He was a good farmer and stockman and businessman, and was always able to provide well for his family.

On top of all that, he was a good Democrat, and served his party in many ways.

But, as I look back over the 26 years I have known him, I think his greatest trait was his ability to give. He had that rare quality of being able to help his fellowman without taking away the dignity of the person he was helping. He was the kind of man who could give you the shirt off his back, and talk you into believing you were doing him a favor by taking it.

He was Libby's dad, and he died last Thursday.

### Trustee Election Set for April 5

An election was called at a meeting of the school board last Thursday night to elect three trustees for the school district. Terms of Bill Thomas, Joe Rawling and Horace Taylor expire this year.

The election will be held Saturday, April 5, with polling places set up at the city hall in Bronte and at Green's Store in Tennyson. Mrs. Otis Smith will be judge for the Bronte box and Mrs. Tom Green for the Tennyson box.

Any qualified voter who lives within the boundaries of the school district is eligible to seek one of the trustee positions. Name of candidates should be filed in the office of County Judge W. W. Thetford 30 days before the election.

### Funeral Services Held Wednesday For J. A. Percifull

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p.m. Wednesday afternoon at First United Methodist Church in Bronte for Jesse A. Percifull, 78, resident of Coke County for 69 years.

Mr. Percifull died at his home at 12:05 a.m. Tuesday. He had been in ill health for a long time.

Officiating was the pastor, the Rev. Fred Brown, assisted by the Rev. Harry K. Morris, pastor of First Baptist Church in Bronte. Burial was in Fairview cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mr. Percifull was born Nov. 17, 1890, in Erath County. He moved to Coke County in 1900 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Percifull. He married Linnie B. Kiker Jan. 29, 1916, in Bronte. He was a former mail carrier, barber and stock farmer, and operated Central Drug Store 15 years before his retirement.

He was a member of the Methodist Church and Lions Club, and was secretary-treasurer of the original board of directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Wayman Percifull of Bronte, Dan Percifull of San Antonio and Noel Percifull of Abilene; one daughter, Mrs. Floyd (Marjorie) Gravitt of San Angelo; seven grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Palbearers were his nephews, including George Clark of Hondo, Lucene Clark of Mosquero, N. M., Frank and Will Percifull of Robert Lee, F. P. Brashier of Ranger and K. B. Watson of San Angelo.

Honorary pallbearers were O. H. Willoughby, B. E. Modgling, Ollie Eubanks, E. L. Caperton, H. O. Whitt and O. R. McQueen, all of Bronte.

## Board Extends Contracts Of School Administrators

Bronte School trustees met last Thursday night and acted on a large number of matters concerning the school. Contracts of Principals James L. Golson and James N. Raughton were extended until June 15, 1971.

The contract of Supt. C. B. Barbee was extended to June 30, 1972, at the January meeting of the board. Teachers' contracts will be considered at a later date.

In other matters brought before it, the board:

- \*Voted to give residents of the Maverick community control of the supervision and maintenance of the Maverick Community Building. This property was included with the new area which was annexed to Bronte School District recently.

- \*Discussed valuations of property in the newly annexed Maverick area, and is now in the

process of evaluating this property.

- \*Opened and read bids on two old school buses. A 1961 Corvair Greenbriar Sports Wagon was sold to Joy Motor Co. of Abilene for \$152. A 1962 Chevrolet 36-passenger bus was sold to Kelly Motor Co. of Coleman for \$333.

- \*Read and accepted an oil, gas and mineral bid from Sun Oil Co. on Layrick School property.

- \*Agreed to request a 12-passenger school bus to be financed from the 1969-70 budget.

- \*Agreed to send copies of the board's recent evaluation of proposals made by the Governor's Committee on Public School Education to a number of state officials.

- \*Accepted the installation of new cabinets in the sewing room

### Home Economic Facts

Evaporated milk is fortified with vitamin C. Nonfat dry milk powder that is sold abroad has been fortified with vitamins A and D. Just recently nonfat dry milk powder sold within the United States has been fortified with Vitamin A and D in the amounts of 5,000 International Units and 500 International Units respectively. This indeed provides a more excellent product.

The number one nutritional problem in the United States is obesity. The major cause is a divergence between the intake of food and the output of energy. However, research has found that in the obese person, the satiety mechanism (signal you are full) is not as responsive as in the lean, and not as responsive in the sedentary as in the active person. The satiety mechanism is located in the hypothalamus of the brain.

In regard to desire for food,

studies have shown that obese persons are more dependent on external signals (smell, taste) than internal signs (stomach contractions), whereas lean persons respond more to internal signals.

Do you know what happens when you gain or lose weight? The fat cells of the body enlarge or diminish when weight is gained or lost, respectively. The absolute number of fat cells does not change.
