Junior Rodeo to Be Held In Bronte Saturday Night

A Junior Rodeo will be held Saturday night, Aug. 10, at the roping arena in the west part of Bronte. Sponsored by Coke County Roping Club, the contests are open to any young people between the ages of 9 and 19.

The festivities will get underway at 5 p.m. when a parade will be staged through downtown Bronte. All riders who wish to participate are invited, and should meet at the arena shortly before time for the parade to start. The parade will leave the arena, follow Main Street to Highway 277, turn right for two blocks, turn around and follow the same route back to the arena. The rodeo itself will get under-

way with approximately two hours of fast, thrilling entertainment in store for spectators and plenty of action for the participants.

Four trophies will be given, one each to high point junior and senior boy and girl. Winning a division in the rodeo will not interfere with Interscholastic League eligibility, Roping Club Officials said.

Joe McCutchen, president of the Roping Club, said a large crowd of spectators and entrants is expected for the rodeo. "We're planning a good rodeo with some good stock and some good entrants and can assure everyone of a real night of entertainment," McCutchen said.

Admission price will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for youngsters under 12. An entry fee of \$1.00 for each event entered will be charged those participating in the event.

Events which will be held for both junior and senior girls are barrel racing, pole bending and flag racing. Events planned for junior boys will be steer riding, break away calf roping and barrel racing. Senior boys can compete in tie down calf roping, ribbon roping and bull riding.

In addition to the events listed above there will be a goat scramble for boys 12 years old and under. \$1.00 prizes will be tied to the animals and the lads who can get the goats will keep the money for prizes.

Several hard luck prizes have been donated to the Roping Club by M. L. Leddy Co. of San Angelo for presentation at the rodeo.

McCutchen said everybody in Coke County and the surrounding area is invited to the rodeo.

Lara received misdemeanor indictments for carrying and rudely displaying a prohibited weapon, a pistol, in Robert Lee on June 28.

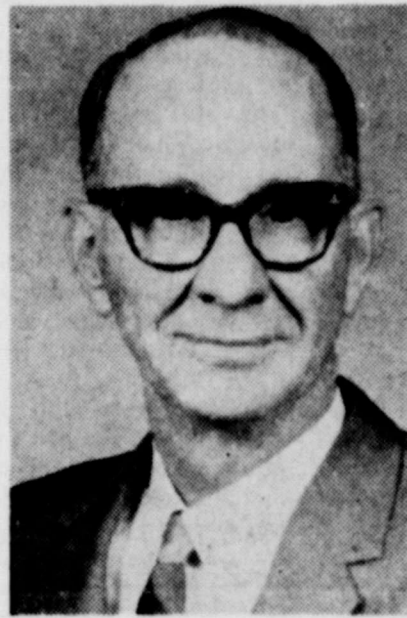
JIMMY RAWLINGS DOING WELL AFTER SURGERY

Apetite Down?

Hot weather got your appetite? Most folks eat lighter foods during this season of the year and they feel better as a result.

Produce counters are filled with a tantalizing array of fresh fruits to help cut down on prices. Cantaloupes and watermelons are two of the more economical choices.

Peaches, plums, bananas, and avocados are available. White seedless grapes are plentiful — washed and tucked into a plastic bag.

They are good thirst quenchers on an automobile trip. Bing cherries are also good travelers.

Tomatoes are moderately priced for this time of the year. Eggplant, corn, cabbage, carrots, squash, purple hull and crowder peas, okra, green onions, radishes, potatoes and dry yellow onions are among the wide variety of fresh vegetables now available.

Generally, meat prices are up a bit. Beef chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, ground beef and franks are among your better choices, on prices. Some brands of bacon, hams and picnics offer best prospects in the pork department. Large size turkeys, turkey parts, eggs and fryer chickens offer good eating at attractive prices.

Updated Washers and Dryers Handle New Finishes

Durable press fabrics have brought about improvements in home laundry equipment. All leading brands now feature models which include the special cool-down cycles in washers, and the automatic controls in dryers which are required for durable

press finishes.

Several companies are using "solid state" controls on their top-of-the-line models which provide an unusually wide range of agitation and spin speeds.

Now in its initial phase, some sources predict that further development of such controls can eventually produce a "truly automatic" washer — one that senses water hardness, clothes whiteness and detergent effectiveness, and then automatically adjusts washing action for each type of load.

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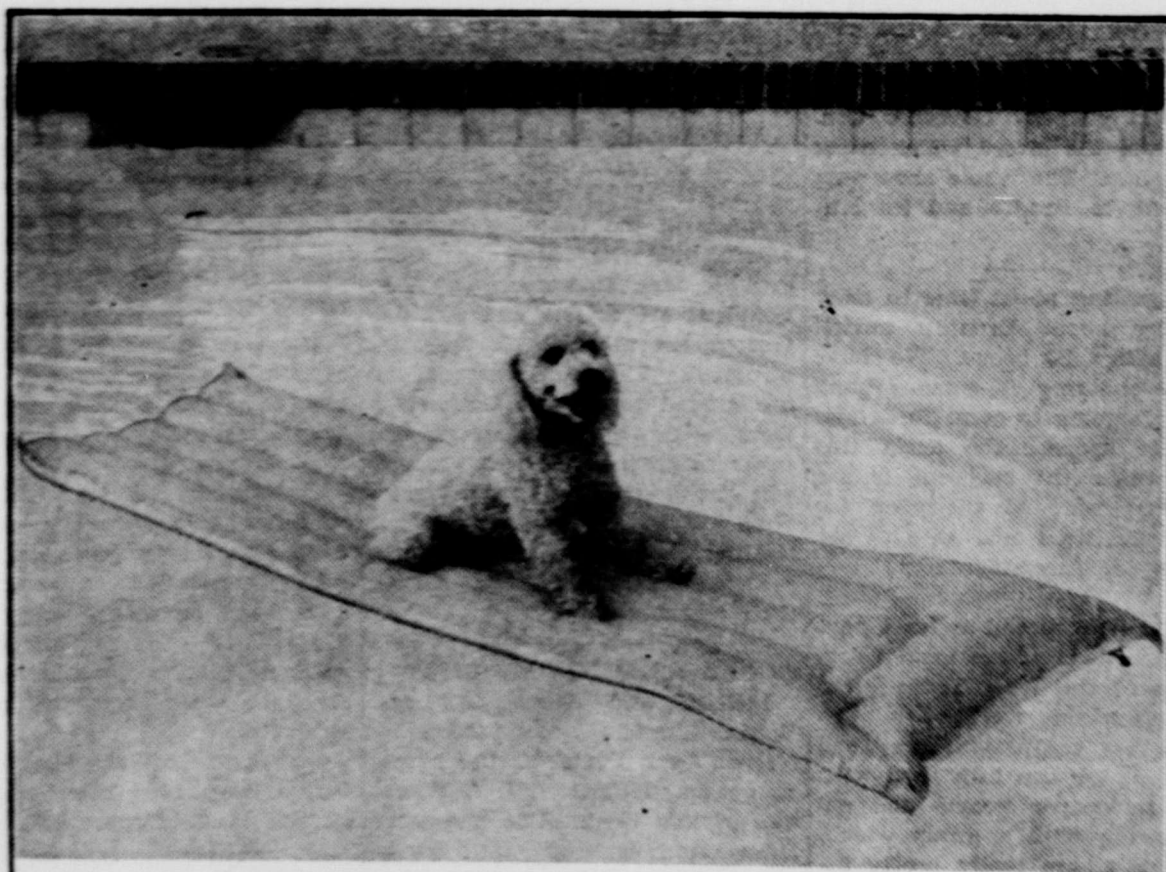

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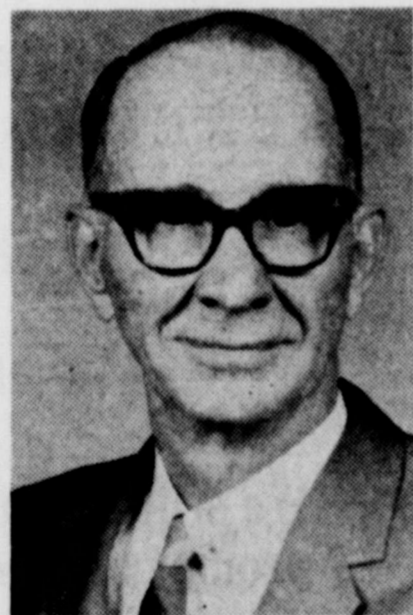

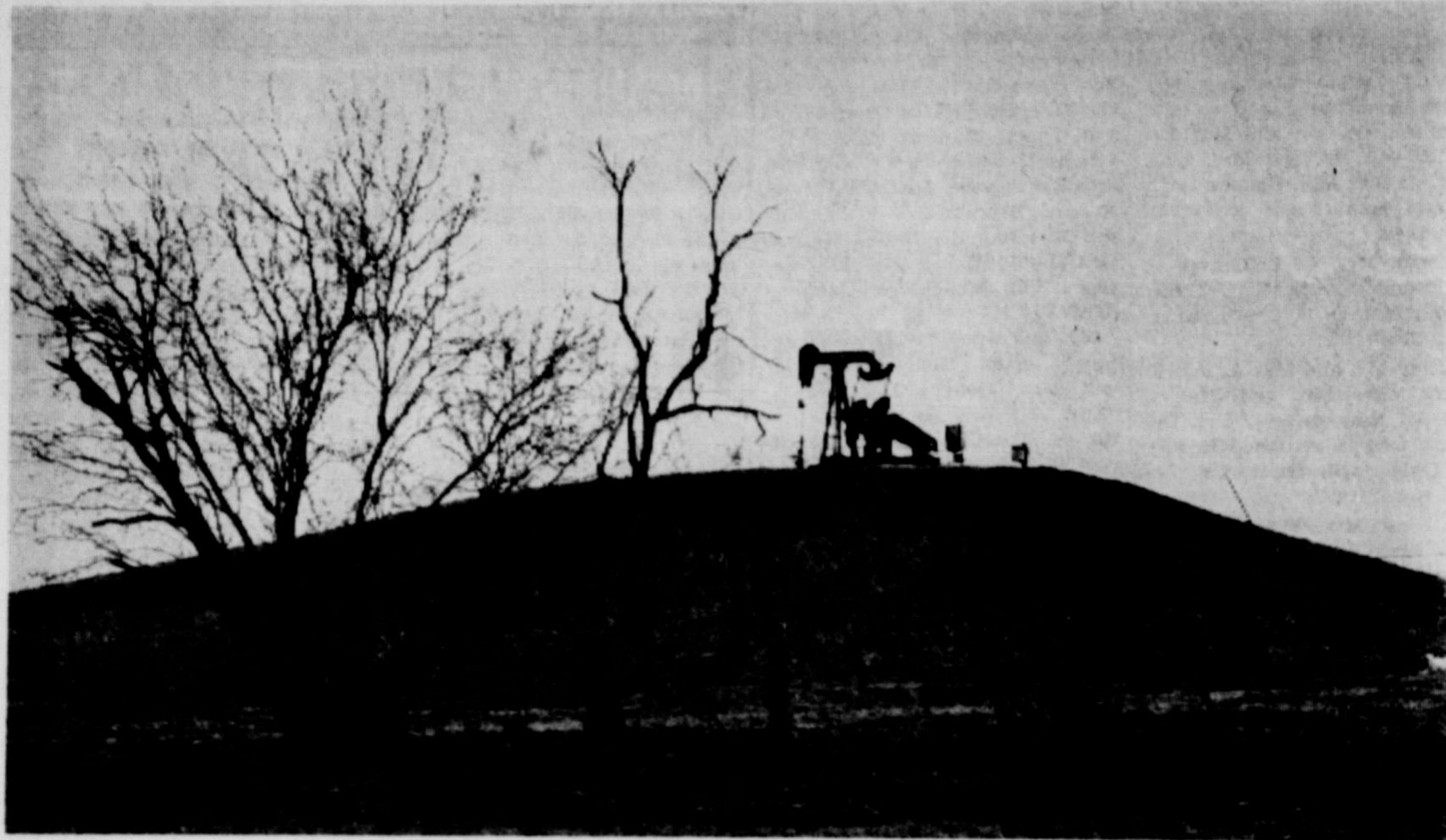
NURSERY OPEN

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THE ISLES OF TEXAS — In the I.A.B. oil field of West Texas, near the town of Robert Lee, Humble Oil & Refining Company has placed wellheads

on great mounds of earth. The lunarlike mounds — 17 in all and ranging from nine to 58 feet in height — dot a landscape that is soon to become a

lake bottom. Formation of the lake, the Robert Lee Reservoir, will begin this fall when the gates of a new dam slide shut and start backing up the Colo-

rado River over ranch land, including part of the I.A.B. field. (Photo by Humble Oil & Refining Co.)

head-crowned islands out in the lake.

The oil company's field employees have long since adjusted to the idea that the I.A.B., which is in an area with an average rainfall of 10 inches — will be operated in many respects like an offshore oil facility. Pumpers, who are the men whose day-to-day job involves checking the operation of each well, will be particularly affected. Twelve of the field's 51 wells will be surrounded by water and will be reachable only by boat. An additional five wells will be connected to the shore by causeways.

Onshore duties also will be complicated by the new lake. To move from one side of the oil field to the other will involve a 27-mile drive along the shore as contrasted to the present direct, two-mile ride. Well-servicing vehicles will have to be floated to the islands on barges and moved up earthen ramps specially constructed for this purpose.

Engineers are taking many precautions to prevent water pollution. Sophisticated devices on each oil well will shut down production immediately in case of emergency. Also a monitoring system will allow continuous on-shore observation of the offshore water injection wells.

Crude gathering lines that run from the oil wells have been wrapped on the outside with tarpaper and coated on the inside with concrete. They are buried two feet beneath the future lake bottom to prevent corrosion.

Looking out at the towering earthen mounds, the driver of the pickup truck scratches his head and does some speculating. "I'd say it looks like we've got a new tourist attraction on our hands," he muses.

And he's probably right. For the next few months, there'll be a spectacular "mountains of the moon" landscape. And after that, one of the most unusual lakes in Texas.

IAB Field Featured In Petroleum Magazine

Editor's Note: Robert Lee, Coke County, the new Robert Lee dam and reservoir and the I.A.B. oil field have been getting some wide publicity recently. The following article, "The Isles of Texas", was written by Joe F. Tucker, public relations manager for Humble Oil Company in the Western Region office in Dallas. It was printed in the widely-distributed summer issue of "Petroleum Today," quarterly magazine of the American Petroleum Institute. It has been distributed to newspapers by the Humble Co., which is the anonymous oil company referred to in the article. We reprint it, courtesy of "Petroleum Today."

The pickup truck jounces along the narrow West Texas ranch road, trailing white clouds of caliche dust. Then, down through a draw thick with mesquite and up a hill on the other side.

"We're getting to the place," the driver says. "You should be able to see one pretty soon now." He pushes back his sweat-stained hat and reaches to adjust the truck's air conditioner.

Suddenly, there ahead you spot what he's been talking about; a

massive mound of earth, higher than two telephone poles, wider than a football field. Lacing the sides of the mound are strengthening boulders. And perched neatly on top of it is a solitary wellhead (which is the part of an oil well that's above ground).

In the distance, a second mound of earth rises from cleared ranch land, and to its right, another. In all, 17 such mounds, nine to 58 feet in height, dot the area, making it look like a moonscape of a science fiction film.

This, however, is not the moon but an oil field near Robert Lee, Texas. In most ways, it resembles other such fields in the state. But in three respects, it is quite different — because of its name, because of those lunarlike mounds, and because of what's going to happen to it within the next year.

First, the name — which is all initials. It's called the I.A.B. That stands for I. A. Bird, the rancher on whose land the first successful well in the field was drilled.

The mounds? The future of the area? Well, by this time next year much of the I.A.B. should

be flooded under up to 50 feet of water. And those earthen mounds, each with a welltop atop it, will be islands out in a large lake, the Robert Lee Reservoir.

Formation of the lake will begin this fall when the gates of Robert Lee Dam, now abuilding five miles away, slide shut. Then the Colorado River will start backing up between the mesas and over the ranch land, inundating part of the I.A.B. But the wells — with their "heads" held above the lake by the mounds of earth — will continue producing oil without harming the water.

Oddly enough, the I.A.B. will also be "flooded" in another, less obvious way. Some 17,000 barrels of water a day will be purchased from the Colorado River Municipal Water District and pumped from the new lake into a treatment plant. From there, the water will be injected into the rock formation, 5,500 feet underground, that contains the oil.

This water, advancing through porous limestone, will push the oil ahead of it and up to the surface through production wells. By the use of waterflooding (as the process is called), the ultimate oil recovery may be doubled.

Waterflooding is now new for the I.A.B. It was first undertaken in 1962, five years after the field's discovery, using water drilled near the bank of the Colorado River. These wells, however, will be inundated by the lake.

The I.A.B. project seems likely to attract attention as one of the most unusual oil and water conservation stories of the year. Owen H. Ivey, general manager of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, calls the program "a fine example of cooperation between two great industries — petroleum and water." (In semi-arid West Texas, water is an industry).

"Revenue derived from the sale of water to the petroleum industry will be used to help pay for the construction of the dam and other district facilities," Ivey adds. "This same revenue will enable the district to deliver water to communities at a lower cost."

The organization Ivey represents is a conservation district created by the Texas Legislature in 1949 to furnish water to Odes, Big Spring, Snyder, and other communities in 11 counties. To accomplish this, plans were

made for the construction of the Robert Lee Dam and the resultant reservoir approximately 18 miles long and four miles wide. Ultimately 50 million gallons of water a day will be diverted from the lake to help meet municipal requirements of cities up to 125 miles away.

The lake also holds promise as a recreation haven. Fishing and water-sports facilities will be available to the public, as well as five lakeside picnic and camping areas. One 200-acre park will be located in the center of the I.A.B. oil field within view of the well-

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 52a. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas as the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

County Commissioners Agree to Pay Part of Loss on Ambulance Service

Coke County commissioners, in regular session Monday, met with Sam Williams, owner of Williams Funeral Homes in Robert Lee and Bronte, and operator of the county's only ambulance service.

Williams met with the commissioners to request some sort of remuneration for his losses in operating an ambulance service for the county. He said that his annual loss in operating two ambulances amounted to between \$4,000 and \$5,000. He told the court that some of the loss was caused from lack of payment for some of the service he renders, but most of it is caused by the high cost of maintaining the vehicles for the amount of use they get.

Williams presented two recommendations to the commissioners: he offered to retain ownership and operate one ambulance himself and operate the second one if the county would purchase it and pay expense involved in the operation; or he offered to operate only one ambulance and asked that the county pay him \$100 per month to help defray expenses.

Williams told the court that the cost of running an ambulance would run at least \$2,000 per year, besides the initial cost of the vehicle and equipment.

Members of the court discussed the matter and decided it would be more economical to pay the \$100 per month than to own an ambulance. Judge W. W. Thetford said he called the attorney general's office in Austin to ask about legal technicalities involved in this kind of arrangement, and some opinions are being mailed to the county.

The judge said that probably some sort of contract will be worked out at a meeting of the court next week.

Williams brought out the possibility of needing two ambulances at one time in his discussion but Judge Thetford said Tuesday that he understood Williams plans to install ambulance equipment in his funeral car so it can be used for an ambulance in case it is needed.

The court was of the opinion that Williams needs some relief from the losses he has borne during the years he has provided this area with ambulance service.
