## Weather Offers Variety

Bronte area residents have experienced a great variety of weather during the past week.

peratures climbed into the 80s Monday afternoon, but a cold front moved in Monday night.

Cooler weather Tuesday grew into cold weather by Wednesday and snow fell most of Wednesday.

nesday. However, it melted just about as fast as it fell, since the mercury was hovering right at the freezing mark. Temperatures early Thursday morning dropped to 27 degrees.

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Austin—Local school districts will contribute \$217.2 million toward financing Texas' basic foundation education program in 1970-71.

State Board of Education settled on this figure in approving local fund assignments of approximately 20 per cent of the total program cost. State pays the rest.

Sixty-first Legislature set local fund assignment at \$204.9 million, plus 20 per cent of the cost of new programs.

Board approved the economic index for each of 254 counties, determining the contribution to be made by districts as a fair share of costs. Each district is further assigned an amount based on the percentage of tax valuations. Tentative indexes have been mailed to district and county superintendents.

Economic index is re-computed each year, based on three-year averages of valuations, scholastic population and income.

In other action, the board:

- \* Reversed the Taylor County School Board order to transfer 73.9 acres of land and 10 pupils from Wylie to the Abilene School districts, on grounds that local trustees made the original decision in a secret meeting... which is not legal under Texas laws.

- \* Approved for re-adoption \$3,075,149 worth of textbooks in 36 subjects covering all grades.

- \* Awarded a \$150,000 contract to Texas A&M University to train driver education teachers and teaching assistants in two summer short courses.

- \* Heard a report that there is no significant disadvantage for driver education students from use of non-degree teaching assistants in driving courses.

- \* Voted to continue the School for the Blind project to develop a percentual training program for visually handicapped children into 1971 under a new \$69,041 contract with the U. S. Office of Education.

**COURTS SPEAK**—In a precedent setting case, State Supreme Court held that mineral rights are dominant over surface rights in lands condemned by government agencies.

Owners have a right to reasonable use of the surface to get minerals under such lands, says the Court, and where public use interferes with recovery of minerals, a second condemnation is necessary. Case involved 7.6 acres of land condemned by Chambers-Liberty Counties Navigation district.

High court also agreed to hear arguments April 1 as to whether a house owned by the San Antonio Methodist Church should be exempt from property taxation. House is used as a resi-

dence for the church's district supervisor. Fourth Court of Civil Appeals earlier reversed a local district court which contended the house is exempt.

Abilene appeal from judgment of \$29,545 favoring a landowner whose 35 acres were condemned for a city airport was rejected by the Supreme Court.

**GOALS IDENTIFIED**—Phase II of Gov. Preston Smith's "Goals for Texas" program was kicked off when representatives of each of the 21 planning regions of the state came to Austin for a conference, and presented recommendations for improvements in the Texas way of life.

These recommendations will form the basis of his 1971 recommendations on state goals, says the governor. Smith sees the process as "bringing the government close to the people"... a procedure he favors.

"If we win, we will have made state government more responsive and more relevant to all Texans," he said. "We will have taken the leadership among our sister states in providing solutions to our own problems and, more important, we will have involved people in the decision-making process."

**INSPECTION DEADLINE NEARS**—There still are nearly 3.2 million Texas vehicles yet to be inspected before the mandatory April 15 deadline. Department of Public Safety warns.

About 2.4 million cars and trucks have complied with inspection requirements since the new period began on Sept. 1. This is the last deadline under the old law. State now is on a 12-month inspection period, with stickers expiring on the last day of the month, 12 months from date of the sticker.

New stickers are placed on left side of the windshield. They show the month of inspection and expiration. So, if you still have a sticker on the right side of your windshield, your car must be inspected by April 15.

**OIL SPILL REPORTED**—A "major oil spill" resulting from a pipeline leak into water supplies of Mineral Wells and Santo Water Supply Corporation has been reported to Governor Smith.

Site of the 500-barrel spillage is one the south fork of Palo Pinto Creek near the Gordon community. It occurred when a bulldozer operated by a farmer apparently broke an eight-inch, high pressure pipeline. State Health Department was called in to protect the health of area residents, and the Water Quality Board said the attorney general may be asked to file suit against negligent parties.

**EIGHT SPURN FOOD PROGRAMS**—Eight counties still

refuse to participate in free food distribution programs for the poor, reports the Texas Welfare Department.

Counties are Gillespie, Kerr, Uvalde, Bowie, Edwards, Randall, Roberts and Colorado, Department said. Another 29 are undecided or have not indicated a preference to welfare officials.

In any county which refuses to cooperate in a food assistance program, Welfare Department will, under court order, operate a commodity distribution program at federal expense, Commissioner Burton Hackney said.

**SCREW-WORMS**—There were no new cases of screwworm developed in Texas in January, but the total for 1969 came to 160 laboratory confirmed cases, according to a year-end report of the State Animal Health Commission.

Seven million sterile flies were released in Texas in January in the screwworm eradication program even though there were no cases that month.

**REHABILITATION**—Governor Smith gave Texas Jaycees a certificate of commendation for their efforts to re-open a rehabilitation hospital at Gonzales. The group is conducting a state-wide drive to raise \$50,000 for the hospital, to help match a \$140,000 Federal grant. When completed it will be able to treat 300 patients a year, doubling the state's facilities for rehabilitation work.

**Short Snorts**

Cigarette tax increase upped the February revenue \$3.4 million (from \$9.4 million in February 1969, to \$12.8 million this year).

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in a new opinion that the State Board of Medical Examiners has no authority to delegate to any other than a board member duty of holding and proctoring examinations for a medical license.

U. S. Office of Child Development grants have been approved for Operation Head Start programs for Lamesa-Dawson County Community council (\$21,526), Starr County council (\$252,516) and Alabama-Coushatta reservation tribal council (\$17,050).

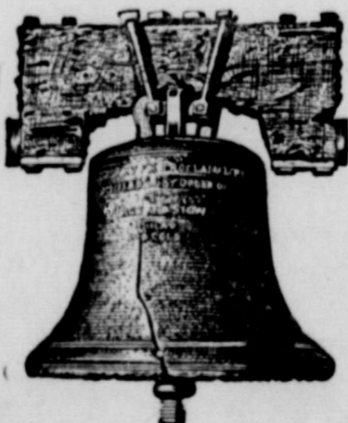
Robert Estrada of Brownsville is new director of Mexican-American Affairs for the Republican Party of Texas.

Business activity across Texas declined seven per cent in January, reports the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas at Austin.

U. S. Department of Labor invited Texas to develop a proposal for state sponsorship of a public service careers program designed to increase employment opportunities in state government for disadvantaged persons, with federal funding hoped for over a 21 month period.

Although the deadline for ordering 1970 automobile tags by mail has passed, the Highway Department reminds that the new computerized form still will save time in issuing plates at court houses and substations.

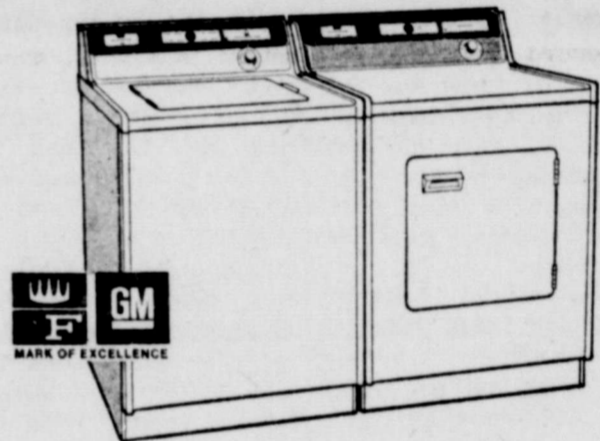

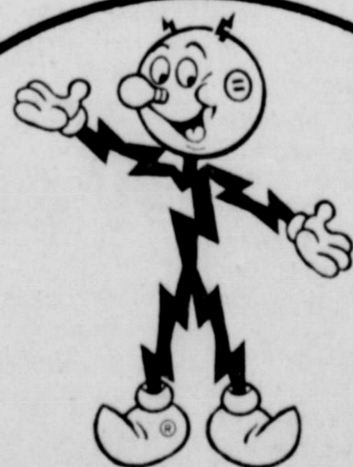

Joe Rawlings, President; R. T. Caperton, Wayne Arrott, Dale Thompson, Delbert Coalsen, Glenn Skelton, Russell Carlton, constituting a quorum, and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS this School District has less than 500 scholastics and this election is ordered and shall be held in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 23, Texas Education Code, applicable to independent school districts having less than 500 scholastics.

WHEREAS on the first Saturday in April, 1970, being April 4, 1970, a trustee election will be held in said School District for the purpose of electing 2 members to the Board of Trustees of said School District.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BRONTE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

That an election be held in said School District on April 4, 1970, for the purpose of electing two members to the Board of Trustees of said District.

That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and filed with the County Judge of the county in which this District is located not later than 30 days prior to date of said election.

That said election shall be held at the following places and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election.

At the City Hall Building, in Bronte, Texas, in said School District with Mrs. Otis Smith as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Dwain Pruitt and Mrs. D. K. Glenn, Clerks.

At Green's Store Building, in Tennyson, Texas, in said School District with Mrs. Tom Green as Presiding Judge and Mrs. Robert Brown, Clerk.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

Mrs. Winnie Waldrop, County Clerk, is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and her staff are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the County Courthouse within

the boundaries of the above named District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the Election Code of this state, and the County Judge shall furnish, at the expense of this School District, all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the results thereof to the County Clerk, to be delivered by the County Clerk to the Commissioners' Court at its first meeting thereafter and to be canvassed by said Court. The ballot boxes and other supplies for said election shall be returned to the County Clerk in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Election Code.

A copy of this order shall serve as notice of said election, and be posted in three different places in said School District, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date for said election. The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall also cause a notice by publication of this election to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this School District is located, which publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with the order of the Board of Trustees the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board, located in the administrative office, a place convenient to the public, and said notice having been so posted and remained posted continuously for at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that this District is located in Coke County and that written notice of the date, place and subject matter of this meeting was furnished to the County Clerk of each county in which this District is located and that said notices were posted by the County Clerk of each of said counties on the bulletin board at the door of the county courthouse for said county, a place convenient to the public, at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting. The returns of said posting shall be attached to the minutes of this meeting and shall be a part thereof for all intents and purposes.

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TERRITORY WITHIN THE CONFINES OF THE EXTRA-TERRITORIAL JURISDICTION OF THE CITY OF BRONTE PURSUANT TO TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. ART. 970a (1963); PROVIDING SAVINGS CLAUSES; AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF ANNEXATION

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

Section 1. Pursuant to Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. Art. 970a (1963) there is hereby annexed to the City of Bronte the territory described in Section 2 of this Ordinance. (Said territory is hereinafter referred to as the Annexed Territory.)

Section 2. The Annexed Territory is comprised of the following: All of that certain parcel of land lying and being situated in Coke County, Texas, which comprises all the territory and lands lying within and encompassed by the territorial limits or boundaries herein described, to-wit:

Being 27-62/100 acres of land out of the C. & M. R. R. Co. Survey No. 2, and 59-64/100 acres out of the C. & M. R. R. Co. Survey No. 3 in Coke County, Texas, and being described in one tract as follows:

Beginning at a point in the East line of the C. & M. R. R. Co. Survey No. 3, Coke County, Texas, and in the North right-of-way line of the Ballinger Highway, said point being fifty feet North 30° East from the Southeast corner of said Survey No. 3;

THENCE North 70° 41' West, 1089-2/10 feet along said right-of-way line to the existing City Limit line;

THENCE along the existing

city limits with the following three courses:

North 20° 30' East, 53-7/10 feet along existing city limits to the cemetery fence; North 69° 30' West, 158-3/100 feet along the cemetery fence; And North 19° 24' East, 2140-6/10 feet to a pipe in the South line of the Park Road;

Should any part of this Ordinance be declared invalid or the application thereof ineffective as to any territory, such invalidity or ineffectiveness of such part shall in no wise affect, impair or invalidate the remaining portion or portions thereof, but as to such remaining portion or portions, the same shall be and remain in

full force and effect; and should this Ordinance for any reason be ineffective as to any part of the Annexed Territory hereby ordained annexed, such ineffectiveness as to any such part or parts of the annexed Territory shall not affect the effectiveness of this Ordinance as to all of the remainder of the Annexed Territory, and provided further, that if there is included within the Annexed Territory to be hereby annexed any lands or area which are presently part of and included within the limits of the City of Bronte or which are not within the City or Bronte's jurisdiction to annex, the same is hereby excluded and excepted from the Annexed Territory to be hereby annexed as fully as if such excluded and excepted area were expressly described herein.

Section 5. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately from and after its passage and approval.

## WASHINGTON

"As it looks from here"

Washington — "The President, Vice President and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors." This is Section 4, Article II of The Constitution.

There has been much discussion over the years as to what constitutes impeachable offenses. For many years the theory was maintained that indictable offenses only were impeachable. This theory has been stoutly defended and stoutly denied. Only one case appears to exist for impeachment on an offense not subject to indictment.

Mostly we think of treason, bribery or, for that matter, any crime, as being clearly a matter of black and white. In any criminal trial in our courts, intent often determines convictions, acquittal or mitigation. Intent and motive is at the heart of solving crime as well as prosecution. The courts have held that to convict one charged with advocating the overthrow of our Government, an overt act must be proved. In other words, action must be connected with the statement of the accused.

Justice of the Supreme Court, William O. Douglas, has recently written a 97-page booklet entitled "Points of Rebellion." It is a tirade against the "American establishment"—the Pentagon, the FBI, the CIA, police, employers and educators. One of the strongest sentences is that "violence may be the only effective response of outraged youth."

Justice Douglas compares our today's establishment with King George III of England. "George III was the symbol against which our founders made a revolution, now considered bright and glorious," Justice Douglas wrote. The Justice says in his book, "We must realize that today's establishment is the new George III. Whether it will continue to adhere to its tactics we do not know. If it does, the redress honored in tradition is also revolution."

Throughout his treatise, Mr. Douglas offers justification for violence. In an appraisal of his writings, he acknowledges that riot has no constitutional sanctions but says that "injustices may pile so high that violence is the only answer."

In other passages, the Supreme Court Justice advises American protesters to risk arrest because the police have no right to interfere with their freedom. (Can you imagine this?)

Mr. Justice Douglas excoriates the military, FBI snooping and other law enforcement agencies trying to get at lawlessness and writes an indictment of our society in general. To this criticism alone, he is entitled to his personal opinion.

It is quite a horse of another color when he attempts justification of violence and revolution directed at influencing the overthrow of the Government of the United States of which he is a part. Reading his words there seems to be no distinguishable difference between "the system," "the establishment" and established order under law.

Justice Douglas writes that he hopes the revolution he is talking about will not be like the one in 1776. The revolution that is coming he says, will arise from "the search of youth for ways and means of making the machine...the servant of man." Just exactly what this means is a little difficult to interpret.

The interpretation is less vague when he encourages violence and says that it bothers him that the establishment may not be wise enough not to use "its stockpile of arms" to suppress the dissenters, for he thinks that will bring on an awful ordeal.

Data is being collected in certain efforts to determine if impeachment proceedings will stand up against Justice Douglas. Included in the collection of evidence is Mr. Douglas' past association with a private foundation alleged to be tied to racketeers.

"Points of Rebellion" is being added to a Bill of Particulars against Justice Douglas. At least he should resign from the Supreme Court, which he must also hate even in its recent years of applying the extreme liberal philosophy. Apparently the Justice has prejudged cases which could possibly come before him of a nature involving revolutionary activities.

### Frozen Foods

The average American eats 70 pounds of frozen foods a year. Eighty-two per cent of the 2,850 frozen food items available today did not exist ten years ago. The number of new frozen food items are increasing twice as fast as other grocery items.

Why? Because frozen foods are meeting the challenges produced by changes in family eating patterns.

How are family eating patterns changing? Family members eat at different times. Children prepare food. All family members have more activities outside the home.

We are a leisure-oriented society and small unit households are on the increase. These all increase the need for prepared or ready foods.

Prepared foods—those brought to some state of readiness by the processor prior to quick freezing—account for nearly 70 per cent of today's total frozen food sales. In 1952, they accounted for on-

ly two per cent.

Within the past ten years, the number of TV dinners sold annually has increased from 50 million to over 600 million, and the market is still gaining at a rate of 15 per cent per year.

Last year, there were enough frozen prepared dinners sold to feed every man, woman and child in the United States three times.

The TV dinner line has grown from three, in 1952, to nearly 30. And today's frozen TV dinner is much improved and better prepared and they sell at almost half the original price. Frozen dinners dominate the prepared foods category.

Why are TV dinners so popular?

According to an economy study conducted by Drexel Institute of Technology, to prepare the same meal, the homemaker must value her time at only 16 cents an hour.

Frozen prepared foods have eliminated much of the time-consuming food preparation chores. Homemakers working away from home are not faced with kitchen chores when they get home. Even washing dishes after dinner virtually is eliminated.

Frozen foods have come a long way since Clarence Birdseye con-

ceived the idea 55 years ago. The few commercial products introduced then have evolved into thousands of forms, all clamoring for space in the retailer's case.

No doubt the development of the frozen food industry has contributed measurably to the changes now so evident in family living patterns today.

### Home Economics Briefs

How does the U. S. consumer spend his money? His expenditures are broken down like this: food and tobacco—23.2 per cent; housing—14.4 per cent; household operation—14.1 per cent; transportation—13.5 per cent; clothing and accessories—10.3 per cent; medical care expenses—7.2 per cent; recreation—6.3 per cent; personal business—5.5 per cent; personal care—1.7 per cent; private education—1.6 per cent; religion and charity—1.5 per cent; other—0.7 per cent.
