SAVINGS BONDS SALES

United States Savings Bond sales during 1969 in Coke County totaled \$18,052, according to G. C. Allen, chairman of the Coke County Savings Bonds Committee. The county has achieved 60 per cent of its goal of \$30,000. December sales totaled \$1,162. Sixty-nine counties in Texas have achieved their 1969 goal.

Texas has achieved 103 per cent of its goal of \$170.1 million with year-to-date sales totaling \$175,487,920. December sales were \$13,997,243 while sales during the same period of 1968 totaled \$13,070,587 - an increase of 7 per cent.

Bond sales over the Nation during 1969 amounted to \$4,749 billion with 97 per cent of goal achieved. Sales of Freedom Shares totaled \$348 million during 1969 - 26 per cent above the \$277 million sold in 1968.




