Bronte High School's two entries in last weekend's state track meet at Austin brought home a fourth and sixth place.

Brian Richards was declared fourth place winner in the shot put event after he tossed the heavy ball 51 feet 8½ inches.

Doug McCutchen was named

sixth place winner in discus competition with a throw of 134 feet and one-half inch.

Gary Stroebel was Bronte's only other entry in the state meet. He entered the science contest, but failed to place in the top three.

POOL TO OPEN MAY 20; READY FOR PARTIES

Bronte's county operated swimming pool will officially open Saturday, May 20, according to Dick Cooper, park caretaker. Cooper said the pool is in good shape and is ready for use any time.

He said he will open it "any time now" for special parties and groups, but it will not be open to the general public until a week from Saturday.

Cooper said he would like to contact somebody who is qualified or is willing to attend classes and become qualified, to teach swimming classes this summer. Anyone who is interested in teaching is invited to contact Cooper.

Bronte Receives 1.4 Inches Rain

A long awaited rain fell in the Bronte area late last week, and while it was not as much as was needed, it helped the droughty situation of this area considerably.

The first and heaviest rain in Bronte fell late Thursday afternoon when a measurement of 1.1 inch was recorded. Another cloud which "looked like it ought to

have rained the bottom out" came through here Friday night but dumped only .3 inch, to bring the two-day total to 1.4 inches.

The rain Thursday was accompanied by pea size hail, but no damage was reported. The rain fell in a deluge and lasted only a short time, but it set water to running everywhere.

The same storm system moved on to the Abilene and Eden areas where it dumped tremendous quantities of hail. Damage at Abilene was estimated at \$6 million, while the estimate at Eden was placed at \$129,000.

This week has seen temperatures climb to unseasonable highs. The San Angelo Weather Bureau reported a Tuesday high of 105, and Bronte was not far under that figure. The weather for Thursday called for continued high temperatures above the 100 degree mark.

Lake Smith Rites Held Wednesday

Funeral services for Lake E. Smith, 77, prominent Coke County stockfarmer, were held Wednesday at 3 p.m. at First Baptist Church in Bronte. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Smith was found dead on his tractor at his farm about 3 p.m. Monday. He apparently suffered a heart attack. The farm is located about 12 miles southwest of Bronte and about 12 miles southeast of Robert Lee.

Mr. Smith was born Nov. 12, 1889, in Mississippi, the former home of his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Smith, before they moved to West Texas. He would have been born in Coke County, but since there were no medical facilities in the county his mother returned to her home in Mississippi for the birth of her child. She did not return here until he was about nine months old.

He was married to Miss Eula Cook at Goodnight, Texas, Dec. 8, 1915. They were both students at old Goodnight College when they met. After their marriage, they returned to Coke County, where Mr. Smith was actively engaged in farming and ranching until his death.

Mr. Smith was a member of First Baptist Church in Bronte and Hayrick Masonic Lodge in Robert Lee.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Finnell Smith of Robert Lee and James D. Smith of Guyton, Okla.; a daughter, Mrs. Billy J. (Eula Fay) Blair of Robert Lee; a brother, J. J. S. Smith of Sweetwater; six sisters, Mrs. Susie Thomas of Dallas, Mrs. Jamie Davis of Waco, Mrs. Rebecca Sherrill of Pecos, Mrs. Mary Golden of Lubbock, Mrs. Clementine Johnson of Marshall and Mrs. Duvergne Campbell of Claude; and five grandchildren.

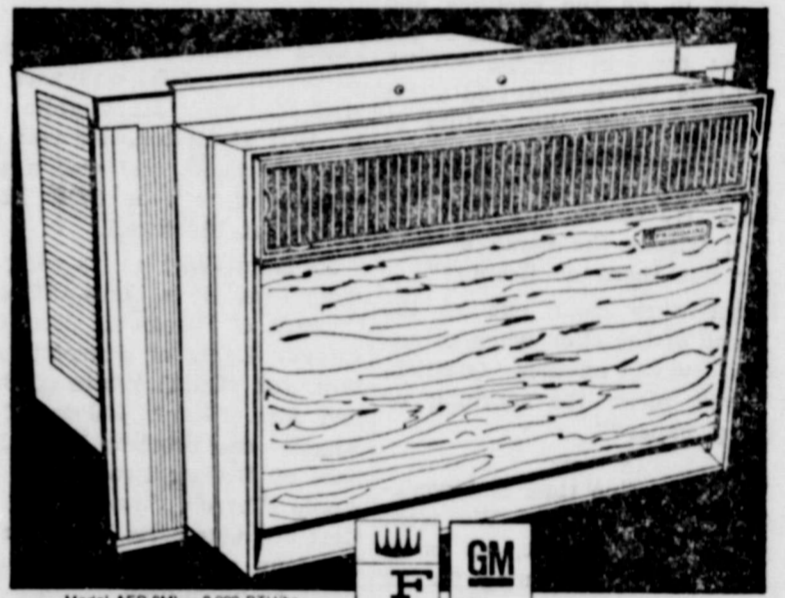

Paving Contract Goes to Ballinger Man

A contract for 9,462 miles on F. M. Road 2662 in Coke County has been awarded to a Ballinger, Texas firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

F. A. Seidel submitted the low bid of \$194,239.61 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing is expected to take 120 working days, according to J. A. Snell District Highway Engineer at San Angelo.

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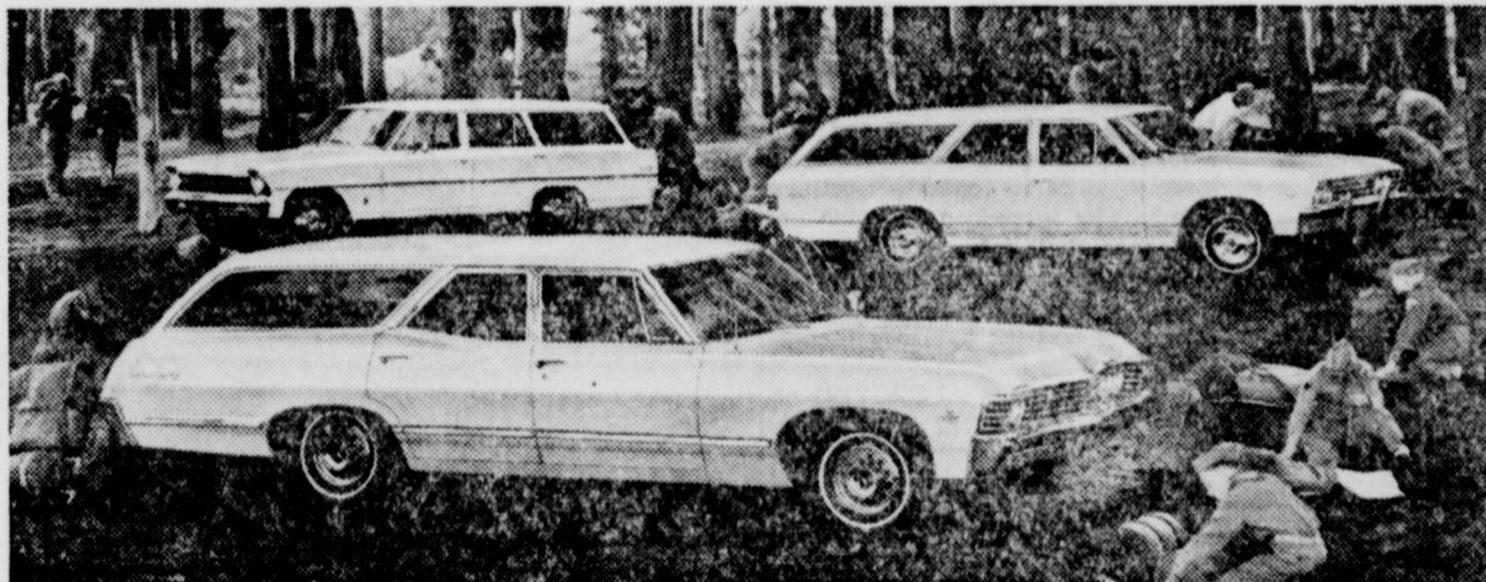
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LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 24th of May, 1967, the general service rates for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Bronte by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 800 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.760 gross; \$1.584 net.
 Next 1,200 cu. ft. @ \$1.482 per MCF gross; \$1.334 per MCF net
 Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ .927 per MCF gross; .834 per MCF net
 Next 20,000 cu. ft. @ .649 per MCF gross; .584 per MCF net
 Over 25,000 cu. ft. @ .593 per MCF gross; .534 per MCF net
 No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right, from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.

Knowing a Good Egg

You'll never know just by looking at the outside shell whether an egg is good. It takes a look inside to really show.

There's a big supply of eggs on the market now at reasonable prices. But, how can you know the eggs you buy are good? The Consumer and Marketing Service says the U. S. Department of Agriculture grade shield on the carton is a good indication of qual-

ity. Graders in the plants using this shield are experts at determining how good an egg is. They check the shells for good condition, but they also "candle" the eggs, allowing them to look through the shells for signs of quality.

You can use eggs graded AA (fresh fancy) or A for all purposes, but they are especially good for frying and poaching where appearance is important. Grade B eggs may be lower priced, and they are good for general cooking and baking where appearance is not important.

Within each grade there may be some eggs that look different from others. Here are some of the most common questions homemakers ask about eggs, and answered furnished by USDA:

Are eggs getting smaller? Consumers sometimes observe that today's broken-out eggs seem to be small. They point out that eggs do not cover as large an area in the frying pan as they once did, but this does not mean that they weigh less.

A broken-out high quality egg covers a small area. The thick white is large in amount and stands high and firm around the yolk. As the egg is stored, the amount of thick white decreases

and the egg tends to spread and cover more surface.

Egg sizes (large, medium, and small) have not changed. Weight classifications have been the same since 1930. We are marketing more large, extra-large and jumbo size eggs these days.

Why are some hard-cooked eggs difficult to peel? Frequently, shells do not peel easily from hard-cooked eggs. This condition is related to the freshness of eggs. As eggs are stored, they lose carbon dioxide and become easier to peel when hard-cooked. The consumer should understand that eggs which will not peel easily when hard-cooked are freshly laid and generally of high quality. Eggs that have been stored for several days will usually peel easily.

What are the stringy white pieces in egg white? These are perfectly normal components of eggs — the chalazas. The chalaza is the thick, white rope-like material which appears on opposite sides of the yolk during the formation of the egg. They anchor the yolk in the thick white. Presence of prominent chalazas indicate high quality eggs. As eggs become poorer in quality, the chalazas tend to disappear. However, eggs may have small chalazas and still be of high quality.

Some users, mistakenly thinking that chalazas are evidence of fertile eggs, very diligently pick them out. This is not necessary, as the chalazas are normal, wholesome parts of the egg white.

Vegetables — Convenience Foods
Many fresh vegetables are actually "convenience foods." More and more they are washed carefully before they are packaged in film bags or banded.

Immature carrots needn't even be peeled; just rinse, inspect, and lop off the stem and a bit of the root. Summer squash shouldn't be peeled; just rinse and slice.

Cabbage and head lettuce should be up-ended under the cold water faucet for a minute, then cut in wedges or chopped coarsely for brief cooking. Sweet corn is a quick cooker when dunked into a pan of boiling water. Tomato halves, seasoned and butter-dabbed, broil in two or three minutes.

Most vegetables are as good raw as cooked. Cauliflower, cucumbers, sweet peppers and onions — dry or green — are samples. Most homemakers overcook vegetables, probably because we've always had plenty of fuel. Not only can the total preparation time of most fresh vegetables be lessened by cooking only until crisp and tender, flavor and texture are much better for it, too.

Some homemakers take it for granted that it is very time consuming to prepare fresh vegetables. They are over-conscious of a few stems or skins, many of which are edible.

Good quality fresh vegetables this week include asparagus, cabbage, carrots, celery, corn, cooking greens, potatoes, onions, and lettuce. Squash, tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers are showing damage from excess water (in some growing areas) and prices may be up on these.

Views Given On Enlarging UCRA

Austin — The Texas Water Rights Commission gave its views Tuesday of a House bill which would expand the Upper Colorado River Authority, which presently includes Tom Green and Coke counties.

The water rights group suggested that the bill require any new county wishing to join the UCRA hold an election on the issue. Counties added to the authority under the House bill would be Sterling, Irion, Kimble, Men-

ard, Concho, McCullough, Mason, Runnels and Coleman.

The bill provides that any county joining later would join by election.

The commission also suggested that the bill's language be clarified to state that the operation and permits of the authority continue under the supervision of the Texas Water Rights Commission. The commission's report was submitted to the Senate, the House and the Governor.

County Agents News Column

By STERLING LINDSEY

The pecan casebearer situation still looks about the same — about ten days ahead of the usual development pace, and our most recent reports from over the State indicate the same situation.

I have checked several locations in and around Robert Lee. My findings show the casebearer, as a whole, to be about eight to ten days away from the time to begin spraying to control them. I found numerous twigs and two larvae in twigs. When the casebearer emerges from the twig as an adult, it matures, then begins to lay eggs on the small nutlets. This maturing period plus the egg hatching period, depending on the weather, usually takes about ten days. Cool weather would lengthen the period, more hot weather would speed up the process.

If the trees we checked are representative, then the time to spray should be between May 15 and May 20. Usually, in a year like this one, two spray applications are much better. I would make one between May 15 and May 18, the second one about five to seven days later.

Several factors can influence the results you will obtain from spraying. First, the application must be timed to hit the peak hatch period. You must catch the worm or larvae before he goes in the nutlet to stay.

Secondly, you must use enough pressure to part the leaves and get the spray on the nuts. The casebearer travels very little and wetting the nut cluster is needed to control him.

Thirdly, respray if rains (hard half inch or more) comes the first two or three days after you spray.

And a fourth item — making two spray applications five to seven days apart in erratic years usually gives good dividends. The hatch period is more spread out in years like this one.

I would add zinc sulfate to the spray mix. This will help fight the bunch growth in your trees. Numerous trees around are showing this type growth this year. This indicates a slight zinc deficiency.

As for the control chemicals to use, there are a number of them on the market. Thiodan, DDT, Parathion, Malathion, Toxaphene, guthion and nicotine sulfate in the correct strengths have all given good control of casebearers. If you would like a copy of the Extension Service guide showing these compounds and the strength formations, give us a ring.

We will try to give you more on the period of the casebearers' development next week, if possible. By then we should be seeing some more positive signs.

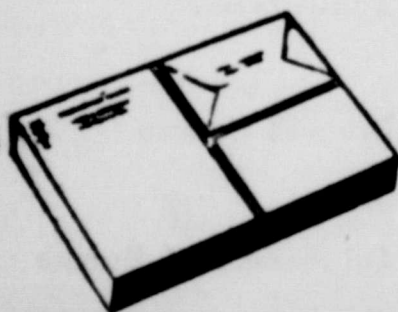
