Extra Games Set For Boys Team

Coach James N. Raughton said Wednesday that he has been able to set up several practice games during the period between Friday night and March 2 or 3. The Bronte Longhorn basketball team will have a playoff game either March 2 or 3, but will wind up their regular season of play Friday night against Water Valley.

A game with Wylie next Tuesday night will be played either at Roscoe or Wylie. Then the local lads will travel to May Feb. 13, and May will return the match Feb. 24.

A tentative date to play Talpa has been scheduled for Feb. 27, but will have to be confirmed later. Raughton said he is seeking games for Feb. 17 and 20.

The Horns have the district championship sewed up and have only one game left. Their district record is 9-0.

K. Glenn Cecil Kemp of Bronte placed his name on the ballot for justice of the peace in precinct 2.

Two candidates also are running for commissioner in precinct 2, but they announced several weeks ago. Passage of the Monday deadline revealed that no candidate for a county office has an opponent.

The ballot in the May election will contain the names of W. W. Thetford for county judge; Mrs. Winnie Waldrop for county and district clerk; Mrs. Jerry Thomason for county treasurer; Roy P. Ross for justice of the peace in precinct 1; Jesse Parker and Bobby Vaughn for commissioner of precinct 2; Earl D. Nutter and Cecil Kemp for justice of the peace in precinct 2; and Jack Corley for commissioner of precinct 4.

All other candidates will be for various district and state offices.

Jacobs said this year's 1630 registered voters is below the 1677 registered in 1968. He mentioned, however, that the fact that 1968 was a presidential election year might have sparked the additional 47 persons to register. The count this year is considerably above last year's count of 1426, which was an off election year.

Janet Thomas, senior in Bronte High School has been named Bronte's 1970 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. The honor came to Janet on the basis of her score in a homemaking knowledge and attitude test taken by senior girls Dec. 2. In addition to receiving a silver charm from General Mills, she is now eligible to compete for a college scholarship. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Thomas of Bronte.

From school winners in Texas, a State Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected within the next few weeks. The state winner will be awarded a \$1,500 scholarship and the runner-up a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

This spring, the 51 Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join for an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Climax of the tour will be announcement of the 1970 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Selected from the 51 finalists on the basis of original test scores and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will be awarded an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will also be chosen and will receive scholarship increases to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — As the January 31 deadline for voters to register draws near, Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr., the state's election officer, issued a "last call" to those who are 21 or over.

Registration is at the county tax assessor-collector's office, but in many counties, deputies have been set up at convenient locations. Persons over 60 who live in towns of less than 10,000 or in rural areas must re-register every year.

Under the old law, persons past 60 in small towns and rural areas did not have to register, but it is now ordinary every year. If they fail to register by Jan. 31, they will not be able to vote in this year's important elections.

Dies also pointed out that young people who will become 21 during 1970 can register before their 21st birthday. Tax office will mark on their registration certificate the date on which they will become 21 and therefore eligible to vote.

Both political parties and a number of civic groups are putting on registration drives, seeking a goal of more than 4 million registered voters this year.

OIL IMPORT WORRIES — Concern over possible federal elimination of oil import quotas caused state political and industry leaders to hoist new storm warnings.

New taxes and serious economic losses are in store for Texas if the Nixon administration scraps the import quota for the tariff system, say informed officials.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes called on the Legislative Budget Board staff to determine how much the removal of import barriers would reduce state revenue should oil prices tumble from \$3 to \$2.25 a barrel. Import problem, together with long range appropriation

commitments, could create a "very, very grave" tax problem for the Legislature next year, Barnes said.

Gov. Preston Smith expressed a similar view in a press conference, terming the potential tax loss from tampering with import quotas "severe."

Democratic Senate candidate Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. predicted that state tax revenues, 40 per cent of which are derived from the petroleum industry, would "drastically decline" if the tariff system is imposed. He noted that many school districts also draw the bulk of their local revenues for public school support from the oil and gas industry.

Alvin Hope, San Antonio independent oil man, told the Texas Railroad Commission that proposals to reduce crude oil through a sliding scale tariff collected by the U. S. Treasury would be the "death knell of the domestic industry as we know it."

CAMPUS MADE — Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, had some jarring news for students.

Board voted tough new regulations to curb the "alarmingly-high" delinquency rate on repayments to the \$285 million-Hinson-Hazelwood student loan program. Put into effect was a requirement that applications (except in extreme hardship cases) have co-signers. Colleges may also lose their eligibility to continue their students participation in the program if they don't help police delinquencies.

A careful system of interviews, followups, parental signatures and required letters of recommendation also will be invoked.

Chairman Manuel DeBusk of Dallas, the new board chairman, said he thinks tuitions should be tied to a fixed increase cost of the overall program — which would mean a sharp increase.

DeBusk also recommended a separate board of regents for each undergraduate college and university. UT Chairman Frank C. Erwin Jr. replied that all boards have grave enough responsibility to keep them busy "without any unnecessary and wasteful rivalry."

GUBERNATORIAL RACE — Texans once again will have a choice between Preston Smith and Paul Eggers for Governor of Texas.

Governor Smith was first to announce. On the first anniversary of his swearing in, he stated that he would seek re-election.

Next day, Paul W. Eggers, Smith's Republican opponent in 1968, said he would make the race again.

Neither of the two men has an opponent in his respective primary, as yet.

SAVINGS BONDS SALES

United States Savings Bond sales during 1969 in Coke County totaled \$18,052, according to G. C. Allen, chairman of the Coke County Savings Bonds Committee. The county has achieved 60 per cent of its goal of \$30,000. December sales totaled \$1,162. Sixty-nine counties in Texas have achieved their 1969 goal.

Texas has achieved 103 per cent of its goal of \$170.1 million with year-to-date sales totaling \$175,487,920. December sales were \$13,997,243 while sales during the same period of 1968 totaled \$13,070,587 — an increase of 7 per cent.

Bond sales over the Nation during 1969 amounted to \$4,749 billion with 97 per cent of goal achieved. Sales of Freedom Shares totaled \$348 million during 1969 — 26 per cent above the \$277 million sold in 1968.

Pecans

Pecans can become rancid. The high oil content which lends their characteristic rich flavor makes pecans very perishable.

To store pecans for year around use the cooler the place the better.

At room temperature (70 to 80 degrees) pecan meats keep fresh only two months. In the home freezer at zero-degrees, pecans will be in good condition for two years.

Before cracking pecans, soak them in water to increase the number of whole kernels obtained. Pour boiling water over the nuts and let them soak 15 to 30 minutes depending on the thickness of the shell.

Soaking makes the kernels more pliable so they hold together better during the shelling operation. Crack the pecans when the shells are dry.

Like meat, pecans supply protein, fat and B vitamins. One cup pecan halves has 740 calories.

Pecan flavor blends well with many foods: waffles for breakfast, soup or bread for lunch, con, salads, pastries and desserts for dinner.

Other ideas for using pecans: add chopped nuts to bread crumbs for casserole topping, use chopped nuts to top pumpkin pie in the last few minutes of baking, or roll cheese balls in chopped nuts before serving.

Make nut-bread fingers to serve with salads by rolling fingers of buttered bread in chopped pecans. Or try mixing equal amounts of chopped pecans and chopped olives with mayonaise to moisten. Spread this on whole wheat bread for extra special sand wiches. A snack item that can be made and used weeks later is Spiced Nuts. They are excellent to have on hand to serve when company drops in for coffee.

Spiced Nuts

In a deep heavy skillet melt 2 sticks butter and stir in 4 cups walnut or pecan halves. Cook the nuts over low heat, stirring frequently, for about 20 minutes, or until the nuts are heated and lightly browned.

Into a paper bag sift together 3 cups confectioners' sugar and 2 tbs. each cinnamon, ground cloves and nutmeg. Remove the nuts from the skillet with a slotted spoon and drain them on paper towels. Add the nuts to the spiced sugar and toss them gently to remove the excess sugar. Spread the nuts on paper towels to cool.

New Dry Whole Milk Powder

Ten years of research have produced a new dry whole milk powder which may successfully meet the ultimate trial: it tastes like milk.

The product, Dairy Fresh, was developed by U. S. Department of Agriculture research engineers. In marketing tests it proved itself successful as a beverage.

Just about everyone who bought and used the new powder couldn't tell the difference between it and fresh fluid milk.

Nonfat dry milk powders are not new; they have been sold in

supermarkets for years. But powdered whole milk, prior to Dairy Fresh, was not generally sold in retail outlets. It went mainly to institutional trade usually for cooking and baking.

Dairy Fresh is made by a continuous vacuum foam process which pasteurizes, homogenizes and concentrates whole milk and reduces it to powder. A can of the Dairy Fresh powder can be reconstituted to the equivalent of one quart of whole milk, with a butterfat content of 3.25 percent.

The powder can be stored under normal home refrigeration for six months. To reconstitute, homemakers add cold water to the powder in an electric mixer or shaker.

Virtually all Dairy Fresh users in the market test gave it high scores when asked to rate its taste, wholesomeness, cost and richness.

Three in 10 Dairy Fresh users considered the powdered milk less rich than fresh fluid milk, but the acceptance rate on the "ease of storage" point was overwhelming.

Acceptance of Dairy Fresh was evidenced in yet another way. More than 75 percent of the consumers who bought and used it said they planned to buy more. A followup interview showed that a third of the initial customers had actually made a second purchase.

The new powdered milk did not cut into another product's market.

At the price it was sold—four cents per quart below whole milk in 2-quart cartons—Dairy Fresh will open new outlets for milk in camping, resort homes and for special use. Fluid milk sales during the test period were not affected by Dairy Fresh.

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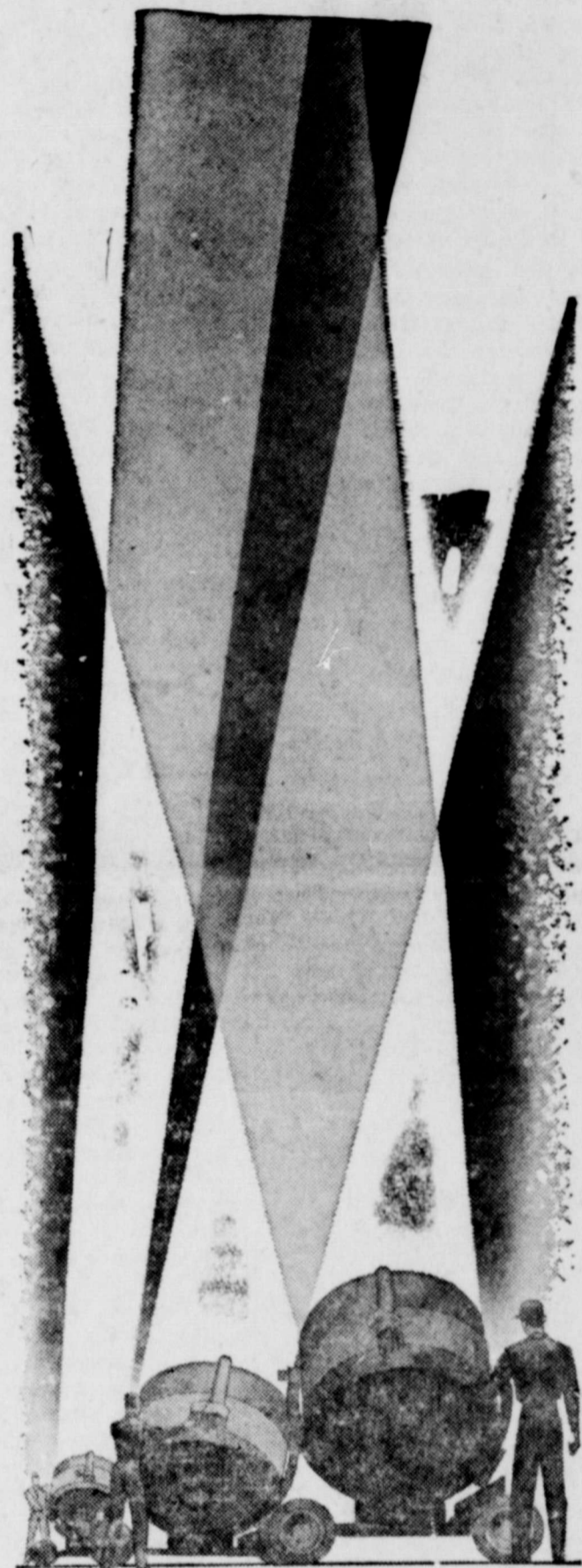

From school winners in Texas, a State Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected within the next few weeks. The state winner will be awarded a \$1,500 scholarship and the runner-up a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

This spring, the 51 Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join for an expense-paid educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Climax of the tour will be announcement of the 1970 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. AUSTIN, Tex. — Texans who registered to vote before January 31 deadline are assured plenty of action for their 1970 registration certificate.

One of the nation's hottest U. S. Senate races is due to rage on through the November 3 general election.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, 66, of Austin and former Congressman Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr., 48, a Houston business executive, are major Democratic contenders for Yarborough's seat. Whoever wins will face Republican Congressman George Bush, 45, of Houston in November.

Gov. Preston Smith, 57, may have opposition from Sen. Ralph Hall, 46, of Rockwall, who made a last-minute announcement Monday as a candidate on the Democratic ticket. Hall's application was not accepted by the State Democratic Executive Committee for technical reasons and was referred to the Supreme Court for determination of his eligibility.

Paul Eggers, 50, of Wichita Falls, will be the Republican challenger for the office of Governor in the general election in November.

Republicans talk freely about million-dollar campaigns for Eggers and Bush.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin will be opposed by District Judge David Brown of Sherman in the Democratic primary and Corpus Christi attorney Edward Yturri, 42, a Republican, in November.

Republicans came up with a surprising number of statewide candidates before the February 2 filing deadline.

In addition, there will be hard fought local contests in many Texas counties.

Long-time conservative leader Bard A. Logan of San Antonio said he was "tired and needed a rest" so he resigned as chairman of The American Party of Texas. Vice-chairman H. W. Matthews of Conroe succeeds Logan until the election of a new leader at the state convention.

Chief chore of the American Party now is to get 30,000 to attend its May 2 precinct conventions, so it can qualify to place a gubernatorial candidate on the ballot.

And there will be a sizzling November 3 battle over the liquor-by-the-drink proposition on the constitutional amendment ballot. Lines are already forming and campaigns shaping up on that.

TREASURE BOOKLET — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler is now distributing free copies for his booklet, "Treasure Tempest in Texas." It's about the Padre Island galleons and their cargo.

At the request of Corpus Christi Rep. Frances Farenthold, State Auditor George McNeil checked on whether state facilities had been used in printing the booklets. He reported that Sadler had reimbursed the agency \$5,000. "It might be in order for me to observe that it is not unusual for general information brochures to be done at State expense," McNeil wrote, saying that Sadler appears to be "leaning over backwards to avoid criticism."

Printing of brochures is a common practice in many state departments, as a necessary part of informing the public. Thousands of copies of various and elaborate, well written and informative booklets have been provided by numerous departments to the schools and libraries of Texas. Many departments even have their own printing plants.

Sadler's opponents in the Land Commissioner race, Rep. Bob Armstrong has not been critical of the incumbent. Armstrong, a prominent Austin sportsman, began his campaign by calling for stronger conservation measures.

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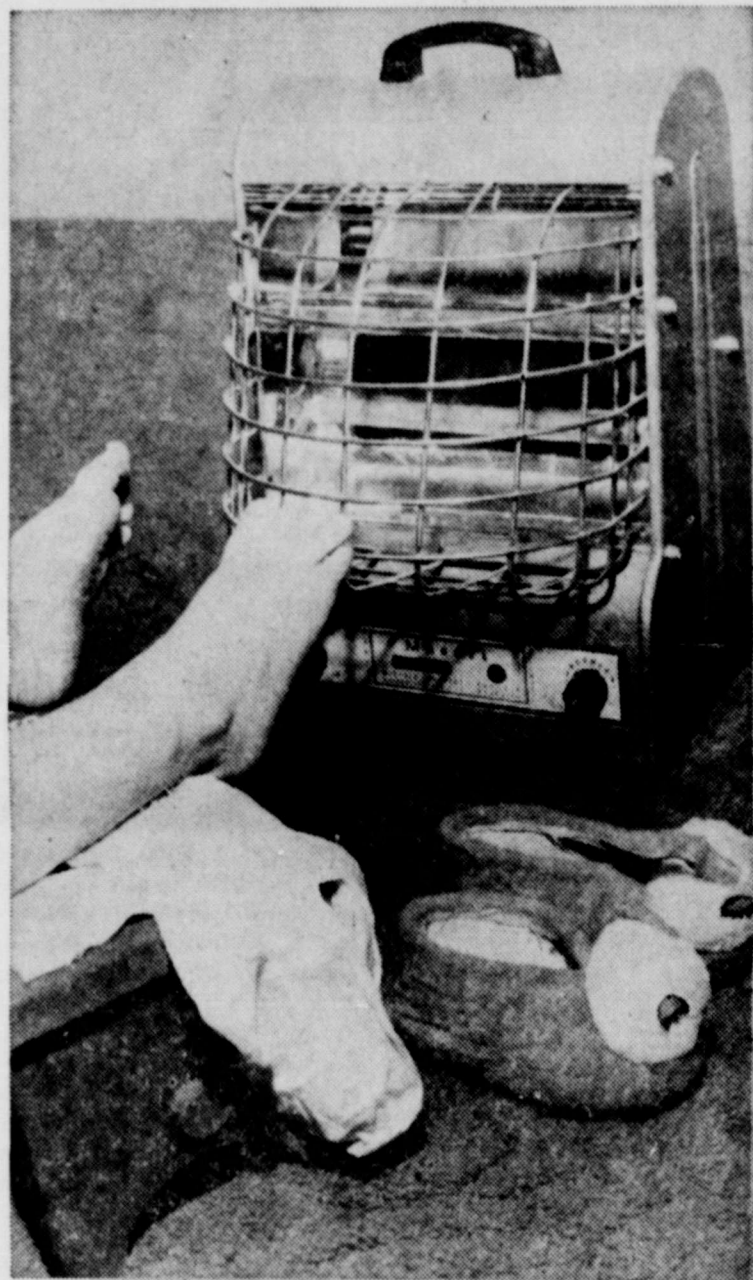
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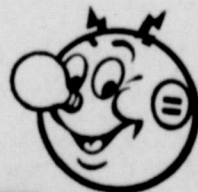

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Cotton Support Payments Upped

Stamford — Farmers in seven counties at the bottom of the Rolling Plains will receive \$1,435,385 more in total price support payments on their 1970 cotton crop than they will realize off their 1969 crop, according to Charles Bragg, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The increase will result from an over-all hike of 22 pounds in average yields, a 2.07 cent-a-pound increase in payment rate and a 13,505-acre gain in allotments, Bragg said.

Four of the counties sustained reductions totaling 32 pounds when the State ASC Committee met recently to set the 1970 projected yields, pay rates and acreage allotments.

Schleicher lost 15 pounds when the State Board cut yields from 278 to 263 pounds for the 1970 crop; Coke lost 12 pounds, from 146 to 136; Concho dropped four pounds, from 226 to 222; and Coleman lost one pound from 172 to 171.

Three counties received a total boost of 55 pounds in projected yields for 1970; Runnels got a 29-pound hike, from 261 to 290.

Tom Green's projected yields were upped 18 pounds, from 278 to 296. McCullough got an eight pound increase, from 169 to 177.

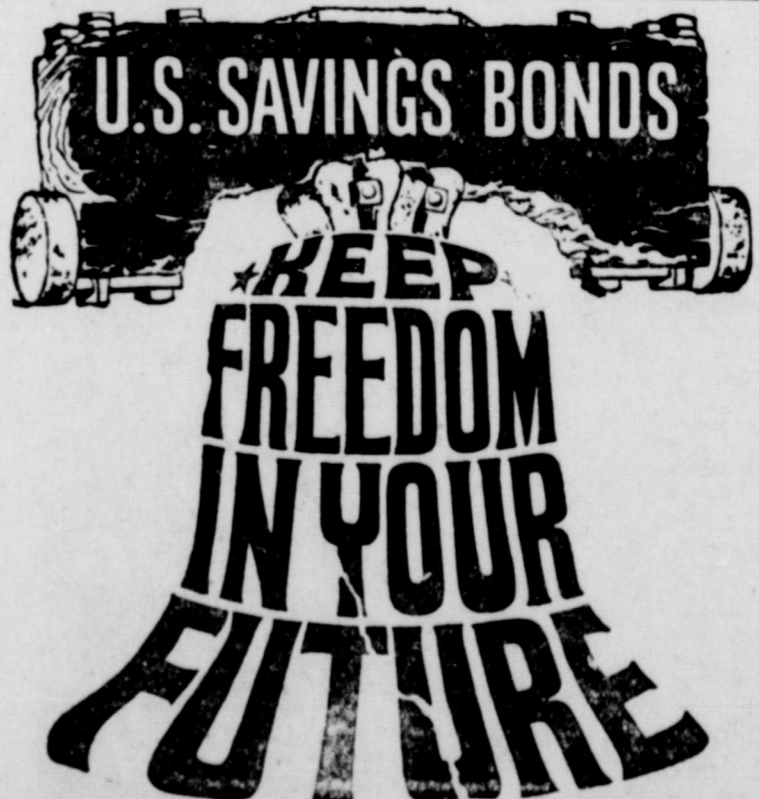
The citation accompanying the medal said:

On that date, the company was moving through a densely vegetated area in Que Son Valley to assist in evacuating casualties sustained by a sister unit. Observing a wounded comrade fall in the initial barrage of fire, Private McGinnis unhesitatingly left his relatively secure position and rushed forward to aid his fellow soldier. While treating the man, Private McGinnis detected enemy activity to his right flank. Quickly securing his M-16 rifle, Private McGinnis raked the area with heavy volumes of fire, ending the suspicious movement and bringing renewed security to the area. His courageous actions were directly responsible for the timely medical attention given to the casualty and instrumental in the overall success of the mission. Private First Class McGinnis' personal heroism and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflect great credit upon himself, the American Division, and the United States Army.

McGinnis has served in Vietnam for the past eight months. He has received two promotions since August and is now a sergeant.

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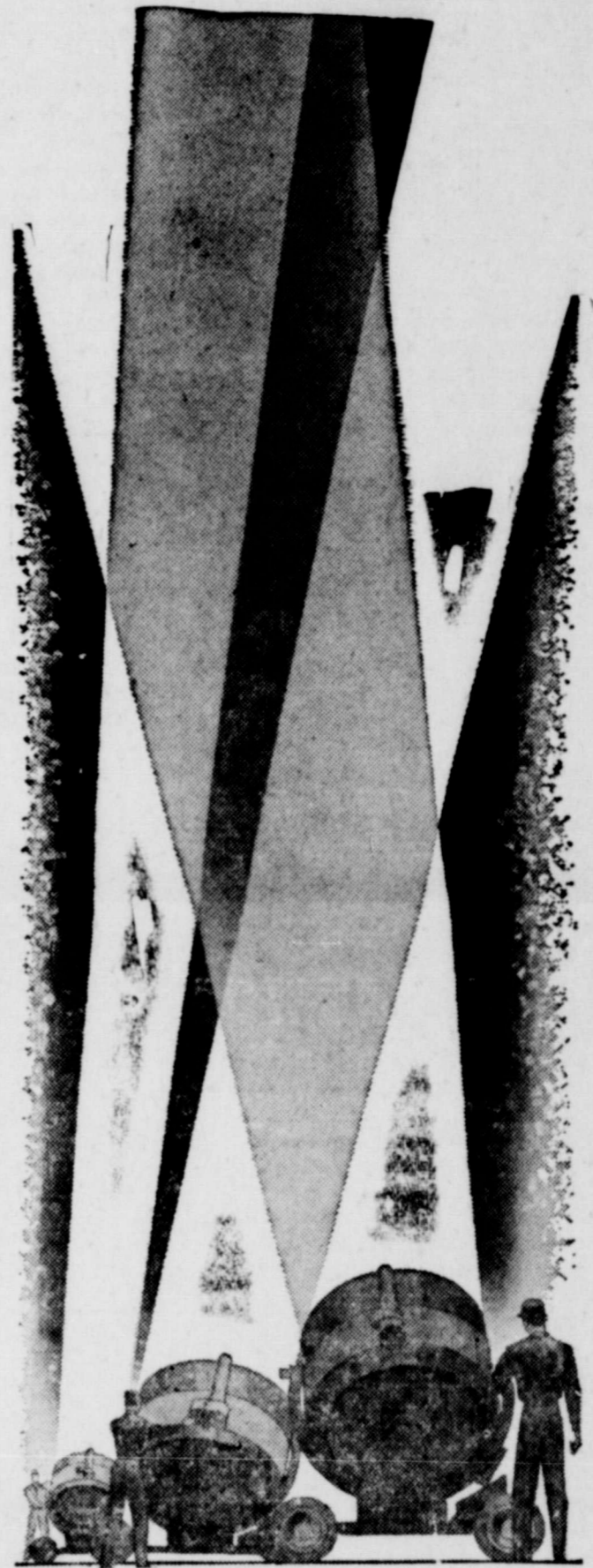

News in the Clothing Field

Youth will set their own dress rules of what and where to wear in the 1970's. Their clothes will express their own personality creatively.

Youth in the 1970's will be freer to devote their energies to pursuits which give them pleasure and a sense of personal accomplishment independent of economic considerations. In this affluence their belongings are not meant to become heirlooms.

They are for right now... this minute... today. They can afford not to be materialistic. Their clothes will reflect this freedom.

They will readily accept technological changes in fabrics. Designs will generally be uncluttered, streamlines, comfortable and versatile.

Midi raincoats are taking over in fabrics of soft nylon satin, vinyl coated silk, cotton gabardine, warm acrylic or wool knits and polyurethane.

Polyurethane is a man made fabric that can be textured, crushed or printed to resemble the reptile world. It may have a soft dull or a shiny lacquered look.

Each fiber has its own care needs. The finishes applied make a difference in the amount of protection you need in a raincoat. Read the label for care recommendations and information on water protection.

Sewing Double Knits of Polyester

"Sewing with double knit of textured polyester may well spoil you for all other fabrics," says an enthusiastic home sewing editor of a popular women's magazine. Two important reasons:

1. The finished garment is great to wear... easy to care for. It retains its shape without bagging or sagging. It is highly wrinkle resistant and packable. The fabric is comfortable to wear, combining a softness and crispness which prevents the linging quality of most other knit fabrics. As for care, such clothes can be machine washed and tumble dried or washed by hand and drip dried. No ironing in either case.

2. The fabric is adaptable... easy to handle and sew. Polyester double knit is suitable for casual or dressy wear. In most cases, it doesn't ravel, require stay stitching, tape or seam finishing. Set-in sleeves and fullness are easy to manage. Usually lining or interfacing is not needed except occasionally for a jacket or coat at buttonholes. If interfacing is desired, choose the new lightweight nonwoven wash-

able type designed especially for knits. Here are sewing pointers. If a slight shrinkage of fabric might present a fitting problem, preshrink fabric by washing and tumble drying. Preshrink zipper as well.

Pin pattern on grain using sharp dressmaker pins.

Use fine needle (9-11) and long stitch (8-10 per inch, or even longer). Try each fabric for best results.

Use cotton-covered polyester thread.

Check tension by sewing a double thickness of fabric. Adjust so stitch looks same on top and underneath. Guide fabrics gently under pressure foot.

If lining is used, attach only at neckline, armholes and waistline seam to benefit from stretch and recovery characteristics of fabric.

Press seams open as you sew, using low steam setting. If you want semi-permanent creases, "test press" fabric to determine degree of crushing or glazing to expect.

When putting in hem, make single row of stitching a half inch from bottom edge, pinking if desired. Pin up hem. Hold back top edge and loosely catch the line of machine stitching to fabric directly opposite. The hand stitching will not be visible on garment, since hem will be a half inch below edge. "Fusibles" may be used as short-cut method of hemming knits.
