So many persons have asked us about our daughter's adventure in South America that we decided to print part of a letter received Monday. Bennie Carol is spending the summer in Caracus, capital of Venezuela. Here's her dispatch:

Here I am in Caracus. We made it in fine after I talked to you from Miami.

We applied for four jobs yesterday, all teaching English as a second language. It seems that in all of their English classes they don't speak a word of Spanish, so it doesn't matter if the teachers can speak Spanish or not. One place said they would let us know and another almost promised us a position beginning the 1st of July (when classes start). We won't know for sure about the jobs at the American school until week after next. Mr. Morris said that he hoped we wouldn't go to work during June. Caracus is quite a city, 21/2 million people. We live near the U. S. Embassy. Our house is on the bottom floor of an apartment house. (There are millions of apartment houses; Caracus is known for them.)

Commissioner John C. White also proposed in a meeting of the Interim Legislative Study Committee on Land Use and Environmental Control that the legislature regulate disposing of pesticides and chemical compounds that are no longer needed, no longer used or banned from use

> From observations, military flights from the big Soviet naval base in Murmansk are bringing submarine replacemens crews to Cuba where they board Rusto cruise off our shores.

> Reports of nuclear missiles in Cuba in 1962 were delayed for a considerable period of time which made the late showdown most serious. This appears to be the case at this time.

> Perhaps the Russians think that internal dissension in the United States has weakened us to a point that we will not react to a shift in nuclear deployment and that a nuclear presence in Cuba, and in the Cartbbean generally, will be ignored. This is one of the great dangers of the nature of the "dissent" which we have in our Nation.

It is, of course, publicly known that Kremlin has recently sent into the Caribbean Sea a naval task force believed to in- Miles. clude missile bearing cruisers and destroyers. When this was officially known, and it was, the Administration should have taken the issue up publicly and forced out into the open that which has seemingly been ignored. This has been an invitation for the Russians to continue to probe for a strengthening of their position as close to the Western Hemisphere as possible. The official attitude seems to be to "play it cool" nearer to home than on the other side of the

It was while we were absorbed where that the Soviets first sent scheme. naval units to within only 90 miles from our own shores. There has been no direct repercussions which are perceivable.

Whatever the reasoning behind it, it is pretty obvious that Russia's military is taking advantage of extending her forces in a most vital strategic position.

When it has been necessary for the United States to act in a confrontation with Russia, nothing has happened. It may not always be so but there are always certain risks to take. Imagine their reaction if we deployed nuclear carrying weapons into the Black Sea or Barents and Okhotsk Seas.

Those who see nothing but good intents on the part of the Soviet Union, reason that with their capability of launching an attack from their own soil, there should be no fear from nearby weapons. The question should follow such reasoning as to why they are expanding a force so near our Country. Sooner or later we could be placed under


