has brought another convenience product to the homemaker — instant fruit. Peaches, strawberries and blueberries are reduced to a puree to which sugar and chemicals are added. The puree is frozen into pellets which are dehydrated by a freeze-drying process. This removes moisture from the pellets without changing their physical characteristics. Fruits that are too mature for shipping may be successfully used in the process.

DRESS TIPS — If you keep your hats in boxes on shelves, and it's a good idea, cut a small panel out of the front of each box and cover with cellophane. That will let you select the hat you want without opening all the boxes.
