### Lawmakers learn

## Changes needed in new school laws

Nearly everyone attending the school reform meeting in Dimmitt Monday night agreed that some changes are needed in the education package passed by the state legislature, and State Senator Bill Sarpalius promised that some of the items will come before the January session of the legislature.

Sarpalius attended the meeting, arranged by Hart School Superintendent Ted Averitt and School Board President Harold Bob Bennett, along with State Representative Pete Laney and State School Board appointee Dr. Paul Dunn of Levelland.

Personnel from all three school districts in the county participated in the meeting,

presenting areas of concern to the panel of three men.

Many in the audience were teachers and administrators, as well as parents and school board members. A question and answer session was included at the end of the program.

Areas raising the most concern involved competency testing of teachers, the career ladder, student failure and drop-out rate, and the increased load of paperwork for teachers.

Claims of discouraging better students from taking more difficult courses and encouraging drop outs were leveled against the new extracurricular activity rules.

Nazareth Supt. Johnny Mason said that if the eligibility requirements that will go into effect Jan. 1 were operating now, nine members of Nazareth's undefeated football team would be unable to continue the season. (The rules say that if a student is failing in any subject in a six-week period, he or she will be ineligible to participate in any extracurricular activity for the following six weeks.)

"If we don't allow some of these borderline students to participate in anything, they won't care about school at all and many will drop out,"

## Amstar sale may come next week

Officials from Amstar-Spreckels Division, and American Maize-American Fructose Company are expected to be in Dimmitt sometime next week to finalize the agreement for transfer of operations of Amstar's Dimmitt plant to American Fructose.

American Fructose is 65% owned by American Maize Products; the remainder of the American Fructose stock is publicly traded.

Amstar Dimmitt plant manager Randy Holme said, "We anticipate Spreckels division corporate management, and officers from American Maize-American Fructose to be in town sometime next week to close the agreement."

The \$50 million deal was announced July 22 by Doug Lapins, vice-president of the Spreckels division, and Pat McLaughlin, president of American Maize-Products Co. Corn Processing Division. The addition of the Dimmitt plant to the American Fructose processing arm of American Maize will increase AFC's high-fructose syrup capacity by 75%. The Dimmitt plant produces 300 million pounds of high fructose corn syrup per year. An AFC plant in Decatur, Ala. produces 400 million pounds annually, but is being expanded to increase production to 550 million pounds annually. Future expansion is a possibility for the Dimmitt plant, according to McLaughlin, who, in an earlier visit to Dimmitt, said AFC was looking for room to expand when it started the process of buying the Dimmitt plant.

## Hereford trucker is killed

A 26-year-old Hereford man was killed Halloween night when his tractor-trailer rig failed to negotiate a curve 11 miles north of Dimmitt on US 385.

David Stanley York was pronounced dead at the scene Wednesday night by Castro County Justice of the Peace Marshall Young.

According to Department of Public Safety troopers and the Castro County Sheriff's office, no cause for the accident has been determined.

York's semi-trailer rig was northbound when York failed to negotiate the wide curve at the intersection of US 385 and two county roads. The trailer jackknifed, then rolled over the cab, crushing York underneath.

The truck, loaded with cot-

ton seed, then burst into flames. Units from the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. were rushed to the scene to extinguish the blaze. A front-end loader was called to the scene to out-load the remaining cotton seed before the loader, two wreckers, and a winch truck could upright the 38,000-lb. trailer.

The truck was owned by Lloyd Newton Trucking Co. of Hereford.

## Two convicted for forgeries

Two Dimmitt residents were found guilty of forgery last Thursday in 64th District court.

Rebecca Lopez Martinez, 27, was found guilty of forgery by passing last Thursday afternoon after six hours deliberation. Martinez testified that she cashed a \$350 check at Taylor & Sons Food Store, and deposited a check for \$500 into her checking account at a Dimmitt financial institution.

The two checks were refused payment because the account on which the checks were written had been closed in 1975.

Evidence showed the checks were removed by unknown persons from a storage house in Dimmitt, and had been cashed.

The jury deliberated only 20 minutes in the punishment phase, and sentenced Martinez to three years felony probation and a \$1,000 probation fine. Martinez was ordered to make restitution of \$927.21.

Donnie Earl Robinson, 19, was found guilty of forgery Thursday night after four

hours deliberation, but a hung jury resulted in the trial after the jury decided, after deliberating for 90 minutes, that the minimum two year penitentiary sentence was not proper in a case involving a \$32 check.

Robinson was identified as passing the check, written by a local businessperson to the Azteca Corporation, at Taylor & Sons. The businessman and his employee testified that Robinson did not have their permission to cash the check, and evidence showed that another check was issued to Azteca after payment was stopped by the businessman.

Following release of the jury, Robinson pleaded guilty to aggravated perjury as the result of a sworn statement under oath that he had never before been convicted of a felony. 64th District Court Judge Jack Miller sentenced Robinson to three years in the Texas Department of Corrections. Robinson was not eligible for probation, because of two earlier felony convictions.

## Bobcats, Swifts aim for playoffs

Dimmitt will be trying to advance into the playoffs for the first time since 1976, while the Nazareth Swifts will try to capture the District 2-A North Zone top seed Friday night, in the two teams last regular season game.

The Swifts have already wrapped up a shot at one of the top teams in the 2-A South Zone, but, for the Bobcats, it's a must win game against Idalou.

Hart, eliminated from post-season play after district 3-AA losses to Abernathy and Hale Center, will end its season at Olton.

### IDALOU AT DIMMITT

Most football jargon sounds like its coming straight out of the Pentagon—and, when Coach Clifford Smith of Dimmitt talks about Idalou, you'd think he was discussing a battle plan against, well, Genghis Khan.

"They've got a spear-thrower, and a spear catcher," Smith said. Quarterback Jim Pruitt "throws like a rocket launcher, and wing-back Stacy Phillips can catch everything he throws. Tailback Isaac Jackson is one of the best running backs around. He's up there right around (Littlefield's Steve) Greene. He may not be quite in the same class, but they don't take very long to call roll in Jackson's class. And fullback Steve Williams runs like a tank."

Idalou's defense features a refrigerator and a baby refrigerator. Wilbanks is the baby refrigerator at linebacker, and Jack Sparks (defensive tackle) is the refrigerator. He's going to weigh about 230 lbs., and he's going to be as

easy to block as a Kelvinator. Their entire secondary was a regional qualifier in the sprint relay. They are really quick."

Idalou's only loss in district play came against Littlefield, 21-14. Littlefield had several turnovers in the game, keeping the green-clad Wildcats in the contest. Tulia came

within four points of upsetting Idalou one week before the Bobcats won over the Hornets, 10-6.

The winner will go on to play Perryton, winner of District 1-3A, next week. For the loser, it's time to hang up the pads and get the roundballs out.

# Canterbury Villa seeking more community support

"We'd just like some support from the community."

Melba Sanders is the administrator at Canterbury Villa, formerly known as South Hills Manor. The facility was purchased last week by Texas Health Enterprises, Inc., a subsidiary of Health Enterprises of America, Inc., based in Warren, Ohio. Texas Health, headquartered in Grand Prairie, operates facilities in Texas and Oklahoma.

The facility has now changed hands three times within a year. Some of the former owners have left a bad taste in the mouth of the business community. Sanders says that is already changing.

"I can't say enough for the people that have stuck with South Hill Manor, in spite of some of the practices of some former owners. Midwest Health Care (the corporation that sold the facility to Texas Health) did not leave owing any local merchants any money, but I understand that some previous owners abused their credit," Sanders said.

"We've had some people come in here who were nothing more than high-rollers," Sanders explained. "We really have some problems. We can't get credit, even though we have different owners, at a lot of business places. We have to pay cash. That's okay if the patients are well enough off to pay for medication themselves, but I've had to pay out of my own pocket for some of the indigents we care for here."

Sanders explained that Texas Health has arranged a "petty cash" account for Sanders to use to pay smaller bills, "but anything major has to go through the corporation. I know for certain they don't have any problems paying bills elsewhere, and I know they won't have any problems here. We have had great cooperation from several merchants here, some folks who have extended a helping hand, like Jerry Kittrell, Marvin Bryant, Bill Henderson, and Walt Hansen. But one businessman, and I won't say who it is, doesn't even want cash business. He doesn't want anything to do with us. We can't get credit from the stores where we need it most, like hardware and drug stores. But, at least they will accept our cash business. It's just that no one will really deal with us on anything major."

"We'll try to co-operate with anyone in town," Sanders said. Charges have been involved that Canterbury Villa is providing sub-standard care, a charge Sanders refutes vigorously.

"The Texas Department of Health is just as happy as they could be with us. There are absolutely no deficiencies in the patient care area. Ralph Harmon, the regional administrator for Region I of TDH said just the other day, 'The only thing wrong with Canterbury Villa is public relations in the community,'" Sanders said.

"I still do not understand why there are still people in the community who feel there is a need to build a new, county-

owned facility, and to close us down," Sanders said. "They would have to obtain a certificate of need, and with as many beds as we have available, it sure would seem unlikely a certificate of need could be obtained."

Canterbury Villa has a total capacity of 118 beds, but is only 72% occupied. The maximum was reached several years ago, at 93%, but that was before construction of facilities at Friona, Farwell and Muleshoe that restricted the available patient flow.

"There were many patients here from Parmer and Bailey counties that were moved closer to home when the other facilities opened," Sanders said. "There were a lot of folks who, I guess, were disenchanted and moved their folks to those places, or to Hereford. But we're getting some of those people back, people from Dimmitt who belong here."

A recent addition to the staff was Larry Johnson, LVN, the new director of nursing. Johnson is a 24-year health professional, and recently moved to Dimmitt from Lubbock. Johnson's wife, Magdalena, is a nurse's aide at the facility.

"We've been genuinely surprised by the friendliness of everyone in the city," Johnson said. "The difference between the people here and a city like Lubbock, or other places, is like the difference between night and day."

Johnson, when asked if he had run into any problems because of moves to build another facility, and to close down Canterbury Villa, asked what was meant by the question.

"I haven't run into any alienation because of where I work at all. Everyone's been so nice. One of the doctors called me on his own the other day, and invited me in just to drink coffee and shoot the breeze. This is a good facility, and we have good people on hand. I like it."

Sanders seconded the notion. We're not out here to make a

big profit. We're here to provide for our city's elderly. There are a lot of things done here for our patients' well-being that aren't done at a lot of places. It's rewarding."

Averitt said. "As long as they stay in school we can try to help them as much as possible, but there is nothing we can do if they don't come."

Similar complaints were connected to the five unexcused absence rule. School personnel asked what could be done with students who have already accrued five unexcused absences.

"They feel that if they are already declared failing, why should they bother with coming to school every day. They won't even make an effort if they feel it won't do any good, and many will drop out," Bennett said.

Dr. Dunn replied that the state board is considering a system to allow a student to come in during the tutorial sessions to do make-up work to erase unexcused absences.

Remarks from local teachers centered on the amount of paperwork required by many of the new rules and regulations.

Documentation of mastery of the essential elements must be kept for every student in addition to writing lesson plans on top of all the regular grading of papers. Many teachers across the state have complained of staying up late every night and having to neglect their own families to complete all the paperwork, Dr. Dunn said.

"Gov. Mark White has asked the state board to help work for a reduction in paperwork for teachers," Dr. Dunn said. "There must be some flexibility in the requirements, especially in the lower grades."

Dunn said that elementary students may not have to have a 70 average in every subject area, but rather an overall 70 average in order to be promoted. He also noted that the board recommends retaining a student only twice, with further placement to be determined by the principal.

Competency testing for teachers was attacked as "a great insult" to teachers everywhere.

"There is no way to test a teacher's love and concern for students, their motivational skills or their dedication," Dimmitt Supt. Robert Ryan said.

Dr. Dunn said that the state board's interpretation of the law is to test teachers only in their knowledge of the subject area in which they teach.

"In some areas of the state, teachers are only one page ahead of the students," Dr. Dunn said. "But we realize

that some teachers could fail the exam and still be excellent teachers and others could pass easily and not be able to teach their way out of a paper bag."

Sarpalius said that he plans to aid in presenting a bill in January to do away with competency testing completely. He noted that it is the responsibility of the local school board to hire and fire teachers and they should be able to determine competency.

Mason said that college testing and the teaching certification tests should be sufficient.

"To take away a teacher's certification without due process is an insult," Mason said. "Other vocations do not require re-testing once certification has been gained."

Teachers remarked that the career ladder provisions are certain to promote jealousy among teachers.

"Our original proposal was not that bad, but the legislature made a disaster out of it when they included quotas," Sarpalius said. "The rules say if you do this and this, then you qualify; BUT we only have so much money so not everyone who qualifies can have it. That's bad."

Sarpalius said he is working on a bill to rework the ladder to make it more of a system of rewarding teachers who excel and go above and beyond in their efforts.

Dunn agreed with teachers who remarked that the new tutorial system was a long-needed change that has been welcomed by teachers and students alike.

Commenting from the audience, Sara Hill said that many of the changes were good, but the state needs to let the independent school districts remain independent.

Laney emphasized to Dr. Dunn that care needs to be taken to protect the integrity of the rural schools. It was noted that many of the changes will be hardest on small schools and leeway needs to be given in many areas.

more boxes than ever before in races that were among the tightest ever in a general election.

Republican John Thomas Henderson won or tied in six county boxes, but incumbent Mack Wallace carried the county in the Railroad Commission race, 1,672-1,076. In the Supreme Court Chief Justice race, John L. Bates out-pollied Democrat John Hill in two precincts and fell just one vote short in two others. Hill carried the county, 1,799-1,018. The only other contested partisan race, between democrat Sam Houston Clinton and republican Virgil E. Mulanax for Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, was even tighter, with Mulanax ahead or tied in eight precincts. Clinton carried the county, 1,530-1,149.

Castro County sided with the rest of the state on six of the eight constitutional amendments. Amendment No. 3, which would provide for benefits for survivors of public servants, was defeated in the county by 199 votes. Amendment No. 5, which would allow the state senate to appoint a successor to the Lt. Governor, was voted down by 13 votes, but was carried by the state. County and state voters favored propositions 1, 2, 4, and 7, while turning down propositions 6 and 8.

Billy Hackleman was the leading vote-getter in the uncontested local races. The county tax assessor-collector got 2,278 votes. New county commissioners Curtis Snitker, of Hart, and Jeff Robertson, of Dimmitt, received 526 votes and 450 votes, respectively. Sheriff Lonny Rhynes tallied 2,222 votes, while county attorney Jimmy Davis got 2,151 votes.

In state offices, Pete Laney was returned to the 85th District state representative seat with 1,994 votes in the county, while state senator Bill

Sarpalius received 2,126 votes. A total of 3,058 ballots were cast, out of 4,737 registered voters, a turnout of 64.6%.

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
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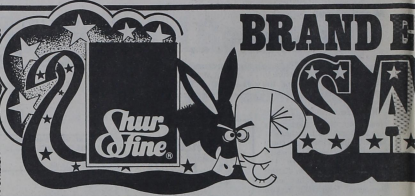
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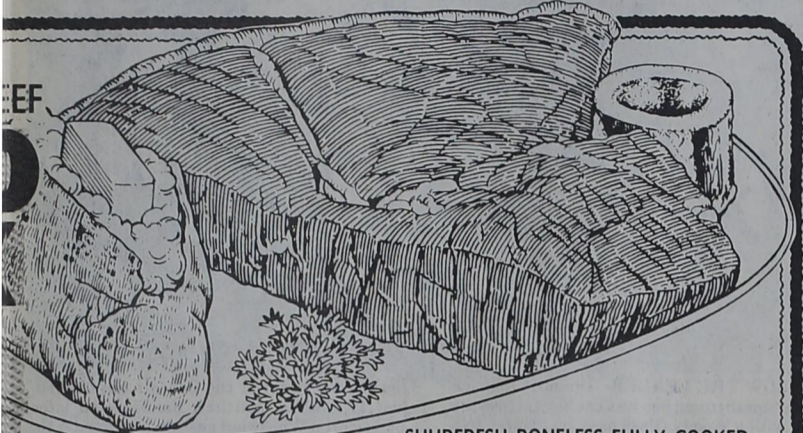

## Bobcats blow past Whirlwinds, 27-0

The last time it happened there, John F. Kennedy was president of the United States. The last time it happened anywhere, Richard Nixon had just defeated Hubert Humphrey for president. George Orwell's book about "Big Brother" watching over everyone's shoulder was a piece of fiction.

Welcome to 1984. Despite what Dimmitt coach Clifford Smith said was "an effort that was disappointing at times," the Dimmitt Bobcats defeated the Floydada Whirlwinds for only the fourth time in 19 tries, 27-0 Friday night at Floydada.

The win sets up a battle with Idalou for a playoff spot at Bobcat Stadium Friday night.

"Mark Coker did his best job of the year," Smith said. Coker rushed 21 times for 115 yards and a touchdown for the Bobcats, now 6-3 on the year. The score came with 8:14 left in the game, culminating a 13-play drive set up by a Joe Alvarez interception at the Bobcat 20.

Coker picked up 69 yards on the drive, and would have had

more, except for a holding penalty at the Bobcat 39 one play after he had picked up 18 yards off tackle. The tailback got Dimmitt back to a fourth-and-one at its own 44, and when Floydada jumped offside, the Bobcats were set up for the score.

It was the first of two second half scores, and came much later than most Bobcat fans figured, considering the flurry of points just before halftime that gave Dimmitt a 13-0 cushion.

The Bobcats had the ball for exactly 10:00 of the first quarter, allowing the Whirlwinds just four snaps in the period. With 7:17 left in the opening quarter, the Bobcats kept the ball for the rest of the period on a 16-play drive. The Bobcats bogged down as the period ended, and called on Bobby Nino for a 23-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter.

Floydada, much like Dimmitt, was hurt by penalties at the most inopportune time throughout the game. Three times, the Whirlwinds kept Dimmitt drives alive with

defensive penalties, but eight turnovers by Floydada aided the Bobcats.

The first turnover was linebacker Eddie Jordan's second interception in two games. It led to the Bobcats first touchdown.

A Woody Glass pass to Nathan Nelson gave the Bobcats a first down at the Dimmitt 47, but Glass was sacked at the 40 on the next play. Glass called another pass on the next snap, and was almost sacked at his own 40, but ducked wide open at the Whirlwind 45. Smothermon twice reversed his field, picked up a convoy of blockers, and raced to the end zone. Nino's PAT put the Bobcats up by 10 with 1:11 left in the half.

Three plays after the kickoff, quarterback Haney Robertson dropped the snap on the ground, at Nino's feet. After Coker picked up nothing on first down, the Bobcats stopped the clock with :02 left. Nino's field goal attempt was partially blocked, but sailed like a wounded mallard over the crossbar, clearing the post with less than a foot to spare.

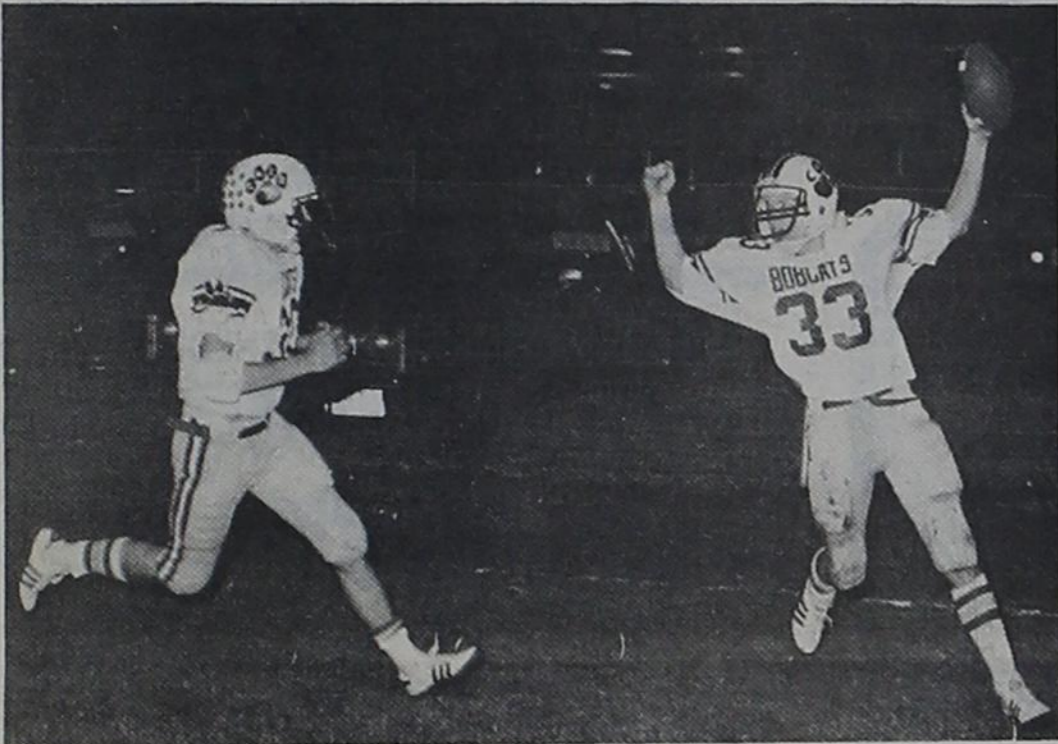

 Nine in a row, one to go!  
 The Nazareth Swifts came one step closer to a perfect regular season Friday night with a 34-13 win over the Kress Kangaroos at Kress.

The win guaranteed the Swifts a zone playoff berth, but Nazareth must defeat Farwell Friday night for the number one seed.

Nazareth hurt its own cause with five lost fumbles, and two of the turnovers led to Kangaroo touchdowns. But the Swifts used a superior rushing attack to crunch the Kangaroos. 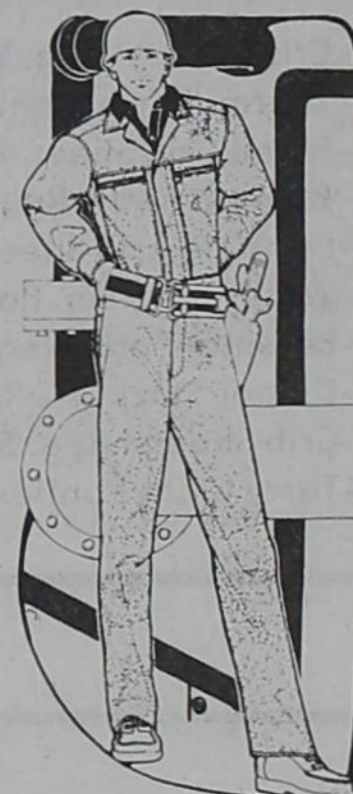

All are invited to attend.

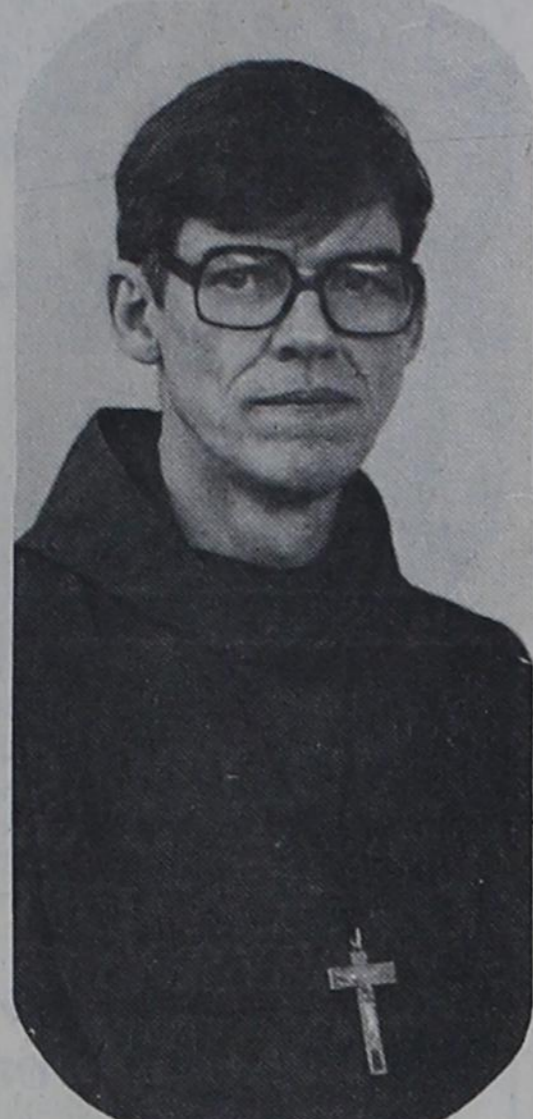

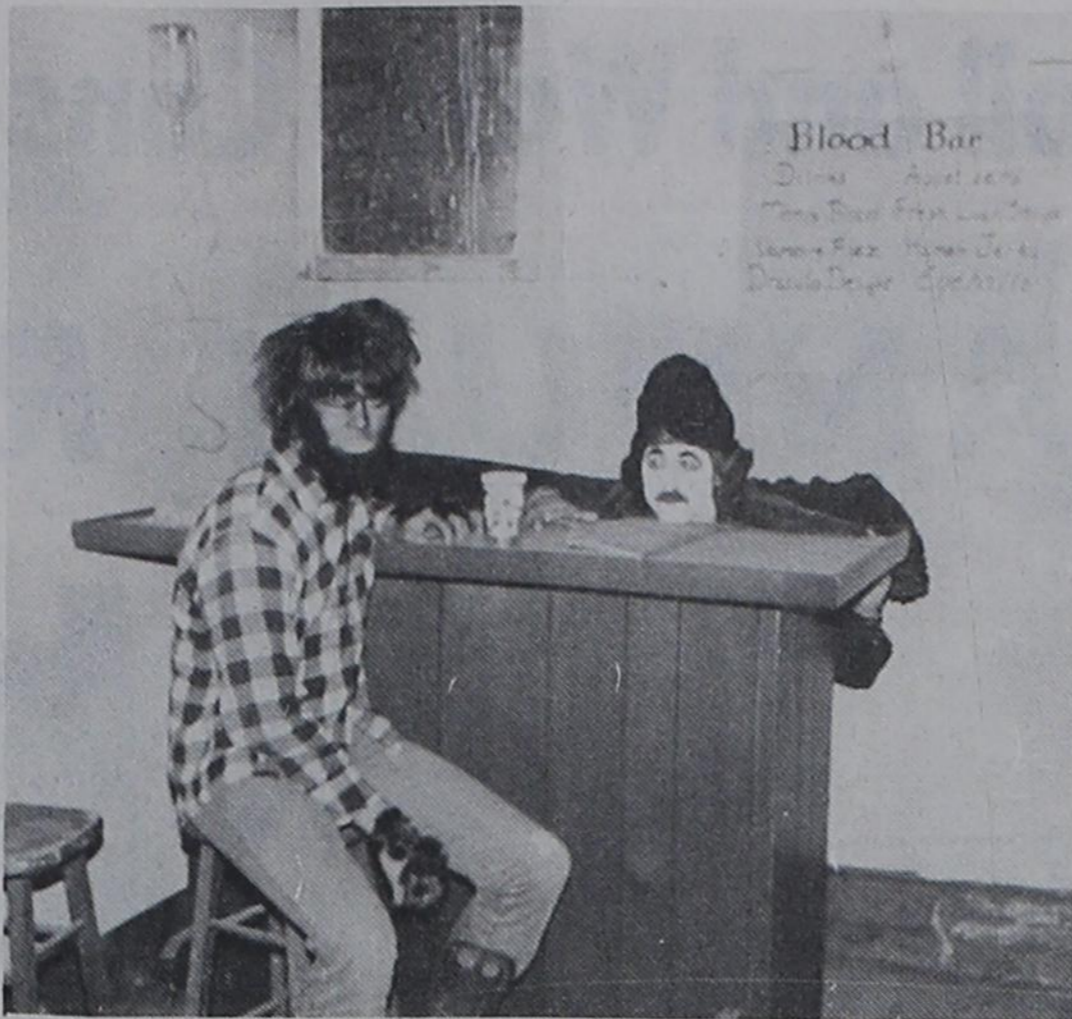

Aldermen okay airport increase

Commercial usage rates at the Dimmitt Municipal Airport will go up Jan. 1, after the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen okayed one of several recommendations of the Airport Advisory Board Monday night.

Wayne Proffitt, airport board secretary, told the aldermen the city will receive \$1,000 revenue annually from businesses who derive their income from using the airport.

The aldermen tabled consideration of a hike in hangar rentals at the airport. Proffitt

told the board he didn't think it was fair to raise rates for rental until improvements can be made around the hangars.

"We don't have any real problem with the west hangars, but there are just five of them in use. We have 10 hangars on the east side that are unusable for a week after just a light shower, because it's too muddy," Proffitt said. "We need to wait until we have some paving around those hangars before we go up on the rent."

Currently, the east hangars are renting for \$20 per month, while the newer facilities to the west are renting for \$40 per month. The airport board recommended last night to raise the rates to \$50 per month for the east hangars, and \$60 per month for the west hangars. The aldermen agreed last night to table consideration of the rent on the hangars until the Nov. 19 meeting.

Ten new hangars, to be built with funding from a Texas Aeronautics Commission loan, are expected to rent from between \$75-\$100 per month. The rent on those hangars, and the anticipated increase in existing hangar rental, will pay for the new facilities and expected paving.

The aldermen voted to release Amstar of any liability to the city once the sale of it's Dimmitt plant is consummated. The sale is expected to go through next week, with American Fructose Co. assuming all obligations.

The aldermen tabled consideration of the new Energas franchise agreement. The Energas franchise with the city

will expire next month, and alderman David Hays said, "We still have plenty of time before the franchise expires, and it would be in the city's best interest to give everyone a chance to do a little further research."

New Energas manager Kelvin Betzen presented the proposed franchise agreement, which would be in effect until 2009. Betzen, and former Dimmitt manager Bob Caddell, told the aldermen that Dimmitt is receiving about 1,020 BTU. The minimum required by the existing agreement, and proposed in the new franchise, is 800 BTU.

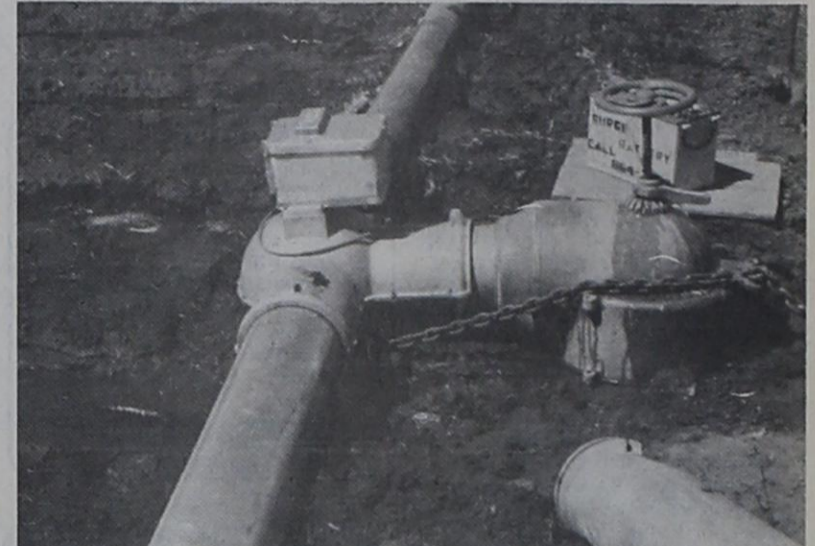

The Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District has had an outstanding year in carrying out a sound conservation program. There are 1000 operating units on 573,565 acres in Castro County. Of these 576 units are District Cooperators on 338,861 acres. The average size unit is 588 acres.

The land use in the county is 460,000 acres of cropland of which 330,000 acres are irrigated cropland. 1700 acres of pasture and hayland, 111,865 acres of rangeland and 2000 acres of otherland.

The district sponsored or co-sponsored the following informational activities during the year.

Published 4 District Newsletters, aired 25 radio programs and 2 TV programs on soil and water conservation, conducted 23 conservation presentations or talks with 1275 people in attendance. The District sponsored the Grass Demonstration Plot, held a Windbreak and Drip Irrigation Demonstration, Annual Windbreak Program, co-sponsored the Sugar Beet Tour, The Surge Demo Tour, and the County Farm Tour. The Running Water SWCD also had a booth at the Harvest Days Fair and held its annual Soil Judging Contest. The election for Director of Zone V was held in Hart, Director James Jackson was elected.

Each and every year the District sponsors Soil Stewardship Week. Materials for Soil Stewardship Week are delivered to nearly all of the churches of Castro County.

The Poster and Essay Contests went very well again this year. For the fourth year in a row, the District has had Regional winners. This year KDHN Radio Station won second place in Regional for the News Media Award. Without KDHN, the Castro County News, and the Hart Beat it would be very hard for the District to get the word of conservation to area farmers. We salute these News Media for their OUTSTANDING SERVICE.

The Board was consulted and assisted in the development of the 1984 ACP Handbook and the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP).

The Board of Directors hired a full time Technical Assistant in September 1983. The Technician is assigned to assist the SCS Field Office staff in Castro County, and to work on District programs such as the Windbreak tree program, Newsletters, Advertising, Banquets, Awards Programs, Soils Judging and to assist the public. Technician, Lilly Nicholson has been an asset to the District and the SCS staff.

Running Water SWCD Directors from Zones 1 and 3 were representatives of Castro County in the State Soil and Water Conservation Districts Meeting in McAllen in October 1983.

## Ag groups oppose pesticide rules

Castro County's Farm Bureau has joined the Texas Farm Bureau in taking steps to oppose pesticide regulations being proposed by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. has also voiced strong opposition to the proposed standards.

County Farm Bureau president Brock Merritt said, "Existing state and federal regulations are adequate for protection of farm workers, farm operators, applicators and others. The proposals are unnecessary, unreasonable, and, in many cases, unworkable. The proposals dealing with the application of pesticides would make it difficult to use this valuable tool to make a profit."

PCG voted unanimously to oppose the proposed standards at its Oct. 24 quarterly board meeting.

The proposals would establish rules for: notifying persons who might be affected by the pesticide; posting notices and knowing specific details of chemical safety regulations; providing oral warnings to persons who might enter a treated field; determining illegal applications and

clarifying drift liability; establishing re-entry intervals into treated fields; and establishing a TDA technical advisory committee.

"We don't have to have a law for this," said Tommy Fondren of Lorenzo, PCG Board chairman. "The TDA-proposed re-entry levels are different in many cases from both the labels printed on the pesticides, and the intervals required by the Environmental Protection Agency. How is the producer to know what's required of him. This inconsistency, and the vague wording of some of the other rules will just encourage lawsuits."

Merritt said farmers and ranchers have more reason than most people to be careful with farm chemicals.

"We live on the land, and, of course, we don't want to hurt our environment, or the environment of the people who work for us," Merritt said.

The local and state Farm Bureau's, and the PCG will all be filing opposition to the proposed regulations. Interested parties have until Nov. 21 to make official comment.

## Federal Land Bank sets interest rates

The Federal Land Bank of Texas' variable interest rate will increase from 11% to 11.50% on farm loans, and from 11.50% to 12% on rural residence and farm related business loans, effective today (Thursday) said Marlos A. May, president of the Westex Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt.

The increase comes as an effort to narrow the widening gap between what the Land Bank pays for money on the financial market and what it charges borrowers under the

variable interest rate plan. Over the last three years, the bank's average cost of funds outstanding has been in the 12% range, exceeding the loan rate to borrowers.

At the bank's annual stockholders meeting in March, directors from the Westex Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt joined other association directors and voted to forego compensation for their local association in 1984, enabling the bank to postpone an interest rate increase at that time.

"It is imperative that the bank continue to post adequate earnings to ensure that our bonds can be sold in the financial markets at the lowest possible costs, which results in lower interest rate loans for our borrowers," said James A. Rogers, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas.

The Westex Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural

residence property in the counties of Castro, Swisher, and Deaf Smith.

### EDC \$ SIGNS

The Castro County Economic Development Commission was organized out of concern for the future of our community.

History has taught us what happens when agriculture is no longer strong enough to support the rural economy.

Employment opportunities become inadequate, forcing better educated people and young people to leave the community to seek employment in metropolitan areas.

Population maldistribution occurs. Because the better educated and higher income people tend to leave the rural area, the rural town is left with a lower educated, lower income population.

Stagnation and decline of the small town occurs. Some small towns become "poverty pockets" and are viewed as disadvantaged in public schools, health care and government services.

Today, we find ourselves faced with some of these symptoms. Business firms have closed and some commercial buildings are vacant. Many families have moved from the community, leaving empty homes that lack buyers. Most property in the community is now selling at the appraised value or less. The tax base has eroded and local bodies of government are concerned with where future support funds will come.

The most obvious solution for the problem is to create a new economic base. In the minds of most people, this means "industry" that will be a source of a new basic wealth.

With these points in mind, the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, with financial support from the school district and the city, organized the Castro County Economic Development Commission. Additional funding has been received from local business and industry and from private individuals. An eight-member Board of Directors has been appointed to supervise the work of the Commission and Jerry Marvin Hanners has been employed as Director of Development to handle the day-to-day responsibilities. The purpose of the Commission is to create jobs and to build a stronger economic climate.
