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## Precinct Lines Are Changed

### Ethicon Employees Due Here for Annual Picnic

Employees of Ethicon, Inc., of San Angelo will flock to Bronte en masse Saturday for the company's third annual employees picnic in the local county park. Minimum estimate of 800 and a maximum of 1200 are expected.

Ethicon employees had their first company picnic in the Bronte County Park in 1967. They liked the facilities so much they came back again in 1968, and are returning for the third time Saturday.

Mayor Royce Lee issued a proclamation this week proclaiming Saturday as "Bronte's Appreciation Day for Ethicon Employees" and called on all citizens to make the visitors welcome.

"It's rather unusual," the mayor said, "for residents of a large city to pack up and drive 30

miles to a small town for a picnic and I think it speaks well for our town and its facilities at the park, as well as for the hospitality of our citizens."

The plant in San Angelo specializes in making surgical sutures used for sewing up all kinds of wounds. The massive plant was built mainly underground, which officials say contributes to the security of the building as well as to ease in meeting sanitation standards.

Coalson's Red Barn Barbecue will cater the picnic lunch, Mead said.

### Commissioners Name Directors For Hospital Dist.

Directors of East Coke County Hospital District were appointed at Tuesday's meeting of the commissioners court. Three of the directors are from precinct 2 and two are from precinct 4.

Named from precinct 2 are Matthew Caperton, E. F. Glenn and Wayman Percifull, and from precinct 4, LeDrew Arrott and C. R. Blake.

The five directors are scheduled to have an organizational meeting Thursday night at the city hall.

The new district was voted recently by citizens of precincts 2 and 4. First board of directors was appointed by the commissioners and subsequent members will be elected.

Citizens of Precincts 1 and 3 may not know which commissioner precinct they live in now, as the commissioners court has announced changes in precinct lines to conform to a ruling of the Supreme Court of the United States that all precincts within a county must contain approximately the same number of people.

Since the county was first organized precincts 1 and 2 have had a preponderance of the county's population since they, respectively contained the towns of Robert Lee and Bronte. With the new redistricting precincts 3 and 4 contain about the same number of residents as precincts 1 and 2. The new lines give Commissioner Floyd Harmon of precinct 3 a hunk of Robert Lee

which formerly all belonged to Commissioner Fern Havins of precinct 1. Likewise, Commissioner Jack Corley of precinct 4 took a sizeable piece of Bronte from Commissioner Howard Brock of precinct 2—all to even out the population requirement devised by the men in Washington wearing long black robes and who have the final say on all questions brought to their attention.

The revolutionary change which has or will affect a majority of counties all over the country, was brought about by former Mayor Hank Avery of Midland, who objected to rural commissioners of Midland County controlling the county government. Avery took his case all the way to the Supreme Court and he won his point.

#### Towns Split

The redistricting split Robert Lee and Bronte approximately in half. Everything north of State Highway 158 in Robert Lee remains in precinct 1, while everything south of the highway, including the county courthouse, now is in precinct 3. In Bronte everything, except for a few jogs in the south part of town, which is west of Washington (Church) Street now is in precinct 4, while everything east of Washington remains in precinct 2.

The commissioners did leave the two west side precincts and the two east sides intact within themselves, making all the changes so as not to interfere with the boundary lines of the county's two hospital districts which follow the boundary lines of precincts 1 and 3 for the West Coke County Hospital District and the lines of precincts 2 and 4 for the East Coke County Hospital District.

Generally the precinct lines follow the same lines they have for years except for their approaches to, and the area within the two towns. Precinct 3 now follows a line from the west boundary of the county which runs east and west approximately two miles north of the Sterling City highway until it reaches the shores of Lake E. V. Spence; then it follows the south shoreline of the lake till it comes to the highway. From there it follows the highway till it intersects Robert Lee Dam; then it travels northward until it intersects the old Sterling City highway; then it follows the highway through Robert Lee and continues westward to a spot approximately at Seven Mile Hill, where it turns south to the Tom Green County line.

Precinct 1 retains all the area north of this line and turns north at the same spot (Seven Mile Hill) until it comes to the Nolan County Line.

Precinct 4 contains all of its original area south of the Colorado River, but now extends north into Bronte and beyond. The east boundary of the new part extends from the river along the Santa Fe Railroad to the city limits, goes down East Railroad Street to Riley Avenue, where it turns east to Washington Street then turns north on Washington to the north city limits where it jogs back west to the railroad. It then follows the railroad approximately two miles, turns west for approximately one mile, then back south to Highway 158. It

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### Allen Bryan Dies In Alaska Crash

Word was received here Wednesday of the death of Allen (Punk) Bryan, 43, near an oil well drilling site in Alaska. He was killed in a helicopter crash some 600 miles from Anchorage.

Bryan was the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Luckett of Bronte. The family reported information they have been able to obtain said the fatal crash occurred about 6:45 p.m. Tuesday. Funeral arrangements are pending, since the Civil Aeronautics Administration is conducting and investigation of the crash.

Mrs. Bryan, the former Pat Luckett, told her brother, Billy Joe Luckett, that she thought perhaps the investigation would be completed in time for the family and body to arrive in Texas by Saturday.

Newby Funeral Home will be in charge of local arrangements and services will be conducted in Bronte Church of Christ with burial in Fairview Cemetery.

Bill Luckett told the Enterprise he understood Bryan was part of a crew which was moving a rig to a new test location. They were flying the largest helicopter made. The huge craft is used to skylift rig parts over the rugged Alaskan terrain from one location to another. He said they had unloaded part of the rig and were on a return trip prior to quitting work for the day when the crash occurred.

Bryan had been employed by Rowan Drilling Co. the past 18 years. He and his family had been residents of Anchorage the past three years, and had lived in Alaska on two tours of work prior to the current one.

Survivors include his wife, Pat; three daughters, Mrs. Thomas Lee Easterling of Alaska; Cathy and Connie, both of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Bryan of Bradshaw; a brother, Joe Bryan of Winters; a sister, Mrs. Christine Barker of San Francisco, Calif.

# H D Agent's News Dept.

### New Fact Sheet

Research points out that most elderly people make "peace" with themselves and face death realistically.

This and other aspects of death are the subject of a fact sheet, "Planning and Financing a Funeral", just released by the Agricultural Extension Service.

The fact sheet is designed to help families understand the psychology of death and become aware of the financial aspects of a funeral.

They explain how death affects members of the family from the aged person to children.

Any death creates an emergency and the fact sheet considers steps in planning a funeral, including military funerals and insurance collection.

In Texas, funeral costs for an adult averages \$942. A lawyer or funeral director can help determine if benefits are available and how to make claims from retirement plans, Veterans' Administration, insurance and others.

The four-page fact sheet is available from my office.

### Cutting Up A Chicken

Disjointing a chicken for economy and eating and serving pleasure requires a bit of skill.

Both whole and cut-up chicken are priced attractively these days, but whole chicken saves a few extra cents a pound.

To get the most for the money, pound for pound, buy chickens that have been inspected for wholesomeness and graded for quality. Federal inspection is required for all poultry processed in plants that sell across state lines. Grading, though, is voluntary.

This is one way to disjoint a chicken:

Cut skin between thighs and body of the bird.

Grasp skin between thighs and body of the bird.

Grasp a leg of the bird in each hand and lift the bird from the table, bending its legs back as you lift. Bend legs until hip joints are free.

Remove leg from the body by cutting from back to front as close as possible to the back bone.

Locate knee joint by squeezing thigh and drumstick together. Cut through the knee joint to separate thigh and drumstick.

Remove wing from body. Start cutting on inside of wing just over the joint. Cut down and around the joint. To make the wing lie flat, either cut off the wingtip or make a cut on the inside of the wing at the large wing joint. Cut just deep enough to expose the bones. Repeat the process on the other side of the bird.

Divide the body by placing bird on neck end and cutting from the tail along each side of the back bone through rib joints to neck junction. Cut the skin that attaches the neck-and-back strip to the breast. Place neck-and-back strip, skin side up, on cutting board. Cut strip in two just above the spoonshaped bones in the back.

Alternate method: Separate back from breast by cutting between the breast and back ribs from the shoulder to the tail end. Bend the back and breast to separate the shoulder joints.

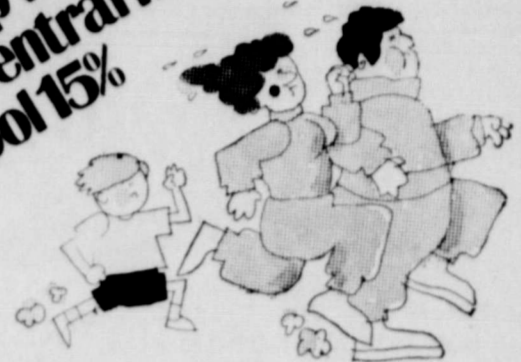
Place the breast piece firmly in both hands. Bend each side of the breast back and push up with the fingers to snap out the breastbone. Cut the breast in half lengthwise.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — With the first special session of the Legislature a failure, Gov. Preston Smith called lawmakers back for a second try at writing a biennial budget and a balancing tax bill.

Midnight gavels fell August 26 with neither task accomplished after tax conference committees were unable to break a stubborn deadlock.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes blamed the first session impasse on House refusal to place beer and liquor under the sales tax. House speaker Gus Mitscher said that was a "smokescreen" masking other reasons for the Senate's refusal to come to terms with the Representatives.

A Senate proposal to place food under a 2.5 per cent (reduced rate) sales tax was batted down unanimously (147-0) by the House. Thereafter, negotiations never budged beyond that point.

In calling for the second session, Governor Smith laid it on the line.

"We have been treated to a spectacle of petty quarreling, jealousies between houses, obstinate and self-serving positions, demagogic rhetoric, childish personalities and undue interference from the lobby," said the Governor. "I believe the people of Texas are sick and tired of it. I know I am."

Smith warned that every function of state government would be "paralyzed or thrown into a state of uncertainty and confusion" if the new session failed to come up with a certifiable revenue appropriation by September 1.

crease was 7.1 per cent and in cities of 25,000 to 50,000, 18.8 per cent.

Crime clearance rates for the period was 27 per cent...the same as 1968. Clearance rate for murders was 84 per cent, for rapes 66 per cent and robbery 39 per cent.

DPS noted that statistics show a major crime every one and one-third minutes during January-June.

LATE HOURS PERMITS ISSUED — Texas Liquor Control Board is issuing special late hours permits for taverns and private clubs in wet areas.

A new law, effective September 1, provides that late-hours establishments can serve alcoholic beverages until 2 a.m. However, the statute is effective only in counties of 300,000 or more population and those where commissioners courts or city councils specifically approve.

State fee of \$100 is collected from taverns selling wine and beer until the new curfew hour. Private Clubs which want to stay open until 2 a.m. must pay \$500 for a permit. State Liquor Control Board must issue the permit or license.

SADLER CENSURE REFUSED — After length debate, House of Representatives rejected a proposed resolution reprimanding Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler for failing to cooperate with lawmakers.

Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi introduced the resolution (and resubmitted it to the second called session) charging that Sadler misled a House committee inquiring about his handling of salvage operations on ancient Spanish ships which sank off Padre Island more than 400 years ago.

Sadler, appearing before the House rules committee, admitted his original testimony on the issue was evasive and misleading. However, he claimed his tactics were necessary because of the delicate nature of the subject under inquiry.

ROAD PROGRAM APPROVED — State Highway Department has approved a \$52 million highway safety and farm to market road improvement program for 1970.

Projects include construction work on 6,373 miles, to cost \$51.2 million; and right of way and relocation assistance totaling \$94.7 million. Some \$871,000 was reserved for later assignment.

About 55 per cent of the work will be on state and U.S.-numbered highways. Forty five per cent is assigned to Texas' farm to market road system.

Most of the work will serve to increase safety on the highways, and a large portion will go to reconstruction.

INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE — That "no transfer" rule of the University Interscholastic League will be the subject of an interim House study. During the first special session of the Legislature, Rep. Bill Swanson gained passage of a resolution calling for the study.

Swanson said UIL also thinks there should be some appeal of the one-year bar for athletes who change schools, so the committee will look for an acceptable means.

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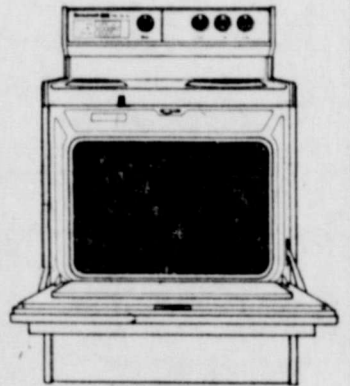

Changes will be made for voting places of voting precinct 1

(the old Robert Lee box) and precinct 2 (the old Bronte box). Robert Lee residents who will continue to reside in commissioner precinct 1 will vote at the recreation center. Mrs. Pattie Ivey will serve as presiding judge with Mrs. Willie Clark as alternate. Voters in Bronte who continue to reside in commissioner precinct 2 will vote in the building located between the Texaco Station and Charlie Boecking Garage, which houses offices for Lee Bros. Matthew Caperton will be judge and Royce Fancher will be alternate.

The other voting boxes will remain as they were in 1969. Voting precinct 4 will be at Tennyson school house with J. P. Arrott as presiding judge and Mrs. Lora Bell Brown as alternate. Voting precinct 8 will continue to hold elections at Silver school building, with H. L. Bloodworth as presiding judge and Ernest Clendennen as alternate. Voting precinct 9 election will continue at Green Mountain community center, with D. O. King as presiding judge and Connie Millican as alternate.

**Regulations Given On Dove Hunting**

Dove season began Monday in this area had a large number of hunters already have been getting their share of the big crop of doves in the Coke County area.

Game warden R. L. Flanagan said this week that laws are pretty rough on violators, and that they will be enforced every time a lawbreaker is caught.

Flanagan said that hunting time is from noon until sunset and that 10 birds per day with 20 in possession is the limit. He also mentioned that hunters who are hunting outside their county of residence must have a current hunting license. The old rule of not shooting from a public road is still in effect.

Flanagan said that fines for violation of hunting laws have been raised since last season and violators should consider this when tempted to break the law. "We want everybody to have a good hunt and a good time, but the law must be enforced," he said.
