

Warning Issued By Atty. General **On "Free" Books**

3² Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Lee were called upon recently by a salesy man who offered them "free en-B cyclopedias" but a side stipula-L tion said they would have to buy yearly supplements which would cost enough to pay for the entire set.

Lee thought the deal sounded a little "shady" and contacted the office of Attorney General Crawford Martin. He received an answer and a copy of the follow-, ing news item which Martin suggested they ask to have it published in their local newspaper.

. The article follows:

Attorney General Crawford C. Martin today warned residents of the state to be on guard against door-to-door salesmen and telephone solicitors who of-Her "free encyclopedia sets" to flom high school here. He farms the public.

The catch in this "something "for nothing" offer is that to take advantage of the "free" part of the offer, the customer must agree to keep the set up to date Uby purchasing the annual year book supplement for a period of ten years, Martin said. The result of the transaction is that the consumer ultimately pays for the entire set purchased.

At the conclusion of the sales pitch, the representative informs the prospective purchaser that though the encyclopedias are free, the company wants to insure that their advertising sets placed with "model families" are kept up to date. Therefore, the recipient must pay in advance for the annual supplements. Often the purchaser signs what he believes to be an agreement to receive the "free encyclopedias," when in fact he is actually signing a contract of sale

Martin said the sales practic es described are deceptive and misleading and in violation of the State Deceptive Trade Practice Law. The attorney general urges any Texas citizen who gelo. 



Cheese

If cheese buying puzzles you, it's understandable. More than 800 kinds of cheese are marketed around the world. They include natural cheese and blends lor combinations of natural cheese, process cheese, cheese food and cheese spread.

Each natural cheese can be grouped by moisture content or hardness and by degree of ripening or aging. Natural cheese varieties are:

Very hard, ripened: Parmesan Romanio.

Hard, ripened: Cheddar (often called American), Colby, Edam. Gouda, Gruyere, Swiss, Provolone.

Semi-soft ripened: Blue (or Bleu), Brick, Limburger, Muenster, Roquefort.

Soft, ripened: Bel Paise, Brie Camembert, Liederkranz.

Soft, unripened: Cottage Cream, Mozzarella, Neufchatel, and Ricotta.

Although Federal Standards or Identity govern the minimum per cent of milkfat and moisture permissible in most varieties, you can expect each natural cheese to differ a bit from country to country, brand to brand, and package to package even within the same brand. Variations in milk, seasonings, aging, manufacturing techniques, time of the year, locality-all affect the flavor texture and color of the same variety.

North Vietnamese leaders do care about American public opinion. And if they think they can gain something by bowing to it, they will.


