Using the figures calculater the actual value of his 240 acre is $\$ 33,280$. Taking 25 per cent a figure of $\$ 8,320$. When this figure is multiplied by the $\$ 1.50$
tax rate, it gives $\$ 124.80$, which is the tax he paid.
Using this same actual value of $\$ 33,280$, we will calculate the tax per cent which Ballinger uses for
tax valuation purposes. This gives $\$ 11,648$ for the valuation located in the Ballinger Schoo District. When we multiply this
figure by $\$ 1.78$, which is Bal linger's tax rate, we come up
with $\$ 207.33$ which Mr. Crockett would have had to pay if his 24 acres were in the Ballinger Dis We don't know much about the basis of setting actual values in

About halfcentury ago there was a to of 8599 school districts in our chool districts. The number 8053 were common istricts istricts. The number 4474, and today there are onl 1326 school districts. On the ba is of the foregoing report, refer ing to the reduction in the num incted that the next ten year will see the disappearance of the emaining 368 common school dis.

It is believed by the Bronte people that
a high school student who has

U.I.L events. It is also believed that a school district who trans ports its students to a school dis. triet should be properly reim bursed for these services. We shall present a suggestion later in the meeting, a solution to the fulfillment of the wishes of ALL the residents of the Norton dis mot.

in the Bronte District are sub stantially lower than in any of
the other districts. Taking the figures calculated for each of the four districts we find that the savings would be as follows on Mr. Crockett's 240 acres in the Norton district:
His present taxes are $\$ 124.80$ and when $\$ 56.56$ for Bronte is subtracted, it leaves a saving of
$\$ 68.24$ 868.24.

His taxes in Ballinger district would be $\$ 207.33$; subtracting $\$ 56.56$ leaves a savings of $\$ 150.77$ Our calculations for the Winters District show he would pay \$247.59; subtracting $\$ 56.56$ leaves a saving of \$191.03.
Of course all the figures cited above are based on use of the arbitrary figure of $\$ 33,280$ as the actual value of the 240 acres, and this might vary somewhat in the Ballinger and Winters districts. However, we do feel that this comparison is pro.
