## Redistricting Splits Bronte

Commissioner Howard Brock brought a map of the City of Bronte to The Enterprise office this week which shows tentative division of the city into precincts 2 and 4, in order to conform to the Supreme Court ruling of one man, one vote.

The line starts at the north edge of town on Washington Street (commonly known as Church Street) and continues southward to Reilly Street, then it turns west for one block and then back south again to the south edge of the city.

Everything west of this line would go into precinct 4, served by Commissioner Jack Corley. All property east of this line would remain in precinct 2, served by Commissioner Brock.

Brock said the commissioners court has not completed its work in dividing the four precincts evenly but the members expect to have it done in the next few weeks.

## Hospital District Bill Introduced

A bill to create a hospital district in East Coke County was sent this week to a sub-committee on Counties. Copies of a resolution requesting creation of the district were taken to Austin Monday by Mayor Royce Lee, Judge W. W. Thetford, Rev. Fred Brown and Martin Lee.

House Bill 1408 by Rep. George Baker would authorize creation of the district which would have the same boundaries as commissioners precincts 2 and 4.

The bill would allow authorization of property tax not to exceed 75 cent per \$100 valuation for support of hospital and nursing home facilities. Voters would have to approve creation of the district in an election called by local officials.

Students and teachers of the Bronte Schools are going at a rapid pace this week as they approach the end of the 1968-69 school term. Classes will be concluded next week with only the baccalaureate and two commencement programs to follow.

Baccalaureate services in honor of the 1969 seniors will be held Sunday night, May 25, in the school auditorium. The Rev. Fred Brown, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Bronte, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon.

## Six-Period Day Planned For School Next Year

Members of Bronte School's board of trustees had a busy night when they met last Thursday in the board room.

The school calendar for 1969-70 was set, allowing for 179 days of instruction. School will start Aug. 25. Thanksgiving holidays will be observed Nov. 27 and 28, and a long Christmas vacation will begin Dec. 23 and extend to

Jan. 6. Easter holidays are scheduled for March 26 through 31. March 6 will be a holiday in order for teachers to attend a TSTA convention. May 22 will mark the end of the school year.

A new feature of the 1969-70 school term will be the initiation of a six period day, instead of seven periods, as has been employed here. Every student in

high school will be required to take five academic subjects plus a course in either physical education or band. Athletic practice times will be limited to after school hours.

Another new feature next year will be the completion of the first semester's work before classes are dismissed for the Christmas holidays. The first semester of work will consist of 18 weeks and the second will have 20 weeks. Still another innovation will be the issuance of report cards every nine weeks, rather than every six weeks.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said all the changes noted above have been carefully considered and are being effected for one purpose: to provide more instructional time for the students. "We feel that these changes will give students more time for pursuing their studies, and will give teachers the freedom to spend more time on actual instruction," the superintendent said. "All of this, we believe, will add up to a higher quality program for our students," he added.

The resignation of Miss Sandra Pollock as high school English teacher was accepted, and Mrs. Zula Tomlinson Sweeten was employed to take her place and to coach girls physical education courses, including basketball.

Mrs. Sweeten is a graduate of Lake View High School in San Angelo and Angelo State College. She is the daughter of Mrs. W. B. Tomlinson of San Angelo and the late Mr. Tomlinson, former Bronte residents. Her husband is a student at Angelo State College. The family plans to move to Bronte.

The board approved an application with the State Department of Welfare for lunchroom commodities for use in the 1969-70 school term. They also approved the 1969 senior trip to Colorado Springs, Colo.

The school board also adopted some new policies regarding the school's band program and agreed to meet at 8 p.m. until the change back to Standard Time.

Certificates to Shellie Cumbie for Outstanding Member of the Tonette Band and Kim Arrott for Outstanding Member of the Junior Band.

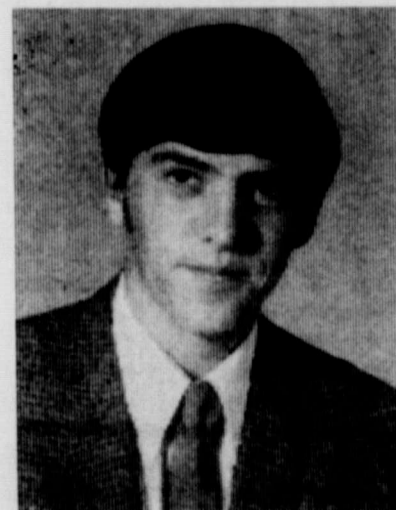

The Coke Conservation District and some 3000 companion districts throughout the nation along with their state and national associations are sponsoring the event for the 15th consecutive year.

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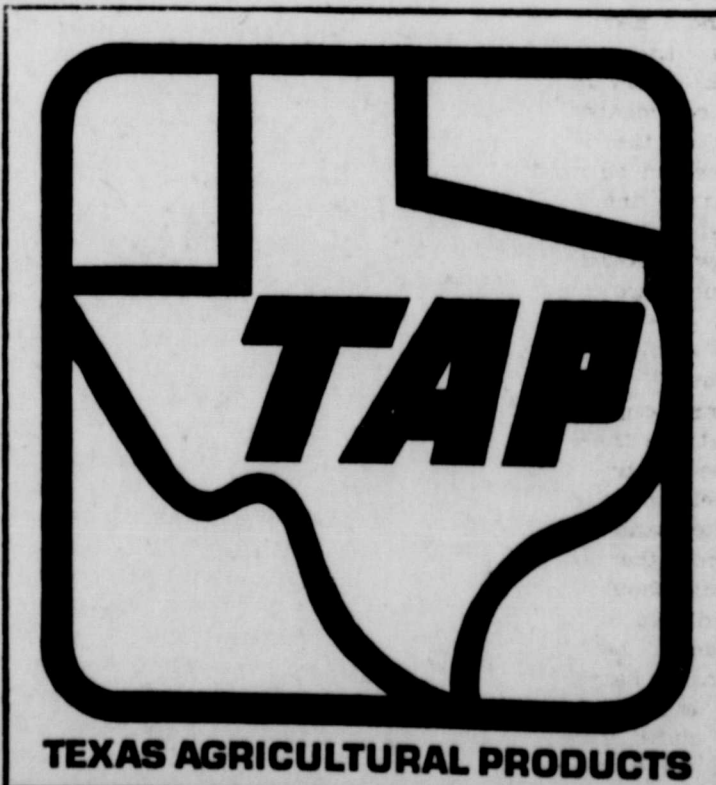

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**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to remove the constitutional interest rate limitations, subject to limits imposed by the Legislature, for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

"(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)**

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

## County Agents News Column

By **STERLING LINDSEY**

Each year about this time we start receiving calls asking if it is time to spray to control the pecan nut casebearer.

In answer to the above question and giving a general answer, we are still two to three weeks away from the time when a number of casebearer will be hatching and entering the small nuts.

The casebearer, at the present time, is in what we term the twig cycle — he is in the larvae (worm) stage and feeding in the new growth. She will complete this cycle, incubate, emerge as a moth, mature a few days then start depositing eggs on the nuts. The eggs normally take four to six days to hatch.

This means another two to three weeks before spraying time. You could get your sprayer ready and then start watching for egg deposits around the 20th.

Our weather has been so erratic this year that a definite hatch pattern may not develop. Some trees are a week ahead of others. The casebearer hatch may be elongated, also.

The screwworm could become our number one livestock menace again during 1969. Conditions over the State have been ideal for screwworm propagation. To date, the number of cases found is greater than during any time since the first year the screwworm control program was initiated, 1962. Every operator is being called upon by the Southwest Animal Health Foundation to do his part in preventing a screwworm outbreak. Certainly we want to do our part.

The following preventive steps are suggested by the Foundation:

1. Inspect animals regularly.
2. Avoid surgery if possible.
3. Collect and submit for identification any larvae or egg masses.
4. Treat wounds with EQ-335, Smear 62, Korlan or Co-Ral.
5. Spray or dip animals.
6. Observe shipping restrictions.
7. Check purchased animals for screwworms — check at point of purchase.
8. Encourage your neighbor to follow precaution in handling his stock.

Several 4-H Club members have competed in judging contests recently. As usual the competition was tough, but respectable scores were recorded in each contest.

The senior quarterhorse judging team, composed of Teddy Millican, Joy Cervenka and Marshall Millican placed third in the district contest. They were ten points out of first place, topped by Kimble County (10 points) and Coleman County (2 points). The junior quarterhorse judging team came in fourth. They were 16 points out of first place. The junior team members were Troy Millican, Marvin Ensor and Mary Cervenka.

In the senior contest, Teddy Millican was 6th high individual, Joy Cervenka 7th high individual. Troy Millican was 6th high in the junior contest and Mary Cervenka tied for 9th high individual.

The senior livestock judging team tied with Runnels County for 5th place in the district. The team members were Lane Beaty, A. J. Roe, Darrel Pitcock, and Edwin Lindsey. The junior team was less fortunate, placing 11th. Lesa Lindsey, Marvin Ensor, Sue Lindsey and Gary McDaniel made up the junior team.

Coke County submitted the only soil judging team entry in the district. Thus, the senior soil judging team will receive a bye to the State Contest.

## Coke SS Payments \$39,000 a Month

A record \$39,000 in monthly social security benefits was being paid to residents of Coke County at the end of December, 1968, according to Ted F. Moellering, district manager for social security.

Throughout the country, monthly benefits payable at the end of 1968 amounted to nearly \$2.1 billion, some \$350 million higher than at the end of 1967," Mr. Moellering continued. "Approximately three-quarters of the increased monthly amount resulted from higher benefit rates authorized by the 1967 Amendments to the Social Security Act. The remainder of the increase was due simply to a greater number of beneficiaries."

By the end of May, 1969, social security will be paying monthly benefits to more than 25 million people — one out of every eight Americans. Although retired workers comprise the largest group of beneficiaries, almost one-fourth of all people receiving benefits are under 60. There are currently more than 3.8 million children and .5 million young widowed mothers receiving payments. Yet the public continues to think of social security as a program for old people.

In Coke County, 76 people under 60 are receiving benefits. That figure breaks down into 40 under 18, 8 from age 18 to 21, and 28 from age 22 to 59.

Many students would have been unable to continue their educations, Moellering said, were it not for the 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act which extended survivors and dependents insurance benefits to students until their 22nd birthdays. In 1968, that program resulted in continuing benefits for 470,000 students.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies leaving a widow and two or more children range from \$82.50 to \$434.40 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security. Payments to the young family of a worker who dies at an early age could total as much as \$85,000 to \$100,000.

Mr. Moellering also pointed out that by the end of 1968, about 90 percent of Americans 65 and over were either receiving cash benefit or would have been eligible

for such benefits if they or their spouses had not been working.

In terms of Medicare, almost all people in the country 65 or over are eligible for hospital insurance benefits. Likewise, 95 percent of all older persons in the country have elected coverage under the voluntary supplementary medical insurance plan which pays physicians' fees.

Lake J. B. Thomas reached elevation 2229.45 Wednesday of last week, a gain of 1½ feet. Lake E. V. Spence, the new district reservoir above Robert Lee, was at an elevation 1819.90 and the river was still flowing briskly as far up as Silver. Beal's Creek was emptying into the river at a good clip. This represents a gain of 8.1 feet or about 15,000 acre feet.

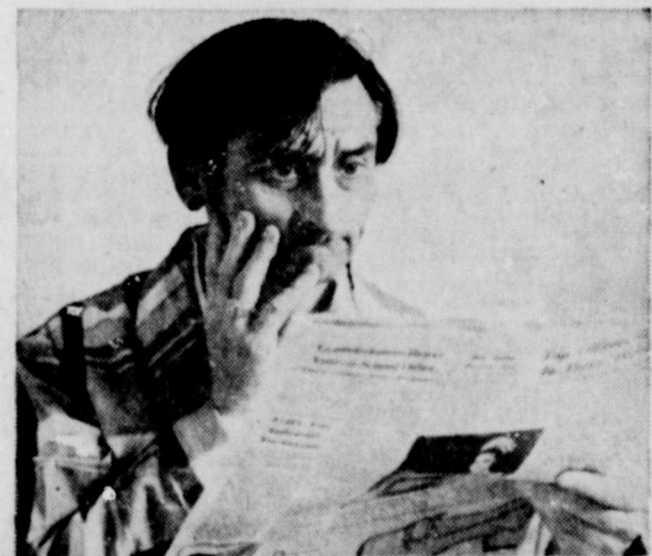
