## Mayor Presents Issues In May 7 Bond Vote

(Editor's note: The article below was prepared and released by Mayor Royce Lee in order to acquaint Enterprise readers with the facts and issues at stake in the bond election set for May 7.)

### REASONS WHY THE COUNTY BOND ELECTION IS NEEDED

1. There is not an inside public assembly hall or building in the Bronte Community, outside the school or churches large enough to accommodate such events as family reunions, inter-club activities, youth organization meetings, programs and indoor recreation, convention hall, banquet rooms, and general meeting place.

2. The present community center at Robert Lee has become too small or the demands too large

for the present facilities; therefore, enlargement is a must.

3. Jail facilities in this county are not good enough to deserve a rating from any authorities. Even though you can not comprehend the probable growth of this county in the next 20 years, to me, this growth is definitely coming. Therefore, the jail facilities need updating to enable our law enforcement officers to carry on their work in a modern society.

4. This county is and always will be a county with an agricultural background and dedication which will never cease. The present facility for a show barn is a disgrace. A modern exhibition building which can be used and will be designed and constructed for more than one purpose is needed. This project, too, should receive a very welcome and expressive vote of "Yes" and this eyesore, which is called a "Livestock Shown Barn," should be removed.

5. The above described proposals in the bond issue have been thoroughly studied by various groups and committees from all over the county with a positive decision that the need exists. The

## Four Qualify For State Track & Field Contests

Four of Bronte High School's athletes qualified for a berth at the state UIL track and field meet to be held in Austin the first weekend in May.

The Bronte team, in spite of the high placings came out second in the regional meet held last weekend at Big Spring. Fort Hancock's 51 points bested Bronte's 48 by three points.

Brian Richards set a new regional record with his 54' 11" throw of the shot put. The old record was 53' 11" set in 1967 by David Holobek of Paint Rock.

Another first place winner was Davis Corley who took the high jump crown with a leap of 5 feet, 10 inches.

Doug McCutchen won the right to compete at Austin with his second place of 20 feet, 10 1/2 inches in the broad jump.

Bronte's other state contestant is Manfred Thompson who took second place in the 220 yard dash with a time of 23.5.

Others who placed at region were McCutchen, third in discus; David Glenn, fifth in pole vault; and the 440 relay team, made up of Nicky Arrott, Glenn, McCutchen and Thompson, fifth place.

A bit of drama connected with the regional track meet was the fact that the outcome was not known until the last event of the day, the mile relay, was run. Fort Hancock won fourth place to push ahead of the Longhorns.

### Golf Team Loses

The A golf team lost to Lorraine by a heartbreaking one stroke, 722-723, in the final day

of the golf meet. Fort Hancock came in third with a 761. The B team was seventh in region. Steve Williams was runner-up medalist.

### Tennis Matches

Charles Masterson and Doug McCutchen won two rounds of their tennis matches, defeating Fort Davis, 6-2 and 6-2, and downing Roby, 6-2 and 7-5. Then they went down before the Eden doubles team, 4-6 and 1-6.

David Glenn, this district's boys singles entry, won over Fort Davis' entry, 6-2, 3-6 and 6-1, and downed an entry from Barstow, 0-6, 6-3 and 6-2, only to lose out to Turnillo, 2-6 and 0-6.

Norma Pruitt, the 46-B girls singles entry, was unfortunate enough to draw the winner of her division in her first matches. Her opponent from Eden downed her, 3-6 and 3-6.

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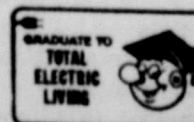

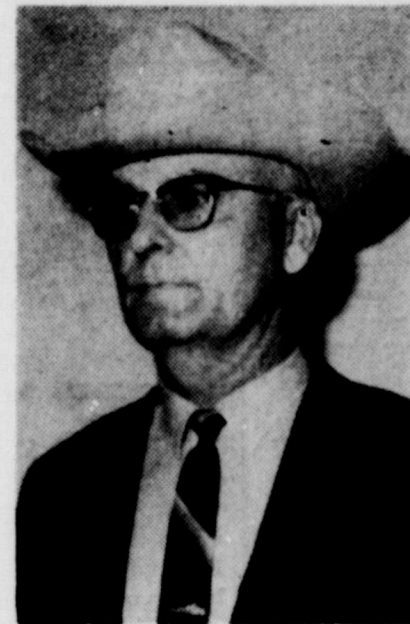

## Primary Absentee Vote Underway

Voters who will be unable to get to the polls on May 4 to vote in the Democratic Primary can now vote absentee by going to the county clerk's office or by requesting that a ballot be mailed from the office. Absentee voting will continue until three days before the election.

A big turnout is expected in this year's election, as much interest has been shown in local as well as in stateside contests.

The only contested race on the county level is for sheriff where the incumbent, Sheriff Melvin Childress, is opposed by Albert N. (Bob) Fields. In precinct 1, two races have developed. Commissioner Fern Havins is opposed by Jett Hood, and Constable Ollie Roe has an opponent in William H. (Hershall) Hall.

The big contest over the state is the race for governor where 10 candidates are seeking the position now held by John Connally. According to poll results in the last few days, Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith, former Attor-

ney General Waggoner Carr and Don Yarborough are the front-runners.

Favored in the race for lieutenant governor is House Speaker Ben Barnes who has two opponents. A couple of Supreme Court justice positions are being contested, and the remainder of the ballot shows no opposition.

Also included on the ballot are three referendum propositions: 1. For permitting sale of liquor by the drink after approval on a local option basis; 2. For permitting pari-mutuel betting on horse racing when approved on a local option basis; 3. For creating the Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the price of milk.

Results of voting on these three proposals will be merely a matter of determining public opinion.

### Absentees Can Vote Now On Bond

Ballots are available for absentee voting in the \$300,000 bond issue which has been called for a vote on Tuesday, May 7. Purpose of the bond issue is to build permanent improvements for Coke County.

Persons who wish to vote absentee may do so by going to the

county clerk's office or by writing the county clerk for a ballot. Only resident qualified voters who have rendered property for taxation by the county will be permitted to vote in the election.

The election was called by the commissioners' court after a petition to the court requesting it.

The proposed bonds would be spent in building a new jail and sheriff's home, for enlarging and improving the present community center, and for building a new agricultural building, all in Robert Lee, and for building a new community center in Bronte.

In order to meet legal requirements, the balloting will be done on two propositions: 1. For the issuance of \$125,000 in bonds for construction of the new jail and sheriff's home; 2. For the issuance of \$175,000 in bonds for building the livestock show barn, the Bronte community building and for improving and enlarging the Robert Lee community building.

Voting on the bond issue will be held in all five of the county voting boxes.

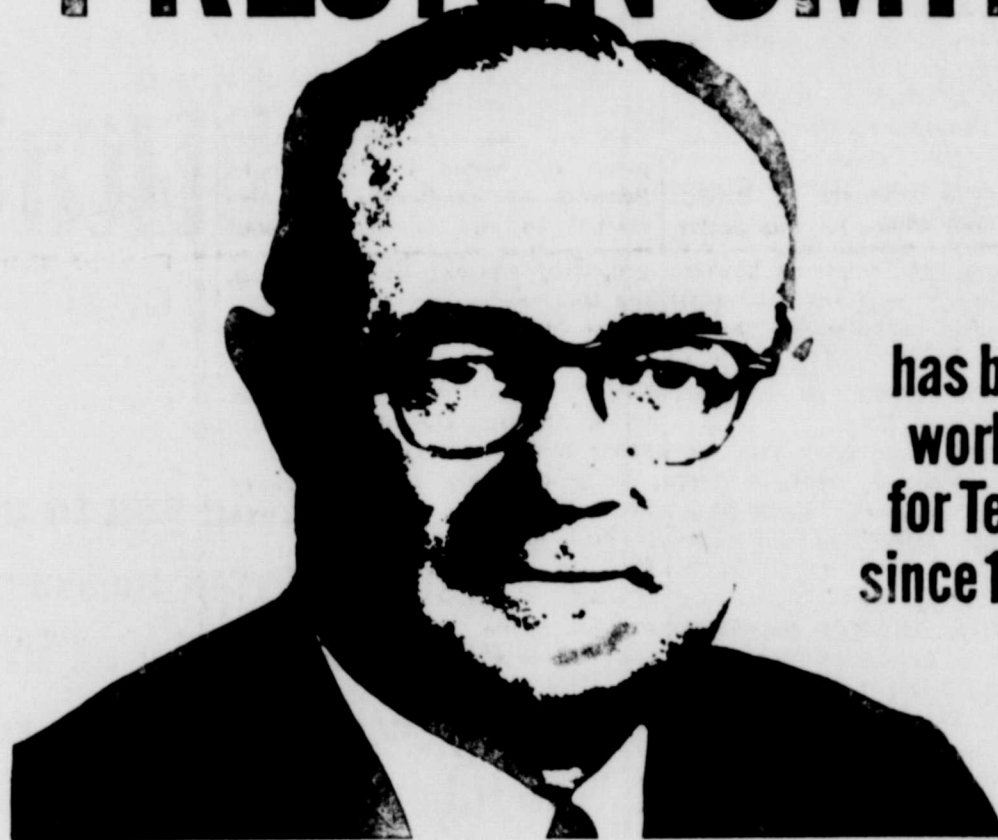
