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Austin — New programs are in the works for job training and computerizing data on the industrial advantages offered by Texas communities.

Texas Industrial Commission announced its computer project will go into operation this summer with completion of data storage on cities across the state. Texas Municipal League, Chambers of Commerce and industrial developers are cooperating.

Commission plans to provide prospective industries with instant information on every town in Texas, listing natural and human resources available, economic potential and strong points in each place.

Program also is designed to show communities which industries most likely would be inter-

ested in their attractions.

Meanwhile, a three-year project to develop industry's ability to determine what training is needed and where was announced at the Governor's Conference on Technical-Vocational Education here.

Construction Industry for Education, Manpower and Research will receive \$90,000 from Texas Education Agency to help other industries plan training based on families, occupations or employment. Council will use the system to develop an environmental technology program expected to enroll between 9,000 and 10,000 students in 1972.

Students will get an introduction to the industries in the ninth grade, study plumbing basics in the tenth grade, heating and cooling in the eleventh. In their senior year, they will select jobs for part-time supervised training. After high school, they can go directly to work in a trade or take advanced training in technology or engineering. Industry and education agencies cooperate in offering the program.

**Air Board-AG Clash** — Texas Air Control Board has accused the attorney general's office of demanding too much evidence before it will take pollution cases to court.

"You shouldn't have to kill anybody to get prosecution," emphasized Dr. Wendell H. Hamrick, Houston member of the board. "I don't see how we can ever get any prosecution under conditions set out by the attorney general."

Protest broke open a long-standing conflict between the board and state lawyers over how much evidence is necessary

to support filing of air pollution violations against industries. It was provoked by an Austin furniture plant case, where the Attorney General declined to take action for lack of sufficient evidence.

Attorney General's representative said the boards stringent regulations present the problem of proving danger to public health and welfare.

**Courts Speak**—Supreme Court held that witnesses cannot be forced to present certain types of records when they are sought only to challenge their own testimony.

High Court overruled the effort of the City of Orange to direct the Beaumont Court of Civil Appeals to make specific findings in an annexation dispute between Orange and Port Neches.

After appeal to the State Supreme Court a Houston shipyard welder won his case for workmen's compensation disability insurance on the basis of his claim that he was poisoned by fumes in a job accident.

Fred Williams of Houston, candidate for land commissioner, has asked the Supreme Court to force Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler to make public a list of 43,000 voters who have state veteran land loans.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, through the AG's anti-trust and consumer division, got a district court injunction against Empire Sewing Machine Distributors of Fort Worth ordering it to stop deceptive trade practices.

**AG Rules**—Out-of-state liquor may be used to stock airlines in Texas without paying any state tax unless the alcoholic beverages are sold while the plane is over Texas, says Attorney General Martin.

In another recent opinion, Martin held that the Sunnyvale Town Council, Dallas County, cannot act in the capacity of a school board for Sunnyvale Independent School District.

**TB Test Reinstated** — Tuberculosis tests have been reinstated at all border ports of entry for cattle imported from Mexico, reports the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Action was taken under terms of a Travis County district court order enjoining the commission from permitting entry into Texas of cattle from Mexico in violation of health regulations. Associated Milk Producers of Texas filed the suit.

Early this year the Health Commission put TB testing requirements into effect on the border but suspended them two weeks later at the request of Governor Smith pending a hearing in El Paso on objections to the order. Commission decided to exempt steers and spayed heifers after the hearing. Issue will be aired at an April 6 agency meeting here.

**Registration Leaders Named** — Loving and Roberts Counties registered the highest percentages of voters in the small-county category. Loving County scored 258.3 per cent and Roberts County 232.4 per cent. Quotas were fixed by the State Democratic Executive Committee. Throckmorton County came in third in the same class.

Next group, population wise, was led by Rains County, followed closely by Stonewall, Shackelford, Bandera, Zapata, Menard, Dickens, Mills, COKE, and Jim Hogg.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration will provide the state data from its aircraft and satellites to deal with pollution problems and natural resource preservation.

An Office of Child Development grant of \$96,014 has been approved for Robertson County, Hearne, economic opportunities

Governor Smith urged the newly organized Mass Transportation Commission to pay special attention to the needs of the old, poor and handicapped who are not able to drive.

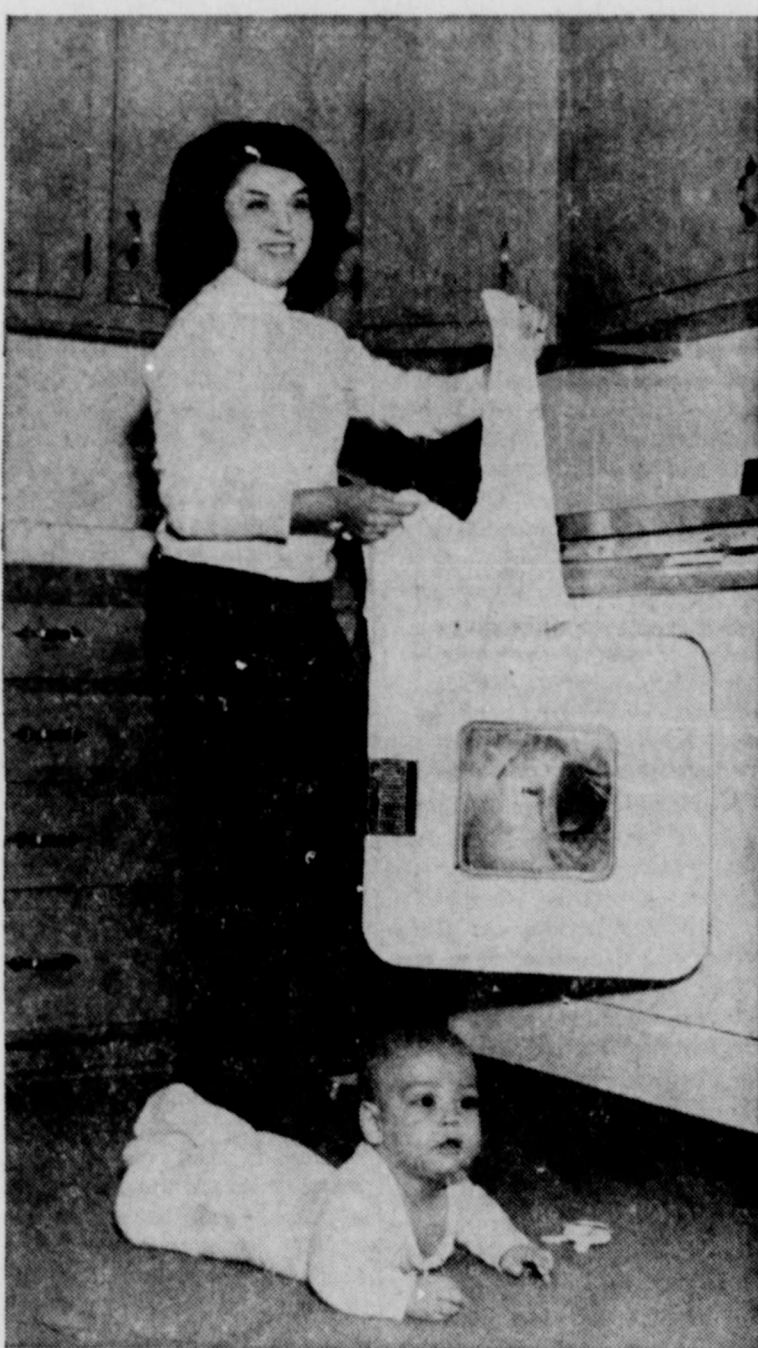

**Cong. Burleson Issues Statement On Candidacy**

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress subject to the Democratic Primary on May 2 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 Counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the Halls of Congress. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State and our Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to Government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that the people's tax money is spent wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every Session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Bur-

leson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted consistently over the years for fiscal responsibility our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our Country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our Nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the Federal Government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson stated that activities of State and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the Federal Government.

"The Federal Government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the Country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said, "the Federal Government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The Federal Government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."

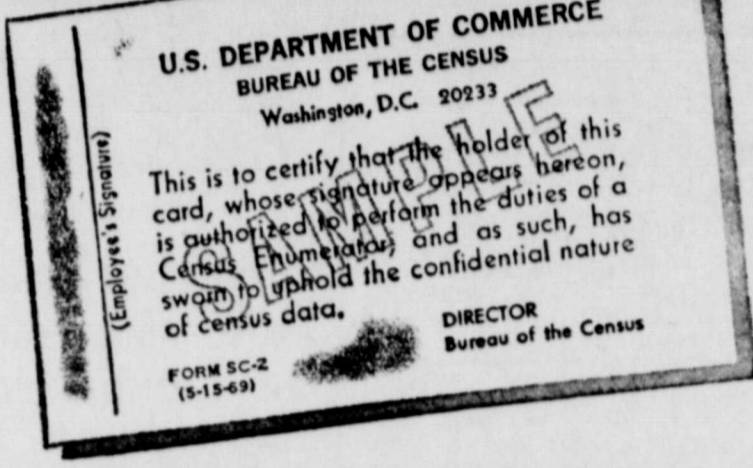

# H D Agent's News Dept.

By MRS. FAY C. BOE

Why not give the carrot an opportunity to make your meals more colorful and tasty?

The carrot's rich endowment of deep orange-gold contains a wealth of nourishment for buoyant health. You can be sure that its "carats" outweigh its modest cost.

All the important carrot varieties in this country have the deep orange color, although yellow and even white kinds are known. Around 400 carrot strains exist, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, although few of us ever come in contact with all of them.

Cutting carrots cross-wise into halves is a popular way of preparing them for pot-roasted entrees. Cut into thirds or quarters, they go into soups and stews. Cut into "rounds," the cross-cut pieces add appeal to tossed salads and are excellent steamed and buttered.

Carrot curls are always popular. Using a vegetable parer, carefully fashion the carrots into tissue-thin, broad lengthwise strips. Swirl each strip into a "curl," fasten with a toothpick, place in ice water and chill for about an hour. Remove the pick before serving, or top with a stuffed green olive.

When cutting carrots for cooking, remember that the smaller the pieces, the less cooking time will be required. Whole carrots need from 20 to 40 minutes cooking time, while tiny carrot bits are steamed to tenderness in about five minutes.

Graters come in handy when preparing carrots. Use a coarse grater for carrot shreds, medium to fine ones for the grated-style carrots. Shredded and/or grated carrots are wonderful in cole slaws, tossed salads and gelatin creations.

You can prepare Tangy Glazed Carrots for the family by using the following recipe:

To Serve 8

- 5 cups or 1 1/4 pounds sliced fresh carrots
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 (5 oz.) Jar pineapple cheese spread

Cook carrots until tender in small amount of salted boiling water. Drain. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over carrots. Continue cooking over low heat until cheese melts and mixture thickens. Do not boil.

Carrot Ambrosia—To Serve 8

- 1 quart grated carrots
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 1 3/4 oz. can grated coconut

- 3 tablespoons honey
  - 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
  - 1 cup or 8 ounces oranges, diced
  - 1/4 cup mayonnaise
  - 2 ounces marshmallows
- Combine carrots and lemon juice. Add oranges, coconut and marshmallows. Combine honey, sour cream and mayonnaise. Toss with carrot mixture. Serve on lettuce.

Shredded Carrots and Apples make a tasty combination. Give it a try while there is a plentiful supply of carrots.

- 2 cups finely shredded raw apples
- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 2 cups finely shredded raw carrots
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Shred apples into lemon juice to prevent discoloration. Add carrots and salt. Serve as a vegetable. Makes about 6 servings.

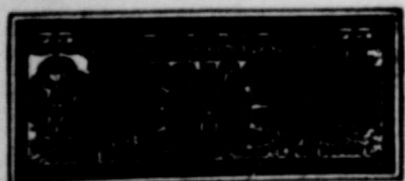
