Smith Outstanding Coke Conservationist

Otis Smith, Bronte stockfarmer was honored last Thursday when he was presented a plaque signifying his selection as Coke County's outstanding soil and water conservationist for 1966. The honor came at a regular meeting of Bronte Downtown Lions Club, and the plaque was presented by D. K. Glenn, president of Coke County Soil Conservation District.

Smith has been a member of the county district since it was organized in 1949, and has participated in the district's programs since that time.

Smith operates 987 acres in the county. He has a small place just north of Bronte where his home is located, but most of his acreage is in the Hayrick area.

Glenn said when he presented the plaque: "He has not only done an outstanding job of con-

servation on his three farms, but has been instrumental in getting neighbours and others to see the value of conserving natural resources."

W. E. Jacoby cited some of the practices Smith has employed as needed for various conservation problems. It was brought out that he has seeded rangeland with native grasses, and was one of the first conservationists in the district to try root plowing and range seeding for brush control.

Pointing out some of the conservation improvements and programs he has made, Smith said he has about 340 acres of land in brush control; 490 acres of range seeding; 98 acres of pasture planting; 50 acres of range pitting; and about 16,824 feet of terrace construction.

Smith also has utilized 676 acres of proper range use; 676 acres in deferred grazing; 98 acres in pasture management; and 85 acres in conservation cropping system, which was carried out on an emergency type practice to conserve water and soil.

Smith's wife is the former Flora Cowley, daughter of Mrs. Lem Cowley of Robert Lee and the late Mr. Cowley. The couple has one daughter, Mrs. E. S. Her-ring of Junction, and three grandchildren, Donna, Randy and Ricky Sheppard, of Junction.

The Second Annual Coke County 4-H Horse Show was held at the Coke County Roping Club arena in Bronte Friday night, July 7. Sixteen club members exhibited 21 horses, sharing honors in the 15 classes. The show was divided into Senior and Junior divisions with eight club members competing in each division. Judges for the show were J. F. McCabe, Jr. and Bob Fields of Robert Lee.

Championship honors were well divided with several competitors taking home the prized rosettes. In the mare classes, Senior division, Redwing, shown by Charles Bloodworth, of Silver, was selected top animal. Missy, shown by Joy Cervenka, of Maverick, was reserve champion. In the Junior division, Jeanie Tejas, shown by Michael Davis, of Robert Lee, was named champion and Sugar, shown by Richard Scott, of Blackwell, was the reserve champion.

The gelding competition found Bail, shown by Sharon McCutchen of Bronte, tops in the Senior division. The reserve champion honors went to Jackwell Jet, shown by Marshall Millican, of Robert Lee.

The Junior division gelding winners were Nuggets, shown by Troy Millican of Robert Lee, and Snuffy, shown by Burl Davis, also of Robert Lee.

Three club members were double winners in the performance class of the show. Marshall and Troy Millican won both the Western Pleasure and Reining Classes of their respective divisions. Marshall was competing on Jackwell Jet while Troy used Nuggets.

Marvin Ensor, of Bronte, was tops in the other two Junior division performance classes, Pole Bending and Barrel Racing, riding his speedy horse, Poncho. The other two senior winners were Teddy Millican, of Silver, winning the Pole Bending race, riding T-Mack and Sharon McCutchen with top time in the Barrel Racing while riding Friday.

Complete results will be run next week.

Mayor Royce Lee said this week that the committee he appointed to make the study is made up of L. T. Youngblood, J. L. Brunson, Clyde Lee, Royce Fancher and D. K. Glenn, plus city council members, Cecil Kemp, Horace Grigg, Martin Lee, Bill Clark, Marvin Bryant, and the mayor.

Lee has called a meeting for Monday, July 24, for the committee and anyone else who is interested in the study of Bronte's future water problems.

The mayor, in an interview Tuesday, reviewed the status of a proposed dam in this area, to supplement Bronte's Oak Creek Lake water supply.

The city started out in cooperation with the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District to make a study of a site on property of Mrs. Annie Wilkins located on the Kickapoo Creek between the city and the Colorado River. The KWICID applied to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a grant to make a study of the site. This grant was received and the study was made, with a report coming from National Engineering Co., an Austin firm hired to make the survey, that the proposed site was a good one, and had definite possibilities.

Since the study was made and before the project could be pursued further, HUD announced that it was not qualified to give the water district and city any further assistance, since the city's population is less than

Season Tickets Going On Sale

Season football tickets for the Bronte Longhorns' four home games this fall will go on sale next week in the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee. The tickets, this year, will cost \$5.00, making each game cost \$1.25 for the reserved ticket holder.

Barbee said that holders of reserve tickets during the 1966 season will have first choice to buy the same seats they held last year. Deadline for purchasing the 1966 locations is Aug. 15, and after that date, all the reserved section which has not been sold will go on public sale immediately, Barbee said, and may be purchased on a first come, first served basis.

Included in the reserved section are rows A through F, seats 1 through 57. These are choice seats adjacent to the center of the playing field.

Barbee pointed out that the Longhorns will have only nine games on their regular schedule this year. However, fans are looking for a couple of extra post season games, as they are expecting the Longhorns to win region this year.

Coke Has Chance To Gain Benefits From Grant For Economic Opportunity

The Office of Economic Opportunity has approved grants totaling \$271,257 to the Tom Green County Community Action Council for various antipoverty programs.

The largest share of the grant — \$211,257 — will go to establishing the local council as district headquarters for antipoverty programs in a 21-county area of West Texas.

The counties include Kimble, Sutton, Menard, Schleicher, Iraan, Coke, Sterling, Crockett, Andrews, Martin, Howard, Loving, Winkler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Ward, Crane, Upton, and Reagan.

The \$211,257 grant includes \$42,885 for a comprehensive study of poverty conditions in the area and \$168,389 for the establishment and administration of antipoverty programs.

Both will be administered through the Tom Green County Community Action Council, although each local program will have its own board of directors and staff members will be hired locally if possible.

The area has a population of

421,425 according to the 1960 census, of which an estimated 31 comes.

The study to be undertaken will cover the needs, resources, and capabilities of the area in order to establish the proper antipoverty program.

The money will be distributed equally to each county on the basis of the poverty level of residents in each county.

The remainder of the grant will be used locally by the Tom Green County Community Action Council. About \$32,000 is allocated for a "Community Outreach" housing study and self-help program.

In addition to the study, the program calls for the purchase of tools and material with which poverty - level residents may improve their housing facilities.

Halfway House, a private rehabilitation center for alcoholics and drug addicts in San Angelo, has been granted about \$5,000 for the hiring of a permanent director. The sum is a direct grant made through the local council.

The remaining \$20,993 is for a special seven-week summer program, already begun there, to provide recreation and education for young people from low-income families.

Mr. Johnson died Saturday, July 1, at 9:30 p. m. in Sam Houston Memorial Hospital in Houston.

He was born July 25, 1878, in Taylor and was raised near Gatesville in Coryell County. He was married to Nola Brim, May 21, 1901 in Goldthwaite. They moved near Bronte in 1909 and lived in this area until 1956 when they retired to their Melvin residence. Mr. Johnson was a farmer and stock farmer.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, James N. of Waco and J. Sewell of Houston; two daughters, Mrs. Lois Mae Smith of Robert Lee and Mrs. Mildred Mitchell of Melvin; 14 grandchildren; 31 great - grandchildren; one sister and two brothers.

Coke May Benefit From Federal Aid

Washington, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson (D) of Texas announced July 6 approval of a \$211,919 Office of Economic Opportunity program development and administration grant to the Tom Green County Community Action Council, San Angelo. The grant will be used to complete a comprehensive area study and develop projects in response to community needs in a 20-County area, including Coke County. Beneficiaries are 421,225 residents, approximately 31 percent of whom have incomes below \$3,000. The program is for 12 months.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

Within the next few months, residents of several cities in Texas may vote local sales taxes on themselves.

Some of the larger cities are considering elections under the new law which permits a community to levy a one per cent sales tax, if its citizens approve.

This is in addition to the state's two per cent sales tax.

In Austin, a group of businessmen and civic leaders are urging the city council to call a sales tax election.

A statewide survey indicates that Houstonians — where the proposed tax could bring in as much as \$14,000,000 a year — will be among the first to vote. Mayor Louie Welch said the city council will be asked to call an election on the issue this fall.

San Antonio Mayor W. M. McAllister expressed support for the local sales levy and said a vote could be scheduled after September 28. Without the additional revenue, he said, San Antonio

would have to reduce municipal services or inaugurate more service charges.

City officials in many smaller towns, on the other hand, indicate they have no intention of rushing into sales tax controversies. One, who probably represented views of many, said city governing bodies ought to wait on a call by citizens, through petitions or other formal requests, before setting any elections to impose new forms of taxation.

AUTO INSURANCE GOING DOWN — Starting August 1, Texans will be paying slightly less for their auto insurance on a statewide average.

Some will pay considerably less, some more. But overall, the State Board of Insurance maintains that motorists will pay \$4, 200,000 less in premiums. Average statewide saving will be about one per cent for all classes of coverage combined.

5,500. Local officials were told that they would have to seek assistance from the Farm Home Administration. FHA officials have expressed a desire to be of service to the city and water district in working out a method of financing a dam in the area, and the KWCID has indicated it is willing to relinquish its water rights in the area to the city.

The project is more or less at a standstill now. Mayor Lee's appointment of the study committee is intended to stimulate renewed interest in obtaining more water sources for future needs of the city.

The mayor told The Enterprise "Study of water sources and supplies is definitely a must for the city of Bronte. The city council deemed it necessary to at least make a study of all feasible sites for building water reservoirs. Therefore, we decided to appoint and solicit help of several public-spirited people and dedicated community workers, who have foresight and are willing to take time to help build for the future."

Lee added that he would like

to suggest that all citizens of Bronte who are interested in the future of the city, "have a positive attitude on the water situation and a word of encouragement for the people who have been asked to serve on the 'Water for the Future Committee.'"

The mayor emphasized that he would like to see the committee make a study of all sites in the area which might prove to be a feasible location for a reservoir.

"Water is going to be a problem for all of West Texas in a few more years — the way our population is growing and the way per capita use of water is increasing just about guarantees that we will have a need," Mayor Lee said. "I would like for Bronte to be ahead of the game when this need actually gets here," he added.
