HD Club Work Covers 25 Years

First Home Demonstration agent of Coke County arrived in Robert Lee on Monday morning, Oct. 9, 1944. The agent, Mrs. Fay C. Roe, nee Fay Daphne Croslin, set up the office in the courthouse and organized clubs—two before the end of October.

The Fort Chadbourne Club was organized on October 29, Robert Lee on October 30 and Friendship the next day. Presidents of the first clubs were Mmes. Charles Boecking, Lowell Roane and A. D. Fields. Thirteen other clubs were organized before the end of the year.

The first major event of the clubs was the officers training school held on March 24, 1945. Seventy-five members and eight visitors attended the event held in the Robert Lee Methodist Church. The first county camp was held on August 15 in the Bronte Legion Park. A large crowd attended. The Bronte Enterprise had a special H.D. Club

section on August 10.

The first county exhibit was a silver tea held on December 5, 1945 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Smith.

Since the beginning of Home Demonstration club work in Coke County many educational programs have been given. They include dress making, canning and freezing foods, food preparation, nutrition, health, Recreation, First Aid, hatmaking, tailoring, furniture refinishing, upholstery, crafts, feather comforter making, gardening, landscaping, time and energy management, home management, home improvement and many others.

The highlight of the Exhibit held Thursday and Friday in the Robert Lee Recreation Center was the Anniversary tea noting the 25th year of home demonstration work in Coke County. Greeting guests were Mrs. C. E. Arrott, first chairman of the H.D. Council and Mrs. J. C. Boatright, present chairman.

Harry Morris, pastor of First Baptist Church, in charge. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery, under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Mills died at 3:20 a.m. on Tuesday at Park Plaza Nursing Home in San Angelo.

Mr. Mills was a retired farmer. Mr. Mills was born March 22, 1876, in Mississippi, and came to Coke County from Brown County in 1914. He married Miss Martha Roberts in 1894 at May. Mrs. Mills died in 1965, after they had been married more than 70 years.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. J. T. Liles and Mrs. J. A. Stevenson, both of Bronte; one son, J. G. Mills of Bronte; eight grandchildren, 11 great-grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

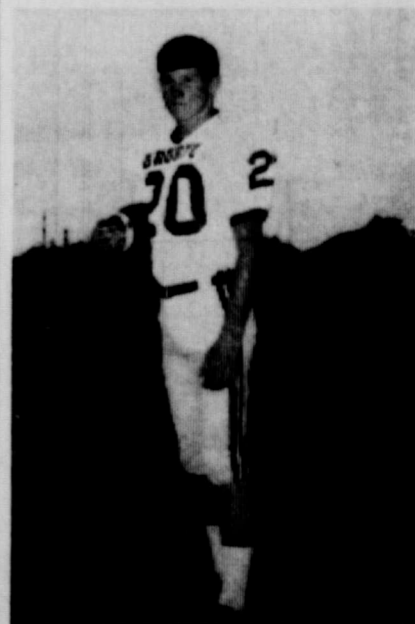

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AUSTIN, Tex. — More than 100 "fraternal organizations" are being requested by Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. to swear that they are in fact fraternal organizations and not just "private clubs."

He says applications are coming in from "fraternities" that evidently are "private clubs" and if they are approved it will make a mockery of the five cent tax per drink requirement set by the Legislature on private clubs.

Texas Law provides that fraternal organizations are exempt from franchise taxes.

Among the "fraternal organizations" presently being asked to confirm their status are the Benevolent Order of the Impala of Texas, Club L'Amour Fraternal Association, Inc., Fraternal Order of Moon Maidens, The Fraternal Order of Dart Players and the Fraternal Order for the preservation and Resurrection of Burlesque.

If an organization refuse to answer the questionnaire within 30 days, it faces dissolution. Answering the questions falsely means possible perjury charges.

WELFARE BENEFITS — According to Welfare Commissioner Burton Hackney, 509 Texas families may be affected by a San Antonio Federal Court ruling requiring the State Department of Public Welfare to pay retroactive welfare benefits not paid since March under the now defunct one-

year residency requirement.

Hackney said that if the department had to pay off all the back benefits, it would average about \$75 a recipient per month for that six month period. And, if all applicants on the list were qualified, this would exceed \$250,000. However, he stressed that some of the applicants would be disqualified for other reasons. He said no appeal of the decision was being planned.

Also, Hackney has asked the Texas Medical Association to help his department settle questions of "misuse" or "over-utilization" of Medicaid services and benefits.

USED CAR WARNING—Texas automobile buyers have been warned against purchasing so-called "bargain" autos now being offered for sale in South and East Texas.

H. C. Pittman, executive vice-president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association, says many of these cars were severely damaged by salt water submergence during the frightful ravages of Hurricane Camille in Mississippi and neighboring states" in August.

"This same sort of fraud on the car-buying public occurs following almost every hurricane in the Gulf Coast area," he pointed out, urging used car buyers to check the bill of sale to determine the origin of the vehicles.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES—An employee of a county or hospital district does not have to be a resident of the county, the district, or even the state, says Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, in a new opinion.

In other recent expressions Martin held that:

* Condemnor in a condemnation case should pay the initial court-cost-deposit when objections are filed by either party to a special commission award. He may recover if the county court judgment is for the same or a lesser amount of damages than offered before proceedings commenced.

*Valley cable TV company which sponsors a bingo-type game over its facilities is not engaged in a forbidden lottery.

BREAKFAST IN SCHOOL — Texas Education Agency says school breakfast programs in Texas public schools are expected to pass the 350 mark in 1969-70, doubling the 172 total set during the last academic year.

TEA also announced that the State Board of Education has allocated \$10,400,000 in vocational-technical funds to Texas' public junior colleges for the present school year. Funds were provided by the Legislature.

REPUBLICANS ACTIVE — Promising themselves at least 35 more state representatives, four more state senators, three more congressmen and a second United States Senator, Texas Republicans are setting their election targets on areas where the minorities

comprise a large portion of the population.

They outlined plans to start now, reaching for the Negro and Mexican-American votes, instead of waiting until election time 1970.

Republican aim specifically at the 15 state senators who made the majority when the food tax bill was passed by the Senate.

Republican District Committeeman Winston Wrinkle of Big Spring, who heads the party's Legislative Committee, says they plan to use the recent "184-day Donneybrook" (three legislative sessions) and the tax increases, as additional ammunition.

Texas Federation of Republican Women announced that Mrs. Spiro T. Agnew will be in Austin on October 31 to present the second annual Tops "N" Texas Awards for community service by women.

BUCELLOSIS — Texas Animal Health Commission says only eight Texas counties have not begun brucellosis - eradication programs, and all but 66 have been classified as modified - certified areas.

Federal regulations went into effect on August 1 restricting the interstate movement of most cattle from areas not modified-certified.

A school land lease sale on Nov. 4 may show the adverse effect of a threatened 27½ per cent oil depletion allowance reduction, according to Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

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Horns Take Coke County Title, Whip R-Lee, 12-0

Bronte Longhorns won the football contest with Robert Lee last Friday night, 12-0. The game was a thriller and the final outcome was unsure until late in the fourth quarter when the Horns made their second touchdown of the night with only 1:06 left on the clock.

It's true that the Longhorns went ahead in the 3rd quarter with a 6-0 score, but that lead could have been nullified any time by the hard fighting Steers. So, the Horns had a fairly tight cinch on the Coke County championship for only a little over a minute.

Bronte's two counters came on a pass connection from Quarterback Keith McCutchen to End Willie Zuniga from the 13, and an end sweep by Nicky Arrott. McCutchen's pass record for the evening was a little lower than usual, 5 of 14, but two of them were big plays and really counted for the Horns.

First Quarter

Lane Beaty kicked off to Zuniga and the kick was short, leaving the ball on the 38. First play from scrimmage was a long pass to Arrott for 27 yards and set up a 1st on the Robert Lee 35. The Steers bottled up Arrott for only a yard on two tries, and Randy Barbee made 4 more to bring up 4th and 5. The Horns decided to go for it and McCutchen faded to pass but was swamped and the Steers took over on their 38.

The Steers looked good with Mike Mumford directing the team and Joe David Key and Randy Smith doing most of the ball carrying chores. They moved the ball from their 38 all the way downfield to the 18 and a 1st down. The Longhorn defense stiffened, however and allowed only 3 yards on 3 plays. The 4th down effort was a field goal

Barbee went for 3 and Arrott got off a good gainer but a flag was thrown and Bronte was penalized 7 yards for holding. Barbee made 2 more yards and another penalty brought up a 3rd and 18. The Horns decided to quick kick and it carried 33 yards to the 46.

Key and Smith carried for Robert Lee down to the 29 of Bronte as the 1st quarter ended. Score: 0-0.

Second Quarter

Key went for 9 yards for a 1st on the 20, then carried three times straight for 11 yards and a 1st on the 9. Mumford kept and lost a yard. Smith carried twice down to the 3, and Key made the final effort of the drive, but it was short and the Horns took over on the 2 yard line.

With their backs to the wall, the Horns made a real effort. Barbee lacked about a foot making a first down on the 12 and McCutchen went the needed distance to the 13. Then the local lads drew a penalty for clipping which brought up 2nd and 16. A carry by Arrott plus a penalty against the Steers gave the Longhorns a 1st on the 24. Arrott picked up 9 and Barbee went 3 more for a 1st on the 36. The drive stalled right there, and Barbee had to punt. Mumford took it and was dropped on his 45.

Key and Smith made a 1st on the Bronte 45, then the Horns bottled up the Steer offense and a 4th and 8 situation forced a punt. Beaty got a high snap from center and by the time he chased down the ball Roger Graves was on top of him and the Bronte boys took over on the Steer 37.

The Horns couldn't move the needed 10 yards and the Steers took possession again on their 29. They were able to move out to the Bronte 47, making a couple of 1st downs in the process. Mumford went to the air, tossed an incomplete pass, and then was swamped on his second try and the ball went back to the Steer 44. The 3rd try was incomplete, so a punt was called for. It went to Arrott who got a nice runback to his own 43. Time was running out and the Longhorns were able to get off three plays before the half ended. Score: 0-0.

Third Quarter

Zuniga kicked off to Smith who was forced out of bounds on his 27. Smith carried three times for a gain of 8, and Beaty was called on to punt. A nice kick went to the Bronte 28 with no return.

Barbee went for 3 and Arrott made a long 5. A 15 yard fine against the Steers moved the ball to midfield and once again the Horns bogged down and punted. Doug Burns took it and was nailed on his 22. Four plays later the Steers returned the punt. It went to Barbee and he was able to get a pretty good field position on the Bronte 49.

Barbee carried for 3 and Robert Lee was penalized 15 to give the Longhorns a 1st on the 34. Arrott went for 4, and a short pass to Arrott followed by some fine running carried for another 1st on the 19. Jerry Graves went for a couple of carries, and the next play was the big one. McCutchen made connection with Zuniga on a pass play into the end zone for the first counter of the night. A kick try by David Scott for extra point failed and the score was 6-0.

Zuniga's kick went to Smith and he was racked on the 32. Then

Smith carried twice for 7 and Key went to the 46 for the 1st. The next series failed to make the needed yards and a punt was called for. It went to Barbee who was nailed on the spot at the 25.

Arrott made a nice gainer, but a penalty moved the ball back to the 13. Barbee carried for 12, then again for 15 and a 1st on the 40. He then added another 3 yards and Arrott made 2 more as the quarter ended. Score: 6-0.

Fourth Quarter

First play of the fourth period was a punt by Barbee which gave the Steers the ball on their 24 yard line. Key carried three times and the last effort ended with Zuniga and Vaughn recovering a fumble and the Horns took over the ball on the Steer 30. Bronte returned the favor immediately with Gary Thomason recovering for Robert Lee, also on the 30. Smith carried three times and lacked short distance having a 1st down. Mumford made it a keeper to the 40. Marshall Millican's run plus a 15 yarder against the Horns moved the ball to the Bronte 40 and a 1st down. Millican made another 5 yards in two tries, and a pass from Mumford to Danny Percifull gave the visitors a 1st on the 28. The Horns allowed the Steers a total of 2 yards on the next three plays, and the 4th down found Barbee recovering a Steer fumble on the 23.

Robert Lee drew a 15 yard penalty and Arrott carried out to the 46 where Bronte got fined 5 yards. Arrott then made another 4 but it brought up a 3rd and 6 situation in Longhorn territory. McCutchen called for a pass play and he was able to connect with Zuniga for a 35 yard gainer and a 1st down on the Robert Lee 18. Arrott carried for 4 but the next down brought a penalty against Bronte and it was 2nd and 11. McCutchen got pushed back but a major penalty against the Steers gave the Horns a 2nd and 1. McCutchen kept to make the yard and a first down on the 8. The Steer line tightened and held Arrott to 6 yards on the first three downs. The 4th down try to make the 2 yards to pay dirt saw McCutchen giving the ball a long pitch to Arrott who went around the left end for the second counter of the night. A pass try for points failed and the score was 12-0.

With 1:06 left on the clock the Steers took the kick and had the ball on the 25. Short gains and a 15 yard penalty against the Bronte lads gave Robert Lee a 1st on the 44, and the next three plays moved the ball to the Bronte 39. But time ran out and Bronte emerged with a 12-0 score.

The exhibit is held annually and is sponsored by the County Council.

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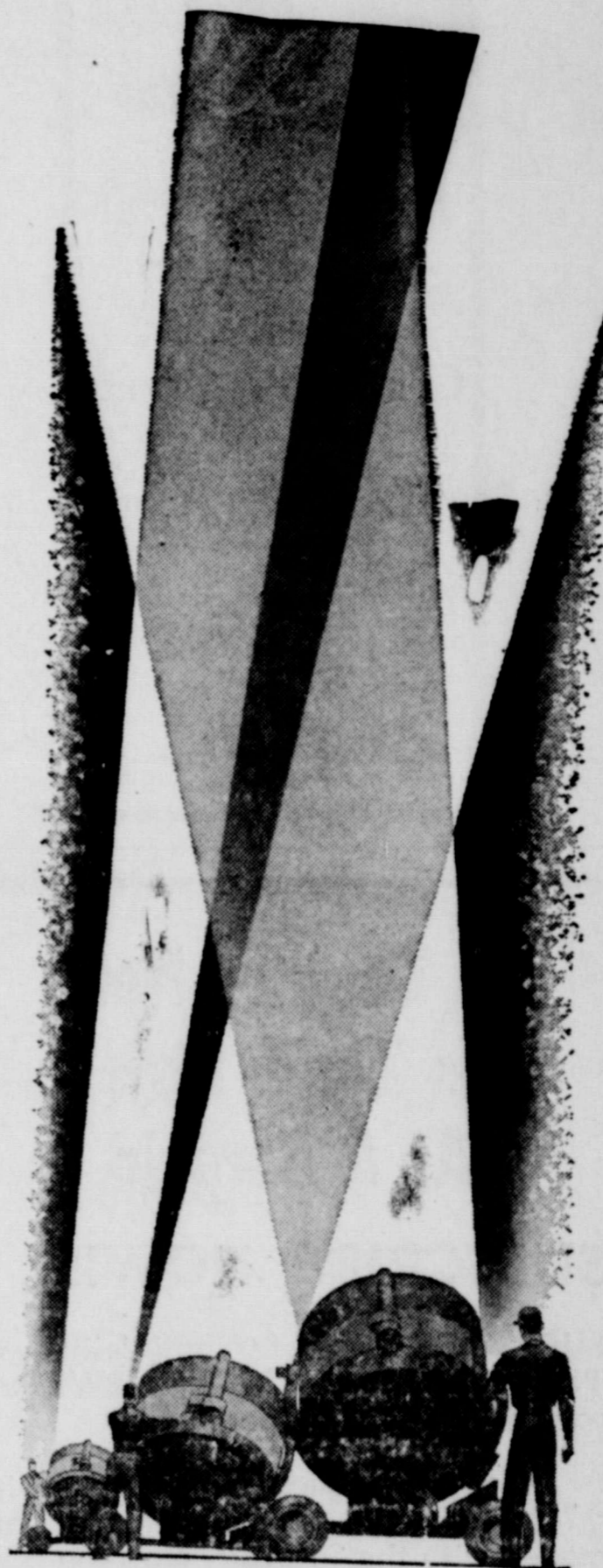

Two school board meetings were held last week, the first a special called meeting on Tuesday night, and the second a regular meeting on Thursday night.

The Thursday night meeting of the board resulted in the resignation of two board members, President Harold Moon and Conda Richards. Both men's terms will expire next April. Richards resignation was effective immediately and Moon's was effective Oct. 12.

Minutes of the Tuesday night meeting indicate that it was called for the purpose of making a study of Rule No. 50 in the Student Handbook. Rule 50 prohibits married students from participating in sports and other school activities. The remaining members of the board will appoint two members to fill the unexpired terms of Richards and Moon.

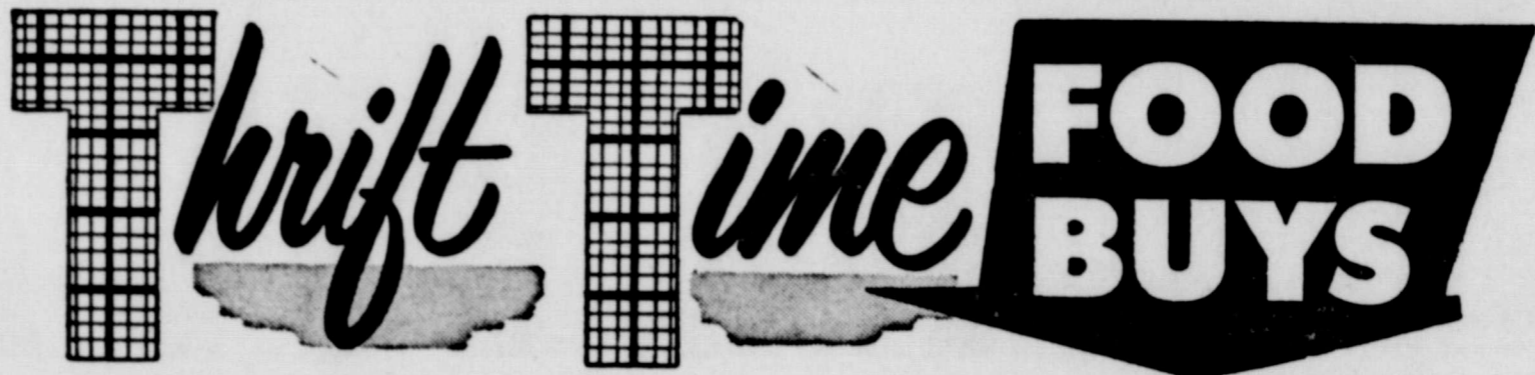
Four Bronte boys did well in the Punt, Pass and Kick Contest sponsored last Saturday by Ivey Motor Co. of Robert Lee.
