Little Red School Group to Work To Keep Schools
AUSTIN - A statewide com-
mittee to represent mittee to represent rural land-
owners and those who enjoy ing in the country during the expected struggle over school district consolidation in the current session of the Texas Legistature was announced here Wednesday.
The group, known as "The Little Red School House Committee," is composed of a cross-section of farmers, ranchers and rural landowners from throughout the state. Charles Schreiner III, a prominent rancher from Mountain Home, is chairman of the committee,
We believe the forced consolidation of small school districts, as proposed in the report of the Governor's Committee on
Public School Education, will go a long way toward destroying rural life as it is now enjoyed in Texas," Schreiner declared in a news conference at noon Wednesday.
Schreiner pointed out that the Governor's Committee recom mends the forced consolidation of Texas' 1,218 school districts into a total of 353.
"This would virtually wipe out 865 community centers, since mary symbols of community mary symbols of community
identification," Schreiner said. He refuted the claim that bigHe refuted the claim that bigmatically provide better educa tion for students. "More bigmess is not an absolute is not an absolute
"The Little said. "The Little Red School House Committee has been formed to awaken rural landowners and residents of small communities to the unseen dangers of forced con-
solidation and to acquaint legislators in Austin with the feelings of the rural people of Texas," Schreiner said.
In addition to the erosion of In addition to the erosion of cosing of their schools, Schreiner said that other adverse effects would include the bussing of stu would inften many miles away elimination or serious curtailment of many outstanding programs designed primarily for rural schools, such as vocationa agriculture and vocational homeagriculture and vocational home-
making programs; the eliminamaking programs; the elimina-
tion of athletic teams from Class AA and below, with the resultant loss of identity for the communities and a decrease or entire elimination of a voice for the rural residents on school boards which will be centered in urban areas.
"The Little Red School House Committee and all its members certainly want to provide the best education possible for the young people of our state," young people of our wh't be
Schreiner said. "But we don lieve that this proposed forced consolidation program, requiring the elimination of nearly 900 school districts in Texas, is the answer."

To Equal Demand But-
If you complete a college education, a job amaits if you are in the right profession. Reports show that although 1966 and 1975 projections pre dict the demand for college-educated workers will balance the supply, an imbalance within proressions is expected.
There will not be enough phy dians, dentists, engineers and physical scientists, according to a Department of Labor survey. A
surplus of school teachers, math ematicians and life scientists is expected.
About 6.2 million college graduates will be needed by 1975 Professional and technical fields will call for 4.3 milhon; managerial occupations .9 mimion 3 million will be needed in and 3 million will be needed in oth
fields,

Nation's colleges and universi lies are expected to confer about fessional degrees over the proyear period About 1.7 million master's degrees and doctorates are expected to be conferred from June 1966 to June 1974 more than 100 per cent more than in the previous nine-year period. is currently the largest occupation for women graduates. The survey suggests that unless larger proportion of women en ter other high demand profes sions, the outlook for employ ment for college-educated wom en may be less favorable than in recent years.
Short supply of physicians and dentists can be alleviated only if steps are taken to expand sufficiently the capacity of medical and dental schools.
