Sharon McCutchen, Joe David Key Named Coke County Gold Star 4-Hers

Joe David Key of Robert Lee and Sharon McCutchen of Bronte won the year's highest 4-H Club honors last Saturday night when they were declared Coke County's

Gold Star boy and girl. Miss McCutchen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McCutchen and Key is the son of Mr. and Mrs. David Key. Sharon has been in 4-H work for seven years and Joe David has had five years of 4-H work.

Court Hears Talk On Improvements

Coke County commissioners, in a session Monday, heard reports from four committees and their architect on recommendations for proceeding with plans for some permanent improvements in the county.

First and most expensive of the four projects would be a new county jail and home for the county sheriff. Two more projects are construction of a community center in Bronte and additions and remodeling to the existing Robert Lee center. Fourth among the proposed projects is a new livestock building for use in the county's annual livestock show and for other gatherings.

County Judge W. W. Thetford said Tuesday that the architect, Louis Drake of San Angelo, was instructed to make some alterations in plans already tentatively drawn, figure cost of furnishings and required fees, and report back to the court in a few days.

The judge said that rough estimates of the cost of the projects are as follows: \$115,000 for jail and sheriff's resident; \$140,000 for the two park improvement projects (community centers); \$30,000 for the agricultural building. These figures do not include money for furnishings, nor for fees of the architect and fiscal agent.

Present for the meeting, besides the judge and commissioners were Cumble Ivey, Jr., Sterling Lindsey, Melvin Childress, Ulmer Bird and J. F. McCabe, all of Robert Lee and Royce Lee of Bronte.

After considerable interest was indicated in the permanent improvements for the county several months ago, committees were named to study needs and make recommendations to the commissioners court.

RELATIVES MEET BOECKING AT DOCK IN SAN DIEGO

Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Boecking and L. T. Youngblood returned last Friday from a trip to California. They went to San Diego to visit their son and grandson, Ens. Tom Boecking, who is a Naval officer aboard the USS St. Paul. They were among a welcoming crowd of about 2,000 who were present at the docks when the St. Paul arrived. The visitors were invited aboard ship and served refreshments.

The St. Paul has been in the war zone offshore of North Vietnam the past few months. She will be in U. S. waters until some time next spring when she will return to Southeast Asia. Ensign Boecking expects to attend school during this time and also expects some leave time starting next week when he will come to Bronte.

It will be at Monahans, Saturday, Nov. 25, at 2:30 p.m. That was the official word received from Coach Cecil Toliver Wednesday afternoon in a phone call. Toliver and Supt. C. B. Barbee met Wednesday at 1 p.m. with officials of Fort Hancock school to decide on the date, time, location and other details of the bi-district football game.

Toliver said he would have preferred to play the game on Thursday night, Nov. 23, but call of the coin gave the choice to Fort Hancock and they preferred the Saturday date.

Toliver reported that Monahans has a fine football stadium and other facilities to accommodate the bi-district playoff. He said Monahans agreed to supply the trophy for the winner of the game; to supply printed programs and tickets; to man ticket gates and microphones announcing the game; and any other work necessary.

Toliver said Fort Hancock has another game to play this Friday night, and they preferred to wait the additional time before meeting Bronte because of this game.

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Longhorns Top Forsan, 40-18

The Bronte Longhorns blasted the Forsan Buffaloes, 40-18, last Friday night when they hosted a team that was judged by many fans to be their toughest opponent in 1967 district competition. The Buffs hit hard and Clayton McKinnon did some slick deceptions in his job as quarterback. The contest wound up the Longhorns regular season of play and they are now ready to advance to the bi district playoffs.

The Buffalo defense was really after Bronte's tailback, Doug McCutchen and held him to only three touchdowns during the 48 minutes of play. McCutchen went 40 yards and 2 yards in the first quarter for Bronte's first two counters. In the second period, he traveled 8 yards for another.

Charles Masterson went in from the 1 for a counter, and Randy Barbee got off a nice 22 yard jaunt for another in the third quarter. The Longhorns' only score in the final period was made by David Glenn on a 9 yard carry. Masterson and Glenn were responsible for extra points in the first and third quarters.

First Quarter

The kickoff went out of bounds on the 31, but the Longhorns elected to play it from there. Masterson, Glenn and McCutchen all carried for 29 yards, and collecting two first downs, to get in field position for their first counter. Glenn started off with the ball, ran into trouble, lateraled to McCutchen, and he traveled the remaining distance to the double stripe. A pass try for extras was no good. Score: 6-0.

McCutchen's kick went to Johnny Dolan who was downed on the 33. An incomplete pass and yard loss on a recovered fumble set up a pressing need for a Buffalo pass. McKinnon faded, was rushed by the Longhorn line, and had to run the ball. He made 7 yards before Victor Brock pulled him down. The punt went to Masterson on the 39.

The Longhorns couldn't make

the 1st, so Barbee punted. Buffaloes streamed through before he could get it off and it went short to the Forsan 49.

A nice pass from McKinnon to Steve Park brought the ball to Bronte's 38 for a 1st down. On 1st down of the next series, a fumble was recovered by David Gentry, to give the ball back to the Longhorns on their 34.

McCutchen carried twice for 9 yards, then a penalty cost the locals 5 yards. Glenn then cocked his arm and fired to Masterson for a 1st on Forsan's 42. Glenn's eagle eye found McCutchen and another pass was good for 25 yards and another 1st on the 17. An illegal motion penalty moved the ball back to the 22. Key play in this series of downs was a pitchout from Glenn to McCutchen, who in turn passed it to Glenn for a 1st on the 2. McCutchen went in on the next play for the counter, and Masterson went around left end for 2 extra points. The score was 14-0.

McCutchen got off his kick and McKinnon tossed to Terry Wooten, who was nailed on the spot by Brock to end the quarter.

Second Quarter

Park got off two big gainers and moved the ball down to the Longhorns 8 yard line for a 1st down. The Buffs were in good position, but carries by Dolan, David Myers and Park failed to yield the needed 8, and Bronte took over on the 2. Prime stoppers on this drive were Brian Richards, Barbee and Brock.

The Longhorns got out of the hole on the 2 yard line all right, with McCutchen carrying for 5 and 6 yards, and Masterson galloping for 21 and 12 yards. With the ball on the 46, the Longhorns passed, but one of the terrible things that can happen when a pass is thrown, happened. Big David Myers intercepted and ran back to the Longhorn 29 before Manfred Thompson upended him. A pass to Wooten was good for a 1st on the 4. McKinnon kept for 3 more and then he went around right end for the TD to put his team on the scoreboard. Conversion try failed, and the score was 14-6.

The touchdown must have disconcerted the Longhorns a little, for they allowed a fumble of an on side kick to be recovered by the Forsan lads on the Bronte 34. Their advantage was short lived, however, as Masterson intercepted a Buffalo pass and ran it to the 37. McCutchen picked up a great big 41 yards to the 22, then Masterson added 8, and McCutchen went 6 more for a 1st on the Forsan 8. McCutchen went over the right side for the third

counter of the evening. No good was the signal on try for extra points, and the score was 20-6.

McCutchen kicked to Myers and the Buffs made a 1st down on the Bronte 30, mostly on a long run by Parks. The next series saw the Forsan lads bog down as they hit the Longhorn line, and Bronte took over on their own 27. A couple of plays later the half ended.

Third Quarter

Dolan took McCutchen's kick and was put down on the 36. McKinnon made a net gain of 6 yards in the Buffs' three tries, so Wooten punted. It went to McCutchen, who made a fine 30 yard runback to the Forsan 40. Bronte drew a 15 yarder for holding, and Thompson gained 14 yards of it back on a double reverse. McCutchen then took a pass from Glenn and almost went in. Forsan decided against letting this happen and stopped him on the 1 yard line. Masterson carried the ball over the double stripe on the next play. The conversion was no good and the scoreboard read 26-6.

McCutchen got off a short kick which settled down on the Forsan 42. After being penalized for clipping, the Buffaloes looked at the Longhorn defenders and decided on a quick kick on 3rd down. It was a beauty, as it went 55 yards before Randy Barbee could run back and pick it up.

Glenn went for 15, Masterson added another 5, then Glenn went for 10 more. The tackle separated him from the ball and Barbee picked it up and tore out with it. But officials ruled the play an illegal forward pass and brought the ball back to the 50. Glenn threw the ball to Davis Corley for a 1st on the 40, Glenn made 3, Masterson went for 10, and Corley carried for 5 to put the ball on the 22 yard line. Barbee then took the ball and zig-zagged through the Buffalo defense to pay dirt. Glenn went for 2 and the score was 34-6.

Brock kicked off to Myers and Corley tackled him on the 38. Dolan made 4 and McKinnon kept for 9 more. McKinnon tried a bootleg play but David Scott wasn't fooled and laid him down back on the Buff 44 for a 7 yard loss. The visitors couldn't recover the loss and Wooten punted just before the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

The Longhorns failed to make the needed 10 and Barbee punted. Second Forsan play was a pass, and Masterson got his second pass interception of the night, taking the ball on the 50 and stopping on the Buff 46.

Glenn got a nice gainer of 16 yards to the 30. McCutchen, who had been out for several plays, came back and went for 4 more, and Masterson gained the 1st down. A personal foul penalty against Forsan moved the ball on down to the 8. Glenn elected to carry and he went the needed distance to make the scoreboard flicker. PAT try was no good and the Longhorns wound up their scoring for the night, with a 40-6 showing.

The Buffaloes started from the 28 after McCutchen's kick. Park went for 8 and Myers made 2 more for a 1st on the 38. The Longhorn defense tightened up, as McCutchen and Brock held McKinnon for no gain and Corley nailed him again for a 5 yard loss. Failing the go, Forsan punted to McCutchen who was pulled down on the Forsan 40.

Wholesale substitutions gave the Longhorns a practically new team. Ronald Cooper took over as quarterback, and Nicky Arrott, Steve Williams and Thomp-

son carried the ball but didn't make the needed 10 yards. Barbee punted to the 34.

A pass to Dolan was good for 11, and the next play was nicely executed as McKinnon threw the ball to Park for a touchdown play. It carried 55 yards, and, after an unsuccessful conversion try, the score was 40-12.

Handful Vote For One Amendment

A mere handful of Coke County voters turned out for the amendment election which was held last Saturday. The 124 ballots cast represented approximately 12 per cent of the county's qualified voters, and this small number rendered a decision on additions to the constitution of Texas, the state's most basic body of laws.

Coke County approved only one of the proposed amendments, No. 3, which permits the issuance of \$200 million in bonds for revival of the veterans land purchase program.

Local voters did not agree with the state as a whole, as all six of the amendments were passed by Texas voters.

Coke County's vote was as follows:

1. Consolidating county funds: for 41, against 78.
2. Permission for mental health services: for 50, against 71.
3. Veterans land bonds: for 83, against 52.
4. Medical pay for injured police officers: for 53, against 70.
5. Bonds for park improvement: for 43, against 81.
6. Permission for state employees to serve on certain boards: for 45, against 75.

The above figures were issued Saturday night and are unofficial.
