### Bronte And Roby Meet Friday Night

The Bronte Longhorns will travel to Roby Friday night for another District 4B football game. The contest will be next to the last in regular season play.

The Longhorns are expecting little trouble in taming the Roby Lions, who have won only one game this year. The mighty Longhorns, Texas No. 1 Class B team, has rolled up 279 points to their opponents 42 for the season, while the Roby Lions have managed to make only 102 against 172 for their opponents. This makes a difference of some 307 points between the two teams for the season.

The Longhorns will wind up the 1967 schedule next week when they host Forsan.

After the Forsan game, the Longhorns hope they have two more contests to go.

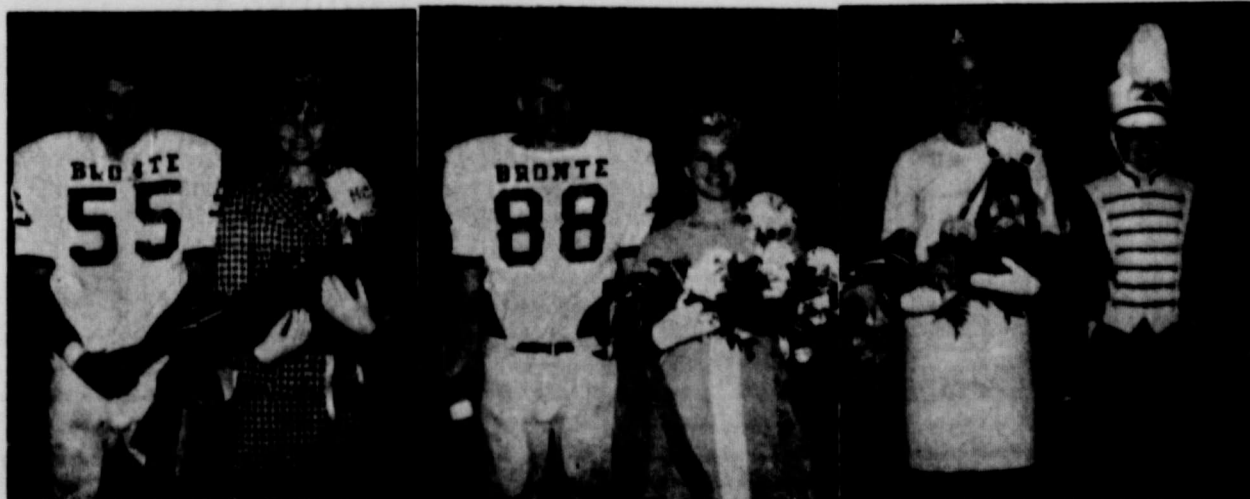

County Agents News Column

The screwworm situation in the Southwest since Beulah made her foray has program officials very concerned. The number of cases in Texas has increased sharply and the area to be spot treated has multiplied several times.

As a result, every operator is encouraged to spray his animals, if possible, and to keep a sharp watch for possible screwworm cases. The program has meant too much to the Southwest and Mexico to let it backslide now.

Maybe the cooler weather will help the situation some.

A number of 4-H events have taken place or will take place soon. First, the 4-H Horse club will sponsor a Fun Day, Saturday afternoon, Nov. 4, at the Bronte Arena. The action will start at 2 p.m. and should wind up about 4 p.m. Any and all youth, 9-19 years of age, are welcomed to participate.

Five events will be held: barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing, goat scramble, and hair pulling (boy-girl teams).

Ribbons will be given as prizes through six places.

The Fun Day will be the Horse Club's last scheduled meeting until March.

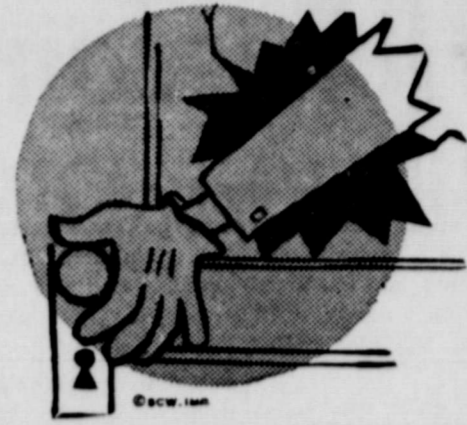

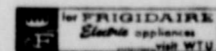

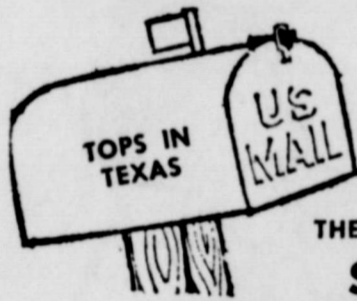

# Longhorns Defeat Trent In Homecoming Game

The Longhorns didn't waste any time getting on the scoreboard Saturday night when they performed for a record size Homecoming crowd at Stephenson Field. After 58 seconds, with 11:02 showing on the clock, the score was 6-0.

With this fine start, the local lads kept the scoreboard going their way, and wound up the ball game with a fan-pleasing 45-12 score.

## Lots of Variety

The Longhorns used plenty of variety in their play to accumulate their 45 points. The first TD came on a 3 yard plunge by QB David Glenn. The second was by Manfred Thompson on a double handoff from the 21, and the EP came on a pass from Glenn to Davis Corley. Doug McCutchen went through from the 2 for the third counter, while the fourth came on a pass from McCutchen to Corley, and Glenn tossed to Corley for the extras. In the second quarter, McCutchen kicked a field goal to give the Longhorns some more variety. Glenn went in from the 2 for the only TD of the 3rd quarter and Charles Masterson took a pass from Glenn for the conversion. In the 4th period McCutchen took a pass from Glenn to cover the needed 20 yards.

## First Quarter

Glenn took Trent's opening kickoff on the 30 and went to the 37. McCutchen made the big play on first try from scrimmage when he got some good blocks and fought his way down to the Gorilla 8 for 1st and goal. Masterson added 5, and Glenn went in for the TD on the next play. Time required was 58 seconds. Try for extras was no good and the Longhorns trotted back up field with a 6-0 lead.

McCutchen kicked off to Larry Hellums on the 5 and Randy Barbee snagged him on the 22. Good defending by the Longhorns held the Gorillas to a minus 1 yard on three plays, so they had to punt. It went out on the Bronte 34.

McCutchen carried twice for 9 yards and Glenn covered 6 more for a 1st on the 49. Masterson got loose on the next play to carry the ball deep to the Trent 21. An important block by Keith Morris smoothed the way. The

next play saw Glenn hand off to McCutchen, who then gave the ball to Thompson. He went the full distance for the second counter and the clock still showed 7:48. Glenn's pass to Corley was good for 2. Score: 14-0.

Hellums took McCutchen's kick deep in Trent territory and was stopped at the 30. He carried twice for 8 yards, then Tim Riggan went for 4 and a 1st on the 42. The next drive bogged down at the 48, but Bronte drew a 15 yarder for roughing the kicker, and Trent took a new lease on life at the Longhorn 37. Brnovak kept the ball on the next play, completely fooled the Longhorns and went for a Gorilla touchdown. He was the first district competitor to score on the Longhorns this year. Try for points failed, and the score was 14-6.

Barbee was downed on the 38 after receiving the kickoff. The Longhorns got a 1st on a 15 yarder against the Gorillas, then the effort bogged down and Corley kicked into the end zone to give the ball to Trent on the 20. Hellums made 6, then Brnovak passed to Riggan for a 1st on the 39. Three plays later the ball had been moved only 2 yards, so a punt was in order. It went to the Bronte 27 and ended the quarter.

## Second Quarter

McCutchen went for 12 and a 1st on the 39, Glenn gained a whopping 29 yards for another 1st on the Trent 37, and then McCutchen moved the ball 35 yards to the 2. McCutchen went in for the counter on the next play. Pass try failed and the score was 20-6.

Hellums was pushed out on the 39 after taking the kickoff. The Trent star carried the ball three times in a row, twice for no gain and once for a loss to bring up 4th and 11. Longhorn defenders Morris, Masterson, David Scott, Brian Richards and Don Hageman were instrumental in this fine defensive stand. Ted Simpson's punt went to Masterson and he was pulled down on the Bronte 48. McCutchen went 12 yards for a 1st on the Trent 40. Glenn started around right side, got trapped and had to change gears and went for another 1st on the 26. Masterson went for 5 and on the next play Glenn handed to McCutchen who passed to Corley in the end zone. Corley also took Glenn's pass for the extras, and the score was 28-6.

A short kick gave the ball to Trent on the 37. Next play, the Gorillas fumbled and David Scott recovered to give Bronte the ball on the Trent 31. Masterson, Barbee and McCutchen all made nice gains to move the ball down to the 7. Glenn tossed a pass to Corley in the end zone, but officials ruled he was out of bounds when he snagged it. Faced with a 4th and 7, the Longhorns elected for McCutchen to try a field goal. He did and it was good for 3 points. Score 31-6.

The kick off and two plays ended the half.

## Third Quarter

McCutchen kicked to start the second half. Trent started on the 25 and made a 1st on the 46. Another good series moved the ball to the Bronte 44 for another 1st. A penalty moved the ball back to the Trent 44, and it was 1st and 25. The visitors couldn't make the needed yardage and their punt went to Masterson and the Longhorns started from their 28. McCutchen made an even 10 to the 38. Glenn and Masterson teamed up to make another 10 on

the 48, then Glenn went for 12 and the third 1st down on the Trent 40. The double handoff play to Thompson was good for 14 yards and another 1st on the 26. A 5-yarder by Masterson and a 13 yard gainer by McCutchen gave the locals a 1st on the 4. A penalty moved it on up to the 2, and from there Glenn beat his way through the Gorilla line for the TD. Masterson took a pass for extras and the score was 39-6.

The Gorillas took the kick off and moved the ball from their 44 to the Bronte 31 before the quarter ended.

## Fourth Quarter

With a 1st on the 31, the Gorillas were wanting badly to score. A 5 yard penalty didn't help, and they tossed two incomplete passes to make matters worse. They couldn't go and Bronte took over on the Trent 32.

Coach Cecil Toliver was ready to play some of his younger Longhorns and pressure on the Gorillas let up somewhat. After three tries, the Longhorns called on Barbee to punt. The Gorillas fumbled the punt and Willie Zuniga recovered, all to no avail, since a penalty was assessed the Bronte boys and Barbee had to kick again. His kick was a 65 yard beauty which rolled dead on the Trent 6 yard line.

Hellums did most of the leg work, with assistance from Pat Carriker, in moving the ball steadily from the 6 down to the Bronte 2. Carriker was called on to do the honors and he sailed though the Longhorns for a second touchdown for his team. No extra points were made and the score was 39-12.

Masterson received Hellums kickoff on the 20 and dashed to the 50. McCutchen went 20 yards in two carries for a 1st on the 30. A 5 yard penalty and 5 yard gain moved the ball to the 20 for a 1st. Glenn tossed one incomplete pass, tried for a second and found McCutchen wide open. A perfect throw and a perfect catch were executed and McCutchen sailed into the end zone without a Gorilla touching him. No extra points were made. Score: 45-12.

An almost completely new team of Longhorns swarmed on to the field and Scott kicked off to Trent. The Gorillas were able to get off 5 plays before the final whistle.

Scratching out the proposition not wanted and leaving the one which reads the way a person wants to vote is not legal now, and ballots so marked will be declared mutilated, and will not be counted.

Instructions for marking the new style ballots are printed on them, but Judge Thetford said a special effort will be made by election judges to see that every voter understands the new system.

A short resume of each of the amendments to be voted on will be run in this newspaper next week.

# H D Agent's News Dept.

**Cost Per Serving of Chicken**  
Don't wait until Thanksgiving for turkey or a special occasion for chicken. Both are plentiful and are good buys — but look and compare prices.

At a glance at price tags of fryer breasts, fryer legs, roasters, and whole fryers, it looks as if whole fryers are the least expensive. But look again on a cost-per-serving basis.

Fryer breasts, at 60 cents per pound, serve four at a cost per serving of 15c. Fryer legs, at 49c per pound, will serve three at a cost of 16.3c. Roasters, with two servings per pound, cost 49c a pound with a per serving cost of 24.5c. Whole fryers, which will make 1½ servings per pound, and costing 33c a pound, figure 24.8 cents per serving.

**Sewing Tips**

Individuals who sew always are looking for ways to make their job easier. Here are some tips about thread to make your sewing easier.

1. Use mercerized thread for most of your sewing; it is smoother and stronger than other types.

2. Select a color slightly darker than the fabric. Thread looks lighter when stitched in fabric.

3. When sewing with a multi-colored or two colored check or plaid, use two colors of thread, one on the top and one on the bobbin.

4. Check yardage on spools before you buy. You will need two spools of 125 yards each for a dress. Buy enough.

5. When sewing by hand, use about 20 inches of thread to prevent tangling. Don't use a double thread.

6. To completely conceal knot in hand sewing, pull the first stitch inside a fold.

7. For ease in threading, place a piece of white paper behind the eye of the needle.

8. Fasten loose ends of thread to the spool with a small piece of cellophane tape. This saves time in untangling the thread box.

9. If machine stitches pucker, adjust the tension. Use 12 to 16 stitches per inch for average sewing jobs.

10. If thread breaks when sewing by machine, the needle point may be rough. Put in a new needle.

**Convenience Foods Time Savers**

Time saved preparing meals means leisure — sometimes money — to busy homemakers and mothers. They buy a good-tasting convenience food when one appears in the stores, especially if the price is right.

The price often is right due to keen competition between food processors. Recently food scientists at Beltsville, Md., made a time and cost study comparing a variety of dishes prepared from processed and fresh potatoes. They concluded: women who value their time at 50 cents an hour or more will be money ahead using processed potatoes instead of fresh ones. Preparing potato puffs, for example, took only 17 minutes. Starting with unpeeled potatoes, the job took 86 minutes. Processed potatoes were made possible by agricultural research.

Don't dry clean your electric blanket — the fluids can damage

the insulation on the electric wiring. Follow the laundering directions that come with the blanket. They usually suggest short wash, rinse and spin cycles. Don't dry the blanket in a dryer.

Take you long to use ice cream? It will keep longer in your home freezer if you wrap the ordinary waxed-cardboard cartons in heavy aluminum foil.

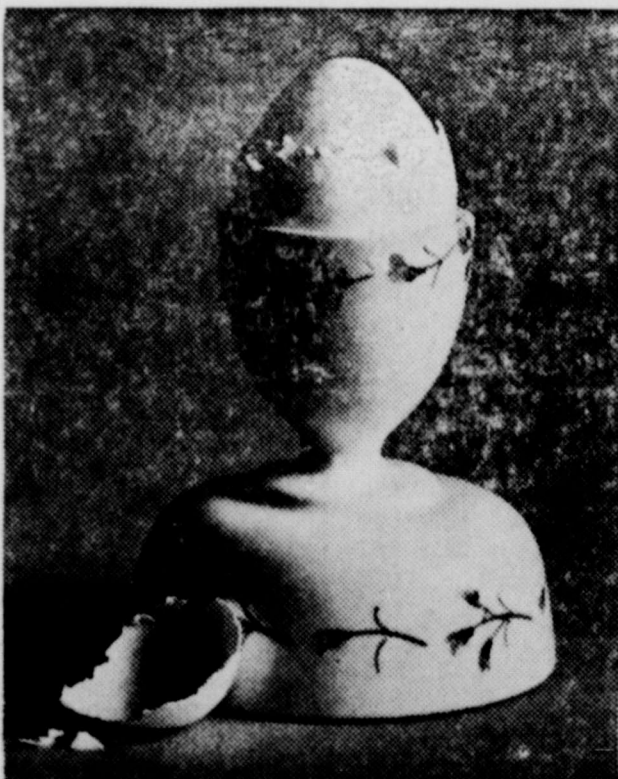

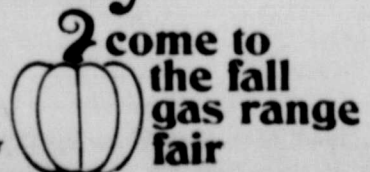

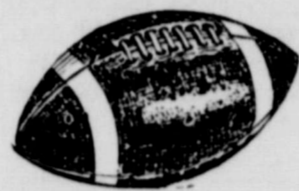
