

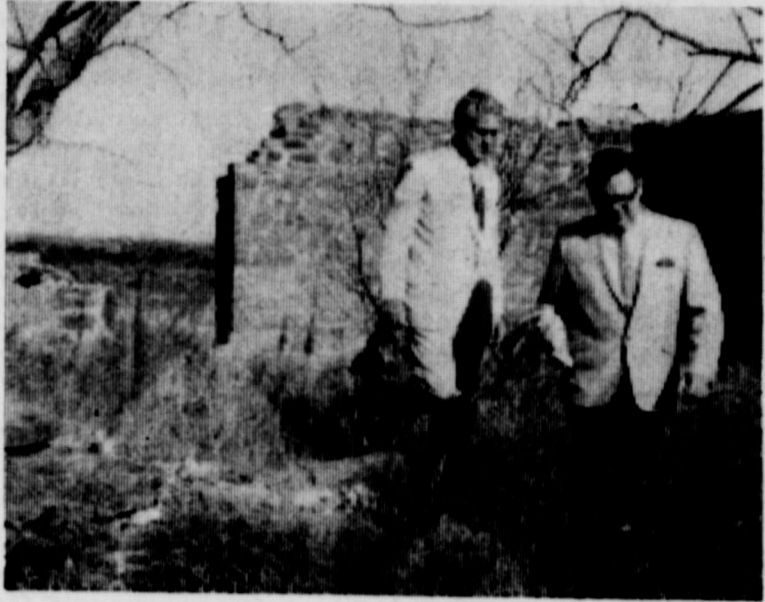

## Bronte Honors Gov. Connally

Tuesday's visit of Governor John Connally to Bronte and Coke County was termed "a tremendous success" by those in charge of arrangements.

Mayor Royce Lee, who was in charge of the Coke County part of the governor's tour which included three stops, said that he felt Connally enjoyed his stay in Coke County immensely.

A big crowd, estimated at 400 persons, were waiting at Bronte city hall to greet the governor when he arrived in Bronte. He was introduced by Mayor Lee and presented a Joni-Lyn blouse to take to Mrs. Connally. The blouses are manufactured locally by the C. R. Smith & Co.

Following the introduction, the governor made a short speech in which he urged Coke County citizens to work toward developing tourism in this area. He said that visits by tourists is one of the state's biggest industries already, and that its potential had hardly been tapped.

He pointed out the need to provide things for tourists to see, so they will stay longer in the Lone Star State. Connally said that Texas has as many tourists as Florida, but Florida keeps them longer and they spend more money.

The caravan which came through Bronte was touring the Texas Forts Trail, which goes through Robert Lee and Bronte. The tour left Abilene Tuesday morning and the first stop was at Fort Chadbourne, where Connally and other dignitaries were greeted by Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Wylie, owners of the ranch on which the old fort is located. Following his chat with them, the Governor took an on-foot inspection tour of some of the remains of the old structures which are well over 100 years old.

The next stop was Bronte. The city hall was decorated with flags, bunting and placards boosting the governor as Texas' favorite son candidate for President of the United States.

Marian Clark and Lisa and Sheila Lee rolled out a section of red carpet for the visiting dignitaries to walk on when they debarked from their chartered bus. An honor guard was made up of Melissa Lee, Sallie Richards, Jolene Vaughn, Bennie Carol Oglesby, Tam Grigg and Debbie Bryant. All the young ladies are daughters or granddaughters of members of the city council or local members of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, with the exception of Miss Richards, who is the great granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wylie.

Girls of the honor guard were carrying Connally for President placards.

Following the governor's talk, coffee, cookies and ice water were served from a table inside the city hall. The table was laid with a white linen cloth and centered with a large arrangement of flowers, featuring a map of Texas. Many in the crowd took advantage of the refreshment period to meet Governor Connally. Wives of city council members and historical committee members, headed by Mrs. Royce Lee, served the refreshments.

After spending over 30 minutes here the tour loaded up and left for Robert Lee where the governor inspected the construction now underway at the site of the new Robert Lee Reservoir. Another crowd was on hand at the Robert Lee site. Following that stop, the caravan moved on to San Angelo for a lunch stop.

## Norton Against Consolidation

### District Court Will Convene Monday

Judge Joe L. Mayes will preside when 51st District Court convenes Monday in Robert Lee.

A grand jury has been called to hear any criminal cases which are brought up. Included on the list of grand jurors are Charlie C. Boecking, Preston Davis, Norman R. Kiker, R. C. Lasswell, Carroll Robbins, J. E. Scott, Joe Rawlings, Donald G. Ballard, Carl Blair, Billy C. Green, Lewis Heuvel, E. F. Jeffries, Frank Hearn W. R. Whitaker, James Arrott and Don Fields.

Voters of Norton School District showed thorough disapproval of the proposal to consolidate with Bronte School when they voted last Saturday 116-40 against the issue. The almost three-to-one votes against consolidation leaves Norton School patrons with a choice of rebuilding their school, which was destroyed by fire June 8, or to join either by consolidation or annexation with Ballinger or Winters.

Bronte voters turned out unusually well for an issue which had little opposition. They voted 174-3 for the consolidation.

The issue of consolidation with Bronte cannot be voted on for at least one year.

## Constitutional Amendments Published; Voters to Decide in November Election

Readers of The Enterprise will notice that copies of seven proposed constitutional amendments are being run in this issue. A total of 14 amendments will be voted on at the general election in November. Only seven are being published in The Enterprise with the other seven being run in the Robert Lee Observer.

State law provides that proposed amendments be published for four consecutive weeks in some legal publication in each county. Consequently, most newspapers in counties with more than one paper publish only part of the amendments.

If space permits, the entire 14 will be published one time in this newspaper, as a public service.

Any amendments which are approved by Texas voters in November will become part of the patchwork Texas Constitution which already contains nearly 200 amendments. Amendments which have been added since the constitution was written in 1876 have more than doubled the words of the original document.

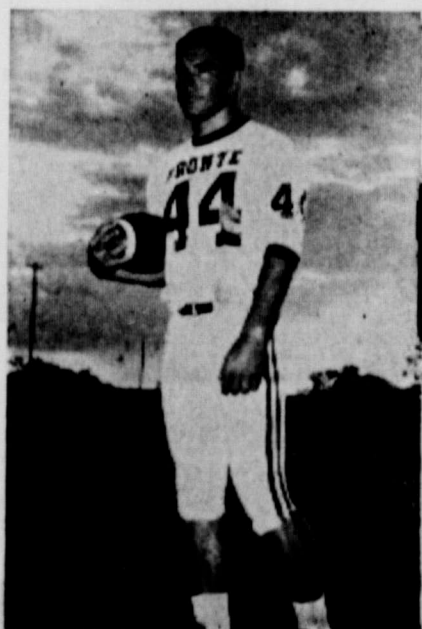

**Common Plants May Be Poisonous**

"The summertime beauty of our state's lush vegetation in yards, fields, pastures, and woodlands also holds dangers that the public should heed," H. N. Smith, State Conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Temple, warned this week.

Smith said that throughout the U. S. and Canada more than 700 species of plants are known to cause death, illness or extreme discomfort to people.

"Chewing, swallowing or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of certain plants, trees and shrubs takes a heavy toll," Smith said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these sources."

Parents should be concerned, the SCS official stated, because many of the plants are quite common in flower and vegetable gardens, and in ornamental landscaping, as well as in wild places. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of plant.

The beautiful oleander bush, for example, grown all over the country, contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis. The toxin is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

The popular Christmas flower poinsettia is full of an acid, burning juice, so lethal that a child who consumed one leaf might die. Mistletoe berries can also be deadly.

Peach tree leaves contain hydrocyanic acid, one of the most dangerous poisons known. Potato and tomato plants, close kin to the deadly nightshade, have foliage that contains alkaloid poisons which can cause severe

digestive upset and nervous disorder if eaten.

Jimson weed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes more poisoning than any other plant. It grows from 2 to 5 feet tall, has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers resembling morning glories. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves.

Duffenbachia, or dumb cane, is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalk contains needle-like crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbedded in the tissue of the mouth and tongue causing severe swelling and pain.

Castor bean seeds are especially dangerous because they are so deadly and so readily available. They are sold in garden stores for about 25 cents a packet and are popular because they produce large, lush plants in one season. Yet one seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

Mescalbean, or mountain laurel, is also dangerous. It has a poison bean with a hard coat. If it is swallow whole there may be no ill effects, but if chewed or crushed it can be lethal.

Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include elephant ear, larkspur, azaleas, lantana canana, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poisoning, poison oak and poison enumac. "More detailed information on these and other plants can be secured from health and plant authorities," Smith said. "However, we have requested SCS offices in our state's 184 soil and water conservation districts to cooperate fully with the National Safety Council in keeping the public alerted to plants that cause these problems."

## How Much to Pay for a House?

The growing price tag on new houses gives families good cause to think seriously about home ownership. "How much can I afford to pay?" they ask first.

The ready-made guidelines and rules-of-thumb never seem to apply to any family in particular. Your safest bet is to forget all these and determine your own house buying power.

To determine how much to spend safely on a new house appraise carefully your financial situation. Then match it against the price of the house and how much it costs to run it.

Add up all steady family income. For most families this will be a base salary, because it is risky to rely heavily on commissions, overtime pay, bonuses or a wife's pay unless you use a conservative figure based on a three or four average.

Subtract from the total family income all your non-housing expenses — food, transportation, clothing, debt payments, medical, etc — to find out how much you have regularly available every month for running a house and for savings.

Homeowners spend about 24 per cent of their after-tax monthly income on basic housing expenses, including the mortgage payment, house insurance, maintenance, repairs, heating and cooling, utilities and real estate taxes.

Families with larger incomes

tend to buy larger houses and have larger monthly expenses. However, families with high incomes generally spend a smaller percentage of their earnings on housing.

## Home Economics Tips

Summer has brought many changes to the family—not the least of these is the longer hours for children to play outside. This not only makes it harder to get them to bed but demands mother to be prepared with hunger-appeasing snacks. Foods and nutrition specialists estimate that 10 to 15 per cent of a person's daily calories is supplied by "nibbles"—so make these nibbles count nutritionally. Some sensible snack foods include celery, carrots, other raw vegetables and fruits, nuts, cheese and milk. Here's a cool summer snack: Add chocolate syrup and peppermint ice cream to milk. Sounds good, doesn't it?

Sewing with cool, summery fabrics like cotton voile, dotted swiss, or cotton eyelet, calls for a little extra care with seams. They should be as invisible as possible, neat and narrow. The French seam is the best choice. Check sewing books for exact instructions for stitching this seam.

You can give cotton gloves a crisp, like-new appearance with spray starch. After washing gloves, roll them up in a terry towel to remove excess moisture. Then spray evenly with starch and let dry.

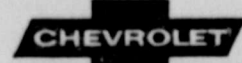

**"LENGTH OF MARRIAGE" SS REGULATION CHANGED**

The "length of marriage" requirement in social security's definition of "widow," "widower," and "stepchild of a deceased worker" has been changed, reports Ted F. Moellering, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office. A widow, widower, or stepchild may now qualify for social security benefits based on a marriage that has been in existence for only nine months just before the death of the worker.

Moellering added that in some cases a marriage that has lasted for as little as three months may qualify the survivor. These are cases involving accidental death or death in the line of duty in the uniformed services.

Benefits under this change in the law were first payable in February 1968. Any person who has been previously disqualified because a marriage had not been in effect long enough should contact the Social Security office at 3000 West Harris Ave. in San Angelo, or see the representative when he is in this area.

Young persons 9 to 19 will be eligible to compete in the rodeo.

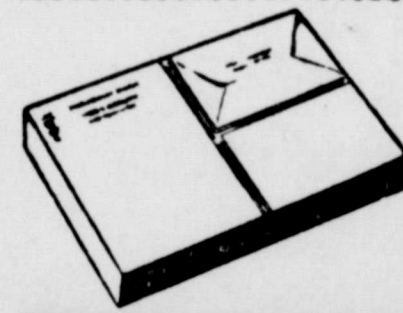

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR11)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any

bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas as the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.



Austin — Campaigns will be shaping up soon on 14 more amendments to the state constitution. All 14 of the proposed changes in the state's basic laws will be voted on at the general election Nov. 5. Some are far-reaching, others routine.

Here are the amendments in the order in which they will appear on the Nov. 5 ballot:

1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.

2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.

3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, within the "prudent man rule."

4. Allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.

5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session. (Present limit is 120 days.)

6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.

7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.

8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.

9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. (Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.)

10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texarkana.

11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant Counties.

12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit concerns to operate plants thus financed.

13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.

14. Spelling out that legislators will not be ineligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

**GOP OFF FOR MIAMI**—Most Texas Republican delegates to the GOP national convention will be shuffling off to Miami Beach this weekend. Opening session is Monday, Aug. 5.

First caucus of the Texans (who have 56 votes in the presidential-vice presidential nominating procedure) is scheduled for 3 p.m. Sunday (Aug. 4).

Sen. John Tower and Mrs. Tobin Armstrong serve on the convention platform and resolutions committee. Douglas R. DeCluitt of Waco and Mrs. Malcolm Milburn of Austin serve on the credentials committee; Jim Collins of Dallas and Mrs. Richard M. Sowell of McAllen, permanent organization; Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Basil E. Atkinson Jr. of Lufkin, rules and order of business.

**DEMOCRATS PREPARING TOO**—Democrats are getting ready for their own big pow-wow in Chicago starting Aug. 26.

Gov. John Connally, Texas delegation chairman and favorite

son candidate for the presidency, announced these appointments to convention posts:

Secretary of State Roy Barre, secretary; Cecil Burney of Corpus Christi and Mrs. Roland Boyd of McKinney, resolutions and platform committee; Will D. Davis of Austin and Miss Claudia Brummett of Amarillo, credentials committee; Tom Gordon of Abilene and Miss Julianan Cowden of Alvarado, rules and order of business; Mrs. Horace Betsford of Corpus Christi and M. J. Anderson of Austin, committee on permanent convention organization.

Also, Rhea Howard, Wichita Falls, committee to notify the presidential candidate of nomination; Mrs. Hilda B. Weinert of Seguin, committee to notify vice presidential nominee; J. C. Looney of Edinburg, honorary convention vice president; J. C. Martin of Laredo, honorary assistant vice president; Ralph McCullough of Houston, honorary secretary; Hunter McLellan of Fort Worth, honorary assistant secretary; and John Mobley of Austin, delegation sergeant-at-arms.

**CONNALLY TRIMS BUDGET**—Governor Connally trimmed the 1969 state budget enacted by the

special legislative session \$1.3 million and sternly lectured lawmakers for setting up \$1.4 million in Agriculture Department appropriations as a lump sum item which he could not veto selectively.

Governor also vetoed seven controversial riders including those which sought to cut off funds for policing air pollution control by cotton gins and prevent use of state planes and helicopters to catch traffic law violators. Connally took the veto axe to these spending items:

\$600,000 for temporary building to house the comptroller's department; \$275,000 for two new elevators in the capitol; \$187,500 for the Port Lavaca causeway state park; \$90,000 for Somervell County state park land; \$91,000 for legal clerks in 13 courts of civil appeals; \$50,000 for insurance claim investigation; \$200,000 for Blinn College to operate Old Washington State Park museum; \$17,500 for a deputy administrator for the Liquor Control Board; \$16,500 for assistant executive director of state board of control; and \$13,000 for assistant director of auditing for LCB.

**COURT SPEAKS**—A Dallas golfer who injured his back when he was thrown from a golf cart at Dallas Riverlake Country Club has won a new trial in his damage suit for \$134,000 against the club. High Court approved the move for George A. McRay after a Dallas court had ruled in favor of the club. McRay claims the club was negligent in

allowing high grass to obscure a stump off the fairway on the 18th hole. Cart McRay was riding hit this stump and McRay was thrown out.

**ACTION SPARKED**—Faced with the Jan. 1 deadline for a regulation prohibiting intra-state shipments of cattle from counties having no certification for brucellosis control, several counties are hurrying into action to secure certification.

Animal Health Department reports three counties—Hemphill, Orange and Starr—qualified for certification during June. Cameron and Hidalgo Counties qualified for recertification.

Sixty-eight counties are in the process of testing initial certification.

**SCREWWORM DANGER**—State and federal animal health experts are becoming worried at the increase in screwworm infestation cases being filed this year. To date 1,125 cases have been reported in 1968.

After the sterile fly program was inaugurated in 1962, the screwworm count fell below 300 cases by 1964.

The rapid increase in cases this year is blamed on extremely wet weather in South and West Texas which has made a climate especially suited for the worms and their parent screwworm flies.

Ranchers are warned to perform surgical operations (dehorning and castration) only if maximum safety precautions are taken to prevent fly infestation.

**Short Snorts**

Governor Connally called a special election in Dallas' Third District for Aug. 24 to fill the unexpired term of the late Congressman Joe Pool.

Citizens State Bank of Refugio seeks a charter from the State Banking Department.

House Speaker Ben Barnes named a special commission of legislators and laymen to look into the economic problems of employers and employees in Texas, including the merits and demerits of minimum wage legislation.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**  
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.
