 1. Use mercerized thread for most of your sewing: it is smoother and stronger than oth or types.2. Select a color slightly dark or than the fabric. Thread look ighter when stitched in fabric 3. When sewing with a multi colored or two colored check or plaid, use two colors of thread one on the top and one on the bobbin.
3. Check yardage on spools two spools of 125 yards each for a dress. Buy enough.
4. When sewing by hand, use about 20 inches of thread to prevent tangling. Don't use a double thread.
5. To completely conceal knot in hand sewing, pull the first stitch inside a fold.
6. For ease in threading, place a piece of white paper behind the eye of the needle.
7. Fasten loose ends of thread to the spool with a small piece of cellophane tape. This saves time in untangling the thread box. 9. If machine stitches pucker adjust the tension. Use 12 to 16 stitches per sewing jobs.
8. If thre 10. If thread breaks when sewing by machine, the needle point may be rough. Put in a new needle.
