### Barbee Elected Vice President Of State Assn.

Supt. C. B. Barbee has been selected vice president of the Texas Small Schools Association. The action was taken at a meeting last week in Austin of teachers and administrators who are members of the organization.

Barbee and other personnel of Bronte Schools have been active in the small schools organization for a number of years. Barbee was already chairman of Region 15 of the association when he was elected to the new position, but said he would have to get somebody else to take over that job.

The Bronte superintendent and six other officials of the Texas Small Schools Association met last Monday with Governor Preston Smith to discuss matters of special interest to small schools in Texas.

Barbee said if the usual custom of the organization is followed, next year he will become president-elect and the following year would take over as president of the state wide group.

### Youth Drowns In Oak Creek Lake

Eddie Lee Wiseman, 13, was pronounced dead by accidental drowning about 9 a.m. Sunday. The accident occurred at Oak Creek Lake when the youth became entangled in some moss while he was swimming after a fishing cork.

The youth was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Wiseman of Loraine. The family was on a weekend outing on the northeast corner of the lake near a fishing ramp. He drowned in about 10 feet of water.

Justice of the Peace Earl D. Nutter of Bronte investigated the accident and rendered the decision on cause of death. Nutter said two men jumped in the water, tried to rescue young Wiseman and "nearly drowned themselves." A third man finally succeeded in retrieving him and artificial respiration was vainly tried for about 30 minutes.

The body was taken to Newby Funeral Home in Bronte and later transferred to Bell-Seale Funeral Home in Snyder.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. Tuesday in Bethel Baptist Church in Snyder. Burial was in Snyder Cemetery. The youth was born Nov. 9, 1955, in Shreveport, La. He was a Baptist.

Survivors include his parents; a sister, Deborah Ann Wiseman of the home and three grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Wiseman of Turkey Creek, La., and Mrs. Bob Dickens of Carrizzo Springs.

\*Agreed to repair Corvair bus which was in a collision last spring.

## 2 Coke Youths to Meet

Two high school students from Coke County will travel by chartered bus Tuesday, July 29, to Baylor University in Waco where they will attend a Citizenship Seminar July 29-Aug. 2 conducted by the Texas Farm Bureau.

They are: Dee Ann Percifull, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayman Percifull of Bronte, and Jacky Preslar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Burns of Robert Lee.

The Coke County Farm Bureau is sponsoring the local students at the four-day training school. Some 390 students from 140 counties across the state will be attending the session.

Four outstanding, nationally known lecturers will address the Waco training school, according to Wayne Arrott of Bronte, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

They are Dr. C. L. Ganus, president of Harding College, Searcy, Ark.; Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, Muncy, Pa.; author of "I Was a Slave in Russia;" and W. Cleon Skousen, Salt Lake City, author, lawyer, educator and former FBI agent.

In addition, a young former narcotics addict and ex-convict from Dallas will relate the tragic

story of his life as an addict and criminal. At the conclusion of the seminar on Aug. 1, 18-year-old Miss Mary Rando of Friona will give her rendition of "I Am the Nation," a patriotic recitation that helped her win the Freedom Foundation's George Washington Honor Medal.

Purpose of the seminar is to give the student a better understanding of the American system and way of life. Emphasis will be placed on the economic, moral and social aspects of the American society. Instruction will consist of lectures, films, and panel discussions.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — It starts all over again (July 28). Legislators will be back at the capitol, finishing up the finance chores they left dangling in their regular session.

Gov. Preston Smith, who called the special session after he rejected the lawmakers' no-tax, one-year budget and insisted on adoption of a balanced biennial appropriations bill, apparently will spell out his recommendations on opening day.

Smith has been conducting a series of talks with business and industry leaders, exploring tax ideas. Legislators are expected to have to come up with a revenue measure totalling \$300 million or more.

Governor abandoned the idea of waiting until after the August 5 vote on an \$80 million welfare spending limit and other proposed constitutional amendments. Advisors and legislative leaders told him lawmakers will need everyone of the 30 days allotted for the special session to complete the big money job at hand.

Key legislative leaders have done some spadework on a \$5.6 billion two-year budget for the fiscal period extending through August 31, 1971. No major difficulties are anticipated here, although some hitches could develop.

New court bills also are being drawn up in preparation for special session effort to enact a measure to replace the courts measure vetoed by Smith last month as reaching his desk too late.

**WATER FOR TEXAS** — Another state has offered Texas an option to purchase its surplus waters, State Water Development Board Director Howard Boswell revealed recently.

Boswell spoke in answer to criticism of Constitutional Amendment 2 on the August 5 ballot to

authorize \$3.5 billion in bonds to finance a master water plan for the state.

Campaigns for and against the proposed amendment are heating up as election date nears. Proponents led by the Governor's Committee of 500 argue that its failure would be "catastrophic" for the state and that the bonds will prove to be money makers for Texas as well as permitting orderly development of water resources.

Opponents, sparked by State Sen. Charles Herring of Austin, wildlife conservationists and strict-economy groups, contend that cost of the contemplated program would be tremendous, that delay for a year or two of added study would be justified.

Nine amendments will be voted on August 5. Major interest centers on water bonds and a proposal to raise the welfare spending ceiling. Annual sessions of the legislature and higher pay for lawmakers are among other amendments to be decided. A "Nine for Texas Committee" is leading a campaign for the entire package.

**OIL ALLOWABLE SLASHED** — For the second consecutive month, Railroad Commission cut the statewide oil allowable, setting the August figure at 53.1 percent of potential.

Top production would be 3,310,997 barrels a day. Allowable was lowered from 63.5 percent of potential in June to 54.7 percent in July. Nine major producers requested the same allowable as July, three sought less and only two asked for more oil during August.

**CHARGE ACCOUNT WARNING**

Although a new law requires creditor to state finance charges, their actual interest rate can range from 18 to more than 36 percent.

The difference lies in which method they use to compute the charge: previous balance or adjusted balance.

The usual monthly service charge of one and one-half percent on revolving charge accounts must be labeled as 18 percent under the new Truth-in-Lending law.

Unfortunately the law permits department stores and other creditors such as oil companies and bank card plans to compute the finance charges by two methods. One can be quite a bit more expensive than the other.

Look for the words "Previous Balance" on the sales slip. In this method consumers are not credited with payments or returns. The one and one-half percent charge is applied to the previous month's balance.

This system works like this: on a \$300 purchase that a \$50 item was returned and \$100 was paid during the billing cycle \$4.50 was added to the account. The total bill the next month would be \$154.50 if no other purchase was made.

The actual annual percentage rate is 36 percent. It may be even higher in other cases.

"Adjusted Balance" means the consumer gets credit for returns and payments before the one and one-half percent is added to his bill.

The same transaction of \$300 with the return of a \$50 item and payment of \$150 would have a

charge of \$2.25 added to next month's bill. The total would then be \$152.25. That is a difference of \$2.25 for the same services in different stores.

The customer's copy of the charge slip tells him to pay the total amount in a certain number of days and have a finance charge added to the next month's bill.

A person that uses a revolving charge account in stores using the costlier method of computing the percentage rate will pay much more for the use of credit.

A little shopping for the stores that have the cheapest plan can make a big difference in the amount of money spent over a period of time.

At least the Truth-in-Lending law does require a creditor to explain his method of finance charges on every month's bill.

## Youngblood Endorses Amendment To Finance Giant Texas Water Plan

Austin—L. T. Youngblood of Bronte has endorsed the adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment to carry out the state's long-range water plan, Governor Preston Smith announced today.

Youngblood has accepted membership on the Governor's Committee of 500, a statewide group of outstanding Texans who are supporting the proposed amendment. The Bronte banker is a long time member of the board of directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority and served many years as president of the river authority.

The proposal, Amendment No. 2, will appear on the ballot for the August 5 special election. Absentee voting on the nine proposed issues to appear on the ballot will continue through Aug. 1.

Adoption of Amendment No. 2 would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue \$3.5 billion in bonds to finance the state's share of the cost of the long-range Texas Water Plan, the governor said.

Smith, who is joined by former Governors Allan Shivers, Price Daniel and John Connally as co-chairmen of the Committee, pointed out that the money would not be used to provide gifts or grants, but will provide temporary financing which will be repaid by the users of the water.

Noting that never before has a proposed amendment to the state constitution had the support of so many Texas leaders, Smith said the objective of the Texas Water Plan is to provide adequate water to maintain the growth and prosperity of Texas into the next century when it is estimated that the state will have a population of more than 30 million persons.

The program has been endorsed by every state and national agency dealing with water development, Smith said. The plan would provide for the full development of Texas' water resources and the importation of surplus water

from the lower Mississippi River for distribution to areas with declining water resources.

Smith said Youngblood has joined with leading Texans from every region of the state in support of the plan because it will provide benefits for every section of the state.

The plan will provide water for domestic and municipal uses, for industry, for agriculture, for recreation, for bays and estuaries and for other beneficial purposes, Smith pointed out.

The new association was formed by the consolidation of the San Angelo and Ballinger associations. The main office will be at 122 South Irving street in San Angelo. Mr Cowsert, his wife and son, Kent, will move to Ballinger where he will be in charge of the office which is located on 8th street.

The new association will make and service Federal Land Bank loans in Coke, Irion, Reagan, Runnels, Sterling and Tom Green counties.

**"Necessity of Protective Headgear, VCS Art. 6701c-3 sec. 2;**

After December 31, 1967, no person may operate a motorcycle on a public street or highway of this state unless he wears protective headgear which has been approved by the Department of Public Safety, nor may any person carry a passenger on a motorcycle on a public street or highway of this state unless the passenger wears protective headgear which has been approved by the Department of Public Safety, nor may any person ride as a passenger on a motorcycle on a public street or highway of this state unless he wears a protective headgear which has been approved by the Department of Public Safety.

**Violations; penalties, VCS Art. 6701c-3 sec 7:**

A person who violates Section 2 of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction is punishable by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50.

Act 1967, 60th Leg. p. 788 ch. 329, ef. Aug. 28, 1967."

To the Editor:

Voters of Texas will make an important decision on the future of our state when they vote August 5 on the Texas Water Plan Amendment — No. 2 on the ballot.

Should we fail to approve Amendment No. 2 it would mean that the Congress, federal agencies, and states of the lower Mississippi Basin, must assume that people of Texas are not interested in doing what is necessary to provide enough water to meet future needs of our state. It could also mean that Texans are not interested in any of the possibilities for getting needed water from outside our state.

It needs also to be pointed out that while No. 2 authorizes 3.5 billion in bonds, the funds would be used over a period of 40 to 50 years, not all at once. No bonds could be sold without approval of 2-3 of both branches of the legislature, and would not be offered until the money is actually needed for construction. Repayments of principal and interest will be well underway long before all are sold. None would be used for gifts or grants. Those who use the water will have to pay for it, with interest.

Misunderstanding has been created by statements of some that the Texas Water Plan has been brought into being without thought or planning. Almost 12

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years ago Texas voters adopted a constitutional amendment that created the Texas Water Development Board, and authorized the first bonds — 200 million. Twice since the plan has been expanded and continued by vote of Texans.

I voted, as a member of the Texas Legislature, to submit this amendment for the decision of Texas voters, and sincerely hope that they will give it their approval on August 5.

**ORDER OF ELECTION FOR HOSPITAL DISTRICT**

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF COKE

EAST COKE COUNTY  
HOSPITAL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, under the provisions of House Bill 1462, Acts of the 61st Legislature, Regular Session, 1969, provision is made for an election to be held within the area of the proposed East Coke County Hospital District (with boundaries coextensive with the boundaries of Commissioners' Precincts 2 and 4 of Coke County Texas as constituted on April 16, 1969) upon the question of whether the East Coke County Hospital District shall be created and established in accordance with said law and Article IX, Section 9 of the Constitution; and, WHEREAS, it has now been determined by this Commissioners' Court that an election should be held under the provisions of said law so there may be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying electors the question of whether the said area of the proposed Hospital District shall be created with the right to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75c on the \$100 valuation of taxable property situated within the district which is subject to Hospital District taxation; now therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION I: That an election be held on the 23rd day of August, 1969, which date is not less than 30 nor more than 60 days from the date of the entry of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying electors of the area of the proposed East Coke County Hospital District, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition:

"SHALL the East Coke County Hospital District (with boundaries coextensive with the boundaries of Commissioners Precincts 2 and 4 of Coke County, Texas, as the same constituted on April 16, 1969) be established and created with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75c on each \$100 valuation of taxable property within such district subject to hospital district taxation for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

NONE but qualified property taxpaying electors of the area of the proposed Hospital District, who own taxable property in said proposed district and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

SECTION 2: IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on the ballots shall appear the following ballot proposition:

The creation of East Coke County Hospital District providing for the levy of a tax not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation, upon all taxable property situated within said District subject to hospital district taxation for all hospital district purposes.

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "For" and "Against" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 3: The polling places and election officials at said election shall be respectfully as follows:

COUNTY PRECINCT NUMBER 2: POLLING PLACE, City Hall, Bronte, Texas; PRESIDING JUDGE, Matthew Caperton; ALTERNATE PRESIDING JUDGE, Noah Pruitt.

COUNTY PRECINCT NUMBER 4: POLLING PLACE, Schoolhouse, Tennyson, Texas; PRESIDING JUDGE: Sam Gaston; ALTERNATE PRESIDING JUDGE: James Arrott.

ABSENTEE VOTING by personal appearance shall be conducted at the office of the County Clerk, Couthouse, Robert Lee, Texas. Absentee voting shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.A.T.C.S. Election Code.

IF THE regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than three (3) additional clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

SECTION 4: Said election shall be held under the provisions of Article IX, Section 9, of the Constitution of Texas and House Bill 1462, Acts of the 61st Legislature, Regular Session, 1969, which Constitutional and statutory provisions shall also govern the holding of the election where in conflict with the General Laws of the State regulating elections.

SECTION 5: Notice of the said election shall be given by publishing a substantial copy of this order in a newspaper of general circulation in Coke County and the area of the proposed district once a week for two consecutive weeks, the first publication to appear at least 30 days prior to the date established for the said election.

SECTION 6: The County Clerk is hereby directed to enter this order in the official records of the Commissioners' Court of Coke County, and to issue notice of election as provided by law.

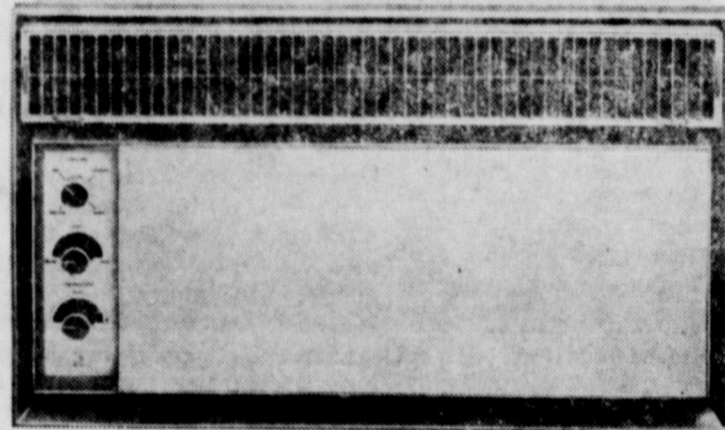
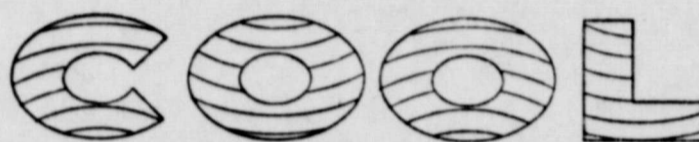
